SCIENCE BUILDING AT HIGH POINT COLLEGE

Construction on a new Science and Home Economics building at High Point College is underway. This is the result of action taken by the board of trustees early in April, when they gave final approval for the erection of three additional buildings on the campus. The new buildings will be laid out in a quadrangular pattern just off West College Drive. The Science and Home Economics building, the main building of the group, will face West College Drive. The other two buildings, to be constructed at a later date, will form the ends of the quadrangle.

The Science building to be constructed and equipped at an approximate cost of \$175,000, will be of modified colonial design. Rectangular in design and two floors in height, with storage space in the attic, the building will have approximately 13,500 square feet of floor space. Outside dimensions are 118 feet by 55½ feet.

The building will be connected with the major portion of the campus by a paved walk and will be heated from the college's central heating plant.

The structure will contain facilities and laboratories for home economics instruction, a physics laboratory, two biology laboratories with a small animal room and a greenhouse, three chemistry laboratories, offices for instructors, and classrooms.

College officials stated that present plans call for the completion of the building in time for the opening of the Fall semester 1954.

GRADUATE TEACHING OVERSEAS

Lovedia Stewart (1948) from Lillington, N. C. was selected as one of the elementary teachers to go overseas and teach in an American school. She is teaching sixth grade in Bitburg American School, Bitburg, Germany. The students in this school are children of American Military personnel stationed there. In her letters she reports the school to be well equipped and so much like those here in America that she sometimes forgets she is in Germany. During her vacations she has had the opportunity to visit Paris, the Swiss Alps, England, Scotland, and many other places.

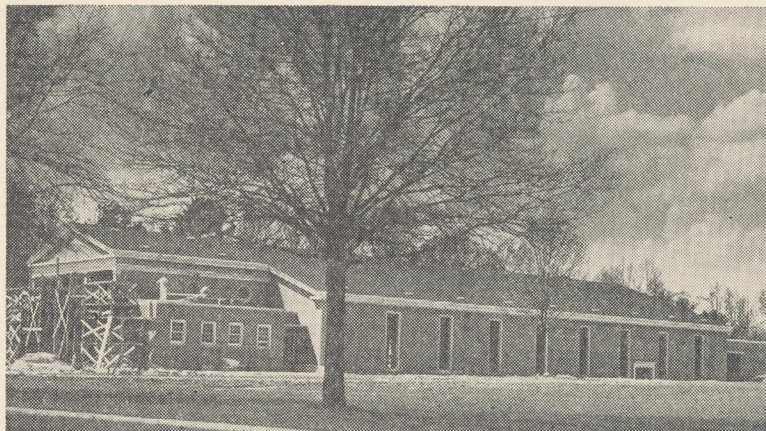

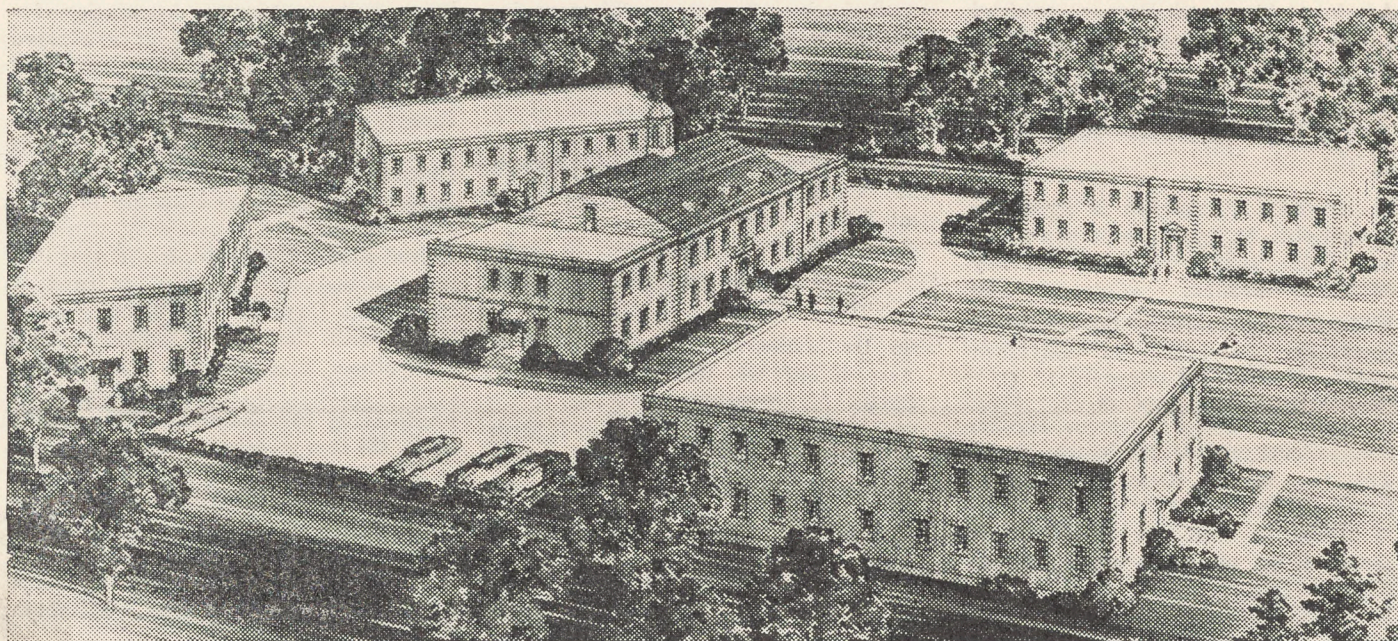

H. P. C. SOPHOMORE HIGH POINT'S COMMUNITY AMBASSADOR

Pat Peacock, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. L. R. Peacock of High Point, was chosen High Point's community ambassador. She left aboard the SS Zuiderkruis for Germany early in June and will spend several weeks in West Germany living in German homes. Her trip

is being financed by High Point Civic clubs under the sponsorship of the Junior Chamber of Commerce. Under the "Experiment in International Living," plan, she will return to High Point late in the summer and be available to speak to local clubs on her experiences in Germany and other parts of Europe where she will travel.

COLLEGE SEES GOOD FALL ENROLLMENT

Prospects for fall indicate that the College will enroll at least 750 students, according to Prof. N. P. Yarborough, registrar. Approximately 700 applications are already in, and this figure does not include a large number of day students who are expected to return or to enter for the first time.

All of the rooms in McCulloch Hall were filled before August 1 and a waiting list has been set up. Two hundred and thirty-five boys have been assigned rooms, and this is the absolute limit of the dormitory. The College plans to house three boys in several third-floor rooms.

Woman's Hall and the new Susanna Wesley Hall for women are filled to capacity, with 193 girls having been assigned rooms and at least 15 on the waiting list.

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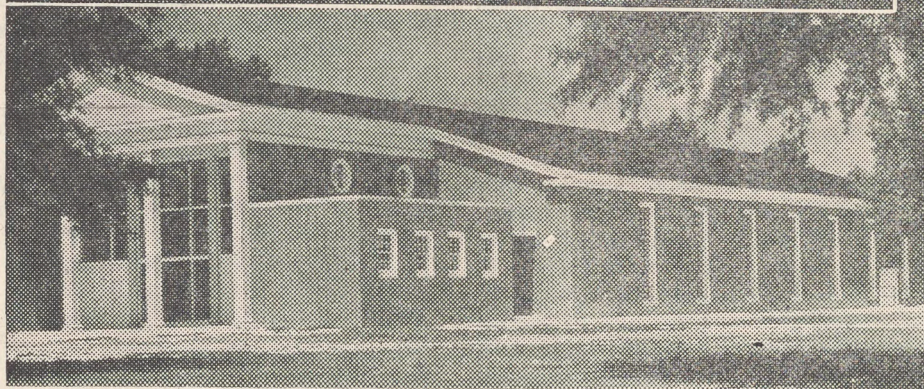
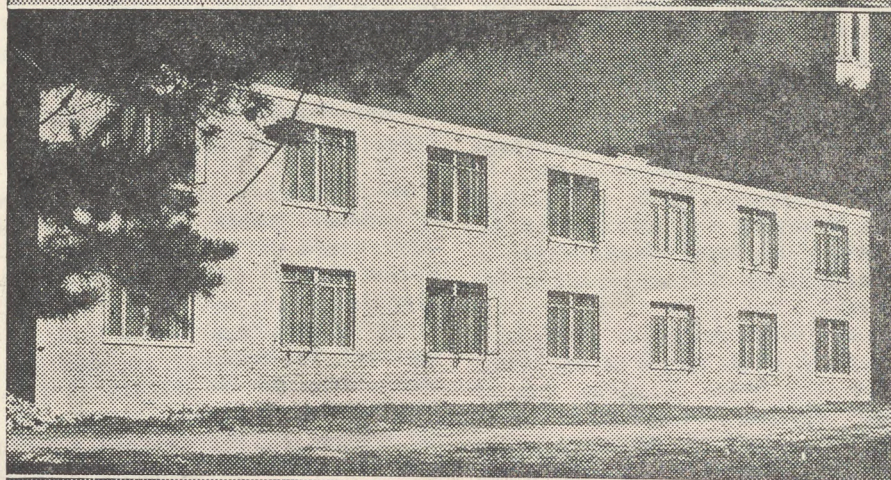
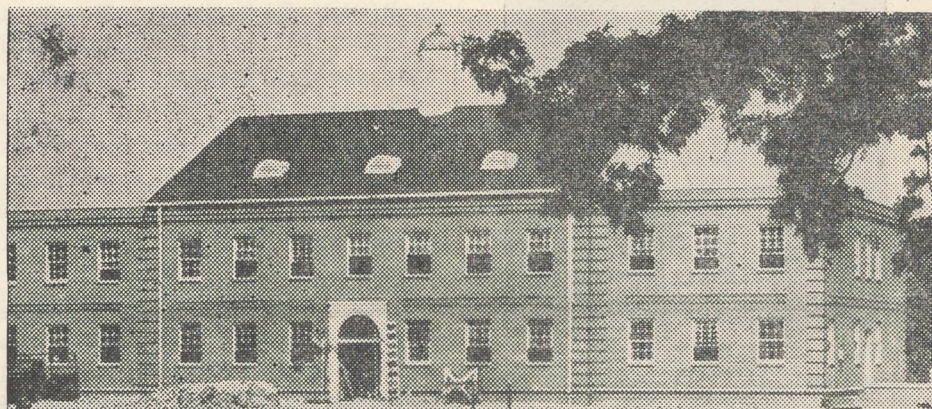

Formal dedication of the new buildings at High Point College, was held October 13 in the new Memorial Auditorium with the student body, faculty, and numerous guests present.

Dr. Weaver M. Marr, resident administrator of the American Humanities Foundation at Salem College, Salem, Virginia was the principal speaker. Dr. Marr placed a challenge before High Point College to strive always for educational excellence, to take the lead in the struggle against prejudice and bigotry, and offer a devoted understanding to youth. He said, "We can look to the future with great hope and believe that God will use High Point College for the advancement of His kingdom, through the manhood and womanhood that take from here the torch of Christian service and sacrifice."

Bishop Costen J. Harrell, of the Western North Carolina and South Carolina Methodist Conferences, commenting on the history of High Point College, as he dedicated the new buildings, stated, "We have reason to thank God for the building of a College like this for the training of our youth."

The church school and college, as compared to the public schools, have a threefold duty to perform in serving the community and the nation, Bishop Harrell said.

"First, through its schools, the church pushes its roots deep into the lives of the people. Secondly, it is through the church supported school that the churches train their leadership—the ministers, the Christian laymen—for tomorrow. Finally, it is the function of a church related college to pour into the educational stream of the nation a Christian point of view and attitude toward life." Bishop Harrell concluded, "It is for these reasons that we dedicate these new buildings and facilities to an even greater service in the future."

The official act of presentation of the new buildings to the College was made by Holt McPherson, chairman of the board of trustees. Also taking part in the service were Dr. Dennie H. Cooke, Dr. J. Clay Madison, Dr. C. Excellence Rozelle, Reverend J. Clyde Auman, and Mr. F. Logan Porter.

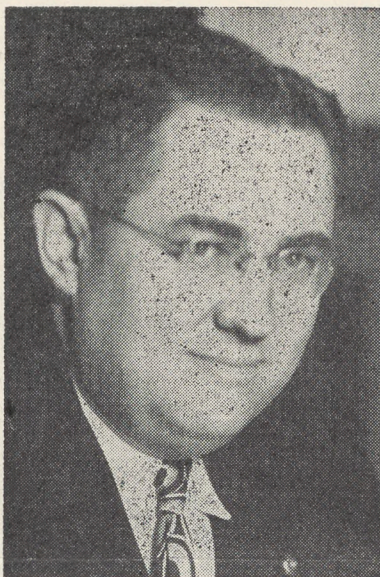

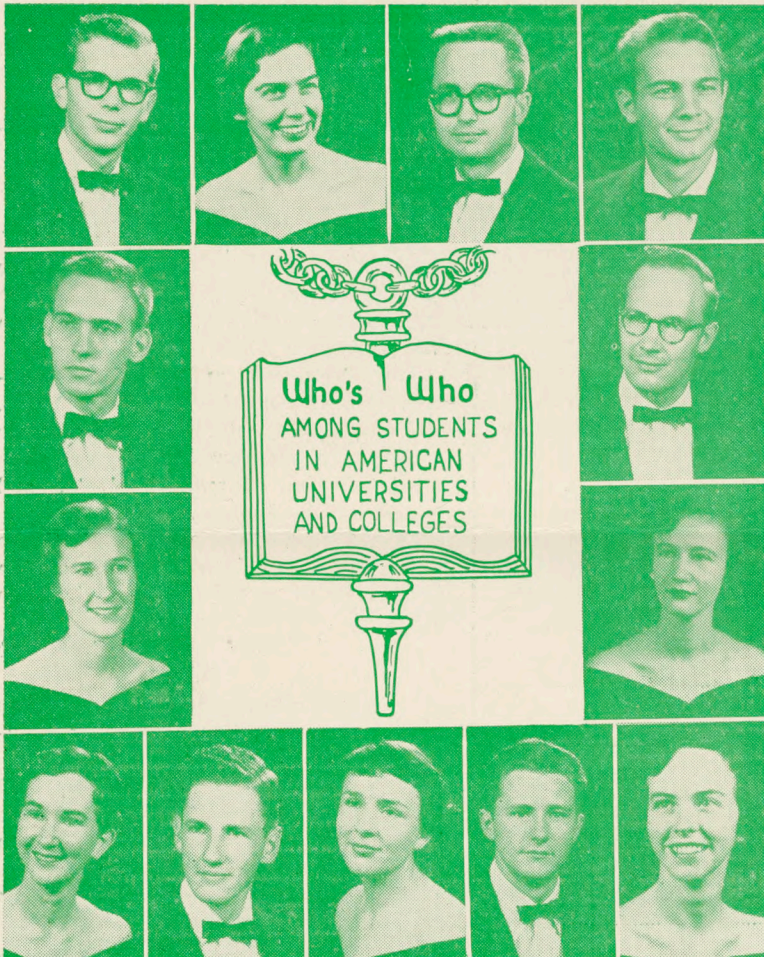
Doug Warren was chosen "Miss High Point College" at the twenty first annual beauty contest sponsored by the Zenith.
