Professorship Established

Earl N. Phillips, a prominent High Point businessman, has committed a minimum of \$100,000 to establish a professorship in business economics at High Point College. The money will be used to strengthen the Business Administration and Economics School by supplementing what the College can pay to get the most outstanding man available to teach in the school.

In making the initiating gift for the professorship, Phillips said he had been impressed with the quality of work done by the Business Department, and that several valued men in his companies are graduates of the school. Phillips, who established a highly successful fabric supply business in High Point in 1926, is chairman of the board of Phillips-Davis Co., Phillips-Foscue Company, Factors, Inc., Electric Supply Company, and several other companies in whose establishment he was instrumental.

College Given Real Estate By Mrs. J. S. Welborn

A gift of real estate with a value of \$175,000 was given on November 4, by Mrs. J. S. Welborn, member of a local pioneer family. The announcement was made at the annual Parent's Day assembly.

The property fronting on Commerce and South Elm Streets, in the heart of the business district of High Point was sold to the Redevelopment Commission of High Point for \$175 thousand for a proposed down-town parking garage.

Mrs. Welborn, a member of the pioneer Barbee family effected the transaction through her attorney, Owen Reese and accountant Worth Bowman after a ruling from the revenue service as to the tax aspects of the transfer.

The donor lives at 421 East Washington Drive in the sturdy, two-story house which her husband constructed for her more than 60 years age. Mrs. Welborn is still active and alert at 86 to the changes that have taken place in High point.

Her father, William Gaston Barbee, married a Randolph County girl and built for his bride the house that stands at the corner of Barbee Street and North Centennial. That was in the year 1880. Mrs. Welborn is the only daughter, the seventh child. She is the only surviving member of the Barbee family.

Interested from the beginning of High Point College, she has placed the College in her will. The campus occupies part of the farm which her father bought prior to 1875.

The annuity purchased by the \$175 thousand gift will provide an income for Mrs. Welborn as long as she lives and will provide a residuum for the College after her death. Therefore, the transaction was a good deal for Mrs. Welborn, for the City, and for the College.

High Point College through life income contracts and gift annuities offers a very effective method of guaranteeing income, and tax-saving advantages for the donor.

Professorship Endowed By High Pointer

Earl N. Phillips, a prominent High Point business executive has established a professorship in business economics at the College.

Mr. Phillips has committed a minimum of \$100 thousand to an open-end endowment which President Patton indicated would enable the College to strengthen the Department of Business Administration by supplementing the salary in order to get an outstanding person to teach in the department.

The department has moved into new renovated quarters in Dennis H. Cooke Hall, the former science building.

In making the initial gift, Mr. Phillips, said he had been impressed with the quality of work done by the business administration department. Several valued members of his staff are products of High Point College and the department. He also indicated that it was an area in which most businesses now have an interest. He expressed the hope that this investment would help do an

even better job of training people for a business career.

Phillips who established a highly successful fabric supply business in High Point in 1926, is chairman of the board of various corporations and holds membership on the boards of other corporations. Included are Phillips-Davis and Phillips-Foscue along with several others.

Holt McPherson, the chairman of the board of trustees of High Point College stated in writing about the gift, "There's no finer investment."

President Patton will ask the College trustees to give the name of Earl Norfleet Phillips to this professorship.

AF-R.O.T.C. PROGRAM SLATED FOR H. P. C.

High Point College males graduating in 1970 wil have an opportunity next fall to participate in an Air Force R.O.T.C. program, according to an announcement by President Wendell M. Patton.

Dr. Patton said that the program has been tentatively approved and will be presented to interested students by an Air Force officer. Those students interested should see Dean of Students F. Lee Edwards to set up interview dates.

Students accepted for the AF-ROTC program will be paid \$50 a month by the Air Force while in school, have their uniforms furnished, and be eligible to compete for scholarships.

rolled in the program will meet classes in military science twice a week at A & T University in Greensboro.

They will also be required to attend a summer training camp at an air force base near their home.

Upon graduation the students will be commissioned Second Lieutenants in the Air Force Reserve and will begin pilot or navigation training.

A & T University in Greensboro will be the host institution for the program, providing all facilities, teachers, officers, parade grounds, etc. for the students.

High Point College Receives Shell Assists Donation

High Point College has been selected for the second time to share in the program of Shell Assists, with the college receiving a \$1500 donation from the Shell Companies Foundation, Incorporated.

Under the Shell Assists program each of a number of privately supported colleges or universities annually receives a donation with each recipient institution using the money for three separate grants in the following manner:

Grant No. 1 is for any institutional use which the President decides is wise. Grant No. 2 is for general faculty development. It is intended for use by the Academic Dean to encourage additional professional development of individual members of the academic faculty of the institution. Grant No. 3 is for additional professional development of individual members of particular departments. This grant is restricted to members of the Department of Chemistry, Physics, and Mathematics.

22% of High Point Teachers Come From High Point College

With the main teacher-recruitment months of February, March, and April coming up, the Department of Teacher Education at High Point College is gearing for an influx of recruiters from school systems from Florida to Maine.

The High Point City school system is probably the main beneficiary of the teacher education department of High Point College. At the present time some 22% of the professional workers in the High Point system — teachers and administrative staff — are graduates of High Point College.

Recruiters coming to the High Point campus this spring will be after the talents of 82 graduates from the department of education. This includes 46 on the elementary school level and 36 on the secondary level.

Every year the department of education at the college, directed by Dr. Dennis H. Cooke, helps its graduates to find jobs in school systems throughout the Eastern part of the country.

Thus far there are 24 school systems scheduled to recruit on the High Point Campus during the month of February.

Gesell Institute Founder At High Point College

The director of research at the famed Gesell Institute of Child Development will be in High Point, March 1, for a lecture at High Point College.

Dr. Louise Bates Ames, who is the co-founder of the Gesell Institute, will speak to students, faculty, and the general public on the topic, "Is Your Child in the Right Grade?" The lecture will begin at 2:30 p.m. in Memorial Auditorium.

Distinguished visiting lecturers such as Dr. Ames come to High Point College through the Piedmont University Center's Visiting Scholars Program. These scholars visit various colleges holding membership in the Piedmont University Center and share their experience and knowledge with students, faculty, and the public in the area.

In addition to her work with the Gesell Institute, Dr. Ames is also a collaborator or coauthor of numerous books and has a weekly television program, "Child Behavior".

BUSY YEAR AHEAD FOR H. P. C.

For High Point College, 1968 promises to be a busy year. Dr. Wendell M. Patton of High Point College announced an impressive list of physical improvements that the colleges will be working on during the new year.

One of these improvements will be the remodeling of the first and second floors of Roberts Hall, the main administrative building, converting several classrooms into much-needed office space. Dr. Patton said that much of this work will probably be done next summer.

Also on the list for remodeling during 1968 is the second floor of Cooke Hall. Remodeling of the first floor of that building has been completed.

Dr. Patton said that he hopes something can be done about the proposed new infirmary during 1968, also. Work is progressing on the four-story dormitory with a possible occupancy date of next fall.

Also in the planning stages is a new chapel and student union building. Dr. Patton said that the College is trying to select a site for the chapel but that no definite plans have been made yet. Surveyors have been on the campus looking over a possible site for the new student union building.

Enlargement or better utilization of space of the present library building is also in the works for 1968, Dr. Patton said.



A Look Into What Lies Ahead

In 1965 the College set out to realize goals which had been proposed by a committee composed of trustees, faculty, alumni, and students. Under the leadership of W. R. Henderson, the effort was named the Golden Decade Development Program and a goal of ten million dollars was set.

The goal for the ten-year program was apportioned \$6,800,000 for endowment and \$3,200,000 for buildings and capital improvements. At this time the capital goals are being met on schedule.

- 1. The Horace S. Haworth Hall of Science was constructed with a grant, a loan, and the remainder from Golden Decade funds.
- 2. The new dormitroy to house 138 students is under construction with a loan and other funds from Golden Decade.
- 3. The infirmary is under construction with funds accumulated before the Golden Decade began and other gifts from individuals.

These buildings when completed will be only a part of the total needed. To complete the goals there will be:

- 1. A student-campus center.
- 2. Another dormitory.
- 3. An administration building.
- 4. A chapel-religious center.
- 5. Alteration and addition to library.
- 6. Renovation of the two older dormitories.
- 7. A swimming pool.

There are indications that the endowment needs are the most difficult to secure. With our present endowment at \$3,000,000, there is a desperate need to have an endowment of \$10,000,000. The investment of borrowed funds in the Sears block in down-town High Point, when paid for, will produce an income equal at the present 4% rate, to an endowment of \$2,500,000. Then if leases can be worked out at Five Points to build a small shopping center, the income after fifteen years could equal the return on another \$1½millions in endowment.

The College has come a long way in three years. The road ahead will be filled with many difficulties. If we are to survive, and we must, then there is room for much concern, many prayers, and supernatural guidance in the years ahead.

We who have "set our hands to the plow" are looking to the future with hope. You are invited to join us in our "plowing."

Development Council Proposes 1968-1969 Program of Work

The March 14 meeting of the High Point College Development Council's Executive Committee took a look at the achievements of the past and then proposed for the Board of Trustees at the April meeting a very challenging program for 1968-69. The one matter with implications was the decision as to what to do about the Golden Decade Program of Development embarked upon in 1965.

Second Phase Recommended

The second phase scheduled to begin in October, 1968, was delayed until January-February, 1969. It is to be recommended that the College proceed to enlist a chairman by June 1, 1968, to work out details and procedures, and then begin the actual campaign early in 1969. If this recommendation is passed by the trustees, the way will be cleared for the second phase of Golden Decade.

Corporate Partners Possibilities Viewed

The second item to be recommended is that a corporate chairman be enlisted and a kick-off for Corporate Partners be set for the first week in September. The goal suggested is 200 members by December 31, 1968. A recognition event for all Corporate Partners will climax the reaching of the goal. With more than 500 corporations operating in High Point alone, it has been estimated that the amount allowed by the Internal Revenue Service to be given by corporations (5% of profits before taxes) is some \$800,000.00. If High Point College through the Corporate Partners Program could receive 1% of corporate profits before taxes, we would receive more than 160,000.00 per year from this source. This amount would equal the income from an endowment of \$4 million.

Deferred Giving Plans To Be Presented

Late September, 1968, is the date proposed for a conference on deferred giving. It is recommended to the trustees that a date be arranged in September to bring in at least three specialists in the field of estate planning.

One part of the conference would be concerned with taxes - estate and income-which would affect the individual and his family. An outstanding tax-attorney has been suggested for this conference. Another group concerned with the "how" of charitable giving would meet with a nationally known authority on charitable giving. The third group would be composed of those interested in knowing about the foundation approach to estate conservation and planuing. Again, this section would have as leader an outstanding expert in the field of family and corporate foundations.

Those invited to attend such a conference would include; pastors in the area in and around High Point, attorneys, C.P.A.'s, C.L.U.'s, trust officers, corporate executives, and others who might be interested in the field of estate planning and charitable giving through wills, bequests, trusts, foundations, life income plans, gift annuities, and insurance.

Plans For Parents' Associates Revealed

The Executive Committee of Parents' Associates of High Point College, a group formed at Parents' Day, November 4, 1967, will meet at the College on May 18, 1968. to select a nominating committee and prepare a program of work for the parents to be presented at Parents' Day in 1968.

More than 2,200 parents of students (presently enrolled at High Point College) will be considered in the total program presented. In addition to the parents of presently enrolled students, parents of alumni are urged to become involved in the affairs of the College. At the May 18 meeting of the Executive Commtitee of Parents' Associates, the business manager of the College, Mr. Earle G. Dalbey, and the Dean of Administration, Dr. David W. Cole will speak to the group concerning the financial, economic, and academic problems facing the College.

Promotional literature and materials for all events scheduled must be provided. The Development Council urges that additional members must be enlisted to share in the work of development.





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Dr. Patton Returns From Russian Trip

President Wendell M. Patton returned to the campus on April 3, after a three-week's trip to Europe. He was one of a party of 100 composed of college presidents, members of boards of trustees, city school superintendents, and other educators who left New York on March 12 for a three weeks' study of communist colleges and universities.

The seminar and field trip was sponsored by the Comparative Education Society, a national inter-professional organization, to give its members an opportunity to study the higher educational systems of other countries.

The itinerary included a briefing and orientation program at Oxford and Reading Universities in England. Brief visits were made to Moscow University, Charles University in Prague, Humboldt University in East Berlin, and the University of Copehagen.

New Grant Aids High Point College Work-Study Program

Some 45 students at High Point College will be aided by the recently announced grant to the college of \$11,748 from the Department of Health, Education, and Welfare.

In a telegram to college President Wendell M. Patton, congress Horace R. Kornegay anannounced that the grant has been approved for the work-study program at High Point College.

Under this program students are given oncampus jobs in various departments at the College, with the money from the newly-awarded grant paying 80% of their salary and the College paying the remaining 20%.

The students chosen to participate in the work-study program are selected by the financial aid office on the basis of family income and size.



GOVERNOR OF LOUISIANA RETURNS TO CAMPUS

John J. McKeithen, Govenor of the State of Louisiana, and outstanding alumnus of High Point College, was the guest speaker during Senior Investiture ceremonies at High Point College on Wednesday, April 24.

A native of Louisiana, McKeithen attended High Point College from 1936 through 1938, when he returned to his home state where he received his A.B. degree in 1941 and an LL.B. degree in 1942 from Louisiana State University, in Baton Rouge.

McKeithen served with the United States Army, 77th Infantry Division, for three years during World War II. He received the Bronze Star while in the Pacific Theater.


Following the war, McKeithen began his legal career. He first entered the field of politics in 1948 when he was elected to the Louisiana House of Representatives, which he served until 1952. He was elected Public Service Commissioner in 1954 and 1960.

In 1963, McKeithen was the first candidate to announce for governor. After two strenuous primary campaigns, he won the Democratic nomination. Then, facing the strongest Republican opposition in modern Louisiana history, he won the governorship in the general election. He has further astounded the electorate by becoming (con't. page 2)

the only governor of Louisiana to be elected to succeed himself in office.

High Point College recognized its most outstanding alumnus by giving John J. McKeithen an honorary degree in 1964.



The Development Program Continues Second Phase Of Golden Decade

By action of the Board of Trustees at the April meeting, the second phase of the Golden Decade will begin this year. The Board accepted the recommendations presented by William R. Henderson, chairman of the Development Council: 1. To hold a Corporate Partners kickoff meeting in early September (9th). 2. To offer a Deferred Gifts and Estate Planning Conference in late September (30th). 3. To begin the second phase of the Golden Decade to secure capital funds during the year 1968-69 to culminate May 31, 1969.

Since the April 24th meeting of the Board of Trustees, the fund raising firm of Cumerford, Inc. has been secured to direct the fund raising effort. A member of the staff of the midwestern firm will be on hand by September 1, to begin setting up committees and other mechanics for the effort which will begin not later than February 1, 1969.

Corporate Partners Meeting Scheduled

The Corporate Partners of High Point College will have a meeting on September 9, 1968 for all who have indicated a willingness to share profits with the College. This group will consist of trustees and corporate executives who have become corporate partners with the College. A full discussion of the program is planned. A goal of 200 corporate partners has been set to be reached by December 31, 1968. A banquet is scheduled for late December to honor all those who have become "Partners in Progress" with the college.

Estate Planning And Deferred Gifts

This conference is being offered as a service to those who may be interested in learning more about estate planning, taxes, and methods of giving. There will be at least three special seminars offered.

1. A seminar led by an outstanding tax attorney which will deal with all the angles of taxes in estate planning and charitable gifts.

2. There will be a seminar offered on the ways and means of making chairtable gifts. Included will be wills, bequests, trusts, annuities, life income. The leader is an outstanding consultant in charitable giving.

3. The third seminar will be offered in the foundation field. The head of one of the large foundation will be secured to lead the seminar in methods, means, and advantages of the corporate or family foundation.

Student Center Must Become A Reality

With the completion of a dormitory now under construction High Point College will have accommodations for 800 resident students. Another dormitory housing 100 to 150 additional students will be built in 1969. This dormitory wil bring our total resident student population to well over 900. If we limit our growth to 1200 students, this means that we will have 250-325 commuting students.

All this adds up to the pressing need for a new student union which will adequately care for 1200 students. We now have a cafeteria, which was formerly a gymnasium, to which has been added a kitchen and storage rooms. With 650 resident students the present cafeteria is taxed to capacity.

The present student center has a student store with a snack bar. The snack bar area has standing room for 50 students. The College post office occupies the remainder of the space on the first floor.

On the second floor is a lounge for television next door to a recreation - day student area which has vending machines. There are rest rooms on the second floor also.

The third floor has a small classroom, the office of dean of students, and the guidance counsellor. No space is available for student government or the newspaper or annual staff.

Administration and student committees have been attempting to ascertain the basic requirements for a student-campus center. It is known that certain accommodations must be included.

Food services must be adequate with space for the boarding students we expect to have. There must be included space for private dining rooms as well as a seating capacity of from 500 to 1000. Kitchen space with storage for seasonal commodities and cold storage facilities are necessary in order to have the best food service.

There must be parlors, small lounges, music and television rooms, snack-bar, recreational space, student government offices, student publications, student personnel offices, reception room, lobbies, a general store, a bookstore, and adequate storage space for equipment. This list is not complete, but it gives an idea as to the enormous need for these facilities, now.

This building — the student-campus center — offers a challenge to all friends of High Point College. What a beautiful and lasting memorial this building would make for someone now reading these words!




Dr. Luther R. Medlin






Dr. Fitzgerald was born in Crouse, North Carolina, the son of the Reverend and Mrs. James B. Fitzgerald. He attended Pfeiffer and Wingate Junior Colleges and received his A. B. Degree from Western Carolina University in 1947. His B. D. Degree was obtained from Duke University Divinity School in 1951.

He joined the Western North Carolina Conference in 1946 and has served pastorates in Sylva, Liberty, Asheboro, Asheville, Charlotte, Greensboro, and his present pastorate in Winston-Salem.

He is a member of the board of trustees of Pfeiffer College. He has or is presently serving on TRAFCO for the Western North Carolina Conference, Commission on Christian Social Concerns, and the Board of Pensions.

Dr. Fitzgerald was presented the distinguished service award from Pfeiffer College in 1965. He is a Mason. He has held membership in the Kiwanis and Rotary Clubs. He was an official visitor of the World Methodist Conference in London in 1966.

Colonel Hoyt H. Wood, staff chaplain at Richards-Gebaur Air Force Base, Missouri, gave the graduation address and then received the Doctor of Divinity Degree from High Point College in Memorial Gymnasium on May 19.

Dr. Wood is a native of Denton, N. C. He graduated from High Point College in the class of 1936. He attended Duke Divinity School and graduated from Chaplain's School at Harvard University in 1943. During his military service Col. Wood graduated from Paratroop School, from Chaplain School at Port Siocum, from Advanced Chaplain's School, Lackland Air Force Base, and attended a nuclear training course.

He served as chaplain at Air Force bases throughout the world, including Langley Air Force Base, Virginia; Barksdale Air Force Base, Louisiana; Seulthorpe, England; Goodfellow Air Force Base, Texas; Stewart Air Force Base, Tennessee; Clark Air Base, Phillipines. He is currently staff chaplain, Headquarters Tenth Air Force, Air Defense Command, Richard-Gebaur Air Force Base, Missouri.

Dr. Wood has received many decorations and service awards, among them the National Defense Medal, Air Force Commendation with three oak Leaf Clusters; World War II Victory Medal; Europe and Asiatic Medal with bronze star; Air Force Longevity Service; Belgium Fourragere; Dutch Orange Lanyard; Armed Force Expeditionary Medal; and the Presidential Unit Citation.

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Historical Statement Of High Point College

High Point College was founded in 1922 by Methodist Protestant leaders who had a firm belief in a distinctly Christian philosophy of life expressed in service. These men and women built into the school a concern for intellectual and spiritual integrity. The college was a dream, a plan, and an extraordinary accomplishment.

From the opening day in September, 1924, the college was a four-year institution and offered only college work. Out of the adversity of the Depression there emerged a spirit of dedication to Christian higher education that combined academic excellence with spiritual values. A vanguard of graduates took their places as purposeful leaders, ministers, business and professional men. In In 1952 the Southern Association recognized the College's academic stature by granting it full accreditation.

The school's capacity to serve continued to grow. Evidence is reflected by a student body in excess of 1100 students in the day session and 500 students in the evening school from 28 states and 4 countries representing 35 different religious denominations, an expanded faculty of more than 70 Christian scholars, an undergraduate program leading to 24 majors, and the construction of 10 major buildings on the 65 acre campus during the past 15 years.

A full range of majors in the arts, sciences, humanities, and social sciences are available, as well as professional preparation in religion, religious education, and education. The College recognizes that change — often radical and rapid — is characteristic of the times. Its programs, therefore, attempt to help students to seek truth with the willingness to unlearn and relearn as truth is discovered.

In the last analysis, the achievement of any college must be measured in terms of the character and contribution of its graduates. HPC is justly proud of the caliber of the host of alumni—men and women who face their life careers with the stamp of high intellectual purpose and spiritual commitment.

The future must be met with adequate planning and effective doing.



First Phase Of Golden Decade Shows Progress



According to the responses which come to the Development Office there was a total of \$1,070,000.00 pledged or intended. Of this amount \$800,00 has been paid to date leaving an unpaid balance of \$270,000.00 A considerable amount of this balance is made up of deferred

pledges to be paid before 1974.

The amount collected has enabled the College to begin construction on three Golden Decade projects. The Horace S. Haworth Hall of Science has been completed and occupied. The new women's dormitory will be ready for occupancy on September 1. The infirmary will be ready around October 1. Other funds earmarked for a chapel and swimming pool have been accumulated. In addition, the endowment of the College has increased to more than \$3 million. The Dennis M. Cooke Hall has been partially renovated.

The total number of gifts to Golden Decade during the fiscal year was 836 amounting to more than \$215 thousand. Other gifts for the year including church support total more than \$392 thousand.

With another phase of Golden Decade to begin in 1969, many pledges will be paid by December 31, 1968. In order not to confuse donors who have pledges projected later than 1968, these will be transferred to Phase II.

Parents, clear the calendar and plan to be present on November 2.


Charitable Giving Emphasized

Charitable giving especially in the realm of deferred gifts is being promoted through the Public Affairs Office of the College. The Director attended a conference in Memphis in May at which time attention was focused on annuities and trusts as a means of philanthropy.

Golden Decade Second Phase Begins This Fall

The second phase of the Golden Decade Development Program will get underway on September 23, 1968. A meeting of all Development Council members combined with the first annual meeting of the Corporate Partners will be held.

Prior to the September meeting of the Development Council, W. R. Henderson, President Patton and others will secure a campaign chairman to head a Steering Committee for the second phase effort. After the chairman has been secured, a steering committee will be enlisted and an organization will be set up.

No goal has been set for the second phase. This will wait for a careful analysis and evaluation of the entire prospect list. An Evaluation Committee, an Arrangements Committee, an Audit Committee and a Public Relations Committee will be appointed. The chairman of each committee will be a member of the Cabinet or Steering Committee.

The organization plan calls for the following divisions: Pace Setters, Leadership, General, Family, and Area, with a chairman for each one.

Through all the planning stage and then in the actual campaign, an outside campaign director will be on the scene to keep every part of the program moving. The closing date for the local and area campaign is May 31, 1969.

THE CRISIS

"Our country has never been more prosperous. Business is booming. Salaries are at their all-time peak. The average American's standard of living is higher than ever before.

"But there are two kinds of organizations that have not felt the benefits of prosperity - that have, in fact, been penalized by the inflation that goes with this prosperity. They are our educational and charitable institutions, the great bulwarks of our freedom."

Annual Report Of Alumni Affairs Shows Gains

The annual report of Alumni Affairs prepared by Miss Beverly A. Deal, Executive Secretary, shows some interesting facts. Forty per cent of the 6,407 known alumni gave more than \$54 thousand. This high percentage of alumni making gifts to the College is an all-time high mark.

Beginning in 1960-1961 with 2% of the alumni giving \$570 the increase has been constant with the exception of 1965-1966 - the Golden Decade first phase campaign, until this year when the 40 per cent goal was reached.

While the amount contributed is not large, the number of alumni is significant. There are a few colleges which have larger percentages of alumni making gifts and many which have much larger total gifts, but High Point College is proud of the record the alumni have made in the last 7 years. Ninety four couples, or individual alumni, made gifts to the College of \$100 or more.

As the College begins the second phase of the Golden Decade Development Program, the alumni are stronger than ever in support of the College. The College will have a larger appeal to corporations and foundations because of this excellent record of the loyalty, devotion, and support of alumni. We need many things. Most of all we need to enlist businesses to help us.

May, Chairman of the Board and President of American Can Company speaking to the Corporate Leadership Luncheon of the Council for Financial Aid to Education, Inc., recently called attention to the fact that all is not well with the higher education system. He also stated what others have been saying . . "and the crisis reduced to its lowest common denominator is money."

Where shall higher education look to obtain the money necessary to survive? Not to student fees, already reaching the limit; not to the federal government, for if this percentages goes above 50% we are in trouble from the control stand-point; not to foundations, for they are turning toward innovative programs. The only other source is the corporation - the business - that sees the great need for the strengthening of the institutions of higher education.

Every business and every individual will survive as they survive as a part of society. Decisions made, will be made to enable society to survive and prosper. If not, then business cannot survive while society crumbles. There are other lesser considerations of returns on investment that do justify an increase in the commitment to educate.

Corporate support of higher education is a measureable investment in a prime source of needed manpower and brainpower. As the source of educated personnel for business in the United States today, higher education will furnish that necessary personnel to insure growth and prosperity. Corporate support is not philanthropy. It is an investment as much as plant, equipment, or any other aspect.

What are the alternatives to businesses' proper support of education? While business gives about 2 per cent of the dollars used, government provides about 50 per cent. Tuiton and fees average about 40 per cent. Private gifts including business about 10 per cent. Government increase means inevitabily greater influence.

Corporate giving can be justified according to Mr. May:

"(1)... because business invests in the future man-power needs. (2)... because an educated people will be less likely to abandon the free enterprise economic system. (3)... because an educated society is a society which produces more, consumes more, and therefore, makes it possible for business to prosper more."

Corporate support for High Point College is not just a "pipe dream", it is necessary to survival.

NEW DORMITORY OPENS

The new four-story dormitory, dubbed the High Point Hilton by the students living there, opened on September 1, as scheduled.

Constructed at the cost of \$635,000 on the east side of the campus parallel to North and Yadkin Halls, the building has exterior corridors providing entrances to separate student living areas. Each area houses eight students and features built-in furniture, carpeting, and air-con-

ditioning in the living room, four bedrooms, bath, and storage facilities.

In addition to the living areas for 138 students, there also is an apartment for a house mother, a lounge, a recreation room, and a laundry room.

While constructed as a woman's dormitory, the building will accommodate men students until a new men's dormitory is constructed. The first two floors will house men students and the two upper floors will house women students.



ANOTHER STEPPING STONE

In another farsighted move to increase the endowment of High Point College, the Board of Trustees has authorized the development of the 5.69 acre Five Point property into the Eastgate Shopping Center, which is scheduled to open October 1, 1968.

The shopping center buildings contain 60,-000 square feet, 56,000 of which have been

leased to the following: Big Bear grocery, Super-X drugs, Family Dollar store, Honey-Fried Chicken, Woodcoe launderette, and Pickway shoes.

High Point College also owns the property and buildings leased by Sears and Roebuck in downtown High Point. Our Board of Trustees, chaired by Holt McPherson, is to be commended for its efforts to insure the future financial security of High Point College.



High Point College Builds Eastgate Shopping Center

The Eastgate Shopping Center is fast becoming a reality. Due to the generosity of two members of the Board of Trustees this property was obtained, and the College was able to begin construction without the delay in securing a loan.

As was the case in the Magic Block, no current operating funds will be used except on a loan basis to be paid at the rate the College could receive in the market. These funds, when loaned, will be subject to immediate recall if and when needed in the current operation of the College.

Second Phase Of The Golden Decade Development Program Is Underway

With the coming to the campus of Frank Henwood, vice-president of Cumerford, Incorporated, the second phase of the Golden Decade Development Program is underway. Mr. Henwood has had more than 20 years experience in fund raising and represents a firm that counts its successful campaigns in the billions of dollars.

The first few months will be used in getting materials printed, public relations, building a leadership group, and setting up the organization needed for solicitation.

It is hoped that by February 1, 1969 the intensive effort will begin. The campaign will end around June 15. The territory to be solicited will

include High Point primarily with fewer contacts in Thomasville, Lexington, Winston-Salem, Greensboro, Kernersville, and Asheboro.

Mr. Henwood will present a plan of operation, budget, and suggested goals for consideration at the meeting of the Board of Trustees in Raleigh on October 9. William R. Henderson, chairman of the Development Council, will play an important part in this phase of Golden Decade.

Corporate Responsibility For Higher Education

Have you ever noticed how cherished bits of Americana have a way of slipping further and further from our memory until they are almost completely forgotten? For example, how often do we still refer to or remember "the little red schoolhouse" — an institution once, and not too long ago, very much a part of American life?

Yet, is it any wonder that the "little red schoolhouse" seems so distant in our past that we scarcely ever call it to mind? Have you looked at our schools lately? Wall-to-wall carpeting has replaced worn wood floors. "The smell of a school-room" as described by Thomas Wolfe has also been replaced by the antiseptic smell. Central airconditioning is replacing the pot-bellied stove. Magnificent complexes of modern structures connected by breezeways house auditoriums, cafeterias, gymnasiums and countless classrooms.

When you combine our rising cost of living spiral and the projected enrollment figures for the coming decade, imagine what we are talking about in terms of dollars to support our exploding demand for colleges and universities.

Everywhere people are asking where will the money come from? And ever more frequently the answer is being heard . . . from the corporations of this country.

Now let us ask ourselves how we ever came to feel that corporations had a responsibility for higher education. It is, indeed, not an obvious obligation; and certainly a member of the management of a corporation must justify such gifts to owners and stockholders and to his own mind else his move is either dishonest or unwise. Fortunately, it is neither; and let's take a moment to see why it proceeds on a scale of increasing compulsion from almost desirable to highly obligatory.

Educators across America generally concede that the private colleges and universities form the core of our best educational institutions. They should because they are the best endowed and supported, they enjoy a freedom of form and direction that allows them to innovate, and by and large they attract the best scholars and students.

These private institutions, if you will think a moment, are generally named for men. Put another way, they are not named for public entities. Harvard, Princeton, Yale, Cornell, Vanderbilt, Emory, Tulane, Duke, Stanford.

Is it not then significant to us that these were begun, if you look at most of their histories, by men and families of wealth? Those were wonderful eleemosynary acts. But the terrifying thought is that these acts are not likely to take place in our lifetime and perhaps never again.

I once asked the rather rhetorical question: "Who will be the next Mr. Duke?" And I answered it in the next sentence: "The corporation." In one sense the corporation always has been the donor, for it was largely from this form and device of free enterprise that came the wealth to individuals to perform their acts of generosity.

With individual great wealth shrinking before progressive taxation, a court in New Jersey in the early fifties confirmed the right of directors to allocate profits as tax deductible for certain benefactions.

It is interesting to note that Irving Olds, the former Chairman of the Board of United States Steel, once said: "Capitalism and free enterprise owe their survival in no small degree to the existence of our private, independent universities."

My second main point brings me to a matter so obvious that I am hesitant to mention it. Surely, we all recognize the fact that the modern corporation makes far greater demands on educational institutions than it realizes. A corporation uses every skill taught and every resource provided by a modern college; and in the setting of a corporation and a college in the same community there is a mutuality of interest almost immeasurable. Corporate excellence, community excellence, and college excellence are tied directly together for self renewal. It is as true of High Point and High Point College as it is of Cambridge and Harvard. A trail of influence spreads from each in proportion to the support the institution receives.

So, to the Corporate Partners group of High Point College, we have enjoyed fellowship, a (Continued on Next Page)

Development Council Meets

The Development Council headed by William R. Henderson, alumnus and trustee, met at 5:30 September 23, at the Top of the Mart prior to the dinneh for corporate executives and their wives. The agenda for the meeting brought several matters to the attention of the group.

A report of the first phase of The Golden Decade Development Program was presented by W. Lawson Allen, Director of Public Affairs. The salient points are:

The second phase was delineated in general terms by Frank Henwood, director of the second effort for capital funds. Mr. Henwood is an employee of Cumerford, Incorporated. He indicated that the preparation period in which a goal will be set, leadership will be enlisted, a brochure published, and other necessary materials produced will last until January, 1969. The intensive phase of solicitation will begin about February 1 and end about June 15.

High Point College's greatest need was presented by Robert Phillips, Dean of Students, and Earle G. Dalbey, Business Manager. Mr. Phillips said that the greatest need now and for the future is a student-campus-center in order to direct the tremendous energy of students in the right direction. With 138 additional students boarding on the campus, the present student center and the cafeteria are inadequate to meet the basic needs of students for meals and recreation.

Mr. Dalbey stated that he had been conferring with students, faculty, and administration for more than two years as to the facilities that the building ought to provide. He indicated that no projection had been made as to when the plans would be ready or the building constructed. He along with Dean Phillips placed top priority on this student-campus-center.

The question, then, as to what the Council would recommend was discussed. The goal was mentioned, but no recommendation was decided upon. The Council decided to recommend that the second phase of Golden Decade should be pri-

marily for the student-campus-center.

Chairman Henderson closed the meeting with a statement concerning the possibilities for the College in the Golden Decade Development Program, lifting up the Corporate Partner Program as a means of reaching endowment goals. He stated that if Corporate Partners could produce \$100,000 a year, that this would be the equivalent of \$2 million endowment at 5% interest.

Corporate Executives Hear Wade

The dinner for corporate executives was held in the High Point Room, Top of the Mart, at 6:30 p.m. September 23. Mr. Fred Councill, Chairman of Corporate Partners, presided and requested Dr. Phil Shore to give the invocation. After the meal was served Dr. Patton introduced the guests, which included the Reverend and Mrs. John Cagle, William R. Cumerford, and Frank Henwood.

Dr. Patton asked William R. Henderson to discuss the purpose of Corporate Partners. The Corporate Partners Program is a program which seeks to enlist corporate support from profits before taxes up to 1%. TAR HEEL STATE LEADS

Of the 1,150 students attending classes at High Point College, the majority (648) are from North Carolina. Maryland, the number two state with respect to student enrollment, claims 148 young men and women. Virginia, with 107 students, and New Jersey, with 90, round out the first four.

Other states represented on the campus are Arkansas, California, Colorado, Connecticut, Delaware, Florida, Georgia, Illinois, Indiana, Kentucky, Maine, Massachusetts, Missouri, Ohio, Pennsylvania, Rhode Island, South Carolina, Texas, and Vermont.

As might be expected, Methodism is the predominant religion at the Methodist-affiliated college. With 533 students identifying themselves as Methodists, they are far ahead of the second largest religious body on campus - 183 of the Baptist faith. Presbyterians follow with 116; Episcopalians with 71; and Roman Catholics with 64. A total of 35 religions are represented on the campus.



Have You A Few Dollars That You Can Share?

As we close out the year's work, we usually take inventory to see what has been accomplished and to anticipate the future. Many decide that they can give a little more or can give something that formerly seemed improbable.

If a gift is made, you will want to get maximum benefit in terms of your own satisfaction, and maximum advantage of your Government's encouragement to make a charitable gift.

Who should make a year-end gift? The person who has a higher income this year, for the higher the tax bracket the lower is your aftertax cost.

How may one make a gift? There are several methods.

- 1. Give appreciated securities. Often you can make a larger gift and thus avoid capital gains tax.
- 2. Make a bargain sale at your original cost to the College of securities which you have held. The amount of appreciation is a gift.
 - 3. Set up a trust.
 - 4. Buy an annuity contract.
 - 5. Secure a life-income contract.
- 6. Have your corporation make a gift. It may cost less than to make it personally.
 - 7. Make a direct cash gift.
 - 8. Set up a memorial fund.
 - 9. Make a gift of equipment.

Phase Two Of Golden Decade On Schedule

Preliminary work related to the second phase of the Golden Decade Program is on schedule, according to Frank H. Henwood, regional vice-president of the Cumerford Corporation, who is in charge of the campaign effort. The initial effort which began in 1965 phases out this year.

The top-leadership for the campaign has been enlisted and will be announced shortly after January 1, 1969. The campaign in High Point is to begin around February 1.

As it is now envisioned the program will involve three soliciting divisions in High Point plus a College division. Other communities will be solicited on a very selective basis by a local committee.

The chairman of the auditing committee is Earle G. Dalbey, the College's vice-president for business and financial affairs. The campaign promotion and publicity committee is chaired by W. Lawson Allen, and forthcoming releases will be issued by Allen, who is vice-president for public affairs at the College.


