NEW HORIZONS

While the majority of students are enjoying a holiday break between semesters, others are engaged in programs of study involving diverse areas of learning such as Wall Street, Africa and Canada.

"New Horizons," a program of instruction termed "challenging and rewarding" by President Wendell M. Patton, is designed to allow students to explore selected topics of intellectual interest.

Headed by Dr. Harold E. Conrad, dean of academic planning, "New Horizons" allows students the opportunity to come into contact with men and women who have already gained recognized reputations in their respective fields.

One of the groups left last week for an extensive trip to Canada where they will get first-hand information on the political, educational, and sociological aspects of the Land of the Maple Leaf. The course in Canadian history, under the direction of Dr. Conrad, offers college credit as do the others involved in the "New Horizons" instruction.

The day before the seven students left for Canada they spent the morning and afternoon in an informal seminar with the vice consul and assistant trade commissioner of the Canadian Consulate in New Orleans—Warren W. Maybee.

They have already visited Niagara Falls and spent an evening at Eisenhower College in Seneca Falls, N.Y., where they were guests of Col. Carlton Cook, formerly of the HPC mathematics department.

The students and Dr. Conrad plan to visit a number of colleges and universities in Canada, sessions of Parliament, the Canadian Supreme Court, the American Embasy while in Toronto, Ottawa, and Montreal. A highlight of the trip

will be a reception in their honor given by Mrs. Roland Michner, wife of the Governor General of Canada, at Government House.

Other students involved in "New Horizons" are studying contemporary Africa under the direction of Dr. Paul Gratiot. At present, most of their work is being done on an independent study basis using library resources. Several speakers with first-hand knowledge of Africa and its culture will be addressing the students.

Another phase of the "New Horizons" plan calls for a group of business students to take a trip to New York City where they will get an on-the-spot view of Wall Street and all that makes it tick. On their return to campus they will continue discussions as to what they saw and learned in the field of economics.

Classes for the second semester will begin Jan. 27.

PANTHERS 4-0

A successful basketball season for the High Point Purple Panthers continues as Coach Bob Vaughn's charges now have an over-all 10-1 record and lead the Carolinas Conference with a 4-0 mark.

The Panthers' perfect score of 10 wins and no defeats slipped to the 10-1 record Saturday (Jan. 11) when they journeyed to Boone and lost 89-85 to the Appalachian Mountaineers.

However, the game will not count in conference standings since Appalachian has withdrawn from the CC and now has independent status.

From now on the going will be "extra" rough for the Big Purple. With the exception of a visit by Appalachian to High Point on Feb. 8, every remaining game for the Panthers will be a conference tilt.

Point's two wins on Dec. 27-28 which enabled them to take the first annual High Point Basketball Classic played in Alumni Gymnasium. They whipped a strong Carson-Newman team 85-74 on opening night and came on strong the next evening to beat Georgia Southern 68-64.

In games this month they beat Wilmington College 107-84, Campbell College 75-62, and out-hustled a strong Western Carolina team to the tune of a 91-86 victory.

For the most part, Coach Vaughn has been going with a "seven-man" team, changing starting lineups depending on his scouting reports. All-American Gene Littles, a senior this year, is fast approaching the 2,000-point mark for his college career total. Big Jim Picka at 6'11" continues to dominate offensive and defensive boards game after game. Danny Witt, certainly one of the top shooters in the conerence, is having a good year and can always be counted on for 40 minutes of 100 per cent hustle in every game. Joe Colbert, Steve Tatgenhorst, Ronnie Loewenthal and Ron Horney are the others rounding out the "first" team.

So far it's been a good year. But right around the corner are contests with Elon, Pfeiffer, Lenoir Rhyne, Guilford, and Catawba. The conference tournament will be played in Winston-Salem Feb. 26-March 1 and then. hopefully, it's on to Kansas City for the N.A.I.A. finals.

One other note: Don't forget Homecoming on Feb. 15 when the Panthers line-up against the Lenoir Rhyne Bears at 8 p.m in the gym.

The Golden Decade Program is a 10-year (1965-1974) period during which the college is endeavoring to raise \$10 million or its equivalent in income.





Co-Chairmen Of Golden Decade Development Program Selected

Holt McPherson of High Point and Mrs. David S. Coltrane of Raleigh have accepted responsibilities as co-chairmen of the second phase of High Point College's Golden Decade Program. Dr. Wendell M. Patton, college president, made the announcement Saturday, January 31.

The Golden Decade program is a 10-year (1965-1974) period during which the college is endeavoring to raise \$10 million or its equivalent in income. Approximately \$1½ million was raised during the initial phase. The second phase is scheduled to begin immediately.

"We're extremely delighted and fortunate to have such outstanding people as Mr. McPherson and Mrs. Coltrane to head our campaign," said Dr. Patton. "Mr. McPherson is recognized as one of the outstanding fund raisers in the state, and Mrs. Coltrane will ably represent our needs in the eastern section of North Carolina," he said.

McPherson and Mrs. Coltrane are both members of the High Point College board of trustees, and the former serves as its chairman.

McPherson is editor of the High Point Enterprise and a member of Wesley Memorial United Methodist Church. Mrs. Coltrane, a former high school teacher, is the widow of David S. Coltrane, who was chairman of the North Carolina Good Neighbor Council.

Both McPherson and Mrs. Coltrane have long been active in the Methodist Church. The former presently serves on the International Commission on Public Relations and Methodist Information. He is founder and president of the Journalism Foundation of the University of North Carolina at Chapel Hill.

A graduate of the University of North Carolina, McPherson holds the honorary Doctor of Laws degree from Catawba College. He served as the first chairman of the North Carolina Citizens Committee for Better Schools which plowed ground at the grass roots for improvement of educational opportunity. He has served on the North Carolina Cancer Committee and is a civilian aide to the Secretary of the Army.

McPherson is vice president of the American Council on Education Journalism and a past governor of Rotary International.

Last year, McPherson was elected chairman of the Maryfield Nursing Home Advisory Board in High Point—the first non-Catholic to head the board. He was also named president of the Literary-Historical Association.

Mrs. Coltrane, a native of Randolph County, received her undergraduate degree from Elon College, her masters degree from North Carolina State University at Raleigh, and took special training at the University of North Carolina at Chapel Hill.

A former president of the State Legislative Council and of the North Carolina Division of the United Daughters of the Confederacy, Mrs. Coltrane also served as president of the Raleigh YWCA.

She is a trustee at the Methodist Retirement Home and is a member of the Edenton Street United Methodist Church in Raleigh.

Golden Decade Second Phase Plans Are Readied

The plans for the second phase of the Golden Decade Development Program have been perfected by Frank Henwood, Regional Vice-President of Cumerford Corporation. Elsewhere in the *Bulletin* the announcement of the honorary chairman and the co-chairmen appears. Strong leadership is absolutely necessary to assure the success of the effort.

Prospective donors have been classified by an Evaluating Committee composed of Holt Mc-Pherson, Charles E. Hayworth, James H. Millis, W. R. Henderson, and Charles Kearns. Solicitation of the prospects will begin within ten days.

The parents and many other friends of the College who live outside the immediate area will be given an opportunity to participate in the campaign through direct mail. Since the chief target of this phase will be the Student Center, the parents should have an unusual interest in this phase of the Golden Decade Program which will provide adequate space for student activities.

Other friends who live in the immediate area will be included in the community functional aspects of the student center. The College has long felt that it is an asset to the community. The completion of the student center will give another facility to share with the community.

Plans reveal the fact that more than one hundred thousand dollars must be secured outside the immediate area in order to reach the mark set by the first phase.

Must We Have Phase II Of Golden Decade?

The Golden Decade Development Program has its origin in an intensive study and subsequent long range plan for High Point College. The name "Golden Decade" was derived from the fiftieth or golden anniversary of the College in 1974. The last ten years immediately prior to 1974 then became the Golden Decade.

From the long-range plans there came the projected needs of \$3,200,000 for bricks and mortar, and \$6,800,000 or its equivalent in income for endowment. Thus the sum of ten million dollars was needed by 1974 to make the goals of the Golden Decade. The effort is based not upon mere daydream or reverie, but upon realistic planning for the future.

The question should be asked, and rightly so, what has been accomplished since 1965?

Endowment has increased from \$1,714,645 to \$3,163,269. Book value of plant increased from \$4,024,540 to \$5,428,855. Buildings have been added — 2 dormitories housing 234 students - science building - infirmary.

In addition the Sears project in downtown High Point has become a reality without the use of one cent of Golden Decade funds. When the loan for this complex has been paid, the net income from Sears will be equal to the income of at least \$3 million. The Eastgate Shopping Center constructed on the site of the Methodist Children's Home will produce, when the loan is paid, income equal to about \$3 million. These attempts to provide income for current expenses for the future will produce much of the needed endowment.

Phase Two of the Golden Decade Development Program will attempt to provide the new student center, and along with this building, add to funds already set aside for the chapel and swimming pool. There will remain for Phase Three a new dormitory, a library addition, acquiring adjoining property, renovation of existing buildings and an administration building.

The chairman of Phase Two is Holt McPherson of High Point. Mrs. D. S. Coltrane of Ra-

leigh is co-chairman with Mr. McPherson. Dan K. Moore, former governor, is the honorary chairman.

In the High Point division, Charles E. Hayworth is chairman of the Pattern Gifts division. W. R. Henderson and Fred Alexander are cochairmen of the Special Gifts division.

An opportunity to invest in High Point College will be provided in six other cities. In Raleigh, trustees Dan K. Moore, Mrs. D. S. Coltrane, Charles F. Carroll, and Blaine Madison are providing leadership. Charlotte's mayor, Stan Brookshire, and Reverend Thomas B. Stockton, trustees, are heading the effort in that city.

In Winston-Salem Dr. Joseph May, an alumnus, and W. F. Womble, trustee, are working with alumni and other friends there.

In the city of Greensboro, trustee Roger Soles, president of Jefferson-Pilot, is chairman. Working with him are Mike Fleming, Bill Wood, E. Wayne Weant, alumni, and other friends.

The Asheboro section is under the able leadership of Charles McCrary with Mayor Robert Reese and others giving valuable help.

The Thomasville section has not been organized but it is hoped that trustee Harry B. Finch, former trustee Thomas A. Finch, and alumnus Kermit Cloniger may be enlisted to undertake the securing of funds from selected prospects in Thomasville.

With only scattered reports now available, nearly 500 thousand dollars have been reported in cash and pledges. The closing date for the campaign is June 10, 1969. It is the hope of Frank Henwood, Campaign Director, that all solicitation may be completed by commencement, May 25.

Many prospects not seen personally will be solicited by mail.

AN OPEN LETTER TO PARENTS FROM PRESIDENT WENDELL M. PATTON

May I use this means of discussing with you a subject of concern to all of us who are connected with either teen-agers or educational institutions - and that is the current publicity being given to student unrest, demands, and disruptions across our nation.

You have entrusted the education of your sons and daughters to us and those of us at High Point College are ever mindful of this responsibility. We pledge anew that the opportunities for an education on our campus will not be jeopardized because of illegal demands of lawless groups.

Our student body is one of the finest to be found anywhere - we have an open door policy throughout the institution - a clearly established system of appeals and recourse - and a faculty and administration which is not only willing to listen to students, but actively seek out their thoughts, feelings, ideas, and suggestions. We know of no reason, nor do we anticipate any problem on our campus, but we believe that you as parents have the right to know something of our thinking, our policies, and the actions that we would take in case of an emergency to guarantee your son or daughter the right to the services for which you are paying and for which we assume responsibility to deliver.

First and foremost let me state that we believe - and strongly believe in academic freedom - but freedom inseparably combined with responsibility! We believe in good conduct, fair play and hard work and those who may have other goals or values will not find our campus a compatible environment. We are vitally interested in student opinion and attitudes and anxious to maintain a community of learning in every sense of the word. We provide recourse, due process, and the rights of appeal for any decision at any administrative level. We protect the rights of students for peaceful assembly, if these provided means of appeal have been exhausted. However, we will not tolerate any action that would in any way disrupt or disturb the normal operation and function of this institution. We can allow neither interference with the educational process, nor illegal actions which might endanger life or property, nor deprival of the rights and services of the majority of students, and we will move strongly in the event this occurs. In fact, we believe that indulgence of irresponsible students is abdication of our responsibility to you and to our student body and will not be tolerated.

Even though we feel that it is unlikely on a campus such as ours, in the event there is any illegal or disruptive action, all students involved will be requested to identify themselves immediately. Those unable and unwilling to do so will be informed that they are trespassing on private property and directed to leave the premises. If they refuse to comply, their arrest will be ordered. Any individual involved who can prove himself to be a bona fide student, properly registered, would be directed to return immediately to his classroom, or dormitory, as the case may be, and then a meeting would be arranged in an attempt to resolve any differences of opinion that might exist. However, I must emphasize that we will not, under any circumstances, negotiate with any group of students during illegal, disruptive, or forceful activity - that there will be no dialogue or discussion until such time as order has returned to the campus. If any student fails to obey this lawful directive from an administrative official, then I, as President of the College, will declare a state of emergency in existence and temporarily assume the total authority of the faculty and Board of Trustees. Using this authority such students would be suspended or expelled on the spot with instructions to immediately vacate their rooms and remove themselves from the campus. Failure to comply will result in arrest as trespassers on private property. Any student thus suspended or expelled may appeal, or be heard, only after the state of emergency is declared over by the President of the College.

It is not our intent to deprive any student of his rights or freedom, but it is our intent to assume a firm stand to protect your son and daughter from a coercive attempt by any group, to deprive them of the services and educational opportunities guaranteed to you by High Point College.

This I owe to you and your children and it is my sincere hope that this position and my statement of our position will find your complete endorsement and support. I not only welcome, but encourage and request your comments, advice, suggestions, or any information which you feel might be helpful to us in facing such a decision.

Please discuss this entire matter with your son or daughter when they come home for the holidays and make sure that this is the type institution that they need and want - the type institution in which they should be enrolled, and one that they will support and strengthen.

Thank you for this opportunity to make clear our position on a major problem area at other institutions. Please remember us in your prayers as we continue to live up to the confidence that you have thus far placed in us.

Statement Adopted By The Faculty Committee

In view of some recent events, the Faculty Committee of High Point College deems it important to reaffirm the principle of a free and open campus where presentation of points of view, discussion, dissent, and normal operations of the college may occur without prior restraint of threat of disruption, violence, or destruction.

To this end, we, the Faculty Committee, endorse the principles set forth by the Council of the American Association of University Professors in its Special Resolution of October 28, 1967:

"Universities and colleges are dependent for their very life upon maintenance of the principle that 'the common good depends upon the free search for truth and its free exposition.' Fundamental to the operation of this principle is respect for the right of all to speak, to listen, to try to persuade by reasoned argument, and to form a judgment based on full and free exposition and discussion.

"The right to speak encompasses diverse modes of expression. It does not encompass action to foreclose full, open, and orderly debate nor does it countenance actions by individuals or groups to restrict the free speech, actions, or academic freedom of others or to keep teachers and students from their central tasks of teaching and learning. The preservation on the campus of the free search for truth, freedom to teach, and freedom to learn is a common and primary commitment of all members

of the academic community — faculty, administration, students, and governing boards."

Furthermore, we endorse the conviction of the AAUP Council expressed in the Special Resolution that:

"... action by individuals or groups to prevent speakers invited to the campus from speaking, to disrupt the operations of the institution in the course of demonstrations, or to obstruct and restrain other members of the academic community and campus visitors by physical force is destructive of the pursuit of learning and of a free society. All components of the academic community are under a strong obligation to protect its processes from these tactics."

In expressing this conviction, we acknowledge the faculty's obligation to protect and preserve a free and open campus and we affirm our support for the Administration in discharging its responsibility to this end.

The End Of The Second Phase Of Golden Decade Has Not Been Reached

The Second Phase of the Golden Decade Program of Development has not ended. Although the director-consultant has gone, the work on phase two is far from being finished. Frank Henwood, regional vice-president of Cumerford Corporation and director of this phase, has made his report according to contract, but no area (including High Point) is complete.

According to the final report, High Point's Pattern and Special Gifts divisions were assigned 250 individuals and businesses. Of this number, the following statistical report was given:

Prospect cards with refusals, 46
Cards still in hands of solicitors, 146

Greensboro Area Progresses Toward Goal

The Greensboro division under the chairmanship of Roger Soles and Mike Fleming is hard at work with 19 volunteer helpers. From the Greensboro division, Jefferson-Pilot, as reported elsewhere in this issue, has pledged \$100,000 over a four-year period to establish a Chair of Learning. This action has set the pattern for other large gifts.

One large gift and one pledge which gave early encouragement to the campaign was from the chairman of the board of trustees and a member of the board, respectively. These came to more than a quarter of a million dollars.

Other areas including Winston-Salem, Thomasville, Asheboro, Charlotte, and Raleigh have not completed work on solicitation. All these areas and those who are enlisted to help are urged to complete all assignments as early as possible.

Alumni, Parents and Friends Respond

Parents, one thousand sets, were offered the opportunity to have a part in this phase of Golden Decade. The number responding has grown to 20.

Generally, alumni were not solicited except where they were in other divisions or were enlisted in leadership positions. The report to date shows 144 alumni who have given in pledges or cash.

Nearly two thousand appeals were sent to various friends in the High Point Community. To date 7 have indicated their intention to participate in the second phase.

Trustees, Faculty and Administration Make Pledges

Two trustees led off with large gifts. The total number of trustees answering with stated intentions was 14. This to-date leaves 14 from whom we have not heard.

Faculty members led the way with 86.36% making gifts or pledges. The administration and all staff members were given a chance to participate. For administrative offices, 100% were counted. The maintenance, cafeteria and others have a smaller per cent of giving.

The Students were never solicited for Golden Decade.

While the report is not final, there are some things to which we may point with pride. The large number of volunteer workers, the dedication of leadership, the response of those who have been solicited, give evidence of the high esteem in which High Point College is held in this area. The Golden Decade Development Program had its origin in the long range plans for the College produced by a committee of administrative officers, faculty members, trustees, and alumni whose report was made in 1962. The Board of Trustees received the report in 1963, but no immediate plans were made at the time to implement the program.

The Original Golden Decade Plans

In the first months of 1965, the Board of Trustees, after a survey by a firm of consultants, voted to proceed with an effort to raise the minimum goal of ten million dollars over the tenyear period from 1965 thru 1974. The College will celebrate the Golden or 50th Anniversary of its opening in 1974. As W. R. Henderson, the chairman and director of Phase I, began making plans, he and his steering committee selected Golden Decade Development Program as the official designation for the period. It takes on added meaning since the last decade before the fiftieth anniversary is indeed the "Golden Decade" of High Point College.

The entire ten-year period was planned with three phases in mind. The objectives for the Golden Decade were set forth in the brochure at the beginning of the first phase in 1965.

The First Phase

Phase I produced in cash and pledges \$1,002,-691.42 of which \$882,180.04 has been paid. The following was accomplished:

1. The Horace S. Haworth Hall of Science was erected at a cost of \$1,040,000 including the land. The cost exceeded the estimate by \$82,081

due to increased construction costs.

- 2. The Infirmary has been built at a cost of \$85,000. Note that this is \$70,000 more than was projected. Original projections were based on the renovation of some rooms in a dormitory for a dispensary, but the College was later forced to provide an infirmary. This explains the increase over the projection.
- 3. A women's dormitory housing 138 students was erected in 1968 at a cost of \$641,000, exceeding the estimated cost by \$341,000. The original estimate was made from the long-range plans of 1963 and for 100 students. The plans changed to house 138 students, coupled with construction costs rising at 12% per year, explain the excess of cost over estimates.
- 4. With the opening of the Haworth Hall of Science, the first floor of the Dennis H. Cooke Hall was renovated to provide classrooms for the Department of Business Administration and for faculty offices at a cost of \$20,000.
- 5. Eighteen bathrooms in McCulloch Hall were torn out and rebuilt at a cost of \$50,000.
- 6. Additional property was acquired across Montlieu Avenue as the site for the science building and other future buildings for \$66,500.
- 7. In addition to the above, we have approximately \$200,000 set aside for a chapel-religious center to be constructed during the second phase.
- 8. Designated funds are held for a swimming pool in the amount of \$60,000.

To summarize the activities of Phase I, in addition to the eight items listed above, there have been other accomplishments which have come as by-products or in addition to the objectives of Phase I.

- 1. A grant for \$346,911 was received from the Federal Government for the science building.
- 2. A loan for \$403,000 was made to the College by the Federal Government to construct the science building.
- 3. A loan for \$470,000 was received by the College from the Federal Government for the women's dormitory.
- 4. A trust fund was set up by an individual for \$50,000.
- 5. A gift of \$50,000 was made to endow a Chair of Economics.
 - 6. Endowment increased by \$637,000.
- 7. The acquiring, building, and leasing of the "Magic Block" to Sears-Roebuck was effected at a cost of \$1,449,616.

- 8. The acquiring, building, and leasing of East-gate Shopping Center was accomplished at a cost of \$600,000.
- 9. A gift annuity was received by the College for \$175,000.
- 10. Budget increase for instructional services rose by \$128,000.
- 11. Average faculty salaries for nine months increased by \$1,567.00.

The Second Phase

High Point College has by the help of many friends accomplished much in these nearly four years, but there is much more to do. The SEC-OND PHASE is now underway. Let us look at what remains to be done in the next four years.

- 1. The student center which will cost at least \$1,000,000 now has priority.
- 2. The Chapel-Religious Center must become a reality. The addition to the staff of a Chaplain increases the urgency for this facility.
- 3. An addition to the library must be a reality before 1973. The fact that Federal funds may be obtained places this facility in the realm of probability.
- 4. The immediate administrative office needs will be met by remodeling the first floor of Roberts Hall. The cost has not been estimated yet.
- 5. The renovation of the second floor of the Dennis H. Cooke Hall goes forward now and thus becomes a part of Phase II.
- 6. Funds for student aid are needed, especially endowed scholarship and loan funds. The sum of \$50,000 annually is needed to meet the needs in this area.

A Look Beyond Phase II

This second and still a third phase of the Golden Decade Development Program are necessary to reach the minimum goals set forth in 1963 and brought forward in the First Phase objectives in 1965. Construction costs have risen sharply and will continue to rise.

- 1. Funds have been set aside for the Chapel-Religious Center. These funds must be supplemented.
- 2. The swimming pool project will require more than the \$60,000 in hand.
- 3. Another dormitory for men is definitely in the plans for the Golden Decade. The cost continues to escalate.
- 4. What about the endowment requirements of \$6,800,000 by 1974? The answer: by the end of 1974 when the indebtedness is liquidated, the anticipated income from Sears and Eastgate

should be equivalent to the income from approximately 6 million dollars of endowment principal.

How Much Longer Can High Point Advance In Quality?

Your College has advanced, not only in physical assets, but also in its standing among the colleges of the State and Southeast. There are some who voice the opinion that a college which has leased a store to Sears and which builds a shopping center does not need money. That which appears on the surface is not the entire story.

The trustees and administrators of High Point College know that the road ahead is indeed uphill if not fraught with almost insurmountable difficulties. The fact that the College was able to borrow funds to buy the Sears property and then to build the necessary buildings, and borrow the funds for constructing the Eastgate Shopping Center, is not too well known. We feel that if we can create income for current operations after the indebtedness is paid, we are helping ourselves, and therefore may deserve to be helped to build other physical facilities on the campus

High Point College Does Have Needs

We need to provide a student center for students, faculty, and friends of the College. This facility is long past due. With the escalation of student fees, one wonders how much longer the students will continue to attend a college which does not have an adequate student center.

The College needs a Chapel. A church-related college without some place to worship and exercise spiritual talents is providing less than it was ever supposed to do. The needs of this sort could be enumerated at length, but these buildings cost a lot of money which we do not have.

What Other Needs Are There?

The liberty is taken to list a few with the hope that you may help supply some of our needs.

- 1. We need a cabinet for addressograph plates. (70 drawer)
- 2. We need funds for scholarships.
- 3. We need a faculty lounge.
- 4. We need several air-conditioners.
- 5. We need a small offset press for printing programs, letters, etc.
- 6. We need a varityper.

- 7. We need a tying machine for mail room.
- 8. We need a small building to house a snack bar.
- 9. We need individuals who will include the College in their wills.

College Receives \$100,000 Gift For Endowed Chair

High Point College has received an endowment grant of \$100,000 which will be used to establish an unrestricted Chair of Learning.

Dr. Wendell M. Patton, college president, announced that Jefferson Standard Life Insurance Company and Pilot Life Insurance Company, both of Greensboro, have contributed toward the endowment. Proceeds from the interest on the endowment will be used to supplement the salary of a professor during a scholastic year.

The honored position, open both to faculty and visiting lecturers, will be known as the Jefferson-Pilot Chair of Learning.

Dr. Patton noted that the establishment of the Chair, in that the grant is not restricted to one particular department, is an unusual procedure and one that will afford the college much more latitude in the field of learning.

The \$100,000 will be contributed to the col-

lege over a four-year period and is a gift toward the second phase of the Golden Decade drive now underway. Goal for the second phase is \$1 million.

W. Roger Soles, President of Jefferson Standard, stated: "We are delighted to be able to participate, through this endowment gift, in the continuing educational enrichment of High Point College, an independent, church-related college.

"We have long been keenly interested in the progress and well-being of the church-related colleges of North Carolina for their great cultural contributions to our community, the special opportunities they represent for our young people here at home, and the vital importance of these neighboring institutions of higher learning to business and industry in this area.

"By establishing an endowment for this Chair of Learning at High Point College, we of Jefferson Standard Life Insurance Company and Pilot Life Insurance Company hope to be able to assist the college each year in that area of its program where the need is greatest," said Soles, a trustee of the college. Rufus White is president of Pilot Life Insurance Company.

"We are extremely fortunate in that the endowment is not restricted to any one particular department. This means that we will be able to use the financial remuneration from the endowment toward a Chair in any of our departments—wherever we find the need to be greatest," said Dr. Patton.


Final details of the Jefferson-Pilot Chair of Learning will be completed in the future, said Soles and Patton.



Centurion Club

High Point Has A Philosophy For Development And Fund Raising

"Why is High Point College always seeking money?" This question is often heard. And it is a valid question. Many of the alumni mildly resent the fact that a constant effort is made to enlist them to make an investment in their College. Coupled with the question above is a very definite impression among local residents that High Point's coffers are full and it needs no more money.

The attempt to answer the question and then to remove the erroneous impression is the purpose of this article.

Why Does High Point Need Money?

The answers have been given many times before, such as a new dormitory, a new student center, an addition to the library, a chapel, a new administration building, increased endowment, scholarships. The list could keep on growing. People just do not believe these things are necessary just because Catawba, Greensboro, Elon, Pfeiffer, UNC-G have them. High Point has always been a conservative institution when it came to living beyond its means.

Why all these needs? If there's no other answer than that these were included in the Long-Range Plans, then they may not be real needs. During the last twenty years many things have been done to increase the effectiveness of the academic offerings. Great efforts have provided better physical facilities. The catalogue indicates the following buildings and major improvements were added: Susanne Wesley Hall-1953; Boiler in Central Heating Plant-1953; Shop Building -1953; Dennis H. Cooke Hall (old Science Building) — 1954; Memorial Auditorium and Fine Arts—1954; Alumni Gymnasium—1957; Additional Boiler — 1957; North Hall — 1958; Harrison Hall remodeled for Cafeteria-1959; Wrenn Memorial Library Stacks-1959; Student Center enlarged and renovated - 1959; Millis Hall-1963; Yadkin Hall-1964; Tennis Courts—1964; Storage Building—1966; Horace S. Haworth Hall-1967; The New Dormitory -1968; College Infirmary - 1968. All these improvements in the physical plant of the College were necessary to provide for triple the number of students, the same increase in teachers, and to give teaching and learning tools for better education. In addition, the principal of the endowment increased by almost the same percentage as the students and faculty.

The College needs the facilities set forth in the Long-Range Plans of 1963. These plans sprang to life in 1965 as the first phase of the Golden Decade Development Program began. As stated in the June issue of the Development Bulletin, the institution has come a long way toward reaching its established goals. But there is much more to be done.

Philosophy, Purpose Create Needs


The philosophy of the College in development and fund-raising is the same as that stated in the general catalogue:

"High Point College attempts to provide a sound, progressive program. A living Christian philosophy of education gives depth and intensity to this quality program... Our fundamental purpose and the very reason for our existence is to assist our students in developing themselves to be come strong leaders in their communities..."

The purpose of every division and every department of the College should be in line with the stated purpose of the College. No person who does not subscribe to the basic philosophy of the institution has the right to work or teach in it. This then is why High Point College needs money. We need increased investment to assure strength in the faculty, adequate facilities, lowest tuition rates as possible, and the most wholesome learning environment available to every person who works or studies on its campus.

The future is as bright as the promises of God. But that future must be accomplished by intelligent planning, industrious and energetic achievement, and in the spirit of the saints and patriots who had the dream that created High

SOUTH ELEVATION PROPOSED STUDENT CENTER

Let us look at the present facilities for students. First, there are the dormitories where there is space for nearly 800 students. There are bedrooms, lounges, storage areas, laundry rooms and kitchenettes for the use of students. Since the student center and Harrison Hall were enlarged, the resident student population has grown by at least 325 with no further expansion of facilities for caring for the physical, social and recreational needs outside the dormitories.

What is now included in Harrison? The dining room, the kitchen, serving area, dish washing, a private dining room, and rest room facilities are on the main floor. At the rear of the building (basement) there are rooms for the student government, Hi-Po, Zenith, campus security, and other rest rooms. This space is now about 10,000

square feet.

In the present student center, there are spaces (very cramped) for the post-office, the studentbookstore, and the snack bar. This space and that on each of the other floors is nearly 2700 square feet. On the second floor is a lounge with a television set, a recreation room with ping-pong tables, vending machines, chairs, and a small kitchen. On the top floor there is a room with a pool-table, and offices for the student personnel and guidance and counselling staffs.

The total space for student offices, student recreation, social life, food services, snack bar, administrative offices, bookstore, and postoffices in both buildings is less than 18,000

square feet.

The proposed student center will replace Harrison Hall and be joined by a passageway to the


present student center. The pictures of the architect's sketches of the new student center are purely tentative. Although much study and investigation of student centers has been carried on, the complete answer has not been found. However, it is thought that the three floors of the proposed outside walls will be sufficient to meet the needs of the College. The vice-president for Business and Financial Affairs is thinking in terms of a building stressed for a fourth floor.

The total space in the new structure with the present student center included is more than 50 thousand square feet. This building will provide food facilities, student store, bookstore, postoffice, snack bar, lounges, student offices, recreation areas with billiard room, ping-pong room, television lounge, trustees dining room, a special dining room, several meeting rooms, and day students' lockers. One floor of this proposed structure will give almost as much space as is

now provided in the two buildings.

The second phase of The Golden Decade has as its goal securing funds for this much needed building. To date, due to certain designations and stock donations, the amount will not be sufficient to build it. It will take a minimum of one million dollars to provide the student center. There are several possible ways to acquire the funds. One, a large grant from an individual or foundation, or next year hope to borrow the necessary amount from the Federal Government. How much? One-half million dollars will provide it. It can become a memorial for some loved one. Or, a large number of interested friends could provide the funds.

Last year in addition to keeping mailing lists current, more than thirty thousand pieces of first class mail were sent from the office. The second class mailings totaled more than eighty-four thousand separate pieces, all of which were addressed, tied in bundles and dispatched from the office. The third class mail processed reached twelve thousand pieces.

All the work, billing, mailings, news releases and processing gifts could not have been accomplished without the valued help of Mrs. Jeanie Hazzard, Mrs. Margaret Ingram, Miss Linda Huff, and students who have worked in the offices.

There has been much accomplished but there is so much to be done that accomplishments seem insignificant. With friends such as High Point College is blessed, the development of the College is going forward with hope and a sense of purpose.

IEFFERSON-PILOT CHAIR ESTABLISHED

In May, High Point College received a letter from Jefferson Standard Life Insurance Company and Pilot Life Insurance Company, both of Greensboro, N.C., expressing their intent to contribute \$100,000 to the endowment of High Point College over a four-year period to establish an unrestricted Chair of Learning. The income from the endowment will supplement the salary of a professor for one scholastic year. The honored position, designated the Jefferson-Pilot Chair of Learning, will be open to faculty and to visiting lecturers.

In presenting the preliminary plans, W. Roger Soles, President of Jefferson Standard and a trustee of H.P.C., stated: "We are delighted to be able to participate, through this endowment gift, in the continuing educational enrichment of High Point College, an independent churchrelated college.

"We have long been keenly interested in the progress and well-being of the church-related colleges of North Carolina for their great cultural contributions to our community, the special opportunities they represent for our young people here at home, and the vital importance of these neighboring institutions of higher learning

AN OPEN LETTER TO PARENTS FROM PRESIDENT WENDELL M. PATTON

May I use this means of discussing with you a subject of concern to all of us who are connected with either teen-agers or educational institutions — and that is the current publicity being given to student unrest, demands, and disruptions across our nation.

You have entrusted the education of your sons and daughters to us and those of us at High Point College are ever mindful of this responsibility. We pledge anew that the opportunities for an education on our campus will not be jeopardized because of illegal demands of lawless groups.

Our student body is one of the finest to be found anywhere - we have an open door policy throughout the institution - a clearly established system of appeals and recourse - and a faculty and administration which is not only willing to listen to students, but actively seek out their thoughts, feelings, ideas, and suggestions. We know of no reason, nor do we anticipate any problem on our campus, but we believe that you as parents have the right to know something of our thinking, our policies, and the actions that we would take in case of an emergency to guarantee your son or daughter the right to the services for which you are paying and for which we assume responsibility to deliver.

First and foremost let me state that we believe - and strongly believe in academic freedom - but freedom inseparably combined with responsibility! We believe in good conduct, fair play and hard work and those who may have other goals or values will not find our campus a compatible environment. We are vitally interested in student opinion and attitudes and anxious to maintain a community of learning in every sense of the word. We provide recourse, due process, and the rights of appeal for any decision at any administrative level. We protect the rights of students for peaceful assembly, if these provided means of appeal have been exhausted. However, we will not tolerate any action that would in any way disrupt or disturb the normal operation and function of this institution. We can allow neither interference with the educational process, nor illegal actions which might endanger life or property, nor deprival of the rights and services of the majority of students, and we will move strongly in the event this occurs. In fact, we believe that indulgence of irresponsible students is abdication of our responsibility to you and to our student body and will not be tolerated.

Even though we feel that it is unlikely on a campus such as ours, in the event there is any illegal or disruptive action, all students involved will be requested to identify themselves immediately. Those unable and unwilling to do so will be informed that they are trespassing on private property and directed to leave the premises. If they refuse to comply, their arrest will be ordered. Any individual involved who can prove himself to be a bona fide student, properly registered, would be directed to return immediately to his classroom, or dormitory, as the case may be, and then a meeting would be arranged in an attempt to resolve any differences of opinion that might exist. However, I must emphasize that we will not, under any circumstances, negotiate with any group of students during illegal, disruptive, or forceful activity - that there will be no dialogue or discussion until such time as order has returned to the campus. If any student fails to obey this lawful directive from an administrative official, then I, as President of the College, will declare a state of emergency in existence and temporarily assume the total authority of the faculty and Board of Trustees. Using this authority such students would be suspended or expelled on the spot with instructions to immediately vacate their rooms and remove themselves from the campus. Failure to comply will result in arrest as trespassers on private property. Any student thus suspended or expelled may appeal, or be heard, only after the state of emergency is declared over by the President of the College.

It is not our intent to deprive any student of his rights or freedom, but it is our intent to assume a firm stand to protect your son and daughter from a coercive attempt by any group, to deprive them of the services and educational opportunities guaranteed to you by High Point College.

This I owe to you and your children and it is my sincere hope that this position and my statement of our position will find your complete endorsement and support. I not only welcome, but encourage and request your comments, advice, suggestions, or any information which you feel might be helpful to us in facing such a decision.

Please discuss this entire matter with your son or daughter when they come home for the holidays and make sure that this is the type institution that they need and want - the type institution in which they should be enrolled, and one that they will support and strengthen.

Thank you for this opportunity to make clear our position on a major problem area at other institutions. Please remember us in your prayers as we continue to live up to the confidence that you have thus far placed in us.



H.P.C.'s MORATORIUM

The High Point College students, in their conduct of the October 15 Moratorium regarding the situation in Vietnam, received high praise from Dr. Wendell M. Patton, Jr., president.

"Our student body has spoken out strongly against a senseless war in Vietnam. While this may not be unusual, it is unusual and most impressive that they have done this in a responsible and mature manner. Surely the nation's leaders cannot fail to listen carefully to a group such as we have at High Point College! They have something important to say, but they make it quite clear that they are willing and able to accept adult responsibility as they express themselves.

"It is needless to say that I am proud to be associated with them and it is my hope that our news media will carry their message and action to the public," Dr. Patton said.

The day-long program, sponsored by the "Students for Peace" movement at the college, began with an early flag-raising ceremony and ended late Wednesday evening with a "Peace Feast" for all students and faculty who had fasted during the day.

Administrative officials, faculty, and students spent the day discussing all aspects of the Vietnam situation — pro and con. All classes were held and it was left to the discretion of professors as to whether to discuss Vietnam — and, students reported, most did.

A Gift May Be More Than A Gift

It was in the depth of the depression of the 1930's. A man, once a millionaire, who had been wiped out in the burst of the boom and the banking crisis, stood on the campus of one of North Carolina's church-related colleges and looked at the buildings that his gifts had provided. He not only was penniless, but had lost his palatial home. As he looked at the scene, the faculty and students busily engaged in learning activities, he was heard to remark, "I wish I had given ten times as much when I had it, for all that I have left is what I have given away, what I have invested here."

Others like this man could have said, "I have no funds in the bank, no property which I can call mine, but I do have a solid investment in the lives of young people who have been helped by the scholarship program I have sponsored." Not physical facilities which may be enjoyed by students and viewed by the donor, but an intangible and even more secure deposit in lives of men and women who have been given an opportunity. Otherwise, imagination and brain would have been wasted and will continue to be unproductive.

The greatest single need now and for the future at High Point College is not endowment, nor yet brick and mortar, but funds which can be used to help worthy youngsters to enroll or remain in school.
