#### THE ANNUAL ALUMNI FUND

launched its 1974 program on January 25 with the first mailing piece to Alumni. During this Golden Anniversary of High Point College, the Alumni challenge is perhaps the greatest ever. Your gifts to High Point College are a living monument and your Alma Mater expresses her appreciation for your interest and assistance in meeting educational opportunities and needs. The excellence of High Point's program will continue to increase as more Alumni participate in the support of the College.

#### THE ADMISSIONS OFFICE

reports to this date, in comparison of last year, we are up 17% in applications for the '74 - '75 academic session. Admissions Director Robert A. Wells, Jr. states this is extraordinary in that most private and public colleges in North Carolina are experiencing decreases in applications in comparison with last year. Part of our success can be attributed to an interested Alumni who have recommended good, prospective students, as well as many faculty programs that have attracted area high school students. Have you recommended a student for the '74 - '75 session?

#### THE GOLDEN DECADE FUND

is well underway under the direction of the Campaign Steering Committee made up of key leaders in the community and operating under broad policies set out by the Board of Trustees. Dr. Charles F. Carroll is General Chairman and Holt McPherson is Co-Chairman. The minimum goal has been set as \$2,150,000 with \$1,000,000 to endowment and \$700,000 for the library addition and \$450,000 for the addition to the Physical Education facility.

The campaign is divided into five solicitation divisions - each with a specific area of responsibility.

1) The Advance Division is made up of prospects who have a definite relationship to the College, that is Employees, Trustees, Students, Parents and Alumni. This division is the first to be solicited and because of their relationship must set the pace for the Campaign.

a) The Employees of the Campus set a minimum goal of \$50,000 and a challenge goal of \$60,000. To date pledges total \$69,246 which is an outstanding performance. Dr. Murphy M. Osborne is Campus Chairman.

b) The Trustees set a goal of \$800,000 for their participation, this is the personal and corporate pledge of all Trustees. To date Holt McPherson, Chairman of the Trustees, reports \$543,435 with several Board members yet to be heard from. The Chairman is encouraged that this goal will be reached.

2) The Primary Gifts Division is made up of prospects who have a potential of \$25,000 and up and is headed by Charles E. Hayworth and James H. Millis. They have a target of \$500,000 and to date have reported \$159,715 with only 5 of the 27 cards worked.

3) The Major Gifts Division is made up of prospects with a potential of from \$10,000 - \$25,000 and headed by J. Harriss Covington and Herman H. Smith. Major Gifts Division has reported \$96,883 from 28 cards from a total of 58 cards. The target for Major Gifts Division is \$300,000.

4) Special Gifts Division is made up of prospects with a potential of from \$1,000 - \$10,000 and is headed by Robert T. Amos, Jr., Jack H. Campbell and Phil Phillips. They have 227 cards and the Division had its Kick Off on January 29 at 7:30 a.m. There is a target of \$200,000 for this Division.

5) The Area Division will be made up of prospects in the several counties where the College receives students and some indication of support. Each county where we have prospects and leadership will have its own campaign.

The Campaign organization is made up of the top leadership in the area, and several good pace setting gifts have been received. We have high hopes of going over our minimum goal by the end of the Campaign on May 31st.



## **THREE PROFESSORS TO BE HONORED**

During commencement exercises on May 19, three former professors at High Point College will receive honorary doctoral degrees. The honorees of the College are Miss E. Vera Idol, English and chairman of the department; J. Hobart Allred, modern language and dean of students; and, Nathaniel P. Yarborough, modern language and registrar. These former leaders of the College who faced the hardships of its opening will receive their recognitions in concurrence with the fiftieth anniversary of High Point College.

Miss Idol will receive the Doctor of Literature degree, and Mr. Allred and Mr. Yarborough will receive the Doctor of Humanities degree. Miss Idol and Mr. Allred began teaching at the College in 1924, and Mr. Yarborough joined them in 1925.

Miss Idol received the Bachelor of Arts degree from Greensboro College (NC) and the Master of Arts degree from Columbia University (NY). She has been a recipient of several honors, including the Distinguished Service Award from her undergraduate Alma Mater, the Book of Golden Deeds award from the High Point Exchange Club, and the Citizen of the Month award from the High Point Sertoma Club. Miss Idol is the author of two books, Paths of Shining Light and A History of Wesley Memorial United Methodist Church from Its Beginning in 1856 to 1960

Dean Allred received both the Bachelor of Arts and Master of Arts degrees from the University of North Carolina at Chapel Hill. In addition to his professional duties of teaching French and Spanish, he served the College as Dean of Students from 1951 until 1959. Mr. Yarborough was the recipient of his Bachelor of Arts degree at Wofford College (SC) and the Master of Arts degree from the University of South Carolina. Continuing to teach modern language on a part-time basis, Mr. Yarborough was registrar of the College from 1936 until 1968. He is a past president of the North Carolina Association of Registrars and Admissions Officers.

It is fitting during the Golden Anniversary of High Point College, that these former professors will be recognized because of their dedication to the institution that is a modern day miracle. That miracle may never have happened had it not been for persons such as these.

#### TWO NEW DEGREE PROGRAMS

Two new Bachelor of Arts degree programs have been approved by the faculty of High Point College. The new programs are Theatre Arts Education and Human Relations.

The purposes of Theatre Arts in a college curriculum include providing opportunities for students in discovering theatre as an avenue for the expression of feelings and beliefs; help students develop talents for expressing themselves through speech, movement, and theatrical devices; encourage students to use their talents creatively; lead students to an understanding of oral and physical communications; and, assist students with special talent and interest to prepare themselves for further education as well as careers in theatre and its related areas.

#### **GOLDEN DECADE THIRD PHASE TOPS \$1,500,000**

The High Point College Board of Trustees held their Spring meeting on March 6 and received the good news that the current campaign for the Golden Decade Fund has received gifts and pledges totaling \$1,500,889, just under 70% of the Third Phase goal of \$2,150,000. This represents the greatest amount of money ever raised by the College in a single campaign.

The total reported included a large grant from the Belk Foundation of Charlotte which was received in February. In appreciation for this gift, the Trustees have named the newest dormitory on the campus (until now known as Co-ed Dorm) the Mary Irwin Belk Dormitory.

The reported amount also included the excellent participation by the campus family including faculty, administration and staff in the amount of \$69,400 and trustees in the amount of \$599,000. The balance of the reported total represents outstanding participation in the Primary, Major and Special gift divisions of the campaign. Dr. Charles Carroll, General Chairman, praised the performance by the campus family and trustees because it represents a real giving of one's self and a true dedication to the College and its mission. Area campaigns are planned for Asheboro, Charlotte, Greensboro, Raleigh, Thomasville and Winston-Salem where it is hoped that good results may be realized through calls on selected prospects.

No general solicitation is planned for alumni gifts to the Golden Decade Fund because of the emphasis being placed on our Golden Anniversary Loyalty Fund campaign this year. Gifts and pledges to the Golden Decade are welcomed from those individual alumni who may have a desire to participate in the Golden Decade Fund and receive credit as well for Annual Fund with the same gift. Some alumni have already taken advantage of this opportunity.

The response by the campus and High Point communities, businesses, alumni, foundations and many friends of the College has been most gratifying. With the momentum which has been generated to date, the campaign should be more than successful. Endowment for faculty enrichment and increased scholarship funds, an addition to the Library and the addition of an auxiliary Gymnasium are the three priority areas needing to be satisfied with the Third Phase and the successful completion of the ten year Golden Decade Campaign. We are all looking forward to a happy fiftieth birthday for High Point College in September of this year.

LESLIE E. MOODY

#### LESLIE E. MOODY DIES

Leslie Eugene Moody, former Resident Administrator of the Humanics Department at High Point College, died in High Point on March 9, 1974. Mr. Moody came to the campus in 1965 with the establishment of an American Humanics Foundation unit on the campus.

Mr. Moody, a native of Riley County, Kansas, received his bachelor's degree from Kansas State University and his master's degree from Stanford University (CA). His career, varied in experience, was widely recognized throughout the United States. Mr. Moody spent fourteen years in the teaching profession, the last seven of which he served as a high school principal. In addition, he was Director of Boys Work in a settlement house. Since 1945 he was in the professional service of the Boy Scouts of America serving in Kansas, Iowa, and Missouri. Mr. Moody came to High Point College from Jefferson City, Missouri where he was a Boy Scouts of America Executive.

A contributor to his community and church, Mr. Moody was a member of the High Point Model Cities Commission and a member of Central Christian Church, where he was Superintendent of the Sunday School and an Elder. After his retirement from High Point College as Visiting Lecturer of Humanics in May of 1973, Mr. Moody taught ceramics at Crossnore School at Crossnore, North Carolina.

Mr. Moody is survived by his wife, Mrs. Helen Brooks Moody, High Point, N. C.; a daughter, Mrs. J. L. Barnes, Gainesville, Florida; a son, M. T. Moody, High Point, N.C.; and a sister, Mrs. C. A. Neuber, Topeka, Kansas.

Memorial services were held on March 12 in High Point with burial in this city.

A group of Alpha Phi Omega Alumni have agreed to establish a Leslie E. Moody Memorial Scholarship Fund to honor the memory of Mr. Moody. It has been understood that contributions to the fund will accumulate until the principle amount has reached \$2,000 before the first grant will be made. The scholarship will be awarded each year thereafter to a deserving student in good standing and a Human Relations major. Contributions may be made to the fund and also receive credit as a gift to the Annual Alumni Fund. It is hoped that it may be possible for the Scholarship Fund to grow well beyond the \$2,000 minimum figure because, as with most such funds, it will be an open end arrangement with no established maximum principal amount. This is an excellent gesture on the part of the APO Fraternity alumni members and a fine way to honor the memory of a man loved by many.

# "LITTLE THEATRE" -A NEW FACILITY

A new "little theatre," in the Old Student Center, was used for the first time during the weekend of February 22-23 by high school and college students for the staging of district competition of the Carolina Dramatic Association.

The little theatre was constructed by the Theatre Arts Department and members of Alpha Psi Omega, the College's dramatic fraternity. The new campus facility seats about one hundred persons and can be used for theatrical productions, coffeehouses, piano and small ensemble recitals as well as other programs.

# ELEVEN STUDENTS INDUCTED INTO ORDER OF THE LIGHTED LAMP

Eleven students have been named to the Order of the Lighted Lamp, the oldest honor society at the College and considered to be one of the highest honors which can be conferred upon a High Point College student. Membership is based upon scholarship, character, and leadership, and the honoree must have maintained an average of 1.75, attended High Point College for five semesters, and made outstanding contributions to the religious, social, and other extracurricular activities on the campus.

## TENNIS CAMP DATES ANNOUNCED

Dates for the annual High Point College Tennis Camp have been set as June 9-14, June 16-21, and June 23-28. The camp, which is both a day and resident camp for boys and girls, ages 9-18, has been expanded to three oneweek sessions following a very successful 1973 season.

The camp is directed by Ray Alley, varsity coach at High Point College and twice NAIA District 26 Coach of the Year. Included on the staff will be several members of the Purple Panther tennis team which finished No. 4 nationally a year ago and several collegiate coaches. Instruction will be highly personalized to the ability of the individual players, who will be broken into beginner, intermediate and advanced divisions.

Teaching aids will be utilized, including the extensive use of instant replay video tape equipment, Prince ball thrower, and hitting boards. Offcourt seminars and clinics will cover singles and doubles strategy, rules, history and traditions of tennis, court etiquette, first aid, and numerous instructional and feature films.

Resident campers will be housed in the new air-conditioned dormitory with the evening programs held in the newly completed Holt McPherson Campus Center. Fourteen courts will be utilized for both instruction and play.

Enrollment for each session will be limited and applications are presently being accepted. Additional information may be obtained by contacting Ray Alley at the Athletic department at High Point College.

#### AN APPEAL TO ALUMNI

"Have you heard about the time they put a cow in the tower of Roberts Hall?" This is a frequent response when someone learns that I am writing a history of High Point College. The answer is, Yes. Of course the cow was discovered in the second floor auditorium. What happened in the tower is another story.

I have learned about the Roberts Hall bell being mysteriously tolled at midnight and (vaguely) about the tower chimes playing "Little Brown Jug." A model T Ford (surreptitiously assembled) appeared in the faculty lounge of Roberts Hall. Halloween produced an outhouse between Roberts Hall and the Student Center.

What else happened? Important things like money and buildings and the coming and going of presidents will make up the bulk of the history. But student activities are important too, and in the memories of alumni pranks fill an important place.

A panty raid in 1957 incurred a

resolution of "extreme disfavor" by the Student Legislature. A walkout from the dining room in 1945 created headlines in the Enterprise. If I remember right, Dr. Lindley told of a bombing raid on the High Point campus when Guilford students hired an airplane and dropped paper bags of red paint. Can anybody fill in the details?

Recollections of student activities usual and unusual - are needed as part of the historical record. I don't promise to include everything: I already know of some things that **ought not** to be included. The announcement was made by Bishop Earl G. Hunt, Presiding Bishop of the Western North Carolina Conference of the United Methodist Church. The McPhersons have been generous contributors to the ongoing life of the College and have made this generous gift for the specific purpose of providing endowment income for securing and maintaining a superior faculty.

A native of High Point, North Carolina, Mr. McPherson received his education in the High Point City Schools, the Bachelor of Arts degree in journalism from the University of North Carolina at Chapel Hill, and Catawba College in Salisbury, North Carolina conferred upon him the Doctor of Laws degree in 1963. A nationally known newspaper editor, he has edited THE SHELBY STAR, Shelby, North Carolina and THE HIGH POINT ENTERPRISE, High Point, North Carolina. In addition, he edited FURNITURE SOUTH and was a special writer for THE MIAMI FLORIDA HERALD. The donor has authored several books and has contributed voluminous articles to trade magazines and newspapers.

Mr. McPherson has been appointed to several boards and commissions on the national, state, and local level, and likewise has been the recipient of many awards because of his service. Currently, he is chairman of the North Carolina Medical Care Commission. He holds membership in many business and professional organizations and has been a leader in the City of High Point both in civic and church affairs. A member of Wesley Memorial United Methodist Church, he has been a member of its Official Board, a trustee, and headed his church's finances for the Building Committee, directing four campaigns during its building program.




The Class of 1974 march to their places in front of Roberts Hall for Commencement on May 19. The M. J. Wrenn Memorial Library is seen in the background.

Commencement 1974, held on May 19 on the steps of Roberts Hall, saw High Point College confer two hundred and forty-two bachelor degrees.

The speaker for the occasion was an Alumnus of High Point College, United States District Judge Robert H. Merhige, Jr., '42, of Richmond, Virginia. The Honorable Mr. Merhige expressed the belief that the Class of 1974 is mature enough to realize that even with "U.S. failings," as he called them, "America is still the greatest country in the world. I believe this country can fulfill our hopes and aspirations." He urged the graduates to aleviate injustice by means of affirmative action along with total commitment.

A new guidance program for the High Point College area, called "Evaluating Your Career Potential", has had great success according to those persons closely involved with the program.

Great success was made with helping high school students make successful choices concerning their futures, specifically in making inroads into career choices for which they may be suited.

Also success was observed in decisions concerned with the formal education which the students will need in order to be successful in chosen career areas, reports the program's director, Robert A. Wells, Jr.

"The person doing the counseling was very knowledgeable about many areas and was able to help the student see a relationship between his aptitude potential and interests and job areas."

The program consists of one's participation in a series of tests concerned with personality and interest traits. Sessions on how to take tests and on improving study habits are held, and individualized follow-up counseling and personal interpretations and suggestions concerning one's future career choice are offered also.

Many young people spend an endless amount of time and effort for education and training in fields that are not compatible with their interests or abilities say those involved in the program.

Those involved in the program hope that analysis of each participant's personality traits, skills and interests will help one make more realistic choices concerning vocational and education decisions.

The program is a first for this area in that it is now available to students who reside in this area of North Carolina.

#### CHEERLEADING CAMP AT HPC



Dates for the 1974 High Point College Cheerleading Camp has been announced as July 28 - August 1 on the HPC campus. 

# The Quality of Excellence

President Wendell M. Patton, Jr. discusses High Point College with Raymond A. Petrea, the new director of information services



Dr. Patton, for the newcomer as well as for the alumnus who has been away for a while, where is the starting point to become acquainted with High Point College?

The starting point is with the people. I'm talking about the students and the faculty. The vast majority of our faculty are warm, approachable people who are interested in the personal welfare of every single student. This is true out on the campus or in their offices as well as in the classrooms and I think the high degree of this interest is one of the unique things about High Point College.

# Lots of colleges say those things. Do we have evidence that it is actually true here?

Yes. The Visiting Committee of the Southern Association, the regional accrediting agency, in its report just a few months ago, said it had seen the unusual friendliness between the students and the faculty. They reported that the interest of the faculty in the individual student went beyond the classroom.

#### How do the students respond?


You should walk across the campus with any administrator or faculty member. The students will give you a friendly greeting, stop and talk, exchange jets, or have a generally cordialy manner. The point is, the faculty recognizes that the students are first of all people and the students give the faculty the same recognition. Our faculty members have a high degree of feeling responsible for the total life of the institution. For instance, faculty members were about to contact prospective students. This grew out of a Central Committee effort to assist in enrollment. Typing facilities were to be furnished to the faculty members so their letters would be a minimum burden on them. But as it turned out, many of them wrote their letters in longhand and the response from prospective students was so positive that I'm sure similar plans next year will include longhand letters.

#### How do you account for this kind of faculty involvement?

I think we are seeing the truth of how nothing succeeds like success. The students sense this positive approach and they respond positively to it. This student response stimulates the faculty. We are truly in a cycle of success.

# What is the underlying philosophy of High Point College?

High Point College is a Christian college dedicated to the pursuit of excellence in learning. We respect the liberal arts tradition and we emphasize its values. At the same time, we believe in preparation for careers and career development. The liberal arts education is by far the most practical kind of education. In a technical education, the material is outdated as soon as it appears in print. But when you study science, history, economics, literature, or art, then you are dealing with



topics of lasting value. Since we can't predict the changes ahead in the world, we have to prepare for everything.

#### How well is High Point College meeting this dedication to excellence?

Better than most similar institutions, I think, and still not as well as we should. Beyond that, what I want is for a visitor on this campus to sense and feel the spirit of Jesus Christ here and to know without being told that this is a Christian college.

# How do you characterize the college's relationship to the Methodist church?

First, I believe Methodists are doing more for higher education than any other church I know of. They know how to nurture a college without smothering it; they know how to preserve academic freedom in pursuit of truth. And they know how to support High Point College. The Western North Carolina Conference gives the College about \$217,000 annually and the North Carolina Conference, about \$10, - to \$15,000 annually.

# How much growth is still ahead for the college in the immediate future?

Actually, we don't plan to become any bigger. It's not that we are deliberately planning not to grow; it's just that our plans for the immediate future don't include a certain figure that our enrollment has to reach. Our goal is better instruction, not more buildings. We build for improvement, not for the sake of getting larger. However, our present buildings and faculty could take care of 200 more students without being crowded. In the immediate future, I believe we must look for innovative ways to demonstrate the practicality of the liberal arts education for young men and women in high school. Young people don't automatically decide to come to college anymore. We need to demonstrate why they should. To do this, we need new projects, new programs, and we must enter new ventures.

#### Has the Golden Decade Fund achieved its goals?

Yes. It has done what we said it should do, in that we have pledges and payments for the endowment, and plans for the library and the gymnasium. We are not building the men's dormitory originally planned because changing life styles - some students want to live off-campus - suggest it would be wise for us to wait a while before investing in a dorm.

#### What do you see ahead for the College?

That depends on what we do with our assets. We have a tradition of service to the community and to the region that we intend to uphold. We offer the kind of personalized education that respects the integrity of the individual. We will not compromise the quality of education we offer. We must help young people find their places in the world where they can make contributions. We must work harder to show our young people what can be done with this kind of education, and education of quality.

Look at our humanics program - one of four in the nation - or the contract program, or the World Campus Afloat. If we can continue the kind of progress that these and other programs suggest, then we can reach our goals. In fact, to survive, we must.



# The Golden Decade Fund—A Success Story

The Third Phase of the Golden Decade fund was the most successful campaign ever conducted by High Point College. The campaign ended on May 31 with \$3,006,115 in gifts and pledges, exceeding the minimum goal of \$2,150,000 by nearly a million dollars. The success of the Third Phase also assured the success of the original Golden Decade goal of \$10,000,000. The gift from Holt and Elsie McPherson of \$1,000,000 was the largest single commitment ever received by the College. The McPhersons and the College hope this contribution will be an incentive for other contributions, whether large or small.

402 individuals, businesses, and foundations all contributed to the overwhelming success of the Third Phase.

A year ago, High Point College's alumni and friends were faced with their largest challenge. Along with the faith that the challenge could be met, we had some questions and uncertainties. The final year of the Golden Decade was upon us and there was no margin for failure. These same tense feelings must have been experienced by members of the Long-Range Planning Committee in 1962 when they developed the ten-year projection of priority needs for the College. In 1964 dollars, the **minimum** needs came to \$10,000,000. We have fulfilled the challenge put before us then.

Funds received are to be allocated with the following priorities: \$1,000,000 to be added to the endowment for faculty support and increased scholarship funds; \$750,000 for library addition; and \$400,000 for an auxiliary gymnasium. As gifts are received, they will be forwarded to the designated purposes. We have suggested preliminary plans for the two building projects. Groundbreaking will more nearly coincide with the actual availability of the funds for use; some pledges have been made over a five year period.

Our deep appreciation goes to Dr. Charles F. Carroll, general campaign chairman, and members of the Steering Committee. The campaign was successful because of their leadership and the dedicated help of the division chairmen and the large number of workers who called on contributors.

Steering Committee members include Holt McPherson, Charles E. Hayworth, James H. Millis, J. Harriss Covington, Herman H. Smith, Robert T. Amos, Jr., Jack H. Campbell, Earl N. Phillips, Jr., Murphy M. Howard Covington, professional director for the campaign, did an outstanding job in the management and direction of campaign activities.

The Golden Decade Fund was successful. Now will High Point College stop the fund-raising activity? All who cherish and respect High Point College will answer with a grateful and emphatic "No."

The College must meet new challenges and new needs with new and changing programs. The College can stop its search for funds only when it is ready to stop its progress and service. Consequently, continuing contacts must be made. The pledges for the Golden Decade, many of them spread over five years, must receive regular attention from the College. Even with its success, the Fund was devised to meet the minimum needs for the College to attract good students. The competition in recruiting new students is never-ending.

In addition, inflation has created new demands on the operating budget as well as on the scholarship funds. In order to keep High Point College the superior institution we want it to be, we must continue to make financial contributions. At the same time, the College is exerting every effort to find new sources for gifts and grants. We welcome any suggestion or lead. We will be pleased to share financial information with anyone who would like to identify our needs more fully.

# HPC Expecting Enrollment Increase

High Point College is expecting to enroll 1,050 students in September for an increase of some thirty students over last year. All dormitory rooms will have double occupancy with no private rooms available. College officials have said they can accept a few more day students.

During this year, there has been a 21.3 per cent increase in applications over 1972-73. Two factors which

possibly can be attributed to the increase are the State of North Carolina program for students with a financial need to attend private colleges and universities in North Carolina, and the active involvement of faculty and Alumni in talking to prospective students and recommending the College to them.

There has been a 31.9 per cent increase in North Carolina applications over last year, and other states showing a definite increase in applications include Virginia and Florida. Several states have remained constant from last year's number of applications received in the Admissions Office.

Our admissions personnel have expressed their appreciation to our Alumni for assisting and recommending prospective students. Since last September, Alumni contributing to the annual fund have received prospective student recommendation cards. Their response in returning these inquiry cards to the Admissions has been most gratifying. This effort to find worthy, well qualified students is continuing this year. Other Alumni may receive a supply of the recommendation cards upon request to the Alumni Office.

High Point College had 1,020 students last academic year including 250 new and 89 transfer students. The predicted figures for this coming September includes 275 new students and 115 transfers. Returning students will bring the total to 1,050 for the four-year liberal arts United Methodist related school.

Students applying for admission in September are required to deposit \$100 as a guarantee that they will enroll as planned, following the acceptance of their application. Fifty more prospective students have paid the deposit this year than by the same date last year.

The College awarded forty scholarships to new students on the basis of their academic qualifications alone, the largest number in a single year. Other scholarships were given on the basis of personal need.

Fifteen additional awards were Presidential Scholarships, offered to students with high SAT scores and in the top two per cent of graduating high school seniors. The awards were offered to fifteen high school graduates and all have been accepted for study at the College this fall.

# HPC COMPLETES DOMINATING SEASON



For the second straight season, High Point College was a dominate force of championship power in District 26 of the National Association of Intercollegiate Athletics (NAIA). The Purple Panthers fielded teams in seven varsity sports for men and captured four NAIA District 26 championships. Four sports fielded women's teams with all four enjoying successful seasons.

The Panthers captured district titles in tennis (for the third straight year); cross country (for the fifth straight year); track, and baseball. In addition to these, they finished number three in the district in soccer and second in the conference as well as fifth in the district in golf. Basketball, while not finishing high in standings, did produce its first NAIA All-American since 1969 as senior center, Pete Collins, was named to the number three team.

The Panthers participated on the national level in track, tennis, and baseball. The baseball team captured the area playoffs for the second time in two years and advanced to the NAIA World Series in Saint Joseph, Missouri. They were ranked number five nationally in the final NAIA baseball. poll.

The tennis team captured its third straight finish among the nation's Top Fifteen small college teams with a number fourteen finish in the nationals in Kansas City, Missouri. In addition to the district title, the Panthers took their second straight Carolinas Conference crown and swept the annual Campbell College Invitational. They won eight of the nine individual conference titles and played five players on the All-District 26 squad.

Eight school marks were either tied or broken in track and javelin. Mike Bogdon finished number fifteen nationally this spring. The Panthers were 6-1 in dual meets, and their conference and district titles followed the outstanding cross country season that saw two High Point College performers named to the All-District 26 squad. The golf team had its first winning season in seven years with a squad composed mainly of freshmen. The squad finished number one in the league in addition to the fifth spot in the district.

In basketball, it was a story of close-but-not-close-enough. The Panthers posted a 10-19 record, but lost eight games by three points or less. They still had a victory over defending national champion, Guilford College, and the play of Pete Collins was outstanding. The 6' 8'' center set a new four year rebounding mark with a total of 1,661 recoveries and became the Panther's first All-American since Gene Littles was named to that honor in 1969. Collins was also drafted in the NBA draft by the Washington Bullits.

The soccer team closed strong with a basically freshmansophomore squad to finish second in the conference and third in the district with two players being named to the All-District team and two to the All-Conference squad.

Five Panthers were named to the All-District baseball squad and four to the All-Carolinas Conference team. The Panthers took the regular season league title with a 32-8 mark; their fourth straight thirty win season. Home run records, both team and individual, fell as Otis Foster and Danny Goins slammed sixteen each as the Panthers collected a national record of sixty round trippers.

For the year, the Panthers captured eight team titles in the seven varsity sports for men, had nineteen athletes to make All-Conference teams, and seventeen to make the All-District squads.

In addition to these honors, Bob Davidson was named Coach-of-the-Year in the district cross country and conference track, while Ray Alley was named tennis Coach-ofthe-Year in both district and conference and was one of five coaches nominated for National Coach-of-the-Year in NAIA.





Dick Gregory, comedian and civil rights lecturer,

HIGH POINT COLLEGE celebrated its fiftieth anniversary with a family reunion on September 11. The students filled most of Memorial Auditorium while the faculty sat on the front rows in their academic garb. Four of the original 1924 faculty members were there, plus the first graduate and other personalities from the early days.

Dr. William R. Locke, the family historian, reviewed the first fifty years with anecdotes, facts, and observations. He even admitted there is a "permanent generation gap between students and the Establishment" — and both the students and the Establishment loved it.

"While the faculty provide continuity, stability, and a link with the past, the students are the growing edge, the innovators, the ones who bring change," he said.

He recounted the 2-year struggle the students had in persuading "the Establishment" that dancing should be allowed on campus. "So if you find the Establishment is slow to allow change, be patient with them" he said to the students. "They are needed for stability and continuity."

He said the faculty does not claim to know all that has been thought or said in the world, but they can relate students to it and teach them how to become acquainted with it. The faculty, he said, is the link with the past.

"College is a meeting place of the past and the future. The faculty represents the past and the students represent the future. The buildings represent the place where they meet," he concluded.

Dr. Locke was introduced by Dr. Harold E. Conrad, professor of history and social sciences. He said no professor was "more beloved or had influenced the temper of the student body more" than Dr. Locke. The applause after Dr. Locke's speech seemed to support Dr. Conrad's assessment.

To open the convocation, Chaplain Charles Teague quoted scripture, made a brief comment, and then introduced Donnah Harrington, Thomasville, who sang "The Impossible Dream." She was accompanied by Toni Taylor, Archdale. It was, in fact, just a family reunion with everybody enjoying the occasion.



Hit songs from the play include "My Best Girl," "Open a Window," and "Busom Buddies."


#### Wins expected

#### New start possible

FORMER COLLEGE students who would like to return to their degree studies may enroll in a new program at High Point College called Operation Resume.

The program started this fall and is designed exclusively for adults over 26 years old. The returning students are meeting as a separate group and are taking only one course.

Next year, those continuing in the program will be expected to register for full course loads. They will be in class with the "regular" college students.

The first course is philosophy in literature, taught by Dr. Earl P. Crow, Jr., professor of religion and philosophy, and Mrs. Shirley Y. Rawley, assistant professor of English. The class meets on Tuesday evenings at 6:30 p.m. in Horace A. Haworth Hall of Science.

The spring term course will be a survey of United States history from 1945 to the present, taught by Dr. A. Paul Gratiot, professor of history, and Dr. David W. Cole, professor of history and dean of the college. Mrs. Nanci Motsinger is counselor for the group.

Students may also be given academic credit for life experiences. A legal secretary or someone in public relations may be able to receive credit for creative writing or journalism. A social worker who has no degree may receive credit for courses in sociology or even psychology. Experience in community theatre groups may qualify someone for credit in drama or theatre arts.



# Board honors Cooke, McPherson, Haworth, Carroll

FOUR LEADERS of High Point College were honored by the trustees at their fall meeting. After graduating in the first class from Duke University in 1926, Dr. Cooke earned his Ph.D. degree from Peabody College, Nashville. He remained on the faculty there for 17 years. He was president of East Carolina University and was on the faculty of UNC-Greensboro before coming to High Point in 1949. **New OFFICERS** were elected by the High Point College trustees at their fall meeting. They are: William F. Womble, chairman; Charles E. Hayworth, vice chairman; Roger Soles, treasurer; and Dr. Wendell M. Patton, secretary.

Womble is senior partner in the law firm of Womble, Carlyle, Sandridge and Rice, with offices in the Wachovia Bank Building, Winston-Salem.

He has been a trustee of the College since 1950. A leading Methodist layman, he has been chairman of the official board of Centenary Methodist Church in Winston-Salem. He has been active in civic and state affairs, serving several terms in the N. C. House of Representatives and on the state Advisory Budget Commission. A native of Winston-Salem and a graduate of Duke University, he earned his law degree at Duke and has done additional graduate work at the University of North Carolina at Chapel Hill.

Mr. Hayworth, trustee vice chairman, is president of Alma Desk Company, chairman of the board of Liberty Veneer Company, and chairman of the board of Clarendon Industries, Inc. He is director of the Southern Furniture Exposition Building Corporation.

He has served in numerous civic leadership capacities and has been on the board of stewards of Wesley Memorial United Methodist Church, High Point.

Soles, treasurer, is president of Jefferson Standard Life Insurance Company, Greensboro. He rose through the ranks at Jefferson to become assistant to the president in 1964. He was made executive vice president two years later and became president of the company in 1967.

He has been a college trustee since 1966. An outstanding Methodist layman, he is a former chairman of the West Market Street United Methodist Church board. He headed the successful campaign for the expansion of Wesley Long Hospital. He is president of the City Club in Greensboro.

Following the annual fall meeting, the trustees attended the dedication of the new Mary Irwin Belk Dormitory where Mr. Womble participated in the ceremonies.

Portraits of past presidents of the college and trustee chairmen were placed in the trustee dining room. These include portraits of Presidents R. M. Andrews, G. I. Humphreys, and Dennis H. Cooke; and trustee chairmen R. Fletcher Williams, H. A. Millis, and L. F. Ross. Several friends and relatives

- Dr. Dennis H. Cooke was made president emeritus,

- Holt McPherson was designated trustee chairman emeritus,

- Horace Haworth was designated trustee vice chairman emeritus, and

- Charles F. Carroll was thanked for his leadership of the Third Phase, Golden Decade Fund.

Dr. Cooke was president of the College from 1949 to 1959. During his presidency, new construction on the campus included Alumni Gym, Memorial Auditorium, Cooke Hall, Wesley and North Halls for Women, additions to the library, and the maintenance shop.

The College was accredited two years after Dr. Cooke became president, signifying that the college had taken its place among institutions offering quality higher education and that it had fulfilled minimal standards in the overall program.

Dr. Cooke retired from the presidency in order to return to the classroom as professor of education. He remained on the teaching faculty until this year.

He has been nationally recognized as an educator and school administrator. He is the author of 26 books on education and school administration, with specialization in mathematics and psychology. Both McPherson and Haworth stepped down as officers of the board after 20 years in office. Both will remain on the board.

McPherson is the retired editor of The High Point Enterprise and has a long record of professional and civic interests. The college's new campus Center, named in his honor, recognizes his service to the college.

Haworth, an attorney in High Point since 1921, has numerous other business and civic interests. He was chairman of the board of Federal Home Loan Bank of Greensboro for many years. He has also been a trustee of High Point Memorial Hospital and Guilford College.

Dr. Carroll, retired state superintendent of public instruction, was honored for his leadership of a successful capital campaign that provided \$3 million to the college. The Third Phase of the Golden Decade Fund will allow additions to the endowment and new facilities for the library and the physical education program. Dr. Carroll was given a certificate of appreciation from the trustees. of those honored attended the trustee luncheon.

# Contributors clubs and awards Inaugurated for annual fund

AN INCENTIVE AWARD Program for contributors to the Annual Fund has been approved by the Executive Committee of the Alumni Association.

A recognition program for Alumni participants in the Annual Fund was inaugurated in 1964 with The Centurion Club. The recognition, in effect for ten years, honors the contributor with a certificate and honorary pass to home basketball games and/or campus events, depending upon the amount of the contribution. The Centurion Club has well served its purpose of recognition.

In the new program each award will be personalized with the donor's name, and the program is retroactive until June 1, 1974. Contributors from June 1-December 31, 1974 will have a 1974 brass tab on their award commemorating the Golden Anniversary of the College. Contributors during the calendar year 1975 will have that date on their award. Each award will have four blank spaces to note years of additional contributions.

Categories and awards are:

THE CENTURION CLUB – For contributions of \$100-\$249, an individualized paper weight with deep-etched copper on marble;

THE TOWER CLUB – For contributions of \$250-\$499, an individualized paperweight with deep-etched white metal on marble;

THE LAMPLIGHTERS CLUB – For contributions of \$500-\$999, an individualized double coaster set with deep-etched copper on walnut column; and

THE FELLOWS CLUB – For contributions of \$1000 and above, an individualized walnut floating shadowbox with lettering and design deep-etched in copper.

All contributors in these categories will receive passes to High Point College home basketball games and campus events depending upon the contribution.

# Surprise bequest for Idol memorial fund

AN UNEXPECTED BEQUEST to High Point College from the estate of the late John D. Idol, Kernersville, will establish a memorial scholarship.

Mr. Idol died September 29, 1974. He had been retired for a year following a career of 41 years as a leading salesman for Adams-Millis Corporation.

The will states that 30% of the residual of the estate will be given to the College to fund the scholarship with first consideration to "qualified" students in religion and humanities.

As far as can be learned, only Mr. Idol, his attorney, and executors had knowledge of his plans to include the College in his will. He had no apparent connection with High Point College; he was not an alumnus and there is no record of a previous contribution. He was unmarried, and, so far as is known, no immediate relatives attended the College.

President Wendell M. Patton had unstinting praise for Mr. Idol's generosity. "Here was a man who had not walked our campus and was never directly associated with the life of the College. Yet, he was motivated to make this truly outstanding contribution to future generations of students. Even though he had neither sons nor daughters, he directed his money to the heart of the College – the students who need the money to come to class."

Dr. Patton said he hoped Mr. Idol's bequest would be "an example" to other benefactors. "We are deeply grateful for this kind of generosity. Gifts of this magnitude make it possible for some students to attend High Point College who might otherwise not attend any college anywhere."

Dr. Patton also urged other potential donors to discuss with the College their plans for bequests. "Mr. Idol's will was carefully planned and will be properly executed. The College, through its Development Office, can assist individuals and attorneys with estate planning considerations."

"There are numerous kinds of plans available for deferred giving which can continue to benefit the donor during his lifetime with the College as the beneficiary to provide a 'living legacy'. We can only hope that Mr. Idol's recognition of High Point College will be an inspiration to others."



# Student Career Intern Program combines work and study for complete education

CAN THE LIBERAL ARTS College graduate find happiness in a job-oriented world? High Point College is learning how to answer "Yes".

The way to bridge the gap between theory and practice is to give the student a job in his chosen field before he graduates.

Dr. William P. Matthews, professor of psychology, directs the Student Career Intern Program (SCIP) at the College. Students in behavioral science, psychology, sociology, and human relations may drop out of class for five months and become part of a social service operation on a full-time basis. If they decide this is not



the career they thought it would be, there is time to take up other studies before graduation.

The variety of jobs taken by students for the trial period have included rehabilitation for society's drop-outs, support for young people's groups, the elderly, the handicapped, and assistance to people in trouble. Institutional agencies where the student is employed include Girl Scouts, YWCA, Salvation Army, Model Cities, and other divisions of government assistance.

Dr. Matthews thinks colleges should assist their students from first registration to graduation in three fundamental areas. He calls it his "package deal" for a college student. "We should help them pick out, try out, and then hire out," he said.

"Some students arrive at college with a firm career choice in mind. But actually most of them don't know what is involved in their chosen fields, and that includes even the ones who say they do. We should have a way to let them know the full range of options available in college," he said.

"Then they should have a chance to try out what they have chosen so they can continue their preparation or back out while there is time to select some other field before graduation."

SUSAN GARNER (above) assists regularly in serving a lunch to 32 senior citizens in Stokes County. They are all retired or past 60 and are on supplemental security income.

While the program is ready-made for students in behavioral science, sociology, psychology, or human relations, other departments are considering adaptations of SCIP for their use.

Among students in SCIP are:

Susan Garner, a senior, living at home in Stokes County where she is working with the elderly in a Community Action Program funded by the Office of Equal Opportunity.

Rick Eldridge, High Point, is working with the Kiwanis Club at the state level in supporting Circle K clubs.

George Ferguson, Temple Terrace, Florida,

worked with the Boy's Home last summer at Lake Waccamaw.

Dr. Matthews is quick to point out the advantages of the program. "The students get work experience they can refer to on their first job application; they have opportunity to prepare for something else if they change their minds;

"They make connections in a professional field by meeting professionals on a daily basis; they have supervision by on-the-job people as well as by their familiar professors;


"Frequently they get job offers and are ready to take the job immediately after graduation."



# Soccer team wins Carolina Conference title in Undefeated season, look to Top Ten ranking A Two-YEAR BUILDING effort has cul- "We have come a long way in a

A Two-YEAR BUILDING effort has culminated in an undefeated soccer season, a Carolinas Conference championship, and the No. 1 seeding in the NAIA District 26 play offs for the Purple Panthers. Buried in a 20-match losing streak in 1972, the Panthers rebounded in two seasons to become a contender for a Top Ten ranking among small college soccer teams in the South.

The Panthers posted a 10-0-2 record in the regular season with basically a freshman-sophomore team. The perfect 6-0 league record gave the Panthers their first Carolinas Conference title. Balance has been the key to the Panther effort as 10 different players shared in scoring the 34 regular-season goals.

#### Record high budget

A RECORD HIGH Budget of nearly \$3 million has been adopted for the current academic year. More than a third of the total budget will go for direct instructional costs including faculty salaries and operation of the library.

\$698,500 will be spent on general operation while \$228,300 will be given back to worthy or needy students as scholarships, grants in aid, or workstudy aid.

Building and grounds maintenance, administrative operations, athletic program and the bookstore operations brings the final total to \$2,922,150. "We have come a long way in a short time," said Panther Coach Ray Alley '66. "This has been a great year for us, but we think of it as a beginning rather than the end of a rebuilding effort. We have a lot of talented freshmen and sophomores, and with another outstanding recruiting year we can look to an even better future," he said.

"Freshmen like Jeff Potter and Hunter Brett have given us the scoring punch we lacked last year, while Jerry Gostic and Skip King have done an outstanding defensive job for us. We've also had outstanding seasons from lettermen like Gary Downing, Mike Ludwigson, and Tom Mackintosh, while Peter Ranney, who never played soccer before this season, has been exceptional in the goal."

The Panthers downed Atlantic Christian and Pfeiffer twice during the season, while getting single wins over Belmont Abbey, Guilford, UNC-Wilmington, Pembroke State, N. C. Wesleyan, and Elon. The two ties were against NCAA opponents, Davidson and UNC-Greensboro.

The Panthers, who now play their home games in Albion-Millis Stadium, got a big boost towards Southern rankings with a 1-0 victory over six-time District 26 champion Belmont Abbey. That win put the Panthers in the No. 1 playoff position with a playoff showdown likely in the championship game against the Crusaders.
