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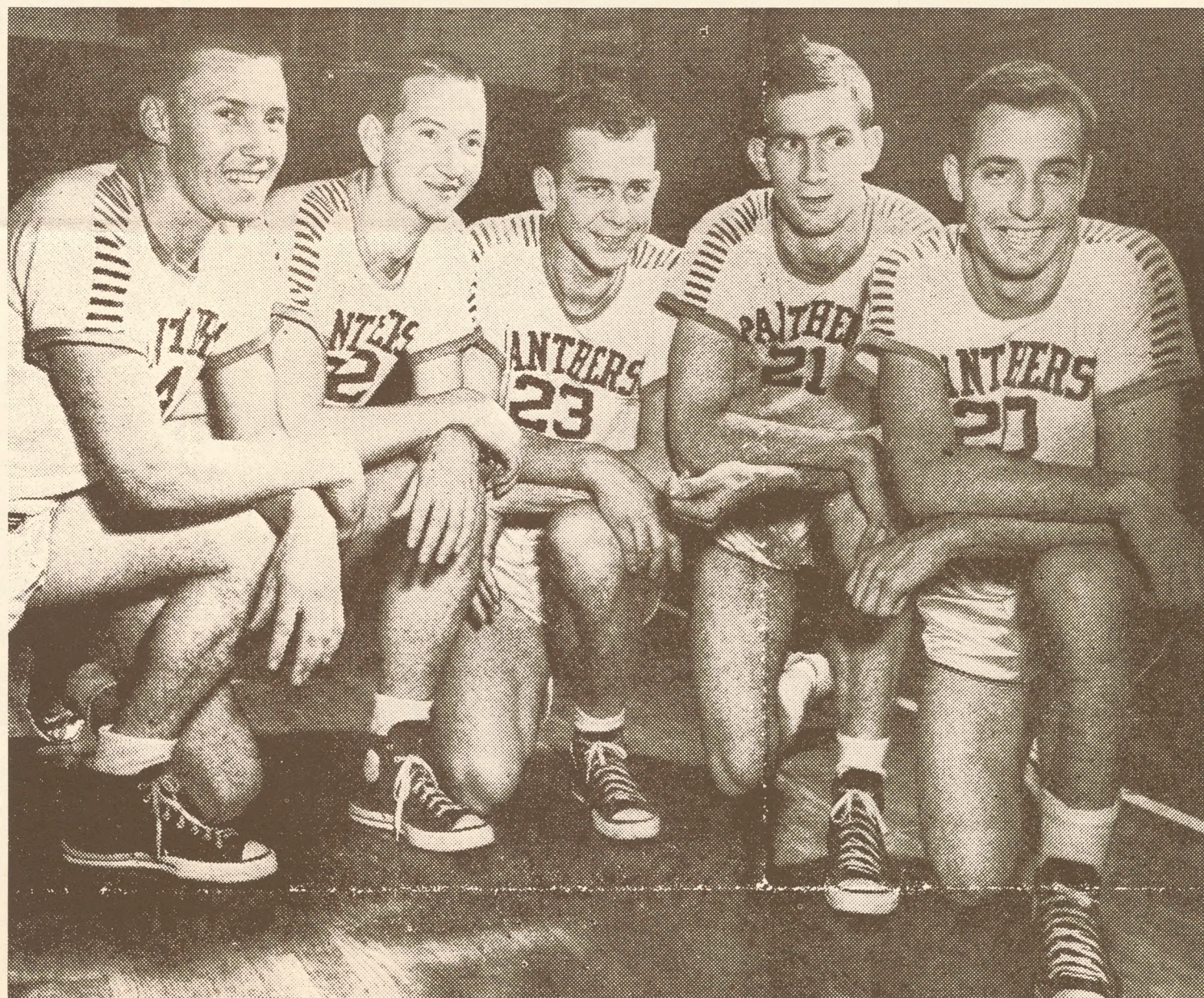

## Panthers Are North State Champs

The High Point College Panthers, who had lost six games in a row at mid-season, roared back to win seven in a row including the North State Conference championship game in which they whalloped Atlantic Christian 88-73.

The Panthers despite the presence of three freshmen in the starting line up, were as cool and poised as a bunch of pros. Their tremendous desire and hustle throughout the tournament carried them to a last-second victory over Elon on the opening night and a pair of wide-margin victories over Appalachian and Atlantic Christian.

It was the first NSC championship for the Panthers since 1953, when they advanced to the second round of the NAIA national tournament at Kansas City. The Panthers closed out the regular season with a 11-7 conference mark.

Coach Yow labeled the final contest as definitely a "team victory." The five starters—freshmen Phil Garrison, Roy Bartlett, Bill Fallin; junior Joe Guzinski; and senior Jackie Short—performed in great style during the entire tournament with reserves continually coming through in the same fashion.

The tournament's most valuable player, Phil Garrison, and his former high school teammate, Roy Bartlett, topped the scoring column with 27 and 26 points respectively in the final game. Forward Joe Guzinski added 13. Jackie Short, the captain and ball-stealing guard, once again proved to be the best floor leader in the conference as he quarterbacked his teammates almost flawlessly from the floor.

Prior to defeating the Bulldogs of AC, who had previously trounced top-seated Lenoir Rhyne, the Panthers upset another tournament favorite, Appalachian, 84-73. Once again it was Garrison and Short who led an inspired team effort for the Panthers as they out-shot, out-rebounded, and out-manuevered the Mountaineers in every turn.

The most thrilling game of the tournament was the first in which HPC downed Elon in the final seconds of the game 80-78. The Panthers were down by two points with less than half a minute to go when Larry Nolan suddenly stole the ball from an Elon guard and raced down court for the tying lay-up with 12 seconds left. Then with six seconds left, a bad inbounds pass by Elon was grabbed by HPC's Garrison, who missed his shot, and Short got the rebound and put the ball back in for the winning points just as the buzzer sounded.

No one player can be singled out as the deciding factor of the success of the Panthers. Garrison was the tournament's most valuable player as he scored 83 points and grabbed 40 rebounds in the three games, Short—all-conference guard—who displayed superb leadership, was also tapped for all-tournament honors, as was freshman Roy Bartlett, who displayed calm and poised playmaking plus an additional 52 points. But it took more than all this to win. It took the rebounding of Joe Guzinski, who was chosen as a member of the all-tournament second team, and of Larry Nolan; it took the key shots by Bill Falin and Tommy Skidmore; it took the dead-eye shooting of Wolfy Unger when it was needed most; it took the smooth ball-handling and playmaking of Chalmous Sechrist, Zane Daniels, and Gene Buchanan when the regulars needed rest.

Yes, truer words were never spoken when Coach Virgil Yow said, "It was a team victory all the way. The boys played to win and they played it unselfishly."

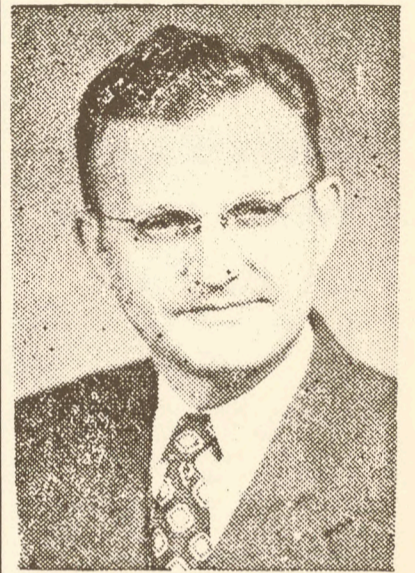
### Welcome Doctor Cooke

Dr. Dennis H. Cooke, new president-elect of High Point College, has already set the pace for the highly animated spirit which surrounds the gala homecoming festival here this year. The whole student body and faculty has graciously extended to him a cordial welcome by captivating this vigorous spirit which has permeated the entire institution.

Dr. Cooke, who has been chief administrator for the past four months, was previously head of the Department of Education and Director of the summer school session at Woman's College of the University of North Carolina. In addition, he served for thirteen months as President of Eastern Carolina Teachers College at Greenville, N. C.

Dr. Cooke received his formal education at Duke University and Peabody College, receiving the B. S. and M. A. degrees at Duke and the Ph. D. degree at Peabody. Upon discarding the students' cap and gown, he accepted a position in the Department of Education at Peabody College, Nashville, Tenn., where he taught for ten years.

# Patton Assumes Duties As Fourth President

Dr. Wendell M. Patton took over the duties of president of High Point College on September 1. Dr. Patton is the fourth president and succeeds Dr. Dennis H. Cooke, who asked to be relieved of the presidential responsibilities which he carried for ten years.

A native of Spartanburg, S. C., Dr. Patton attended Wofford College. Following World War II, in which he served as a ground and flight training officer and attained the rank of captain; he transferred to the University of Georgia where he took his B.S. and M.S. degrees. He won his doctorate from Purdue University in the field of psychology. His Master's thesis was written on "The Duties and Functions of College Administrative Officials."

Dr. Patton brings with him extensive experience in college administration and teaching. At the University of Georgia, he served as assistant registrar and admissions officer; he served Lander College, Greenwood, S. C., as business manager and head of the department of Education and Psychology; while doing graduate work at Purdue, he also taught.

## Patton Fourth In Line Of HPC Presidents

High Point College was founded in 1924. The Rev. R. M. Andrews, D.D., serving as the first president of this institution. Dr. Andrews had served as field agent in the original campaign for funds to begin the college, and was a former president of the North Carolina Methodist Annual Conference. Dr. Andrews resigned from the presidency in 1930.

The Board of Trustees selected the Rev. Gideon I. Humphreys, A.M., D.D., LL.D., to fill the vacancy. Dr. Humphreys was the former president of the Maryland Annual Conference of the Methodist Church. He was close to the field of education because of his association with the General Board of Christian Education.

From 1924 to 1930, Dr. Humphreys served as president of this board, resigning in 1930 to assume the presidency of High Point College. Dr. Humphreys retired from this position in June of 1949, after serving for 19 years.

Dr. Dennis H. Cooke was inaugurated as the third president of the college in 1950. He holds the A.B.

and M.Ed. degrees from Duke University and the Ph.D. degree from George Peabody College.

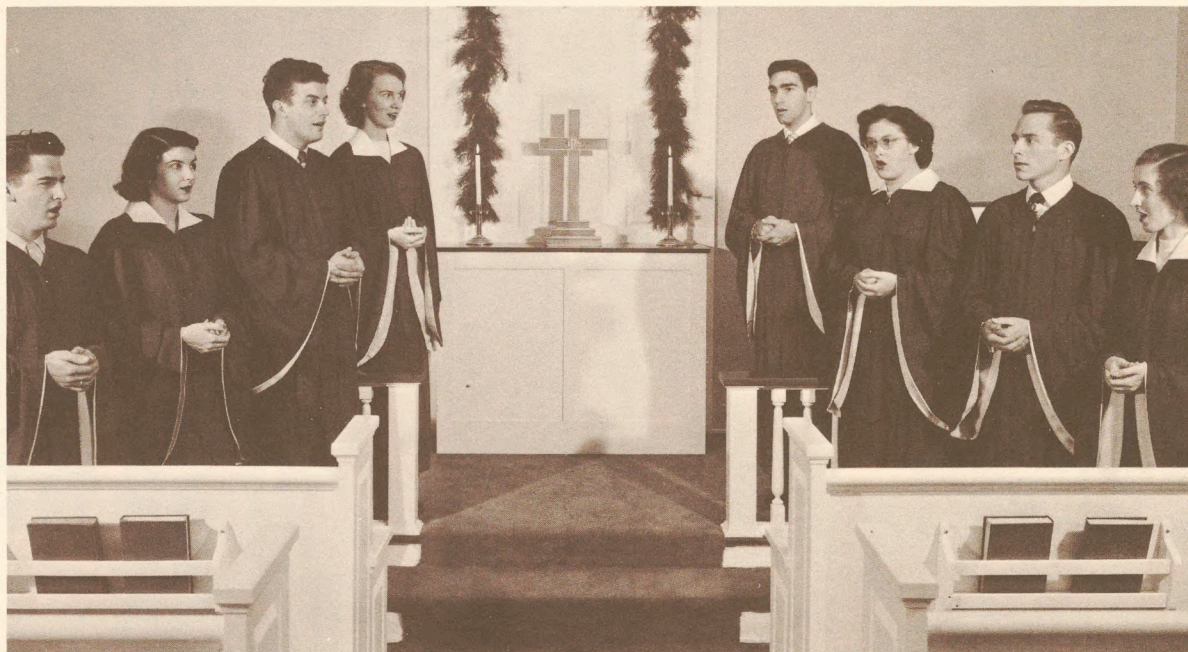
He was for a number of years Professor of School Administration at George Peabody College for Teachers, and then President of East Carolina College. For the two years before coming to High Point, Dr. Cooke was Head of the Department of Education and Director of the Summer School in the Woman's College of the University of North Carolina.

Dr. Cooke resigned after ten years of loyal service to the college. He is now serving as head of the college's department of teacher education.

To be inaugurated as the fourth in this line of presidents, Dr. Patton received his education at the University of Georgia and at Purdue University. He has served as assistant registrar and admissions officer, as business manager and head of the education and psychology department, and as an instructor in various educational institutions.

Dr. Patton also served as a psychologist and was assistant to the president in the world of industry. It was this latter position, at Shuford Mills in Hickory, N. C., which Dr. Patton gave up in order to accept the presidency of High Point College.

## Women's Dorm Rules Changed

The Woman's Dormitory Council has had several rules approved for the women residents of High Point College.

The major change is that all upper-class girls are allowed to date every night.

Freshmen girls may date on Saturday (12:00) and Sunday (11:15) nights during the first semester. Provided their averages don't fall, they will be permitted to date on Friday nights (11:15), commencing with the second semester. This rule may be subject to revision, however.

Another of the more prominent innovations is the rule that all lights must be out at 12:00 p.m. with the exception of Saturday night, when the blackout time is 12:30, exam time, and those times when a girl has obtained special permission from the Dormitory Counselor. According to the old system, only freshmen girls were required to have lights out at 12:00. Upperclass lights were under no restrictions.

A few changes have also been made in the times the girls are allowed to go to the bookstore. Seniors may go at 9:30, and all other girls may go between 9:45 and 10:30. All must return to the dorm by 10:30.

## New Man To Take Office

SUCCEEDS DR. ANDREWS

Rev. Gideon Ireland Humphreys, A. M., D. D. has indicated that he will accept the presidency of High Point college, a position that he was elected to by the college board of trustees on last Tuesday afternoon. Rev. Humphreys is expected to arrive in High Point early in June and take over the duties that Dr. R. M. Andrews has resigned. Rev. Humphreys is 46 years old and is fully capable of handling the responsibilities of his recently acquired position. He will be the second president of High Point college. Dr. Andrews has been presiding since the college began in 1924. Rev. Humphreys is at present pastor of the First Methodist church of Salisbury, Md., which is the largest church in its respective conference.

Dr. Humphreys, who is to begin his work as president June 1, graduated at Western Maryland college in 1902 when he was about 19 years of age. He was the valedictorian of his class, a summa cum laude graduate, the highest scholastic honor which Western Maryland college confers upon any student. Immediately after leaving college he entered Westminster Theological seminary, graduating there in 1904 with the degree of bachelor of sacred theology. Upon completion of the seminary course he took postgraduate work at Western Maryland college, receiving his master's degree. Later the institution conferred upon him the degree of doctor of divinity.

# Yow Enters Basketball Hall-of-Fame

High Point College swelled with pride when Coach Virgil Yow was inducted into the National Association of Intercollegiate Athletics' basketball Hall of Fame March 13, 1959. The ceremony was held in the Grand Ball Room of the Mhulbach Hotel, Kansas City, Missouri. Yow holds many happy memories of 27 years of coaching.

During brief ceremonies held in Kansas City, Coach Yow, along with eight other prominent men of basketball, was awarded a plaque commemorating him as a member of the NAIA basketball Hall of Fame, a position coveted by all coaches. Yow became the second coach from North Carolina and the eleventh from all over the nation to receive this honor. Attending the ceremonies were approximately 250 coaches and officials from all over the U. S.

When asked if he had anything to say regarding this honor Yow stated, "What can I say? It is one of the nicest things that has ever happened to me."

Coach Yow, a native of Gibsonville, N. C., and a 1930 graduate from High Point College, has devoted a total of 27 years of coaching athletics. He began this extensive career

at HPC in 1932 after completing a year of graduate work at the University of North Carolina.

For 12 consecutive years Yow remained at HPC during which time he served as athletic director and coached baseball, basketball, and football, finally concentrating on basketball, admittedly his first love.

During eight years, 1945-1953, Yow served as coach for Hanes Hosiery, a girls' basketball team in Winston-Salem. In the course of these eight years Yow's team was declared world champions for three consecutive years.

In 1953, Yow returned to HPC and has remained. While serving as coach of the HPC basketball squad, Yow's teams have won three North State Conference championships and have twice been to NAIA tournaments.

Amid a host of pleasant recollections from his coaching years, Coach Yow singled out one event which thrilled him most—being selected to coach the women's All-American team on its tour of South America.

Asked if he would repeat these years if he had the opportunity, Yow replied, "If thinking of money, no, I wouldn't coach. But if I wanted a happy, enjoyable life in which I could work with boys, I wouldn't change a thing. This is one business

in which you make plenty of lasting friendships."

Other charter members were Mae Frazier, Jewel Hughes, Emma Lewis Whitaker, Callie Isley, Cleo Harrell, Margaret Perry, Eugenia Williams, O. C. Loy, Pomona Johnson, Mabel Balch, Ethel Blackwelder.

With the graduating of the class of 1928, 48 new members were added to the Association at an alumni banquet in the spring. J. Elwood Carroll, now a prominent Methodist Protestant minister, was the second president of

The High Point College Alumni Association was organized at a meeting of the senior class last Friday afternoon. H. E. Coble, the class president, appointed a committee which had been working on a constitution and by-laws for some time. The same was unanimously adopted after some minor revisions.

The constitution provides that all former students of High Point College are eligible for membership in the association, but none save graduates are eligible to hold office.

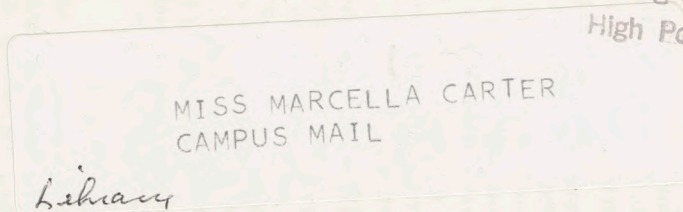

## *Perfect season for women's basketball team*

**WOMENS BASKETBALL** team began with a 82-64 win over Campbell College and when the season ended, they were unbeaten. Under the coaching of Jennifer Alley, they won the Carolinas Conference championship, the N.C. Division II title, the No. 1 ranking in the state, and added a third-place finish in Region II. Wanda Wilson, Dawn Allred, Gracie Simmons, and Ethel White led the way to 23 consecutive victories to tie the college record set in 1949-50 by the men's basketball team.

Wanda topped the scoring all year

and became an All-American candidate. Gracie set a school mark for women with 36 points against Francis Marion. Dawn made 238 assists, a school record for men or women.

The team averaged over 90 points a game. Important wins over Wake Forest (102-55) and Pfeiffer (83-66) helped establish High Point as the best team in the state. Robyn Cooper, Denise Washington, Germaine McAuley, Dee Ann Clapp, and Jody Westmoreland all contributed to the string of Panther victories. Lynn Massi, Debbie Madden,

and Wendee Saintsing rounded out the squad which compiled the perfect 17-0 season.

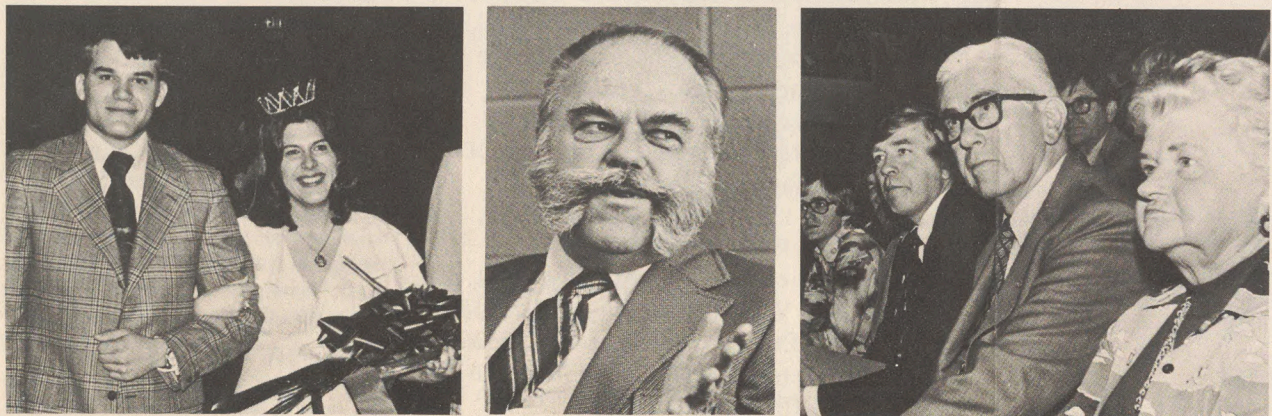
Numerous honors of all-state, all-tournament, or most valuable player came to Cooper, Allred, Wilson, White, and Simmons.

The team breezed through the N.C. Division II tournament and they began the regional tournament with a win over North Kentucky, 83-76 but dropped the game against Francis Marion, 81-80. They dispatched Clemson U. in a consolation match, 105-78.

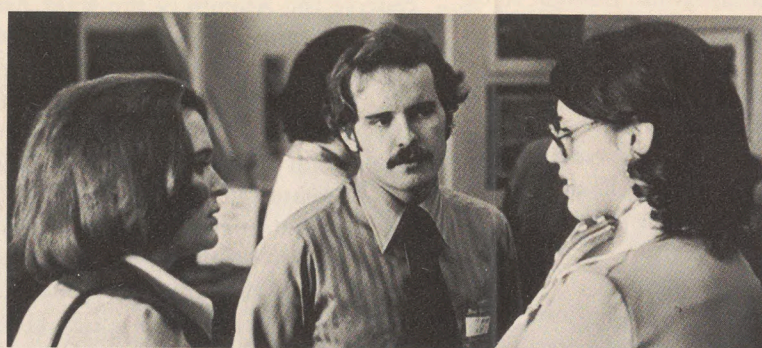

## Trustees create visitors board, new plans

HIGH POINT COLLEGE will soon have a Board of Visitors to advise trustees on finance, educational policies, improvements to curriculum, plans for the future, or any other facet of college life.

At their meeting in March, the trustees also set plans in motion to provide a new 10-year program to continue the development and growth of the institution.

Members of the new Board must live within 50 miles of High Point and exhibit a particular interest in the affairs of the college. President Patton said the creation of the new advisory board filled a "long-felt need to involve more community leaders and professional people in the life of the college." There will be no limitation on the size of the new board; by-laws are being formulated for its operation.

First step in the new development plan is the

appointment of a committee from faculty, staff, alumni, and students to set long-range goals. The plan will involve decisions on buildings, equipment, personnel, cost of the development, and resources available to meet the needs.

The committee is expected to take a year to make their first report; officers of the trustees expect the new program to be ready at the beginning of the school year in 1977.

The College recently completed a 10-year plan marked by the successful completion of three capital campaigns. The College realized increased endowment, new facilities, and major building projects including the Holt McPherson Campus Center, Belk Dormitory, Haworth Hall of Science, and Hayworth Memorial Chapel.

ALUMNI AND FRIENDS of the College are demonstrating record-breaking support for the Annual Fund. By March 31, 1,003 alumni contributed a total of \$63,027. The amount is nearly \$15,000 more than the contributions by the same date last year.

All alumni are being called on to support the \$76,000 goal, a "bicentennial" figure selected to reflect the national celebration and to suggest the level of support needed by the operation of the College. Major share of the total will support the Alumni Chair of Higher Learning. Unrestricted as well as earmarked gifts thus far have put \$21,675 into the fund for endowing a faculty salary.

Scholarships have received the second largest portion, with over eleven thousand dollars going to support financial aid to needy or deserving students.

Chairman for Advanced Giving is Clarence C. Keever '46, president of Patrician Furniture, High Point. A list of contributors to the top categories of gifts appears on the second page of this issue of Highpoints. National chairmen for the Fund are the Herman Coble's '27, '28, both long associated with the operation of the College.

Class agents and class chairmen are continuing to work for the completion of the goal by May 31. Personal mail, visits, and telephone calls are all being utilized to contact as many as possible of the College's 8,500 alumni.

Last year's Fund included contributions from 1,511 alumni and the average gift was \$33.54. Total amount received was \$50,683.68 and 18.4% of the alumni participated in the Fund. Alumni in the decade of the 1940's gave the most, for a total of \$11,868.29 from the ten classes. The 1950's group was close behind with total contributions of \$11,039.03.

The final report of gifts will be published in the October issue of Highpoints and each contributor's name will be on the Honor Roll.

## Awards to top Alumni donors

HIGH POINT COLLEGE's top supporters are being recognized for their generosity to the Alumni Fund with an awards program in four categories.

Alumni contributors who have already earned the awards for the current Alumni Fund are listed on the next page.

The Fellows Club recognizes contributions of \$1,000 or more. Each donor receives a walnut shadow box featuring a copper plaque with raised lettering.

The Lamplighter's Club distinction is given to contributors of \$500 to \$999. The memento is a coaster set contained in a large wood block with the name of the donor on a copper plate on the front of the block.

Marble paperweights recognize members of the Tower Club and the Centurion Club. Contributors of \$250-\$499 become members of the Tower Club; the award is a marble block with a white metal shield carrying an engraving of the Robert's Hall Tower.

The Centurion Club award, for contributors of \$100-\$249, has a copper plate bearing the seal of the College.

Each award is etched with the name of the donor and has four blank spaces to attach the year designation for future gifts to the Fund.

INAUGURATED last year, the awards program features attractive shadowbox, paper weights, and coaster set.

## How-to-survive course successful

"I MISS THE security of a town where I know my way around, and just want to relax quietly in my room when I get back," Kevin Wilson said, speaking of his temporary home in Roanoke, Virginia.

Wilson, sophomore from High Point, was one of seven college students who participated in an "urban survival" course during the January interim.

The seven students drew their prospective homes for the three weeks out of a hat the morning they bid farewell.

Each participant was given a maximum cash reserve of \$35, three addressed postal cards, and round-trip bus fare or a ticket. Relatives, friends, or acquaintances could not be contacted or used. Personal vehicles were not permitted.

Each student was to send a postal card to Dr. William Matthews, course coordinator, immediately after arrival. Telephone numbers were provided for the students in case of emergencies. Each student traveled at least 100 miles away from High Point as preplanned by Dr. Matthews.

There was concern and discussion about possible trouble since participants were planning to hitch-hike. But there were no problems; people who helped them were extremely friendly. Each student had to find a place to sleep and a job to pay expenses for the three weeks away.

Roy Hardee, senior, High Point, said while he had not been hungry he learned to like foods he wasn't too fond of before going to Lynchburg. He ate lunch at a small cafe and cooked his own dinner — usually soup on a hot plate in his room.

Hardee and Wilson spent their first weekend in Bluefield, arriving on top of a truckload of wood in an 18-degree snowstorm. Hardee, who has fairly long hair, a mustache, and goatee, had considered getting a haircut and shave but kept putting it off. "I figured if I was going to participate in the experiment, I

might as well see if I could make it the way I was without changing my appearance."

The survival program, thought to be simple by some of the students, proved otherwise.

Hardee had already worn a blister the size of a half dollar on his foot trying to find a place to stay. Other college students were returning to Lynchburg and most of the part-time jobs were taken.

Finally through the state employment office he found a job for a halfday helping load furniture on a truck; he netted \$10. Later, while walking along the street, he saw an elderly man putting boxes into a car, assisted him, and earned 30 cents.

"Ordinarily I would have turned it down but I figured the name of the game was 'urban survival' so I took it. That 30 cents meant more to me than any other money I earned while gone," said Hardee. Four students each came back with \$120.

Matthews said the course would be offered next year if the demand develops. However, the ground rules will be changed. Students will have to sign up further in advance and less money will be given at departure time. "Lot of the girls asked if they could participate next year," Matthews said.

Each student was required to keep a daily reaction log, and a brief outline of each day. "I never had a lot of patience but I've learned that you just have to wait for things to happen," Hardee said.

Other students with hometowns shown in parenthesis and their destinations included David Olson (Wilmington, Delaware) Richmond, Virginia; John Wescott, (Manteo, North Carolina) Columbia, South Carolina; David James Gangler, (Bethesda, Maryland) Charleston, South Carolina; Robert Goode, (Chevy Chase, Maryland) Greenville, South Carolina; and Daniel Lawrence Schurz, (Easton, Pennsylvania) Portsmouth, Virginia.

## Board to fix campus

LED BY THE TRUSTEES, the College has plans for making improvements in the landscaping and beautification of the campus. At a recent meeting, the trustees adopted a Board Beautification Program involving a personal contribution of \$200 from each board member. Trustees are asking each other to support the BBP rather than to commit college funds to the needed campus improvements. President Patton has secured the services of a landscape consultant.

Students are being asked to assist in pointing out particular places that need improvement by planting shrubs, flowers, or trees. First areas to receive attention are the Montlieu avenue lawns and buildings including the areas around the library, Haworth Hall of Science, and Hayworth Chapel. A later phase of the beautification includes improvements around Cooke Hall and adjacent lawns.

President Patton reported several trustees have already sent in their checks and others have given their pledge to support the project.

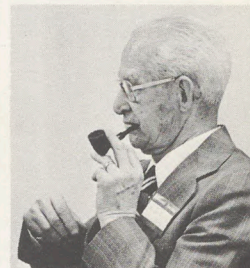

**HIGH POINT COLLEGE** awarded 291 degrees on Sunday, May 16, in Commencement exercises in Alumni Gym. Dr. Wendell M. Patton, president, conferred the undergraduate degrees including 110 bachelor of arts, 80 bachelor of science, and 1 bachelor of arts in teaching. Nineteen seniors received their diplomas with honors.

The College also awarded honorary degrees to two outstanding churchmen and a business leader. The honorary doctoral degrees were given to the Rev. Richard J. Crowder, minister of First United Methodist Church; the Rev. Orion W. Hutchinson Jr., minister of Central United Methodist Church, Asheville; and to Edgar H. Snider, High Point businessman.

The baccalaureate service was held at 11 a.m. at Wesley Memorial United Methodist Church. Retired Navy chaplain Captain Dean K. Veltman was the preacher. Well known in the Navy for his counselling with troubled married couples, Veltman urged a new "world-view" on the seniors.

A committee of college trustees selected the honorary degree recipients. Crowder has given leadership to both

church and community affairs, including the presidency of the High Point Ministers Alliance. He served congregations in Boone and Charlotte before returning to his hometown of High Point in 1971. He has assisted in the direction of the United Community Service, the Kiwanis Club, the Drug Action Council, and the Salvation Army Boys Club.

Hutchinson is known as an international traveler, author, editor, and church leader. In addition to other positions, he is on the General Board of Church and Society, the commission on Christian Higher Education, and will attend the 1976 General Conference and the World Methodist Conference as a delegate.

Snider is the founder of Snider Printing Company, the National Electronic Card Company, and is an officer of Ticketag Corporation and Grace Flower Shop. He has provided leadership to Wesley Memorial United Methodist Church and to numerous civic and community organizations. He has been recognized professionally by the printing industry.

## Contributions from Alumni set new Fund record

**HIGH POINT COLLEGE'S** Annual Alumni Fund has topped its goal of \$76,000 for 1975-76.

Alumni gifts to the College amounted to an all-time record of \$111,145.15. The previous record was \$105,610 in 1972. The receipts will support the Alumni Chair of Higher Learning (\$31,762.03); The Golden Decade Program (\$50,155.12); Scholarships (\$21,620.38); and other designated gifts (\$7,607.38).

The Annual Alumni Fund has yielded \$737,053.65 since its beginning in 1961.

Chairmen of the Annual Fund have been Mr. and Mrs. Herman E. Coble '27 and '28, High Point, retired educators. Chairman for Advanced Giving has been Clarence C. Keever '46, High Point, president of Patrician Furniture.

Class agents, class chairmen, and dozens of volunteer workers have kept in contact with the College's 8,500 alumni throughout the year by direct mail, telephone calls, and personal visits on behalf of the Fund.

Leadership gifts are recognized by membership in the Fellows Club (\$1,000 or more); the Lamplighter's Club (\$500 to \$999); the Tower Club (\$250 to \$499); and the Centurion Club (\$100 to \$249).

The record amount more than doubled last year's total alumni receipts of just over \$50,000.

Alumni Director Robert E. Williams called the success of the fund "overwhelming." He praised the effort by the large corps of alumni volunteers.

"More than 8,500 alumni prove their value and worth every day in their

responsible positions of leadership. Beyond that, they have given generously to underwrite, in part, the program of the College. When their support is added to the support of countless other friends, patrons, trustees, foundations, and businesses, the significance of their contribution is more apparent. This unselfishness is an important contribution to the cause of Christian higher education. High Point College is grateful to every supporter," he said.

Next year's Fund will begin in January but a definite goal has not been set by the executive committee of the Alumni Association.

Volunteer workers are being sought to assist in the work of next year's fund. An enlistment form is on page 3 of this issue of HIGHPOINTS.

## Epperson urges creativity

**DR. E. ROY EPPERSON**, professor of chemistry and assistant dean of the College, called on the graduating seniors at commencement on May 16 to maintain their creativity.

"Our livelihood may depend upon advances in technology but our life may depend upon what our creative people, under capable leadership, do about inflation, unemployment, pollution, crime in the streets, and overt violence," he said.

Dr. Epperson said that creative people are very badly needed in the professional and academic world but they may have a problem in overcoming obstacles to creativity.

"The environment of today's professional activities is not designed to foster creativity," he said. He cited several reactions which block creativity: "It is not polite to be inquisitive. It is better to conform. Engaging in fantasy is a waste of time. There is only one correct answer to the problem."

He challenged the seniors to create solutions to the mass transit problem and the environmental pollution problem. He warned them at the same time that their creativity would be disruptive.

Dr. Epperson listed the characteristics of creative people as enthusiasm, optimism, a sense of humor, a questioning attitude, inquisitiveness, positive thinking, imagination, fantasy, imagery and vision, intuition, ingenuity, observation and knowledge, honesty and sincerity, courage and fearlessness, drive, stick-to-itiveness, and individuality.

"In your individual life you possess the basis for creativity, and that basis is imagination. Albert Einstein said that imagination is more important than knowledge. You will find that employing creativity brings about change in your life and in your environment," he said.

"Develop optimism; develop a willingness to take a chance; strengthen your natural spirit of inquisitiveness and a readiness to ask questions. Develop the courage to suggest new ideas to someone you trust for their evaluation and comment," he said.

John Veltman, president of the senior class, recalled some of the more outstanding events of their four years together as a class. It was a family day for the Veltmans; John is the son of Captain Dean K. Veltman (USN, retired), Chaplain, who was the preacher at the baccalaureate service earlier in the day.

Charles E. Hayworth, vice-chairman of the trustees, greeted the assembly and, in turn, called for complimentary applause for the graduates, their parents, the faculty, and the staff.

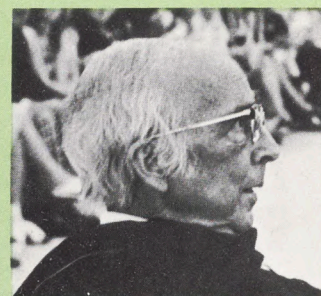

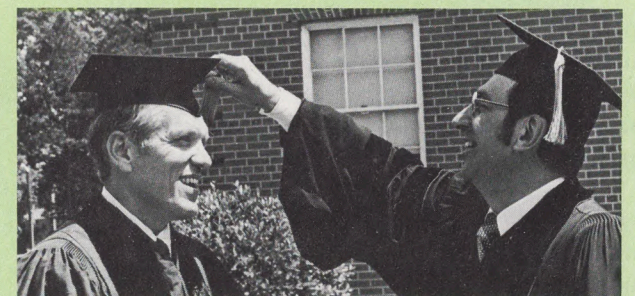

They are not any better students than those attending a few years ago, but they are inclined to accept themselves as they are, and to accept their faults."

He said he likes to talk to people and observe how they act. "People are so complex and such a bundle of paradoxes that you never can tell how they are going to react," he said.

She is an active member of First Methodist Church and has served with the Sunday School, the Wesleyan Guild, and on numerous congregational committees.

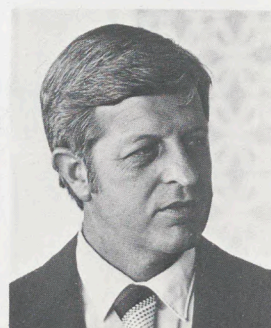

## Kruyer tells business story of college & city

**HIGH POINT COLLEGE** students spend an estimated \$374,000 each year in the area as a result of the College being located here. Cletus H. Kruyer, vice president — college affairs, spoke to the High Point Chamber of Commerce recently on the impact of the college on the area's economy.

He said the total figure was based on the average annual spending for college students in the community of the college which was established as \$340 per student in a national survey.

Faculty and staff expenditures were based on the total salary figure of just under \$1,500,000. Two largest items for faculty and staff expenditures were food, \$124,800, and housing, \$221,844.

In addition to the money that goes into the local economy from student funds and faculty and staff salaries, the College itself has several outstanding expenditures.

The College pays \$178,000 annually for its utilities. The annual phone bill is \$20,345. On properties that are not tax-exempt, the College pays nearly \$30,000 annual taxes. The College paid nearly \$7,000 in N.C. sales tax last year.

The College also paid \$21,500 to local financial institutions for interest; and it boosted local deposit balances in their institutions in both time and checking balances by an average of some one-and-three-quarters millions of dollars.

Kruyer reminded the Chamber of Commerce group the College was located in High Point because the City gave the Methodist Protestant church 50 acres of land and \$100,000 to help start the College. Today the College has grown to 75 acres of land with a net worth of \$14,691,000 after liabilities of \$2,740,000. The number of buildings has grown from the original 3 — still in use — to 23 plus the stadium and the baseball diamond.

In 1974 the College had a total budget of \$2,918,380, and, in 1975, \$3,328,266. Approximately 75% of the students come from outside the High Point area and this means that a high percentage of the budget income is new money in the community.

Kruyer said that the independent and United Methodist Church-related college is a prime example of the result of free enterprise. "Without free enterprise, none of our institutions, like High Point College, could have grown with the times," he said.

"We do not ask for tax funds; instead we are the offspring of the interest of private individuals who have been willing to share their income and their assets, most from free enterprise, with these institutions. High Point College has been truly a growth industry and our success is not ours alone but that of the people of High Point who have been so generous with their interest and support from the very beginning.

"We are here to serve the community in every way possible and we want to be ever more effective with each succeeding year," Kruyer said.

# Cup awarded for season

A WINNING SEASON for the total athletic program merited the College the first annual presentation of the Joby Hawn Cup, symbol of superiority in the Carolinas Conference. The Cup recognizes the retiring commissioner of the Conference and is given to the college with the best overall athletic program as computed on a point system.

Coach Hartman's baseball team finished first in the regular season but were third in the conference tournament. The team has a 34-13 record for the season. Dan England led the nation much of the year in strikeouts while pitching a 9-4 record. Junior Billy Sorrell led the conference in wins with 11. Hartman won his 400th game at High Point on April 10.

The men's tennis team won the District 26 title for the fifth straight season. Coach Jim Goff led the team to a 13-10 mark and a second place finish in the conference tournament. Kim Dillard won the MVP award and was singles champion of the District. He and Tom Fitzmaurice won the district doubles title.

The women's tennis team finished fourth in the conference tournament for women and had a record of 4-10 for the season.

The track team finished second in the conference and district. Ron Dement, freshman, was selected as the Panther MVP as he set a new

conference record in the 3-mile run.

The golf team, led by MVP Jim Ivey, finished second in the conference tournament and third in the District 26 tournament. The golfers had a fine 16-2 season which set a record for the most wins by a High Point College team.

Coach Jerry Steele is looking forward to an interesting season after announcing the signing of four basketball players. The new recruits include two guards, Danny Anderson and Scott Richardson, and two big men, 6-8 Bob Hovey and 6-7 John O'Brien.

Anderson directed his team from Hunter Huss High School, Gastonia, to the state playoffs as a junior and to a conference title as a senior. He averaged 12.5 points per game and gave 91 assists last year.

Richardson is the first player from three-year-old Lake Braddock High School, Burke, Virginia, to receive an athletic scholarship. He averaged over 19 points his last two years and was named to the Washington Post All-District and All-Region Teams.

Hovey played center on Asheboro's WNCHSAA state championship team, averaging 16.6 points per game and shooting 56% from the floor.

O'Brien led Sachem High School, Lake Ronkonkoma, New York, to a 19-2 record, playing center or forward as he averaged 12.9 points per game.

NANCY M. SHELTON, assistant professor of education, won the Foy Distinguished Teaching Service Award at Commencement on May 16.

The annual award is given by Mr. and Mrs. John C. Foy of High Point. He is former president of High Point Paper Box Company and executive director of Carolina Container Co.

"The recipient is truly a dedicated and professional teacher in the finest sense of the word," said President Patton in the citation. He said she was "one who has a deep and abiding interest in students, one who instills a sense of values far beyond the confines of the textbook or the classroom, who activates students in a most efficient and sensitive manner while demanding quality performance."

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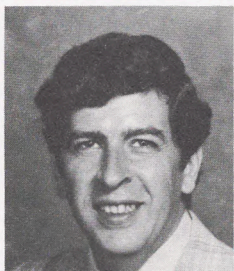

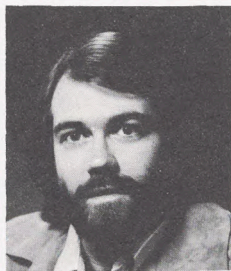
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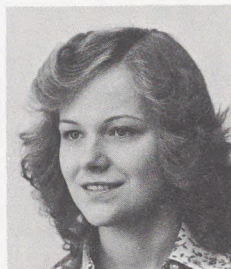

## Work on front gates

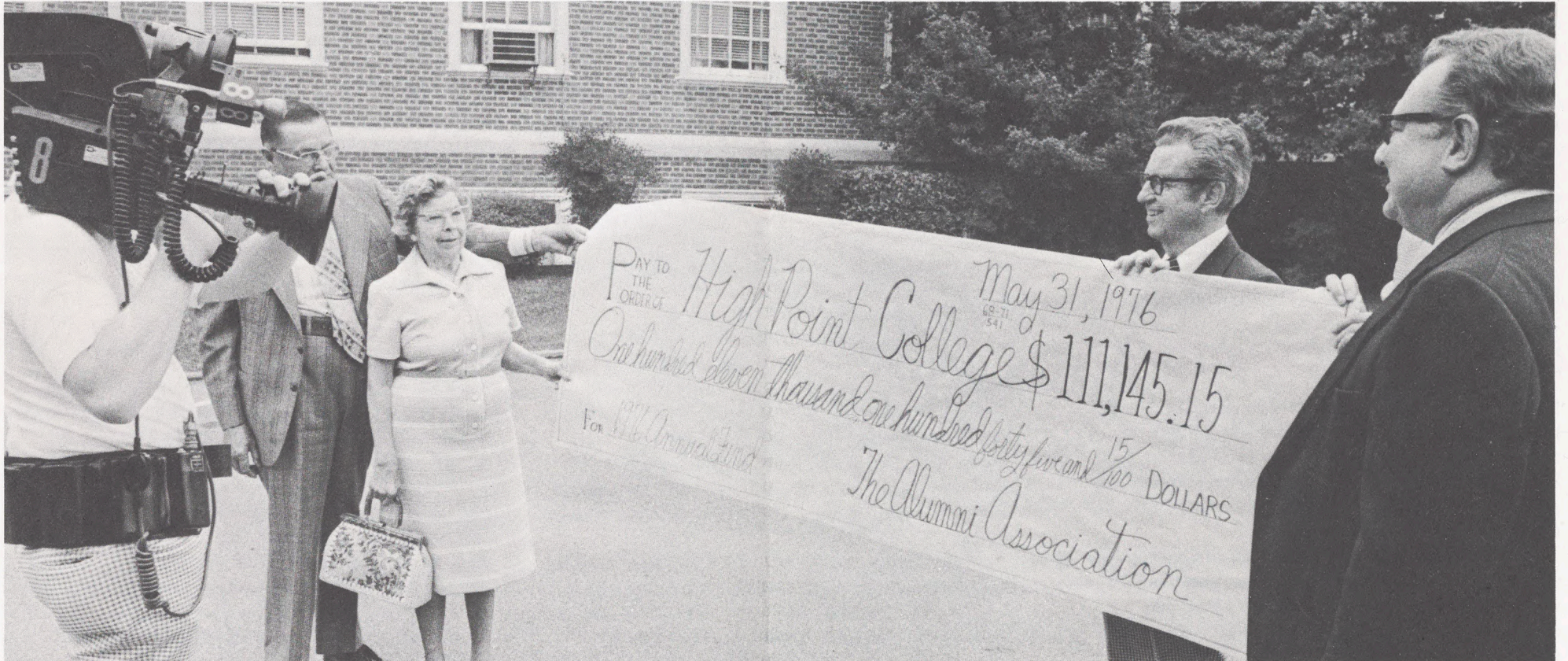

## Facelift for Roberts Hall columns, tower

EXTENSIVE refurbishing of the colonnade and the tower of Roberts Hall has been undertaken to maintain the appearance of the building. More changes are planned for the early fall.

Through the years, successive coats of white paint on the columns had built up so thick that no

further painting was advisable. Sandblasting removed all the old paint plus some of the deteriorated masonry. Sandblasting was also used to clean the brickwork of the portico.

Masonry workers then scaffolded the columns and applied a smooth coat of stucco suitable for repainting or for leaving unpainted.

At the same time, the tower, recovered just two years ago, needed another coating of fiberglass. Workers swung in bo'sun's chairs and tripped around the upper section of the tower with long-handle rollers and brushes to get the job done. (See photo.)

A leaky steam line to the library also had to be dug up and replaced, with the temporary displacement of paving and walks.

Plans have already been announced for complete new plantings in front of Roberts Hall. This project is part of the overall Board Beautification Program being supported by individual members of the Board of Trustees with personal contributions. Landscaping and additional plantings are scheduled for the front campus, library area, Haworth Hall of Science, Hayworth Chapel, and Cooke Hall.

## Change in school calendar

THE COLLEGE will operate on a somewhat different calendar next year. Changes include freshmen and transfer students arriving on campus Sunday, August 29, Parents Day changed to March 5, and Thanksgiving being observed with only one day off.

Freshmen orientation begins on August 29 and registration ends the four-day event. Upperclassmen arrive on campus Wednesday, September 1 and register Thursday. Classes will begin on Friday. Classes will also meet Saturday, September 4.

Fall break begins Friday, October 29 at 4 p.m. Classes will resume at 8 a.m. on Thursday, November 4. Pre-registration for interim and second semester is scheduled for November 8-10.

Last class day for the fall term will be Friday, December 10 with examinations scheduled for December 13-18. Students will return after Christmas holidays January 10.

Parents Day is usually scheduled in the fall but has been changed to March 5 for the coming year.

## Predict enrollment growth

RECENT HIGH SCHOOL graduates and others considering attending High Point College in September should make immediate inquiry. Freshman orientation is scheduled for August 29-September 1.

Fall enrollment predictions suggest that the College will have more students in September than it had a year ago.

Current applications are running about 5% ahead of last year when final enrollment showed a total of 1,130 students. High Point College has had a continuing rise in enrollment in recent years while many other colleges have suffered falling enrollment with cutbacks in programs and projections.

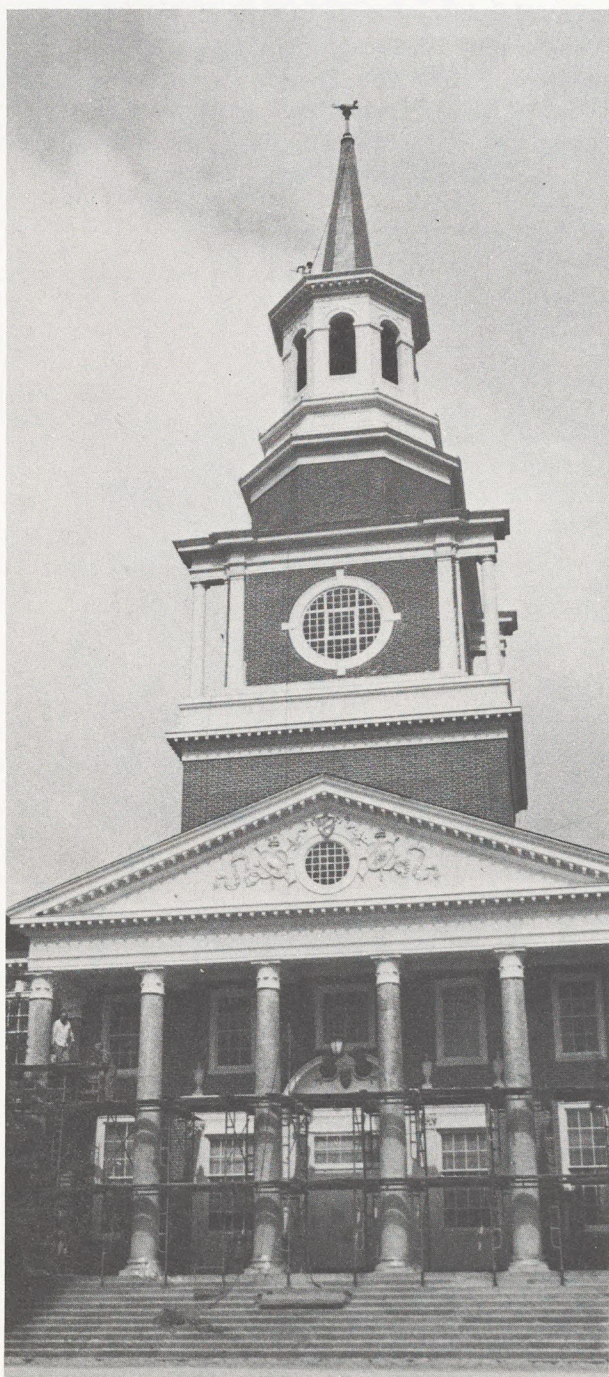
As expected, most of the 1976-77 student body will come from North Carolina. States with the next largest compliments of students include Maryland, Florida, Virginia, and New Jersey.

# HEW dictates procedures for complex report *News from Alumni*

LIKE THE TENTACLES of an octopus, government intervention in the ordinary life and affairs of private colleges is reaching into every obscure corner. After the three classical branches of government — legislative, executive, and judicial — the regulatory agencies have become a law unto themselves. The complex and often confusing regulations of these agencies finally fall on the shoulders of a particular person. All of the top college officers are required to spend inordinate amounts of time complying with the Federal agencies. The story of Registrar David Holt's involvement is typical.

DAVE HOLT normally tells the truth in his work at High Point College not only because he is an honest man but simply because there is no substitute for accuracy in his work as registrar. The exception came last year when he tried to satisfy a form sent by the Department of Health, Education and Welfare.

His first attempt was unsatisfactory and "a man in Washington" called and said he should have filed 30 such reports, one for each major

## One day COPE Clinic

HIGH SCHOOL STUDENTS may attend a Career, Occupation, and Personal Evaluation Clinic on campus October 9, or February 5, 1977. Dr. William Matthews, licensed practicing psychologist and chairman of the psychology department is the Clinic director.

The day-long sessions will include testing for vocational and occupational interests, a discussion with Matthews, and an immediate personal evaluation. A written summary of the test results will be sent to participants.

The Clinic is sponsored jointly by the Western North Carolina Conference of the United Methodist Church and the College.

The \$50 fee for the Clinic will be applied to the student's freshman tuition if he or she attends the College.

## Bicentennial campus

THE COLLEGE has been officially recognized as a participant in the Bicentennial Campus Program by the American Revolution Bicentennial Administration.

Recognition as a bicentennial campus was based on the College's concern with the American Revolution and the life of the country in several courses and extra-curricular events. The College evidenced support of the original aims of the American Revolution and a contemporary involvement in the nation's heritage.

The departments of history, sociology, business, theatre, English, and art offered specific courses during the winter term related to the nation's life and heritage.

offered, and detailing the participation of minority students in these programs. Holt explained that the College had only 25 minority students and the request would have required more forms than students.

"I told him 'you've got to be kidding,' but he said 'no, we're not.'" The information was already a year old at that point but Holt tried again. His office spent two days researching information, filling out forms, and sent it in.

This time "a woman in Washington" called back and said it would have to be done over. "I asked her about the report I had just sent in and she said the man was only a trainee and had lost all the reports," Holt said.

"I told her I didn't have the records any longer, and could not comply. Now, the form has a place for me to sign, certifying that the information is true and without error. I told her my staff could jumble up some numbers and make them come out at the right place but the facts would not be accurate. I asked her if this was what she wanted and she said 'yes.' We spent a week jumbling up some figures; I wrote on the report this was most inaccurate and erroneous but here it is. I haven't heard from her since," he said.

The College, with Holt's office as just one example, is spending increasing amounts of time proving that the college is in compliance with Federal regulations on the treatment of minority students. Numerous questions on student information forms are there solely to satisfy requirements of various state and Federal agencies related to proof of the College's non-discriminatory policy.

Like other institutions, the College signed a statement in 1965 that it would not discriminate because of race and color. This statement was required by the Civil Rights Act of 1964. The Department of Health, Education and Welfare took over the enforcement of the Act and now dictates the procedures to be followed in reporting or enforcing compliance.

Throughout the year, Holt is required to furnish complex reports to HEW and to the North Carolina Office of the Higher Education General Information Survey, known as the HEGIS report. This report provides a composite picture of College enrollment by sex, whether in-state or out-of-state residents, class, total number of freshmen, fulltime, parttime, and whether they are special students.

He has no idea of the intended value or use of this report, especially since there is a four-year lag in his submission of information and the completion of the final report with a copy back to his office.

What does he do with the final report? "What good is it for me to find out the enrollment of other colleges four years ago? I throw the report in the trash can," he said.

## Students aided by Haggai foundation scholarships

The THA Scholarships are given for one year at a time with a maximum of \$2,000 per year. A student may qualify each year of his college career for a total of \$8,000 in assistance. Each of the Scholars is reviewed annually by the Board of Governors.

Herman W. Bernard, president of Casard Furniture Manufacturing Corporation and chairman of the THA board, said "We believe that well-trained, dynamic youth leaders can help us solve some of the problems of young people. The THA Foundation was set up to help train and motivate these leaders."

## Leadership gifts sought toward \$77,000 Alumni fund

**ALUMNI HAVE A GOAL** of \$77,000 for the Annual Fund. Solicitation among 6,300 alumni is already underway. The drive will continue through May 31, 1977 when college officials close the books.

Contributions to the annual fund will support the Alumni Chair of Higher Learning, the Golden Decade capital expansion, scholarships, and any other purposes indicated by the donor. The Fund contributed \$111,145 to the College last year, the largest amount ever given by the Association to college operations.

National chairmen for the Fund are Nancy and Max Meeks, High Point. Max '49 is a well-known personality as an announcer over Radio WMFR and as manager of the Furniture Plaza. Nancy '45, is employed with the High Point city schools.

Chairman of the Advanced Giving Program is T.R. Hendrix Jr. '58, associated with Hendrix Batting Company, High Point. Hendrix suggested recently that alumni should recall the life-long benefits received from the college experience, and

should now try to make a gift to the College in return for those benefits.

"Private and church-supported colleges, unlike state-supported schools, must rely on

voluntary contributions to remain in operation. High Point College, like all other small, liberal arts church-related colleges, has heavy financial burdens. While the College is in good condition, all of us who love the College must work to keep it this way," he said.

Early stages of the Fund will concentrate on leadership gifts recognized by membership in the Distinguished Gifts Clubs. Supporters who give \$1,000 or more are named to the Fellows Club. The list of Fellows heads each announcement of contributors. The Lamplighter Club recognizes contributions of over \$500 while the Tower Club lists donors who give \$250. For contributions of \$100 or more, alumni are listed in the Centurion Club. Each gift club carries special recognitions for the members.

Individual letters from Class Chairmen will go to classmates in January, 1977. The classes of 1940-1949 have the largest segment of the total, with a goal of \$22,100. Second largest amount is \$19,350 for the classes of 1950-1959.

## Scholarship income from estates, gifts, bequests valuable to College

**SCHOLARSHIPS** totalling nearly \$70,000 have been received by the College during the fiscal year 1975-76. Vice President — College Affairs Cletus H. Kruyer reported the scholarships to the recent meeting of the trustees.

Newest scholarship is the Frank H. Wood Memorial Scholarship for Athletics. Mr. Wood attended High Point College with the class of 1928; as an undergraduate, he was an outstanding baseball and basketball player. He was president of George T. Wood & Sons, Inc., from 1943 until 1974 and chairman of the company at the time of his death. He was a leading business, civic, and government leader in High Point. Beginning with a bequest in his will, Mr. Wood's family established the scholarship as a memorial, with individual and corporate gifts. Additional gifts and memorials are being added to the sum.

Two scholarships were established by bequests in the wills of individuals. The John Idol Scholarship Fund is a memorial to a member of one of the area's prominent families. Mr. Idol was a leading salesman, retired, for the Adams-Millis Corporation. His will indicated that students in humanities and religion should be given preference. The Wayne B. Sullivan scholarship memorializes the High Point businessman who was

president of Wayne Trademarks.

Two individuals, Mrs. Dottie Groome Nelson and J. Wiley Coltrane, made direct gifts to the institution with the stipulation that the income from the funds be used to assist young people in receiving an education. Mrs. Nelson lives in Stamford, Connecticut, and is a friend of the College. Mr. Coltrane, retired local businessman, was formerly president of Coltrane Construction Company.

The Robert R. Aylmer Memorial Scholarship was established by members of his family and many friends; Bob was a 1973 graduate of the College.

Two alumni, Mr. and Mrs. Robert Latta, High Point, initiated the Claude A. Swanson Memorial Scholarship to recognize the late Mr. Swanson as a beloved father and father-in-law.

The Andrew Pickens Scholarship was established by descendants of the Reverend Andrew Pickens, a pioneer Methodist Protestant minister in Western North Carolina.

The Pickens family held reunions from 1907 until 1956; in that period, the family received an annual collection designated for an educational scholarship. Through the years of wars and the Depression, the custom was observed and a small

amount was put into savings every year. Trustees of the fund turned over the gift to the College this year. A family member, Mrs. C.W. Bates, recently celebrated her 90th birthday; for gifts, she requested that contributions go to the Pickens Scholarship.

The B.C. and Alice Barber Smith Scholarship was established this year by the Smith's daughter, Edith, of Reidsville. Miss Smith, a retired school teacher, died six months after establishing the scholarship. Since that time, one of Miss Smith's sisters, Mrs. Bessie Blackwell, also of Reidsville, has provided a substantial addition to the fund.

All scholarship funds at the College are subject to continued growth through additional gifts. Many individuals choose an existing scholarship and make a memorial gift to it from time to time. Several of the new scholarships resulted because an alumnus or friend of the College was able to suggest the College as a worthy recipient for an intended gift. In reporting the gifts to the trustees, Mr. Kruyer said that the "planting of the seed" may have taken place many years ago. He said it is evident that some of the scholarships came to High Point College because of thoughtful planning by people who wanted to insure appropriate disposition of their estates.

## Trustees announce plans to improve library

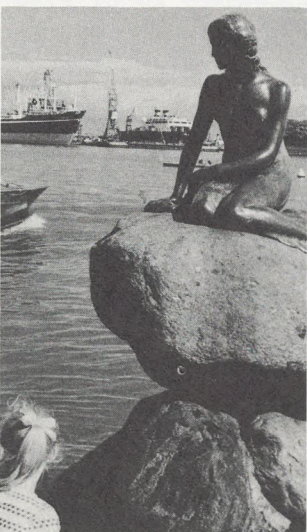

an additional stackspace was added in 1959. Mrs. Marcella Carter in her annual report to the trustees noted that the building now has 95,000 volumes literally crammed into every available space and that few volumes can be added unless some of the present volumes are discarded. The collection should be increased by three to five thousand volumes annually in order to keep pace with current publications.

A report from a library consultant contrasted the "basic excellence of the collection" with the limitations of the present facility. In his report, Dr. Warren Bird, director of the Duke Medical Library, noted that the location of the library as well as its shortcomings contributed to the "low library use" by faculty and students.

The trustee action set no deadlines for the committee nor did it spell out a course of action. The committee is to study all that would be involved in improving the library facilities and report to the Board at its next meeting. J. Harriss Covington, president of Harriss & Covington Hosiery Co., High Point, is chairman of the buildings and grounds committee charged with the investigation.

Options available to the committee include enlarging and remodeling Wrenn Memorial Library or the construction of an entirely new facility at another location on the campus. Traffic patterns, student needs, campus design, and future planning will all be considered in making the decision. The cost factor of remodeling versus new construction will also be considered.

In either case, additional funds will be needed from alumni, friends, and supporters of the College for the new facilities. Basic decisions on the future of the library are expected in the spring of 1977.

## Trustees adopt budget, elect officers for new year

**COLLEGE TRUSTEES** have adopted a budget of \$3,318,000 for the current academic year including the expenditure of more than \$1 million for classroom and laboratory instruction. \$748,000 will be used for administrative and general services while the operation and maintenance of the campus will cost \$477,500.

Other large items include assigning over \$200,000 to student aid and \$121,600 to the library for additions and upkeep of the collection.

Boarding students will eat their way through \$520,000 worth of groceries. The bookstore will require \$141,000 and the athletic program, just over \$50,000.

To balance the expenditures, the College will rely on a combination of students fees, investment income, and gifts and grants. Student fees of nearly \$2 million will offset only 53% of the costs of operating the College while an additional income of \$740,000 is expected from the rental of dormitory rooms, boarding students, and other auxiliary enterprises.

Major expenditures last year included a new gymnasium floor for \$24,000, a bookkeeping machine for nearly \$20,000, two tennis courts for \$38,350, and the new entrance from Montlieu Avenue, \$8,000.

Endowment of the College has

more than doubled in the last ten years. While \$4,902,405 was in the endowment at the end of the 1975-76 fiscal year, the amount at the end of the 1964 year was \$1,572,879.

The Board returned the executive committee to another year of leadership. They are: Chairman, William F. Womble, senior partner of Womble, Carlyle, Sandridge & Rice, Winston-Salem; vice-chairman, Charles E. Hayworth, president of Alma Desk Company, High Point, treasurer, W. Roger Soles, president, Jefferson Standard Life Insurance Company, Greensboro; and secretary, Dr. Wendell M. Patton, president of the College.

In addition to listing the contributors to the Annual Alumni Fund, the report also shows the names of all non-alumni friends and supporters. Equality of Opportunity: Admission to, employment by, and promotion within High Point College shall be on the basis of merit, and there shall be no discrimination on the basis of race, color, creed, religion, sex, or national origin.

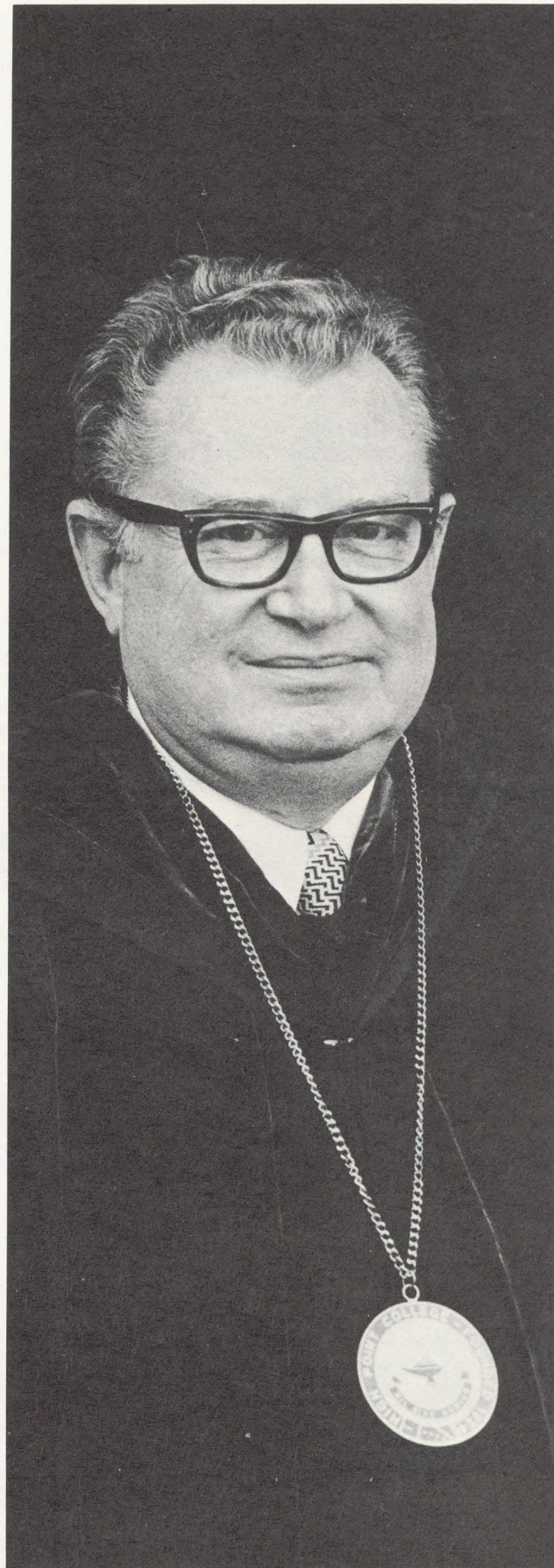
## The President's Report

### *The Year in Review*

**G**rowth, financial support, reorganization, and plans for new ventures marked 1975-76 for High Point College. The College maintained a strong position in enrollment, broadened its curriculum possibilities for students, and consolidated internal gains. While many of the 2,800 institutions of higher learning in this country struggled to survive last year and a few closed, High Point College moved positively and creatively to meet the challenge of remaining viable and worthy of support and respect.

Public opinion seems to have moved within the last year toward a more realistic support of private institutions. The maintenance of two systems of higher education, public and private, has long been a bulwark of American democracy. Without the private sector, education could always be in danger of becoming a tool of the state and subservient to political or totalitarian expediency.

Students who choose to attend private colleges are as worthy of support as students who attend pub-

lic institutions. Assisting the student to meet the cost of attending a private college is an appropriate use of tax funds; at the same time, the institutions themselves must retain self-governance. State and Federal funds, then, are rightly used by students to receive their education in a privately-governed college or university. Such a choice is at the heart of a democracy and it must be preserved.

In addition to student fees and government funds, the College counts on the voluntary support of several sectors of the citizenry. The measure of support represented in this report of gifts and grants to High Point College is impressive. On behalf of the trustees, faculty, students, and all other personnel, I express the appreciation and thanks of the College for this high measure of support.

Every student is grateful because the cost of attending college is higher than the tuition and fees that are charged. The difference is made up by the contributions shown on these pages.

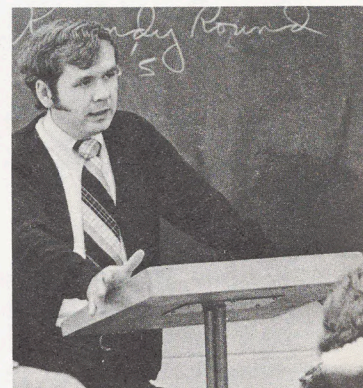
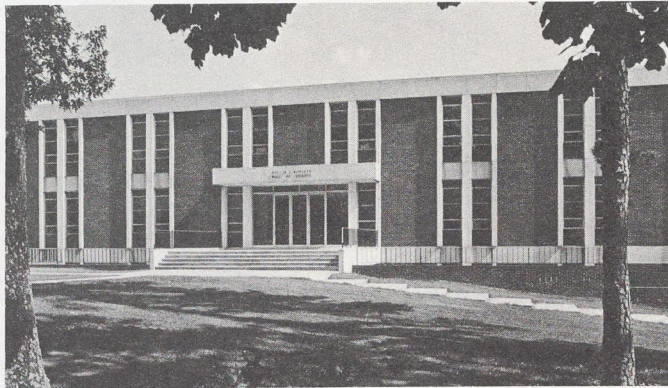
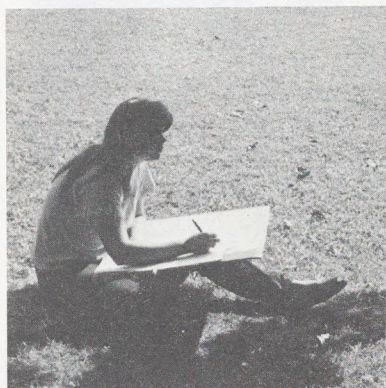
In addition to the contributions of alumni to the Annual Alumni Fund, the College receives valuable support from a large number of non-alumni contributors. All of our gifts and grants are reported here and we appreciate the thoughtfulness of each con-

tributor to the overall High Point College Fund. A gift to any section of our need makes more funds available elsewhere. Every contribution, then, is a gift to the total work of the College.

While the College's economic situation was heavily influenced by the national condition, the College nevertheless operated in the black, subsidized more than half the students with some form of financial assistance, and was able to expend some funds on new projects and programs.

Early in the year, the academic departments of the College were consolidated under four major divisions. In addition to giving more efficient internal governance, the new divisional system will provide increased opportunity for students to structure their studies along individual choices and more in keeping with the breadth of a liberal arts college.

The divisions (with the departments included) are Humanities (English, modern foreign languages, religion and philosophy, fine arts), Behavioral and Social Sciences (history, political science, geography, education, human relations, sociology, psychology), Natural Science, Mathematics, and Physical Education (biology, chemistry, mathematics, health, physical education), and Business (business administration



and economics). Divisional chairmen are Dr. Owen Weatherly, humanities; Mr. William Cope, behavioral and social sciences; Dr. Roy Epperson, natural science, math, and physical education; and Dr. Richard Bennington, business.

The College anticipated about 1,075 students in September and was pleased when 1,131 arrived. Dormitory needs were met by pressing two old college-owned homes into service on what we hoped would be a temporary basis. The old houses proved so popular with the men residents they will continue in use for at least another year.

Some classrooms bulged beyond an acceptable number for a single professor and new sections were immediately added to courses in business administration and human relations.

The breadth of the curriculum offerings of High Point College received a considerable boost from the beginning of the program with Florida Institute of Technology. A significant number of students have expressed interest in the program and in another year when they become juniors, upwards of 40 students should be living on the campus in Florida. Students will return here for the senior year and graduation. The arrangement provides High Point College stu-

dents opportunity to major in environmental studies, oceanographic science, photography, business applications of computers, applied mathematics, and air commerce.

The Florida program may be the forerunner of more curriculum expansion through cooperation with other institutions. In such cases, students will remain students of High Point College with all their records maintained on this campus. They will graduate with degrees from High Point College; the cooperation with other institutions means the broadening of the courses, experiences, and academic stimulation afforded by life on another campus.

The upgrading of campus facilities continued with the building of two additional tennis courts, an all-weather track at the stadium, a new entrance to the campus from Montlieu Avenue, the re-planting of the front lawn, and the addition of air conditioning to Memorial Auditorium.

The trustees set in motion a general beautification program to be carried out with their own financial support. Trustees called on each other to contribute at least \$200 to the improvement of the campus with re-seeding, landscaping, and planting of shrubs and trees under the direction of a professional landscape consultant. The work is to be carried out in stages over the next year.

The trustees also created a Board of Visitors to advise them on finance, educational policies, improvements to the curriculum, or any other facet of college life. Membership on the new advisory board will come from community leaders and professional people whose expertise will be of particular value to the needs of the college.

The drama section of the fine arts department won accolades from local critics for presentations during the year, especially for the student-production "Make it Another Old Fashioned," a revue of Cole Porter songs, and for the fantasy-drama "Indians" directed by Mrs. Carolyn Rauch.

The year saw several significant changes in college personnel. Wes Gaynor retired as bursar after a career distinguished by service and competence. The name of the office has been changed to Assistant Business Manager and Derald Hagen has taken the position.

New professors joining the faculty include Mrs. Carol Brantley, assistant librarian and instructor; Dr. John F. Moehlmann, assistant professor of English; Lyman Rickard, instructor in chemistry; William H. Shirley, assistant professor of history; and Frances J. Shamberg, assistant professor of modern foreign languages. Chaplain Charles Teague is shifting his emphasis from the chapel to the classroom to become instructor of Christian Education.



Two faculty members, Miss Shamberg and Edwin Plowman, instructor in sociology, received their Ph.D. degrees late in the year. Of the 57 fulltime faculty members, more than 50% have earned the terminal, or doctoral, degree.

New trustees include Arthur Utley, High Point attorney, and G. Robert McKenzie, minister of Front Street Methodist Church, Burlington.

Once again, the interim session of the academic calendar provided opportunity for innovative and creative course offerings. Two groups of students went to New York City with particular interests in the operation of Wall Street and Broadway. In each case, the groups received personal and helpful attention from important personages in the financial and entertainment industries.

The urban survival course captured the attention of the media and brought much favorable publicity to the college. Seven young men left the campus under Dr. William P. Matthew's aegis to meet the challenge of living for a month in a new and distant environment. David Olson, rising sophomore from Wilmington, Delaware was the subject of a news story given national circulation by the Associated Press. Other media located and interviewed students in Lynchburg and Roanoke, Virginia.

High Point College is also taking a key role in the "cluster" arrangement suggested by the Methodist Joint Higher Education Planning and Strategy Committee, particularly in assisting the development of a common calendar among Pfeiffer, Brevard, Greensboro College, and High Point College. The common calendar is widely seen as a vital first step in closer cooperation among the Methodist-related institutions of higher learning within the state.

Through the generosity and support of his family and friends, a scholarship was established in memory of Robert R. Aylmer Jr., a 1975 graduate who was the victim of tragedy. The income from the contributions will provide financial aid to students in biology or natural science. Nearly \$9,000 has been contributed to the fund.

Late in the academic year, the College was recognized as a participant in the Bicentennial Campus Program by the American Revolutionary Bicentennial Commission. The recognition was based principally on courses offered that dealt with aspects of American history and heritage as well as interest in contemporary national life.

As we look forward to a new year, the College once again is expecting a good enrollment situation. We have had more applications and more acceptances than in recent years. Our admissions picture is bright and our hopes are high. While we do not expect spectacular gains, we have every reason to believe that High Point College will continue to be strong, to have a high enrollment, and we are grateful for the continuing support of many friends. ■

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The Alumni Association has awarded funds from the Louise Adams and Percy Lindley scholarships to four students -- Thomas Simpson, High Point; Fred Rutledge, Trinity; Rebecca Albright, Coleridge; and Peter Migliorini, Westfield, New Jersey.

The Adams scholarship went to Simpson and Rutledge. Simpson, senior, is majoring in business administration. Rutledge, senior, is majoring in psychology; he won the award last year. The P. E. Lindley Memorial award went to Miss Albright and Migliorini. She is a junior and has been secretary in the Placement Office. Migliorini is majoring in business administration and has been student assistant in the alumni office. He is a sophomore.

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Dr. Benjamin Harvey Hill, 80, Greensboro, died on August 11. He was retired biology professor and chairman of the department of the College, where he taught for 38 years. Following retirement, he taught at Cumberland College, Kentucky. Dr. William Locke assisted in the funeral. The family requested that memorials be directed to the building fund of the College.

Dr. Samuel Jesse Underwood, 58, High Point, died on August 7 in the VA hospital in Salisbury. He was formerly the head of the Department of English of the College, and had taught at Furman University, Frostburg State College, and Penn State University. He was author or editor of a number of publications.

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Miss Edith M. Smith, retired school teacher in Reidsville, established a scholarship in memory of her late parents at High Point College shortly before her death on August 24.

A lifelong Methodist, Miss Smith lived on a farm in Rockingham County all of her childhood and attended a small two-teacher school. She later attended a boarding school in Ruffin but her formal education was interrupted by the influenza epidemic of 1918. She resumed her education at Rutherford College and began teaching in small schools but never gave up her dream of completing college. She subsequently attended Duke University during summer months until she lacked only one year of work. She then became a fulltime student as a senior and received her A.B. degree from Duke University in 1929.

She taught in Pitt County, Rowan County, and Guilford County schools before returning to her home in Reidsville in 1947. She taught fourth grade in the Wentworth Elementary School for 16 years and retired in 1963.

Her gift, in excess of \$14,000, will provide at least three academic scholarship grants of \$400 each year. Miss Smith was a frugal woman, known for her love of young people and for her devotion to the church. High Point College had not been a part of Miss Smith's life, but discussions with her minister, an alumnus of the College, persuaded her of the value of funding a scholarship at the College.

The College is truly grateful to her for establishing this living memorial to her parents and to herself.

**W**RENN MEMORIAL LIBRARY has served High Point College well and long. Built in 1937 as a gift of the late Mrs. M.J. Wrenn of High Point in memory of her husband, the library has served as a research and study center of the vast majority of High Point College alumni and former students. The five-story stackspace was added in 1959. Now, nearly 100,000 volumes crowd its walls, the library staff has outgrown the offices, and work rooms are nearly always too small to accomplish the required labors.

"The new library" is being discussed by college officials who see it as the most pressing need of the entire college program. The library of any college or university may well be the heart of the learning activity. Classrooms and offices, laboratories and desks in dormitory rooms, lecture halls and seminar rooms are all important. But many times, it is within the mind of the solitary student crouched over a pile of books on a library table where knowledge is being most coherently assimilated. The physical setting, the surroundings, and the attractiveness of the study area can either add to or detract from this central activity of personal study.

Investigations and preliminary studies are underway to determine the best method of providing additional library space, whether by a totally new facility or by skillful and artistic additions to the present 40-year-old structure. At the appropriate time, an architect will be chosen and sketches will be considered.

From the first, the needs of the student are being kept uppermost in the minds of those responsible for decisions. Students deserve an attractive place to study. Students need to see the library as part of the whole learning experience, a central part, and an essential part.

Funds for the new library are planned as part of the Golden Decade campaign. As receipts add up, plans can be made to speed the day of groundbreaking and final completion. Additional gifts are needed to insure that the College will have a library that will serve long and well. Without it, the College will be offering less than the complete facility and program needed by its students and envisioned by its alumni and supporters. ■
