Liberal gifts for new library from students, faculty

LED BY A STUDENT GROUP, the students and faculty of the College have given \$22,964 to build the new library — a project not yet officially adopted by the trustees.

The 24 students in the human relations course, Finance and Public Relations, wanted to gain experience in funding and public contact. They also wanted an important and challenging project. They chose the library because they could understand and interpret the need for a library to the remainder of the campus.

Professor Earnest Price Jr., distinguished lecturer in human relations and chairman of the department, is teacher of the class. As a retired national executive of the YMCA, he has had considerable experience in campaigns.

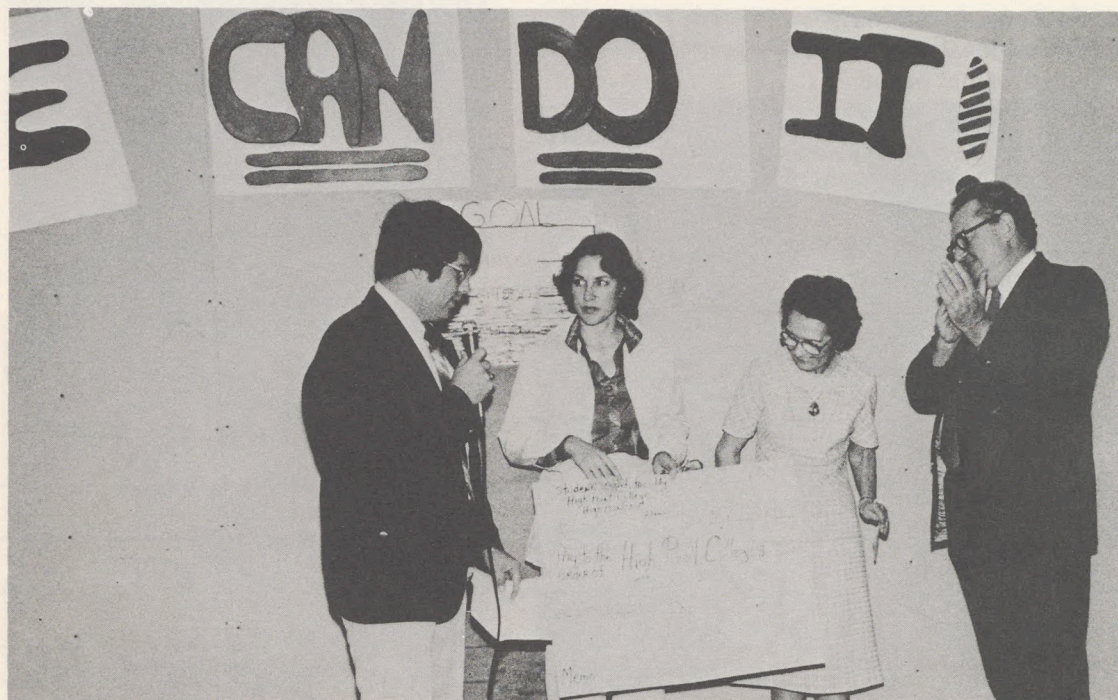
The class turned itself into the board of directors for the project, appointed committees, set a goal and a closing date, and then began to put their plans into motion. A slide show was produced for showing to the faculty, student groups, and

individual donors. Committees began to function in the areas of promotion, solicitation, advance gifts, and records.

To insure an appropriate campaign opening, the class made their own pledges. The average gift from class members was about \$150 per student, with the highest being \$750 and the lowest, \$70. As a whole, the pledge from class members amounted to \$3,205. Mr. Price challenged their generosity with the promise that his own contribution would be related to their class effort.

Donnie Crotts, a senior from Thomasville, was general chairman of the class project.

Leaflets were distributed to all students; thermometer posters around campus showed the progress of the fund; personal visits were made on students, faculty, and staff members. Pledges were being sought right up to the close of the campaign. The final total was not known until moments before the public announcement of the fund's success.



A GIANT CHECK was presented to the College at the conclusion of the drive. Miss Carter, librarian, and President Patton accepted the check from Danny Ingram and Donnie Crotts.

Both Miss Carter and Dr. Patton expressed surprise at the amount of pledges and contributions, and both were unstinting in their compliments to the class.

(Mr. Price was out of town at the time of the presentation: the class sent him a telegram to relay the good news.)

College-community relations promoted at breakfast

"ANY SERIOUS CONSIDERATION of college-community relationships in High Point should begin with a recognition of the College as a Methodist Church-related college," Earnest Price Jr., told the prayer breakfast gathering at the College in December.

Price is distinguished lecturer and chairman of the human relations department. Nearly 300 community leaders attended the annual breakfast hosted by the Trustees.

"Because it's a church college it shares part of the mission of the church. It takes from its relationship to the church a commitment to improving the quality of life within the framework of a value system rooted in the Judeo-Christian tradition . . .

"In the exercise of that commitment, the College's first responsibility, of course, is to its students. Central to its purpose is the task of equipping (them) with knowledge, skills and expertise, and with the social vision, moral courage, and spiritual faith that will ensure the use of these in the best interests of society. And the accomplishment of that task contributes to the quality of life in the greater High Point Community. . . .

"There is increasing recognition of the importance of learning as a life-long process. . . . The stage is set for the greatest emphasis on higher education in non-traditional patterns we've ever seen. Now . . . is the time for college and community to work cooperatively and creatively to match needs and resources in new programs. Such new programs would take the form of evening classes, workshops, seminars, training events, and specialized life-enrichment programs of many kinds.

Faculty at humanities meeting

THREE FACULTY MEMBERS represented High Point College at a federally-funded conference at Albany, New York, in late November, designed to assist institutions of higher learning in developing humanities continuing education programs.

Dr. E. Roy Epperson, Dr. Marilyn Karmel, and Ms. Shirley Rawley attended the three-day regional workshop, with concentration on more active involvement of the humanities in continuing education and community outreach projects.

Dr. Epperson, professor of chemistry and associate dean of the College, is chairman of the educational policies committee with oversight of the curriculum and all academic work. He is head of the division of natural science, mathematics, physical education and health.

Dr. Karmel, assistant professor of education, is director of the new program of gerontology. She was also director of a week-long conference last summer on the identity crisis of modern women.

Ms. Rawley, assistant professor of English, is director of the Continuing Education program, providing evening classes for working adults and other students who cannot attend regular daytime classes.

The competitive selection for attendance at the workshop was based partly on how well institutions are making the humanities a central part of their continuing education curriculum.

for cooperation and mutual support that would improve the quality of life through more effective use of resources, expanding opportunities, and involving more people . . .

"It has been said that the churches should be the conscience of a community. There is no question that the churches should keep the community sensitive to human suffering, social ills and wrong-doing. . . . Church congregations, the urban ministry, and various agencies are doing much. . . . The question is, 'Are we utilizing with maximum effectiveness the resources of the college and the churches in an united effort?'

"Let me urge that (we) be sensitive to new and creative ways by which we can be of service. Some of those ways will involve the college in an official capacity. But others will involve members of the administration and faculty and students unofficially.

"Let's face the future together in the faith that college and community in close cooperation can improve the quality of our common life and make a small part of our world reflect a bit more the spirit of him whose birthday we celebrated in the Christmas season."

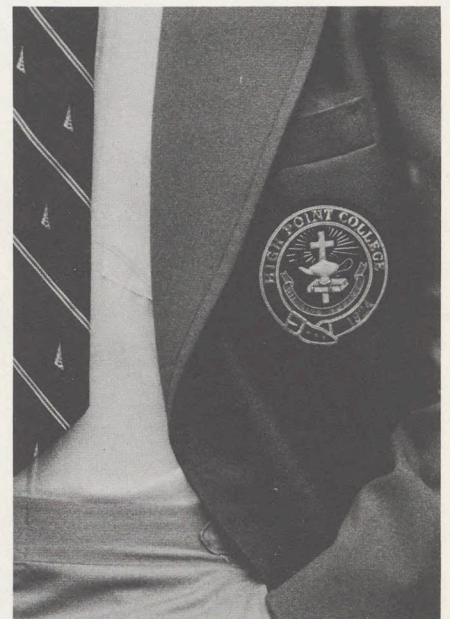

Students gain experience by community involvement

THROUGH A BROAD-RANGING PROGRAM of involvement in the life of the community, High Point College students are given an opportunity to bridge the gap between classroom theory and practical experience. Faculty members assist in placing students in specific intern programs directly related to their major.

Cathy Groom, a human relations major from Arlington, Virginia, is typical of the students involved with community life. Cathy is interning with the Volunteers to the Court, a program to provide meaningful assistance to young people who have run afoul of the law. Her work begins when a young person between the ages of 16 and 21 is convicted of a first offense for a misdemeanor. The judge may remand the offender to a program that combines rehabilitation and community service — i.e., to reporting to the Volunteers of the Court program and an assignment of a specific number of hours service that are to be given to a nursing home or other community-oriented service.

Cathy's responsibility, working directly with Gart Evans, director of the Volunteers program and a '75 graduate of High Point College, is to stay in contact with her youthful clients, recruit Big Brothers and Big Sisters to work with the offenders, and report to the judge on the progress of her clients in the program.

She visits with her charges in their homes or during school hours, assists in the training of the adult volunteers, and appears in court to explain progress or lack of progress in individual cases to the judge. (About 65 percent of those remanded to the program successfully complete their assignments without further lawbreaking and are given a "clean" police record.)

The daughter of a lawyer, Cathy is considering attending law school after graduation from High Point College in the spring.

An outstanding student and campus leader, she is active in her sorority, the Student Government Association, and is a member of several honorary recognition groups.

Other students work in similar programs.

*Lynne Smith, Greensboro, is an assistant to the executive director of Junior Achievement, in Greensboro. She assists in forming J.A. clubs (which function as business corporations) and she assists the businessmen and women who are advisors to the corporations formed by high school groups.

*Daniel Ingram, Greensboro, is associate exploring executive in the Explorer Program, Boy Scouts of America. With an office in the General Greene Council headquarters, Danny is frequently in the field, working both with organized groups and their leaders, as well as with the management of the Council.

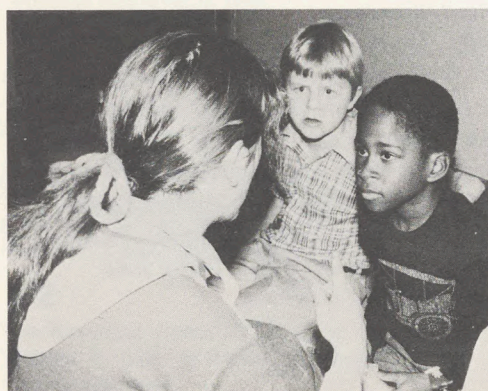
*Judy Harris, Salisbury, Maryland, works at the High Point YMCA as assistant youth director in the after school program. After presiding over light snacks for her elementary grade children, she leads them in gymnasium or swimming pool activities.

*Robert Gillis, Durham, is associate director of the scouting program in the High Point area. He is responsible for the growth and success of the Cub Scouts and Boy Scouts program in High Point, Jamestown, Davie and Davidson counties.

Cathy Groom summarized the value of the program in a single sentence: "I know I can get good grades, but I need to know that I can work with people."

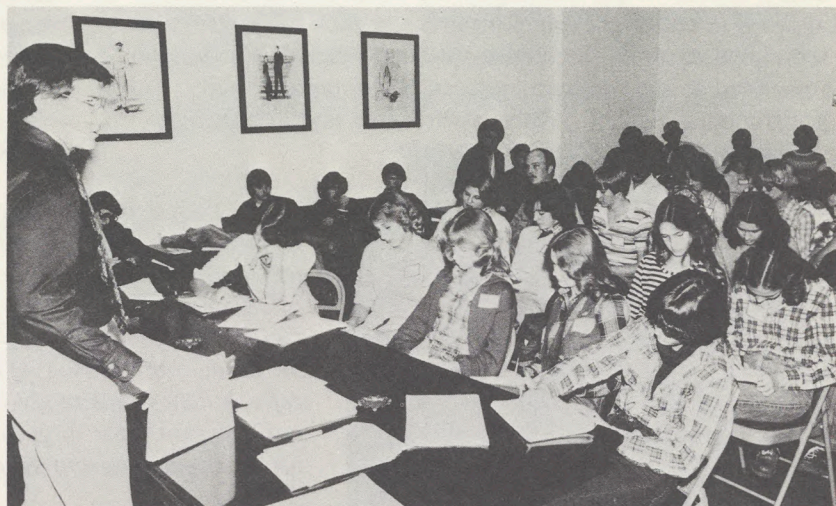

Men's and women's basketball teams end on top

THE BASKETBALL SEASON was an unparalleled success. High Point College was the *only school in the country* where both the men's and women's basketball teams qualified for their respective national tournaments.

The men won the Carolinas Conference crown at Salisbury by defeating Pfeiffer 54-51 in a see-saw battle down to the last second. They advanced to the NAIA District 26 tournament in Winston-Salem, where they met familiar foes, including Guilford, Pfeiffer, Gardner-Webb, and Belmont Abbey, with the Panthers winning over Pfeiffer 71-54, coming from 10 points behind.

Next stop was Kansas City where the men won a lop-sided victory over Oregon Tech (91-62), but lost in the second round to Briar Cliff, Iowa (76-75). The Kansas City foray was the first time since 1969 that High Point College had played in a national tournament.

Charlie Floyd took honors as All-American; Danny Anderson was named All-District, and Jerry Steele was named District 26 Coach of the Year and NAIA Area VII Coach of the Year.

The season was the most successful in a decade at the College, with the Panthers winning 18 consecutive games to break the previous school record of 17. The overall 27-6 season was the best since 1969.

The Lady Panthers won the Conference Championship, for the fourth consecutive year, in the tournament at Salisbury (the same night and gym where the men also came in first) and went on to the AIAW Region II tournament in Louisville, Kentucky.

They defeated Bellarmine, Francis Marion, and S.C. State for their ticket to Fargo, N.D. High Point College was the defending national champion of the AIAW National Small College tournament.

North Dakota State fell to the Lady Panthers (93-50) in the opening round, but the second-round loss to Dayton (75-65) forced the women into the consolation bracket. They came home in sixth place.

The women had a 33-4 season and Coach Wanda Briley was named the 1979 Stayfree National Small College Coach of the Year. She is completing her second year at High Point

College, where her volleyball teams had seasons of 41-10 and 42-7 plus a place in the national tournament in 1977.

Outstanding women included Marie Riley, Ethel White and Andreia Blanchard, who were named to numerous All-American teams.

An Editorial: Hard Lessons from another college

EXPERIENCES OF BELOIT COLLEGE, Wisconsin, provide lessons for other similar colleges who are certain to face difficult times in the immediate future. Summarized in the January 10, 1979 *Wall Street Journal*, the Beloit story offers important benchmarks to other institutions. Especially as High Point College touches some of the problems faced by Beloit, the story of Beloit's experiences may be instructive as we look for solutions. Changes may be required, loyalties must be increased, and sacrifices will become ordinary.

Enrollment and financial difficulties for colleges and universities are coming because the number of 18-year-olds in the country will peak this year, and then decline as much as 18 percent in the early- to mid-1980s. In addition to the shrinking pool of college-age students, there is apprehension that with tuition and other costs on the rise, more students will decide to forego traditional four-year liberal arts college careers.

Beloit's troubles began in 1964 with the introduction of a highly-innovative three-year calendar, the guarantee of no increase in tuition costs during a student's career, and the prediction of a near-doubling of the student body. The College scuttled its identity as a 4-year traditional school, and when the predicted rise in the number of students did not materialize, the decline precipitated a financial crisis.

To make up deficiencies in enrollment and in financial support, drastic measures were taken. While retaining its liberal arts posture, Beloit has added more practical courses, viz., anthropological students learn museum management; art

students study commercial art; and math students will be able to major in computer sciences next school year.

Other measures to recoup include a re-organized admissions effort that draws heavily on faculty participation. The College has put off needed maintenance while borrowing \$4.5 million from the endowment. The guaranteed tuition plan has been abandoned, and 44 telephones have been removed. Maintenance and janitorial services are contracted to off-campus vendors and a professional consultant has been retained to direct the funding. The College expects to have a balanced budget by 1981.

To point again to the obvious, HIGHPOINTS offers these considerations:

— Financial support of High Point College by its alumni and friends is its lifeblood;

— The liberal arts character of the College will have to continue to be broadened to provide a more direct link to career objectives;

— Cooperative recruiting efforts involving alumni, friends, faculty, and administrative officers and personnel will be required to keep enrollment stable;

— The cost of recruiting a student for High Point College has doubled in three years;

— The College must retain its identity as a liberal arts college while preparing graduates for careers.

Finch lectures study role of women and Christianity

CAN CHRISTIANITY LIBERATE WOMEN? Yes, says Dr. Rosemary Reuther, and Christian ideology offers the most viable context within which to pursue equality of the sexes.

Dr. Reuther was Finch Lecturer at the College on April 11, also observed as Ministers Appreciation Day. She is the Georgia Harkness Professor at Garrett-Evangelical Theological Seminary.

She spoke on religion from a feminist perspective, dealing first with the compatibility of feminism and Christian, and during the evening, with God, creation, and ecology from a feminist viewpoint.

Women had a "problem" of equal treatment in the Old Testament — after all, all the Hebrew prophets were men. But women had a different position in the New Testament because distinctions of class, race, and sex were swept away. Despite the lingering Judeo-Christian stereotypes which refer to women in inferior roles, she feels the modern church is ripe for equalitarian changes.

She says a new interpretation of old teachings will reveal a theme of equity rather than a male-dominated church hierarchy. She sees a need, then, not for revamping, but for re-evaluating the old doctrinal teachings.

Women have to pay a price for functioning in the public sphere that men don't have to pay, Dr. Reuther says. "Women don't have the support of a wife, as men do so they

can devote their full time to a public life."

It is important for women to function with men in the public sphere just as it is imperative for men to function equally in the home sphere."

Judy Harris, Salisbury, Maryland, said the program gave students an opportunity to meet other students in humanics and agency executives. The exposure to different agencies and needed skills was an important part of their education, she said.

Furniture Marketing aimed at career preparation

FURNITURE MARKETING has come to High Point College in the form of a new major starting in September. The program will lead to a Bachelor of Science degree with a concentration in furniture marketing. Courses will be taught in the Earl N. Phillips School of Business.

First graduates of the program will be ready for employment in 1981; some students currently enrolled in the School of Business are expected to select the new major in time to complete the requirements in two years.

Dr. Richard Bennington, head of the School of Business, said the intent of the program is to prepare students to enter the marketing departments of furniture manufacturers, furniture industry suppliers, or to go into furniture retailing.

Dr. Bennington has been on leave from his regular duties at the College during the spring semester to join the management offices of Bassett Furniture Industries, Inc., the world's largest furniture manufacturer.

Courses in the new program include advertising, sales

management, retailing, public relations, marketing research, furniture marketing, logistics in the industry, design, and computer applications in furniture marketing. A comprehensive internship of several months on-the-job experience will be an integral part of the course work. Depending on a particular student's interest, the internship may be completed in a furniture manufacturing facility, a retail store, or a furniture supply business.

Members of the College Board of Visitors and other area industrialists participated in the planning of the new major. Dr. Bennington said leaders in the industry would be further called on to provide practical opportunities for students.

"We want this entire program to be a two-way street if our students are to receive maximum preparation," he said. "Not only will our students need to go to the industry for field trips and internships, but we want representatives of the industry to come to the classroom where, in the best possible setting for learning, we can take full advantage of their practical viewpoint."

Students in the program will complete the usual requirement for a bachelor's degree. Bennington said that while the graduates will be well-rounded in liberal arts and the basics of business, the major will give them special familiarity with furniture as a product and as an industry.

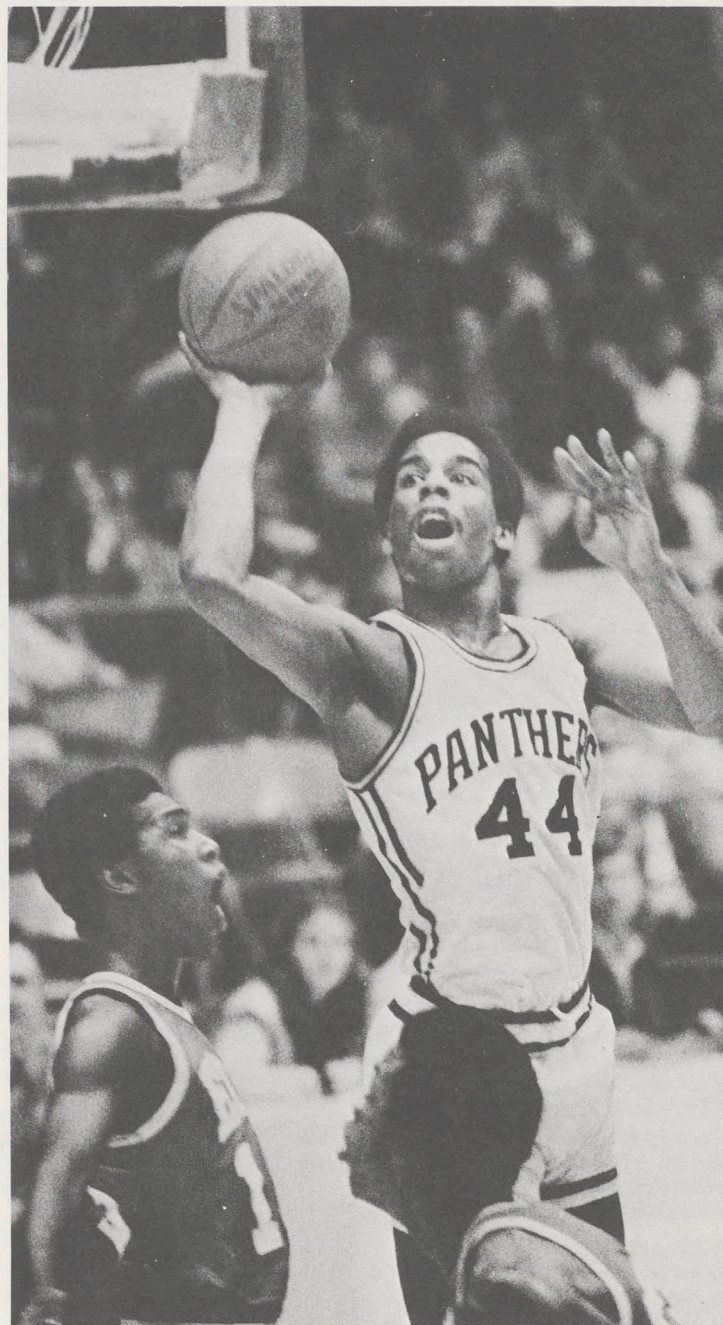

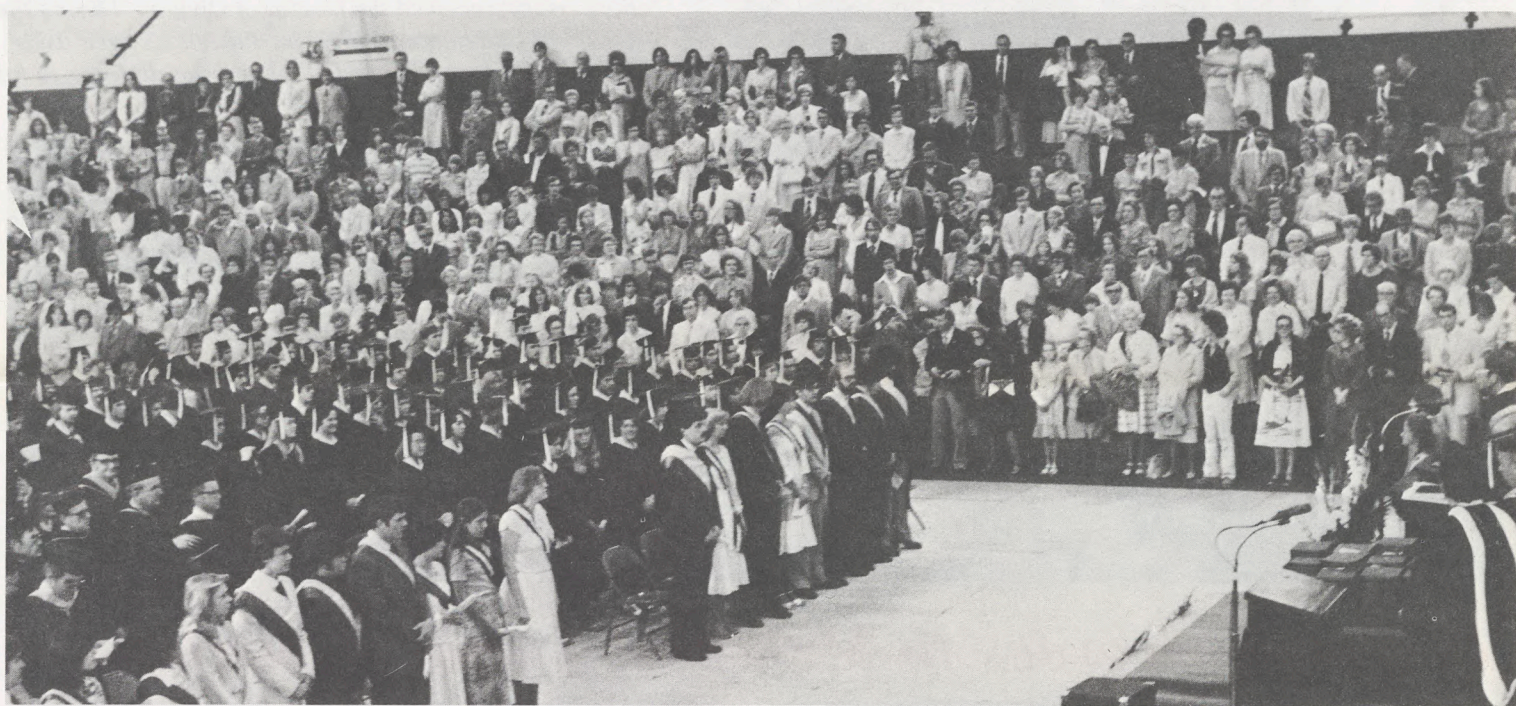

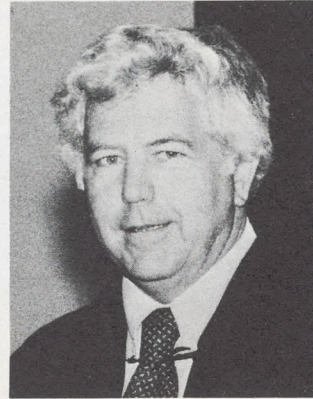
Shirley Y. Rawley, assistant professor of English, won the

Honorary degrees to McWhorter and Timberlake

HONORARY DEGREE RECIPIENTS Bob Timberlake and the Rev. John McWhorter were the chief speakers for graduation activities, May 5-6.

McWhorter, pastor of First United Methodist Church, Gastonia, was the preacher for the baccalaureate service Saturday evening in Wesley Memorial United Methodist Church. He challenged the graduates to enter upon their future lives with a definite purpose.

"You have been called to greatness, to a life of service and caring. You've had dreams of the great possibilities for your life, and now it is yours to use or to waste, to make or mar," he said.

The citation for his honorary Doctor of Divinity degree called attention to his service and leadership in both church and community activities. He has been superintendent of the Waynesville District, and has been minister of congregations in Charlotte, Black Mountain, and Asheville. He has been on numerous church boards and agencies including the councils on Ministers and Higher Education.

Timberlake, self-taught realist painter who still lives in his hometown of Lexington, has achieved acclaim here and

abroad. He told the graduates in his Sunday morning address at commencement that they should consider the past, the future, luck, and love as they came to the day.

The man whose paintings were all sold prior to their exhibition in New York's prestigious Armand Hammar galleries said he was lucky to have talents and the opportunity to use those talents.

He also attributed his success to the "fine family and great friends," who help him. "Love is probably the most important thing in our lives," he said. "But love unexpressed is no love at all, only an illusion. If you love, you will feel loved; and if you love yourself, you will make those around you happy."

He advised the graduates to love their careers. "Very few of us do what we want to do in life; but when you love what you are doing, it isn't work," he said.

In introducing Timberlake, President Patton noted that Timberlake's grandfather, E.M. Raper, gave the Founder's Day address at the College just 50 years ago.

Timberlake received the honorary Doctor of Humanities degree.

Baseball finishes season with NAIA World Series

LONG AN NAIA BASEBALL POWERHOUSE, High Point College topped one of its finest seasons to finish second in the nation in competition in the NAIA World Series finals.

On the way to a 38-15-1 season under first-year coach Jim Speight, the Panthers won an incredible 11 games in the eighth or ninth innings.

The 19th contest, at Guilford, hinted at the pattern for the rest of the season. Trailing 9-0, High Point rallied for 11 runs in the last two innings for a wild 11-9 win. High Point rallied for wins five more times to tie for the first place in final conference standings. Then they eased through the conference tournament over Pfeiffer (12-5), Elon (11-9) and Pfeiffer again (8-1) to win their ninth title in 11 years.

The Panthers won the District 26 Tournament on the strength of their pitching, the fifth district title in six years.

High Point came from behind in the Area 7 tournament opening, scoring six runs in the eighth inning, over Cumberland College (Ky) 12-8.

Panthers won the second game, over West Virginia State, but lost to Coastal Carolina in the double-elimination tournament.

The championship contest against the same team was right out of a Frank Merriwell story. Freshman Neil Van Asch homered for two runs in the second but the score was soon tied at 6-6. A two-out walk followed by a homer seemed to put the game on ice. The Panthers would not be denied. In the ninth, Tim Reid doubled, Danny Culler singled and Jeff Kennedy walked to load the bases. A Coastal Carolina pitching mound conference could not prevent Van Asch hitting the first pitch over the light poles for a grand-slammer, the lead — and after two more runs — a trip to the NAIA Series in Nashville.

The Panthers played Birmingham Southern in the opening game of their third Series since 1972. Trailing 2-0 with two out in the ninth, the Panthers pulled off another miracle win, 3-2 with hits by Kennedy, Van Asch, Fred Poole, and Kenny Carter.

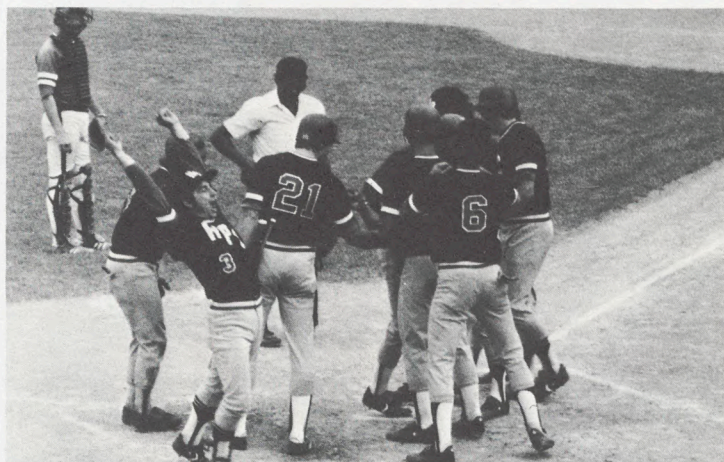
A rain-delayed game against Southeastern Oklahoma State, resumed the following day, had another late-inning rally and another miracle win. Mark LaFranco, reliever, was the winning pitcher.

The Panther streak was halted in the second game of the day as David Lipscomb won, 6-3. But High Point bounced back with a win over St. Xavier (Ill.)

Another rain-delayed game against Point Park (Pa.) was tied 6-6 at the end of nine innings; the Panthers scored 4 runs in the top of the 13th to win 10-6 and to advance to the championship game against Lipscomb. The miracle streak had run out, and High Point College came home with second place.

Danny Wilbur was selected All-Conference, All-District, and All-Area. Tim Reid, Joe Garbarino and pitcher Jay Schwamberger were All-Conference and All-District. The All-Tournament team included Ken Carter, Joe Garbarino, Gerald Culler and Mark LaFranco.

MEMBERS OF THE ALUMNI Association's Executive Committee attended their fifth annual planning retreat at Mount Shepherd Retreat Center June 15-16. The sessions were presided over by Geraldine Rash White '42, president of The Alumni Association.

The committee was given an intensive analysis of the statistics of the 1978-79 Annual Alumni Fund by Robert E. Williams '59, Director of Alumni Affairs. (Statistics will appear in November issue of HIGHPOINTS.) A goal of \$120,000 from 2,000 Alumni contributors to the 1979-80 Annual Fund was approved. On June 1 contributors to the

Annual Fund began receiving an active membership card with rights and privileges as provided by the Alumni Association's constitution.

Dr. Murphy M. Osborne '58, Vice President for Student Affairs gave the committee a State of the College update. He related many innovative programs of the College. He warned against apathy of alumni toward the College and strongly urged continued support of each alumnus. His comments reflected the financial, physical and religious picture of the College. Osborne told the committee that fall enrollment should reflect a total of over 400 *new* students.

Miss Sallie G. McLarty, Director of Alumni Affairs at Greensboro College, was a resource person for a session on Alumni Field Work and Chapters. (See story on HPC Nights this fall.) The committee elected Foil V. Charles '50, Greensboro, as National Chairman for the 1979-80 Annual Fund and Henry I. and Ruth May Ridenhour '42, Pilot Mountain, as Co-Chairmen for the Advanced Giving phase of the Fund. Mrs. White appointed the following to serve on the Constitution Study Committee: Geraldine R. White '42, Lyles H. Kearns '50, James A. Stanley '55, Donald M. Dwiggins '64, Robert D. Kornegay '64, Eleanor C. Young '32, M. Louise Adams '29, and Robert E. Williams '59. Revisions to the constitution will be mailed to alumni for approval by ballot in the early spring of 1980.

Area alumni phonothon successful

THE FIRST HIGH POINT COLLEGE Alumni Phonothon was held to Alumni in the High Point, Jamestown, Archdale, Trinity, and Thomasville area on May 15 and 17.

27 volunteers, who represented Alumni, faculty, students, and faculty wives, participated in making 370 calls. 207 (56%) of the calls were completed. The two nights of calling resulted with 83 Alumni pledging specific dollar amounts and 73 Alumni pledges were made with no dollar amount. During the two nights a total of \$6,803 were pledged. As of July 1, 106 (68%) pledges had been paid with a total of \$7,439.

Plans are being made for a phonothon during the spring of 1980 to a larger geographical area than covered this year.

Panthers end season with awards

HIGH POINT WON the Joby Hawn Cup for the fourth straight year. Conference titles in volleyball, men and women's basketball, women's tennis and baseball gave Panthers the points to retain the Cup. Symbolic of athletic supremacy in the Carolinas Conference, the award has never been won by another school.

Post-season play saw good work by the tennis teams. The women finished fifth in the Southern Region II tourney after winning the third straight conference title.

The men, represented by Jeff Apperson and Willem deGroot as District 26 doubles champions, won enough matches in Kansas City for High Point to finish 16th in the nation. DeGroot, named All-American, went to the quarter-finals of the singles before being beaten.

Patterson discusses Austria trip

DR. ALAN PATTERSON, head of the physical education, health and recreation department, was selected by Rotary International to join an Austrian Study Group for two weeks in the country behind the Iron Curtain.

Shortly after his return, he said the group had first-hand opportunity to learn about and understand Austrian people and culture.

Austrians, he reported, believe America should oppose Communism in any way possible, overt or covert; they do not understand how the United States can be so concerned with human rights and self-determination in third world countries while seeming to ignore Communism in Europe.

Patterson noted that teachers and professors are more respected, less criticized, and less involved in discipline problems than their American counterparts. Education, he reported is among the highest-paying professions in Austria.

The group stayed in Austrian homes, visited weddings, cultural and sports events, churches, monasteries, and various dinners, and had ample opportunity to explain the American system and philosophies to Austrians.

He also said, when the trip was over, that he had never appreciated the United States more nor been more pleased to be a citizen.

Continuing education offers degree programs at night

AFTER A YEAR OF OPERATION, the Continuing Adult Education program of the College continues to serve a real need. Director of the program is Shirley Y. Rawley.

The typical student in the program is past the age of 25, had a year or two of college several years ago, but had to drop out for employment or to assume other responsibilities. After a lapse of several years, and now employed full-time, the student is seeking a degree.

After a recent announcement of dean's list students in the program, Dr. Earl Crow, who teaches a course, said that all the students were highly motivated and conscientious. "And

the thing that frightens me most," he said, "is that these students would have missed a college education but for this program."

By taking two courses every 8-week term, a student can expect to earn a degree in four years or less — with a lot of hard work.

College boosted by grants, gifts

THE COLLEGE and a faculty member have recently received grants from off-campus sources.

The largest was \$46,352 from the Independent College Fund of North Carolina. To be used for current expenses, it represents the College's part of an annual grant from the Fund to 28 member institutions.

The North Carolina Humanities Council awarded \$9,200 to support the Shakespeare and Woman '79 project, a week-long seminar to explore meaning for life.

And Lyman Rickard, instructor of chemistry, won a grant from the Burroughs Wellcome Company for a summer of graduate study at the Florida Institute of Technology.

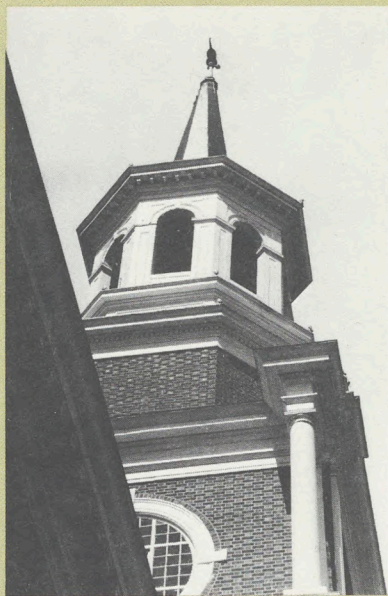

College now owns almost the whole block from Montlieu to Lexington.

Dr. Patton led the College into an investment program involving purchase of the downtown "Magic Block", Eastgate Shopping Center, and other properties. A new president's Home with 55 acres was acquired on Deep River Road, a gift from Mr. and Mrs. Pat Brown.

When Dr. Patton became president September 1, 1959, the endowment was \$1,035,714. As of the end of the fiscal year, May 31, 1979, the endowment had increased to \$5,980,767. In other financial growth the operating income was up to just under \$4 million in 1978 and 1979, from less than one million dollars in 1959. In the same period, total assets have increased from \$3,869,000 to \$16,026,177 as of May 31, 1979.

During Dr. Patton's presidency, the College has instituted numerous innovative academic programs, including the American Humanics Program, the Student Career Intern Program, the Contract Program, the joint program with Florida Institute of Technology, the Continuing Adult Education Program, and several new majors including Gerontology, Accounting, Furniture Marketing, and the Business Administration program in the Earl N. Phillips School of Business.

The College library acquired its 100,000th volume, and plans are being made for the development of a new Learning Center.

The College had a primary need for physical improvement when Dr. Patton took office, and he turned to the task at hand. Under his presidency, the following buildings have been constructed:

The J. E. Millis Hall for men; Yadkin Hall for women; Belk Dormitory for men and women, the Horace E. Haworth Hall of Science; the Holt McPherson Campus Center; the Chas. E. Hayworth Sr. Memorial Chapel, the Infirmary; and a warehouse and maintenance building.

Numerous renovation projects have been completed, and the campus has been improved with additional drives, parking lots, alterations and acquisitions. The campus has been enlarged by purchases of more than 30 acres adjacent to the existing property, so that the

Dr. Wendell M. Patton, B.S., M.S., Ph. D., LL. D., became president of High Point College on September 1, 1959. He held positions with the University of Georgia, Purdue University and Lander College before joining Bruce Payne & Associates, New York, as a senior associate. He was an executive of Shuford Mills, Inc., for a short while until being selected by the Board of Trustees as the fourth president of High Point College.

He is a member of numerous professional societies and honor societies; his publications have appeared in prestigious journals. He has been active in civic and church life in High Point, and he is listed in the leading national biographical directories.

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1978-1979 was a year of growth and progress for High Point College in several important areas, particularly in the area of broadening the services and offerings to the students.

As the College looks forward to the 1980s, more emphasis will be centered on making the benefits of a college education available to a larger segment of the population than recent high school graduates.

Leading the way in innovative approaches to non-traditional learning is the Continuing Adult Education Program. By meeting classes three nights a week in specially devised eight week terms, a student may earn a college degree in under four years. The work is intensive, highly concentrated, and is a strictly no-frills proposition. Classes meet 48 weeks of the year, and the fulltime student takes two courses in each eight-week period. Through this Program the working adult who is unable to attend classes during the daytime may complete the requirements for a bachelor's degree.

One of the professors in the evening classes recently noted that the work done by CAEP students is equal in academic achievement to that done by the "regular" students. He added, however, that were it not for the Continuing Adult Education Program, these people would not have been able to gain a college education.

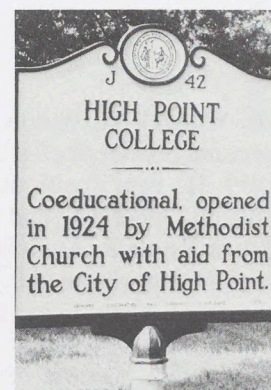
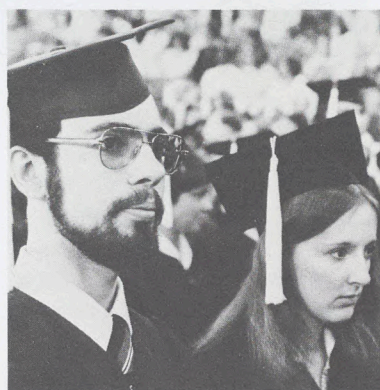
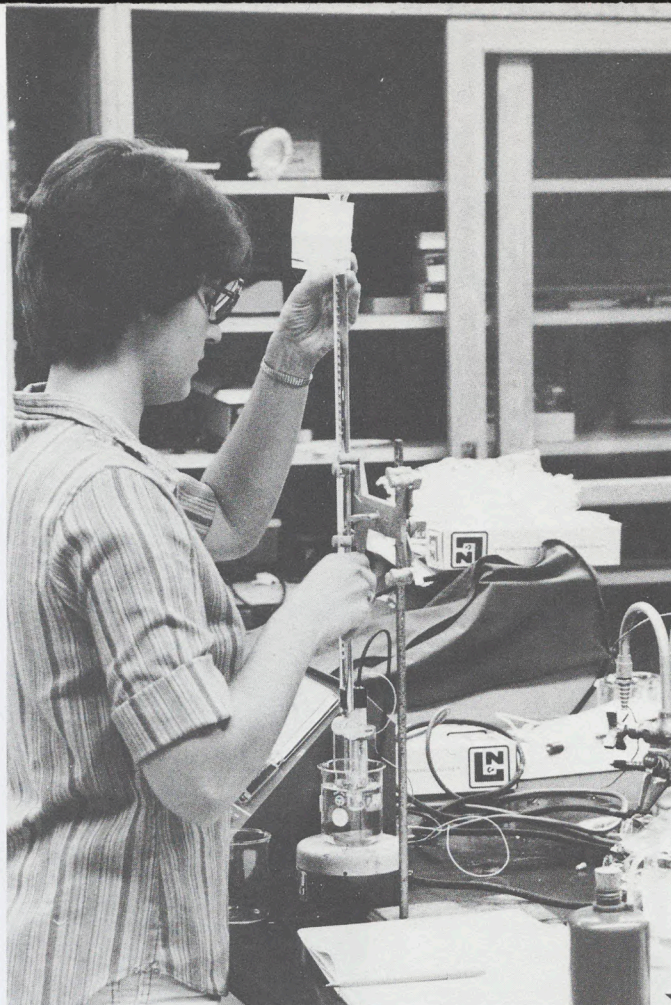
Director of the program is Ms. Shirley Y. Rawley, who is also acting head of the English department for 1979-80.

In addition to the evening program, other approaches to education are being sought in special short-term seminars and classes, and especially in courses that are taught by college faculty members in off-campus locations. To give vice presidential leadership to the non-traditional projects, Dr. Murphy Osborne has been appointed director of special programs.

In an outstanding enlargement of the curriculum offerings, the College inaugurated a Furniture Marketing major. Students interested in the whole area of business and furniture will now be able to graduate with particular expertise in the areas of retailing, management, and marketing as they relate to the functioning of the furniture industry. Meeting a need not filled by furniture programs in other institutions of higher education in the state, the program is the result of long consultations with industry leaders. Their perceptions of career needs for new entrants into the furniture industry were used to formulate the curriculum as well as co-curricular activities.

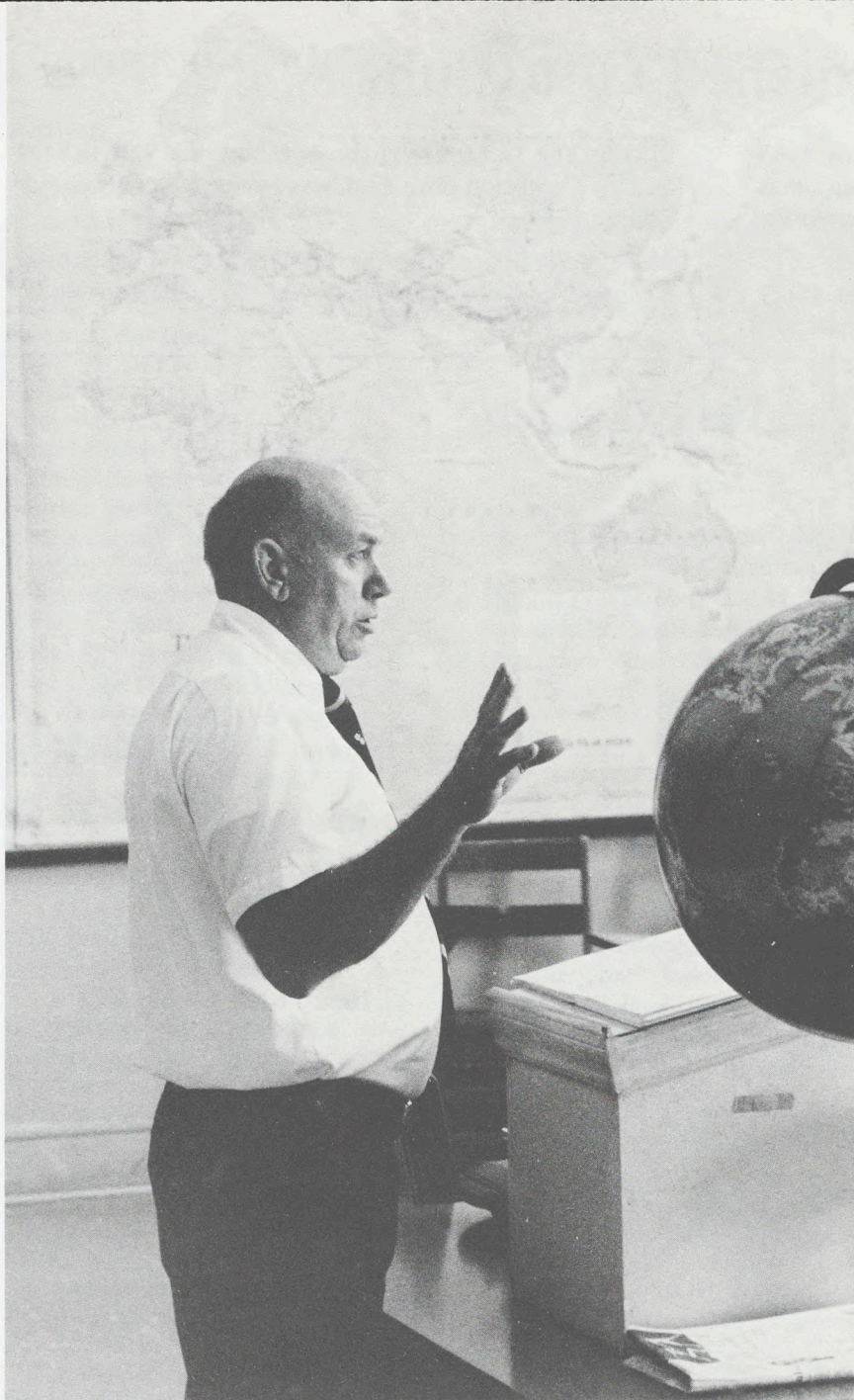

In recognition of another kind of leadership, the College gave honorary doctoral degrees to Bob Timberlake, artist, and Dr. John McWhorter, minister of First United Methodist Church, Gastonia. In both instances, the degrees recognized professional achievement, leadership and service to the broader interests of mankind. McWhorter was the preacher for the baccalaureate service, held in Wesley Memorial United Methodist Church, and Timberlake was the speaker for Commencement on May 6. The College awarded 198 bachelor degrees to



graduating seniors.

Recognition of another kind was won by the athletic teams of the College. The Panthers won conference titles in volleyball, men's and women's basketball, women's tennis, and baseball. In basketball, High Point College was the only school in the country where both the men's and women's teams qualified for their respective national tournaments. The men played in the NAIA tournament in Kansas City; the women, in Fargo, North Dakota. In baseball, the men finished second in the nation in the NAIA World Series.

The Panthers were awarded the Joby Hawn Cup from the Carolinas Conference for the fourth consecutive year. The Cup has never been won by another school.

All observers of the College campus have become conscious of the successful beautification program. The trustees started the project three years ago with a fund created from their own contributions. Last year a veteran horticulturist, Ira Carter, was employed by the College to

continue the beautification. The result has been notable improvements in flowers, plants, and shrubs of all kinds, as well as a general upgrading of existing flora.

Especially gratifying has been the reorganization of the Admissions Department under the direction of Alfred Hassell, who was appointed director in the summer of 1978. With normal turnover of personnel, the Department needed re-assignment of duties and training of new assistant directors. As a result of his excellent performance, the College enrollment has remained at the 1,000-plus mark, well within the number of students needed to operate the College at maximum efficiency.

In summary of the year, the College is deeply appreciative for the continued good will and support of trustees, Board of Visitors, faculty, students, friends, and all the great host who have joined hands and hearts in the educational endeavor that keeps High Point College strong and progressive. ■

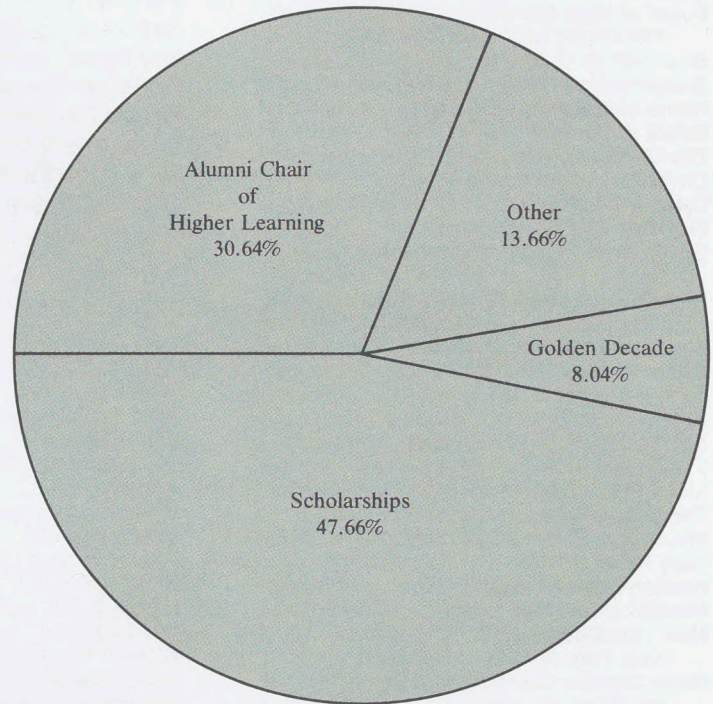

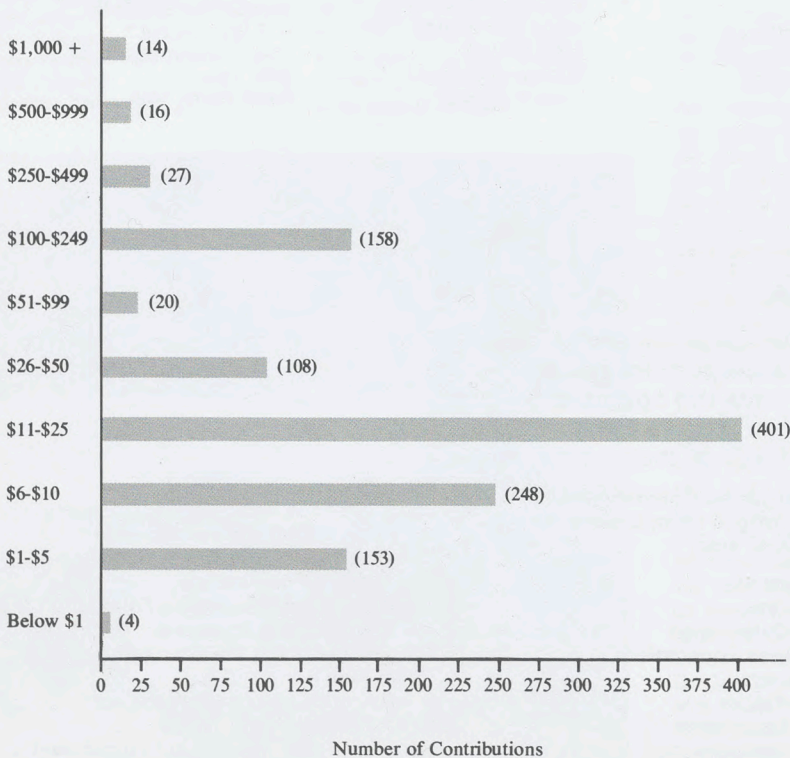
