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Steele Wins 400th Victory

## Miracle Shot Propels Panthers To Victory

Sometime among all the High Point College basketball games since 1924 there surely was one that had more glory. None leaps immediately to mind. A guy had to swish a one-handed, 67-foot buzzer shot just to keep this game going and ensure that he would get top billing on a night filled with stars.

So much to savor from this 99-95, double-overtime victory over Elon. But when those whose blood runs purple and white pass this game down to their grandchildren, they'll tell them about the 67-footer by Panther guard Chris Windlan that wrapped up some history and ultimately, a spot in the NAIA District 26 championship game, all in one miraculous bundle.

Is miraculous too strong a word? See what you think. After 40 thrilling minutes of regulation play had produced nothing more than a deadlock, Elon took charge in the first overtime period and led 91-88 with two seconds remaining. Elon's Brian Branson, who had entered the game with a streak of 37 consecutive free throws to his credit as well as Carolinas Conference Player of the Year honors, stepped to the line with two seconds left for a one-and-one opportunity. Last rites were being delivered to the Panthers at a furious pace.

But Branson allowed the Panthers to rise from their collective death bed. He missed the free throw and the ball bounced to Windlan, who grabbed the rebound, dribbled, and threw up a prayer as the buzzer sounded.

The ball arched across the mid-court line, three-point line and foul line before the answer finally came to Windlan at the other end of the floor. The shot hit all net and drove a stake through the heart of High Point College's worthy challenger.

The Panthers finished off Elon in the second overtime period, benefiting from George Byers' four points and two points each from Roy Smith and David Stubblefield.

"A bunch of us get together during practice, go to different spots on the court — length of the court, half-court, three-quarters — and just throw 'em," said Windlan, a 6-2 junior guard from Brookeville, Md. "I never thought it would come into a game situation. It's like a 'Horse' shot, not a game shot. When (Branson) didn't hit it, I just got it, took it, and threw it at the basket, hoping it would go in."

On most other days, any of the other remarkable facets of this District playoff game that surrounded Windlan's magic would have kept fans humming for days.

This was a game in which Panther coach Jerry Steele picked up his 400th career coaching victory. "It's the first time we've ever hit one from that distance, I think. But I still dislike the three-point shot," said Steele, losing a battle with his mouth

to hide a grin. You don't coach 25 years without learning a sense of humor is vital to your survival in a topsy-turvy profession.

This was a game in which Elon shot better than 70 percent from the field in the first half to claim a 51-41 halftime advantage. The Christians led by as much as 12 points in the second half before High Point College rallied. But Elon had the final possession in regulation and could have won the game but failed to get a shot off in heavy traffic under the basket.

This was a game in which Smith scored 18 points and pulled down 13 rebounds while being double and triple-teamed for much of the game. Hugh Gelston helped Smith shoulder some of the load by scoring 17 points.

This was a game in which Elon threatened to pull off a three-game sweep of the Panthers. Elon had

beaten High Point College twice during the regular season, once in overtime.

But ultimately, this was a game that will be relished and relived for days, months and years to come.

## HPC Outduels Wingate, 67-64 For Tourney Championship

SALISBURY — High Point College may not have the fastest gun in the West, but it proved fastest in the Carolinas Conference Saturday night.

The Panthers, who played the role of a seasoned gunfighter throughout the season, gunned down the final obstacle to the conference championship by holding off Wingate, 67-64.

Roy Smith and Willie Walker each sank two free throws in the last 31 seconds as High Point withstood the upset-minded Bulldogs at Catawba's Goodman Gym to claim its second straight conference tourney title.

The championship is the school's 11th, more than any other conference member, and coach Jerry Steele's sixth career crown. Steele has captured four with the Panthers and two at Guilford College to become the league leader.

Smith led the Panthers with 21 points and nine rebounds. Senior forward Hugh Gelston collected 15 points, and Walker totaled 13. High Point moves to 21-5 overall.

Marvin McKesson paced the Bulldogs, 12-17, and 15 points. Todd

Holden had 14 and Ed Smith 11 as Wingate failed in its cinderella bid.

Unlike last year, Saturday's title did not come as a surprise for High Point. The Panthers entered the season as a heavy favorite, and everyone marched into their meeting with High Point trying to shoot through the league's fastest draw.

After High Point dropped its final opponent, gang leader Smith collected another trophy.

A senior center, Smith captured his second consecutive tournament Most Valuable Player award. Others making the all-tourney team were High Point's Chris Windlan; Marvin Work and Chris Huntley of Wingate; and Lonnie Lee of Catawba.

Perhaps the MVP Saturday should have been Walker, whose two foul shots with 15 seconds left virtually ensured victory.

The Panthers led 63-57 after Holden bagged a three-pointer for the Bulldogs with 38 seconds to play. Smith stepped to the line with 31 seconds left to provide a 65-57 margin. McKesson canned a three-pointer with 25 seconds left before Neil Willoughby collected a follow shot in the lane to pull the Bulldogs

within 65-62 with 18 seconds remaining.

Walker was fouled bringing the ball upcourt three seconds later. He hit both ends of the one-and-one for a 67-62 lead.

Wingate failed to hit any desperation three-point attempts but got a layup with nine seconds to play to close the scoring. After intercepting the ball at High Point's end, Wingate's Troy Ebron walked with one second left to end all doubt for the Panthers.

"It feels real good just to win the tournament," Steele said when asked about winning titles back-to-back. "I would be content if the season ended today. It's what you work all year for. These titles are won back in December and January.

"Wingate struggled early, barely made the conference tournament and came within a breath of cutting down the nets tonight. I think our guys wanted this all season, and they paid the price back in December and

# George Erath Citizen Of Year For 1987

George Erath's fastball is gathering dust in the attic. His curve is hanging up in the back of some dark closet. They're only memories now.

But the man who posted impressive numbers during several minor league baseball seasons — 18 wins one year — is pitching still. It's just a bigger game now, in a higher league.

Erath is pitching, not for strikes, but for better education, health care, community services, opportunities for youth and many other good causes.

The pitcher controls the ballgame. He's *the* man on the field.

High Point is Erath's team. He's on the mound.

"Perhaps more so than any other person in the city at the moment, he's just *the* man around town," said schools Supt. Owen Phillips.

That is recognized in the selection of Erath as High Point's Citizen of the Year for 1987. The award has been given annually since 1966 by the Enterprise, the recipient chosen by the former winners. This time, they reached their decision easily.

"I don't think we've ever had a person of the year who's done more or deserves it more than George Erath," said Fred Alexander, the Citizen of 1985. "I suspect he's involved in 25 things at one time."


Locally, Erath is a member of the boards of trustees at High Point College, High Point Regional Hospital and Presbyterian Home. He is on the boards of directors of the YMCA, the Arts Council, the Chamber of Commerce, the Boy Scouts of America Uwharrie Council, the United Way, the High Point Educational Foundation, the Tom Haggai Foundation and the Environmental Center. He is also an elder at First Presbyterian Church, a member of the advisory council of the Salvation Army Boys and Girls Club, chairman of the Rotary Club's Polio Plus Campaign, an advisor to the Junior League, a member of the school board at Westchester Academy and a director of the CEO Roundtable.

Erath was a member of the High Point Board of Education in 1982-86, resigning when he moved outside the school district, but "he's continued in an unofficial position, kind of an ex-officio board member," said Phillips.

"I think he's at a peak at the moment," Phillips added. "I'm sure he gives as much time to his community as he does to his work."

Erath, who is 60, has been very successful in his work, the veneer business. He is chairman of the boards of Erath Veneer Corp. of Virginia and Euro-American Wood Products, Inc., and president of Erath, Curry, Morrow & Associates.

But it was the business of baseball that brought him to High Point from his native Chicago. In turn, he gave up opportunities in baseball in order to stay here.



Erath played in the Chicago Cubs system during the late '40s and early '50s. During a stint with a Cubs farm team in Lumberton, N.C., he met High Pointer Bob Hartley who advised the hurler to get an education — at High Point College.

He did, though he continued to pitch during the summers, earning a business degree in 1952. He followed that with a master's in business administration from the University of North Carolina at Chapel Hill.

Erath's head was better than his arm. In a 1982 interview, he admitted he "did not have enough God-given equipment to continue as a professional baseball player.

But he didn't give up the game right away. For two years, 1954-55, Erath worked as business manager of the Hi-Toms, the local professional team. He turned down an offer of an office job with the New York Yankees and instead accepted an invitation from Jimmy Mitchell, a Hi-Toms director, to join him in the veneer business. Erath first worked as a salesman for Mitchell, then bought controlling interest in a struggling Virginia company and has done well ever since. Though his business interests take him all over the world, he maintains his home in High Point.

Erath's gift from God wasn't being able to throw a baseball, but to grow a fortune.

"My personal philosophy," Erath once said, "is that God gave every man a talent and he expects him to develop that talent to the fullest. If that talent happens to be making money, then the important thing is what to do with it to benefit others."

That attitude make Erath a hero in Tom Haggai's book.

The 1983 Citizen's just-published volume, "How The Best Is Won," is devoted to the leaders and heroes among America's "most innovative and successful executives."

"The Bible suggests that our own capacity to receive is dependent upon making room by letting our generosity flow out," Haggai wrote.

"In my own city, I watched George Erath for thirty years. From professional athletics, he moved to woods and veneers; and every time I turn around, he and his wife Shirley are making a significant charitable gift or taking a leadership role on a volun-

tary board. George commented:

"I believe that the church teachings and family practices have the greatest bearing on one's attitude toward giving. Recognizing the fact that we are stewards for that which we possess during our time on earth is certainly the teaching of the church. Sharing the rewards of your talents with others is a teaching that came from my parents. In addition, I had the good fortune of having my first financial business partner believe that no one does anything alone and one must always remember those who helped along the way and plow back in these institutions a portion of the rewards that come as a business prospers."

"There isn't any doubt that he's concerned with Christian stewardship — along with privilege goes responsibility — and he's very generous," said Dr. Scott Woodmansee, senior minister at First Presbyterian. "He wants his wealth to service the entire community."

"He works hard and makes money so he can help other people," Alexander said.

"George is one of the most generous men I know, both with his time and his money," said Bill Horney, the 1984 Citizen. "You can tell he knows he isn't going to take it with him, and he doesn't expect to, and he wants to share it."

"He is the most unselfish man with his time and resources of any man I know in this community," said Jim Millis, the 1967 Citizen.

"I don't know of any phase of High Point's life that George Erath hasn't been in it giving something of himself," Bob Amos, the 1975 Citizen, said.

The best pitchers master many different pitches and blend them into their game. That's Erath's strategy for community service, according to Millis.

"I think he gets satisfaction from seeing this community grow in all areas — the arts, the hospital, education — blending together to make High Point great."

But maybe one pitch stands out — education.

"I can't think of anybody in this town who has contributed more to education, kindergarten through higher education, than George Erath," said Phillips.

"I think he'll be remembered most for his devotion and hard work for High Point College," Alexander said.

Erath is heading a campaign to raise \$20 million for the college over the next 10 years. If it is successful, it "will really cement us," said Haggai, a fellow trustee.

The campaign has three aims: to create new buildings, increase scholarships, and strengthen the faculty.

"George wouldn't lead a campaign that didn't have that balance," Haggai said.

In fund-raising, Erath leads by example. He does not do it to have his name carved on a building.

"He could care less about that," Alexander said.

"He's been giving endowments all along," Haggai said. "If he puts his name on anything, it will be a block of endowments rather than a building."

Typically, Erath evades credit for his contributions.

"He's a modest guy in every respect," said Alexander. "He doesn't do anything for recognition."

"He's done more things than people know," Phillips said, giving one example and keeping many others secret: The crossing guards at Fairview couldn't afford to buy their uniform shirts and there was no money in the school's budget. Erath paid for them, 20 to 30 shirts.

"You can't report all the things he does because he gives things many of us don't know about," Haggai said.

"A lot of people are benevolent for self-aggrandizing purposes," Phillips said. "That's the farthest thing from George's mind. George Erath does not help other people for ego purposes or recognition. He's generous well beyond the pocketbook. He's generous from the heart."

Indeed, Erath can set tables for a church supper joyously and give \$100,000 to High Point College humbly. That's his nature, say his friends.

"He doesn't take himself seriously," Haggai said. "He's fully democratic. He is no different today than when I knew him as a young guy having a hard time making it as a salesman for a veneer company."

"He's not a big operator, he's not a bigshot," said Horney. "He reached the point where he wanted to spread himself out and give something back. He's gotten a lot of fun out of having a generous spirit. He's a sweet guy."

There might be more fun ahead as Erath continues to spread out, observers said. Already vice chairman of the N.C. Educational Assistance Authority, a member of the board of visitors of the Lineberger Cancer Research Center at the UNC Medical School, a member of the Gov. Jim Martin's finance committee and a director of the UNC Educational Foundation, Erath might find time for more statewide service, some believe.

"I think George is the kind of person who can play a larger role beyond our community," said Phillips.

Erath can play with the best of them. He's a major league pitcher, after all.

## Father Drinan Delivers Annual Finch Lectures

Father Robert F. Drinan, prominent priest and former Congressman, was the featured speaker for the 28th annual Finch Lectures program at High Point College on March 2 and 3. The lectures were presented in conjunction with Ministers Appreciation Day at the college, which was held on March 2.

Ministers Appreciation Day gives High Point College the opportunity to express its gratitude to United Methodist ministers in the Western North Carolina and North Carolina Conferences.

Drinan spoke to 48 ministers in the Chas. E. Hayworth Sr. Memorial Chapel on "Emerging Theological Issues," from "The Papal Visit: Implications for American Christianity." Then after the Ministers Appreciation Luncheon, Drinan took part in an open panel discussion with the ministers in attendance.

The next day, Drinan addressed a College Community Convocation on "Current Moral Dilemmas," from "The Papal Visit: Implications for American Christianity."

Drinan was ordained a Jesuit priest in 1953. Since then, his career has encompassed many areas. He has distinguished himself as a priest, legislator, law professor and author. Father Drinan now works as a professor of law at the Georgetown University Law Center, specializing in international human rights, constitutional law, civil liberties, legislation and arms control.



Prior to his tenure at Georgetown, Father Drinan was a member of the United States House of Representatives from the Fourth District of Massachusetts from 1971 until 1981 when he bowed to papal prohibition against priests running for political office. While a member of Congress, Father Drinan was chairman of the Subcommittee on Criminal Justice of the House Judiciary Committee. He also served on House committees on the Judiciary, Internal Security, Government Operations and House Select Committee on Aging.

## 300 Participate In Career Alumni Day

## Aspire Campaign Totals Nearly \$4.2 Million

The Aspire campaign for High Point College, which was announced on November 2, has resulted in \$925,716 in gifts being made to the College during this fiscal year.

Gifts and pledges for the entire campaign period, which began June 1, 1986, now total approximately \$4.2

million. The goal for the campaign's first phase, which ends May 31, 1991, is \$10 million. All contributions made to High Point College during this period, including unrestricted gifts, count toward the goal. The College is also continuing to accept pledges.

The Aspire campaign will provide funds for capital, programmatic, and special needs identified by the College. Specific projects include the new men's residence hall, the Winston-Salem continuing adult education campus, the proposed athletic complex, the proposed fine arts center, renovations for Roberts and Woman's Halls, library holdings, computer equipment, endowed scholarships, funds for faculty development, and support for the Honors Program.



## High Point College Alumni Association Proposal For A Revised Constitution

After a year of careful review, the Executive Committee of the High Point College Alumni Association has proposed a revised Constitution for the Association. All alumni are asked to read the document and vote either "yes" or "no" by marking the ballot provided on page five.

### ARTICLE I — NAME AND PURPOSE

- Section 1 — Name: The name of this organization is the High Point College Alumni Association.  
 Section 2 — Purposes: The purposes of the Association are to promote the interests of High Point College and to establish mutually beneficial relations between the College and its Alumni.

### ARTICLE II — MEMBERSHIP/ELIGIBILITY

- Section 1 — Regular Members: Any former student of High Point College who completed an academic year prior to 1980 or who has graduated from the College since 1980 is a regular member of the Association. Those who have attended since 1980 but have not graduated are eligible for associate membership.  
 Section 2 — Associate Members: Associate membership in the Association will be granted to members of the High Point College faculty, staff, administration, and to others who demonstrate an active interest in High Point College. An associate member will be sent mailings and will receive services, programs, and other benefits available to regular Alumni members of the Association.  
 Section 3 — Honorary Members: Upon the recommendation of the Executive Committee at the Annual Meeting of the Association, honorary membership may be granted to any person who has made significant contributions of service.

### ARTICLE III — PRIVILEGES OF MEMBERS

- Section 1 — All members will have the right to vote at all meetings of the Association and will be sent the publications of the Association and notices of all general meetings held under the auspices of the Association.  
 Section 2 — Members making financial contributions to High Point College will be given special recognition. For the purposes of recording gifts, the fiscal year of the Association will coincide with the fiscal year of the College.

### ARTICLE IV — MANAGEMENT AND DUTIES OF OFFICE

- Section 1 — Management: The management of the Association is vested in the Executive Committee comprised of the President, the First Vice President, the Second Vice President, Recording Secretary, Director of Alumni Affairs, presidents of established alumni chapters, Alumni Giving Chairman, the Immediate Past President, six members elected at large, and, as non-voting members, the President of the Student Government Association and the President of the Senior Class. Past presidents of the Association will be ex-officio members of the Executive Committee. All officers will be graduates of High Point College. The acts of this committee are subject to review by the Association at its annual meeting.  
 Section 2 — Duties of Office:  
 a. President: The President chairs all meetings of the Association. The President appoints all committees not otherwise provided for and acts as the general director of all affairs of the Association. The President will have served as a member of the Executive Committee prior to election as President.  
 b. First Vice President: The First Vice President will assume the office of President if that office becomes vacant. The First Vice President will perform other duties the President of the Association assigns.  
 c. Second Vice President: The Second Vice President will serve as historian for the Association. The Second Vice President will perform other duties the President of the Association assigns.  
 d. The Recording Secretary will keep accurate records of the proceedings of all meetings of the Executive Committee and will perform such other duties as the office requires. The recording secretary will give to the President and the Director of Alumni Affairs a copy of the minutes of each meeting.  
 Section 3 — The Director of Alumni Affairs will be an employee of High Point College and will be directly responsible to the Vice President for Institutional Advancement. The Director will promote beneficial programs and interests for the continued life of the Association and its constituency.

### ARTICLE V — ELECTIONS

- Section 1 — Nominations: The Nominating Committee will nominate a slate of officers and candidates for members-at-large of the Executive Committee. The ballot will be mailed to the members of the Association at least 30 days before the annual meeting.  
 Section 2 — The officers will be elected by ballot by the members of the Association. They will serve a two-year term or until their successors are duly elected. The President will not serve for more than four consecutive years. Write-in votes will be permitted.

- Section 3 — Executive Committee: Two members-at-large of the Executive Committee will be elected annually, each for a term of three years. They will be elected by ballot in the same manner as the officers.  
 Section 4 — The tabulated results of the ballots returned will be reported at the annual meeting and those receiving the majority of the votes cast will be declared elected at the annual meeting and assume office at the close of that session.  
 Section 5 — The Alumni Giving Chairman will be appointed by the Executive Committee during the first meeting after the beginning of the fiscal year.  
 Section 6 — A vacancy in an office or in an at-large position of the Executive Committee will be filled by a two-thirds vote of the Executive Committee.

### ARTICLE VI — COMMITTEES

- Section 1 — Nominating Committee: Nominations for officers and committee members-at-large will be made by a Nominating Committee which will consist of three persons. This committee will be appointed by the President.  
 Section 2 — The President will appoint these standing committees, with each having a member of the Executive Committee as a chairman: (1) Chapters, (2) Alumni-Student Relations, (3) Homecoming, (4) Alumni Giving, (5) Awards, and (6) Scholarship. Other standing committees may be ordered by action taken at the annual meeting.  
 Section 3 — Duties of Committees:  
 (1) Chapters: To organize and promote the interest of the Association through the Chapters.  
 (2) Alumni-Student Relations: To instill into the students an appreciation of the College and their education opportunities at High Point College, and to direct the Association's efforts in receiving new members of the Association.  
 (3) Homecoming: To work with the Director of Alumni Affairs in planning for and executing the Homecoming observance at High Point College.  
 (4) Alumni Giving: To promote the program of the Association in securing funds for the College such as endowments, scholarships, buildings, etcetera.  
 (5) Awards: To select recipients of any awards given by the Association, including the Alumnus of the Year.  
 (6) Scholarship: To select recipients of any scholarship funds awarded by the Association or assigned to the Association for distribution.

### ARTICLE VII — MEETINGS AND ATTENDANCE

- Section 1 — Annual Meeting: The Annual Meeting of the Association will be held during the spring of the academic year. The call for this meeting will be issued with the ballots at least 30 days prior to the meeting. All officers and standing committees and such special committees as directed may make reports to this meeting.  
 Section 2 — Special Meetings: A special meeting of the Association may be held on request of the Executive Committee, or by a petition of 25 members of the Association, after first giving at least 10 days notice of the meeting. Only business stated in the call for the special meeting will be considered.  
 Section 3 — The Executive Committee will meet at least four times a year. At least a five-day written notice will be given for any meeting. The first meeting immediately after the start of the fiscal year will be designated as the organizational meeting.  
 Section 4 — An officer or an at-large member of the Executive Committee who is absent from two consecutive regular meetings of the board may be deemed to have resigned membership on the board and is not eligible for re-election within a year following the resignation. The unexpired term of the vacant position will be filled by a two-thirds vote of the Executive Committee.  
 Section 5 — Quorum: At any meeting of the Association regularly and properly called, those present will constitute a quorum. The members present of the Executive Committee will constitute a quorum.

### ARTICLE VIII — CHAPTERS

- Section 1 — Members of the High Point College Alumni Association may form chapters of the Association by geographical designation.  
 Section 2 — Chapters will have their own constitution and/or bylaws subject to the constitution of the High Point College Alumni Association.  
 Section 3 — Chapters will not become incorporated bodies.

### ARTICLE IX — REVISIONS

- Section 1 — Amendments: This constitution may be amended by two-thirds vote of the members present at the Annual Meeting provided that the substance of the proposed amendment(s) of the Constitution has (have) been submitted with the call of the meeting.  
 Section 2 — *Robert's Rules of Order (Newly Revised)* will govern the meetings.  
 Section 3 — This Constitution will be revised by the Executive Committee every five years.

# HPC Women: That National Title

It happened just 10 years ago. For High Point College alumni, the school's followers and those involved, it remains a unique achievement they all regard with pride. It has weathered the 10-year span.

It is High Point's only national championship.

On March 24, 1978, the High Point College women's basketball team defeated South Carolina State for the Association of Intercollegiate Athletics for Women (AIAW) National Championship. The 92-88 overtime victory, in the title contest held at Francis Marion College in Florence, S.C., crowned the Panthers basketball queens for a year.

The championship season and story stands as a tribute to a remarkable team performance.

"It's probably more exciting now looking back at it than it was when it happened," said Wanda Briley, head coach of the team. "It was my first year as a head coach, and everything is exciting when you're a first-year coach."

The season wasn't supposed to end in exciting fashion, though. It began with plenty of optimism, following seasons of 24-1 and 29-2. But a heavy dose of pessimism crept into the picture by midseason. Then came the fairy-tale finish — 20 consecutive wins and the national crown.

"Five players were dismissed because of academic or discipline problems before the Christmas break," Briley recalled. "But during the second half of the season, the team really pulled together ... Watching them come together was more exciting than winning the championship."

"Marie Riley and Germaine McAuley might have been at the center of that," she said of the team's turnaround. "A lot of it was simply a love of the game; they all loved to play basketball. But some of it was probably because they knew I wouldn't put up with anything after the dismissals."

Most people remember the team's tremendous turnaround. And most everyone remembers sharpshooting forward Riley, a native of Seldin, N.Y., and teammate Ethel White, the guard from Greensboro. Both earned all-America status for the 1977-78 season. But Briley remembers other names as well from the magical season.

"I remember Germaine McAuley ran the point for us from her center position," Briley said. "And Robyn Cooper played an important role. She had not started much before that season. But she stepped right in and started where she had not before."

Who would have guessed such surprising performances were in store? No one would have in January, when the Panthers fell to 10-8 after a 75-71 loss to Western Carolina. Lack of team unity plagued the squad for weeks before the loss.

But for whatever reasons, High Point bonded together after the four-point defeat, winning its final eight regular-season games and rolling into the playoffs.

The Panthers defeated Lenoir-Rhyne, avenged their loss to WCU and downed Mars Hill en route to capturing the North Carolina AIAW Division II title. They moved on to defeat Guilford, Atlantic Christian and Pfeiffer to claim the Carolinas Conference tournament championship.

The Southern Region II tourney at Bridgewater, Va., followed. High Point routed Bridgewater College, defeated Kentucky State by nine and faced S.C. State in the first of their two battles.

The Panthers gained a 95-84 win on the strength of 43 free throws. Riley, White, McAuley and Vickie McLean all scored more than 20 points to pace the attack.

From there, it was on to the nationals at Francis Marion.

A blowout of Eastern New Mexico (104-65) set the stage for the national quarterfinal battle with William Penn College of Iowa. Reserve center Sylvia Chambers, a Greensboro native, led the Panthers with 12 points and 13 key rebounds in a narrow 66-65 win.

After that escape, High Point battered Berry College, the 1976 national champion, 105-77 to earn a berth in the title game. Then came earlier foe S.C. State, which enjoyed a virtual home-court advantage for the championship encounter.

"When I first looked up at the scoreboard and saw it was 12-0, I didn't think we were going to win,"

Briley recalled of the early deficit in the championship battle. "I was more nervous than the players: I had never coached in a championship game. But I had confidence in our players."

The Panthers proved that confidence true. They bounced back, took a 23-22 lead and stretched it to 35-27 before settling on a 39-33 half-time edge.

A State rally wiped out an eight-point Panther lead midway through the second half and set the stage for the dramatic finish. White, whose contributions are often overlooked according to Briley, stole the ball at midcourt and tied the contest 73-73 on a layup with 1:14 remaining. Another White steal and layup, and free throws by White and Riley put High Point up 77-75 with time running out.

But State tapped in a missed foul shot with six seconds left to tie the game at 77-77.

On to overtime.

There, Riley's 13 straight points boosted High Point to a 90-81 lead. White nailed two free throws with seven seconds left to quell a State rally and seal the championship.

Riley, who scored a school-record 41 points in the final, won tournament Most Valuable Player honors and the National Player of the Year award. White scored 20 in the final and made the all-America team along with Riley.

Ten years later, the players have dispersed and chosen different lives. But chances are they all remember the 1977-78 season, when they all pulled together for a championship. It was a long and remarkable road.

"I feel proud for the school," said Briley, who went on to coach at Wake Forest and now works for Federal

Express in Winston-Salem. "It doesn't matter who coached or who played. The championship brought attention to the community. And because the community can be proud of it, that makes me proud."

# Humanics Students Receive Unique Education

Let's say you work with the Open Door Shelter. You help feed the homeless who wander in off the street and provide them with a warm place to sleep overnight. Some would call this an act of unselfishness.

Or let's say you work with United Way and set up a campaign. You raise \$1,232, more than double the amount ever raised on a college campus by students. Some would call this exercise charitable.

Almost anybody would call these deeds generous. But 47 students at High Point College take it a step further. They call it an education.

Through the American Humanics program at High Point College, these students get a first-hand look at non-profit organizations. They donate several hours a week away from the campus, away from the classroom working with people in various non-profit organizations.

They take underprivileged kids to the circus. They raise funds for High Point College through the annual Alumni Phonathon. They work with the YMCA. They work with the Salvation Army's Boys and Girls Clubs. W. Patrick Haun, director of the American Humanics program at High Point College, says local agencies contact him almost daily about getting his students involved in a project.

Some of these students will eventually devote their whole lives to the

non-profit field. Others will use their experiences to enhance careers in contrasting vocations.

All, however, will share one common trait-knowledge that no book or professor can adequately convey.

"I've always had a view of society through my parents," said Gretchen Foard, a History and Political Science major from Salisbury, Maryland. "But my experiences in the American Humanics program have changed my viewpoint by allowing me to deal directly with society myself. You get to see the complete spectrum of our society from up close."

"Participating in the American Humanics program has made me realize that there's good to be found in everyone," said Becky Wiley, a Human Relations major from Baltimore. "Some of the people I have come in contact with may be abusers or have drug addictions, but that doesn't mean they're not human beings. I have flaws too, but that doesn't mean I want to be completely cut off from society."

These words are sweet music to the ears of Haun, who has directed the American Humanics program at High Point College for the past four years while also serving as a professor of Human Relations at the school.

"There's a metamorphosis that takes place with students who enter this program and stick with it," said

Haun. "I see a maturity level that is tied to a deep sense of responsibility. That's the excitement of the program — to be here and watch the kids grow emotionally as well as intellectually."

"In today's informational society, you can't go a day without hearing about somebody being deprived. Through many of the non-profit agencies our students work for, they get to see the hurt, rejection and pain that many people feel. The one common thread among the American Humanics students is a yearning to help someone else."

This help began in 1948 when the American Humanics organization was formed to provide a college-level education for students wishing to enter America's youth and human service agencies. Eleven nationally identifiable youth and human service agencies in the voluntary sector recognize American Humanics and seek its graduates for professional positions: American Red Cross Youth Program, Big Brothers/Big Sisters of America, Boys Clubs of America, Boy Scouts of America, Camp Fire, Inc., 4-H, Girls Clubs of America, Girl Scouts of the USA, Junior Achievement, YMCA and YWCA.

This fact is not lost upon Brett Carter, a Human Relations major from High Point who has worked with the Boys and Girls Clubs in High Point as well as the United Way.

"In this program, you have a chance to meet a lot of key professionals in the field you want to work in," said Carter. "Soon, I will have graduated from college. Big deal, employers say. What kind of experience do you have? That's where American Humanics comes in. When it comes time to call on these professionals for a job, they will know who I am."

Only 15 colleges and universities in the United States are affiliated with the American Humanics program. High Point College was the fourth institution to join forces with the organization in 1965. Some of the other schools that are affiliated with American Humanics include Arizona State, Pace University, Pepperdine, Texas A&M, University of Illinois at Chicago, University of the Pacific and the University of Missouri-Columbia.

At High Point College, American Humanics is situated in the Department of Behavioral Sciences and Human Services. It plays an integral part of the college's academic program by providing an opportunity for people majoring in Human Relations, Psychology and Sociology or minoring in Social Work to obtain hands-on experience through working with people in numerous community-oriented projects while earning their degrees.

The students, however, are not the only ones who enjoy benefits from the program, according to Wayne Drumheller, who is Campaign Director for United Way of High Point.

"The American Humanics students doubled their results from the campus-wide campaign they held a year ago," said Drumheller. "To my knowledge, no student group has ever conducted a United Way college campus campaign just for the students. They were structured just like we are, from the chairman all the way down the line. They're a unique group."

"I was very impressed with their sincerity. And they're such an enthusiastic group. Our volunteer adults learned a lot from them because of their enthusiasm and their ability to stick to the project until the end."

And one doesn't have to major in a related field of study to gain something from the program. Kevin Ilaraza is a Business major from Red Bank, New Jersey, who believes the program is right for him as well.

"I want to be in the business field, but that doesn't mean I won't be dealing with people and their problems," said Ilaraza. "There are many different situations and different people you're going to encounter in the business world. You'll be more comfortable with these situations if you have encountered similar circumstances before. I can use this kind of experience as much as anything else directly related to my field."

January so they could be here tonight."

The Panthers had to work plenty in the second half against the Bulldogs.

High Point appeared ready to blow the contest open when David Stubblefield hit a turnaround jumper at the 11:52 mark to give it a 43-32 advantage. But Wingate answered with an 8-0 run to close to within 43-40.

After the teams traded buckets, Windlan canned a three-pointer and Walker hit a powerful driving layup and foul shot for his three-point play with 6:05 left. High Point led 53-45.

Another trading session ensued before Gelston hit three free throws in two bonus opportunities for a 62-54 lead with 1:21 left.

George Byers' free throw at the :47 mark came before Wingate's three-

point bombs. Smith and Walker then clinched it at the line.

Wingate coach Steve Hudson, who guided his team to the brink of a title, showed obvious disappointment.

"We played well tonight but we didn't shoot well," he said. "That was the key in a nutshell. We missed some easy shots, inside shots we should've made."

"We had had a disappointing season when we entered the tournament. You don't like to come in down six runs in the bottom of the ninth inning. But that's what we did. Tonight, we scored five in the last of the ninth and lost 6-5."

The Panthers couldn't shake Wingate during the first half. High Point opened leads of 13-7 and 21-15 before it went cold from the field. The Panthers led 21-15 at the 7:32 mark but managed only three points during the next 6:09.

Windlan's three-pointer with 3:41 left provided High Point's only scoring during the stretch.

Wingate seized the opportunity and trimmed the deficit. Anthony Houston's rebound layup with two seconds remaining forced a 28-28 tie at the half.

Despite building seemingly strong leads during the final 20 minutes, High Point needed the late heroics to seal the title.

The Panthers also sealed a District 26 playoff berth for Belmont Abbey. Belmont Abbey, which finished fourth in the district regular season race, needed a Panther win to make the four-team district field. Wingate would have locked up the fourth berth with a win.

Belmont-Abbey travels to Gardner-Webb for Tuesday night's district semifinal.

High Point hosts Elon at 8 p.m. Tuesday in the other semifinal matchup. It will be the third meeting this season between the league's top two teams. Elon claimed two wins over the Panthers during the regular season.

The meeting provides another challenge for the conference's fastest draw.

## HPC Coach Has Reason For Holiday Joy

Bob Davidson has plenty to be thankful for this holiday season.

It could have turned out plenty different.

Davidson, track coach at High Point College, suffered a mild heart attack in late October. But it was strong enough to require single-bypass surgery (the simplest of bypass operations) and keep Davidson from his teaching and assorted other duties at the school.

That is until last week, when Davidson returned to his office full-time to catch up on paperwork and prepare for the coming track season, which begins in early February.

Davidson is glad to be back. But he knows the situation could have been very different.

"I feel lucky," Davidson said. "You're darn right, I feel lucky. I guess in the first place you think, 'This can't happen to me.' It always happens to the other guy."

"In my case, lots of people said, 'We sure couldn't believe it when we heard you had a heart attack. Your weight is under control. You don't smoke. We know you're fussy about your diet.'"

"Well, I couldn't believe it either." But it did happen.

Davidson was in Charlotte attending a Carolinas Conference basketball officials meeting on Oct. 24 when, late on that Saturday afternoon, chest pains he had noticed during the prior week increased in intensity.

"I was concerned about the pains, but I didn't get around to doing anything about them," Davidson said. "That was a mistake. I did get around to it, but I could have acted about a week earlier. In fact, the Friday prior to this little heart attack, I made an appointment with a cardiologist in High Point for the Monday following the officials' meeting. But I never made it to that appointment."

Davidson had chest pains during the Saturday meeting but would not leave early. After the meeting concluded, he drove himself to a Charlotte hotel, where the desk clerk telephoned the hospital. By this time, the pains were "intense."

Tests were conducted and doctors, who were initially not sure Davidson had suffered an attack, were gradually convinced an attack had occurred.

"I even have some questions in my mind sometimes as to whether I actually had a heart attack or not," Davidson said. "But they say 'Yes, you did have a minor heart attack.'"

And it was a result of a total blockage in one coronary artery. After an initial treatment failed, the single-bypass surgery was left as an option on Oct. 30.

Davidson was hospitalized in Charlotte for 13 days, leaving in early November. He's been recuperating at



home since, watching his diet and walking daily.

"I feel like I'm about all the way back," he said.

"It was a shock," he said looking back. "But I feel fortunate ... when the bypass was successful I felt very fortunate."

Davidson is also grateful for the support he received during his recovery.

"The college has been wonderful," he said. "The faculty and staff have supported me 100 percent. And the physical education and athletic staffs have really gone the extra mile. You really appreciate your friends when you find you need them. They've really come to my side, and I appreciate that."

Fellow instructors filled in to prevent Davidson from falling too far behind in his teaching duties. He remains slightly behind in recruiting for the track team, but has caught up for the most part.

He said he fully intends to pick up where he left off, continuing his basketball officiating (among other things) after consulting his doctors.

"Supposedly, I'll be as active as I was prior to the bypass. It was just a re-routing of the circulation."

Davidson is just grateful for the friends who were there for him.

And now, thanks to some tinkering by the medical experts, he'll be there for his friends for some time to come.

## Herman Coble, Sr., First Graduate, Dies

Herman Earl Coble, Sr. '27, the first person to receive a diploma from High Point College, died January 16, 1988. He is survived by his wife, Lelia Wagoner Coble, and several nieces and nephews.

Herman was born in Alamance County in 1902. As his obituary in the *High Point Enterprise* noted, "he was a pioneer in the development of High Point College, starting work there as carpenter and handyman in order to earn money for his own education." After graduating at the top of his class, he went on to receive a master's degree from UNC-Chapel Hill. He returned to the College in 1945 to teach and served on the faculty for the next 27 years. For a number of years, he also managed the bookstore, which led many to say that he knew more students than any other faculty member.

Herman was an active member of the Alumni Association throughout his life. He was president of the Association in the years 1931-32 and, in 1976, he and Lelia were jointly honored with the highest award presented by the Association, "Alumnus of the Year."

The family has requested that memorials be made either to the Herman Coble Jr. Scholarship Fund at High Point College or to First United Methodist Church in High Point, where Herman, Sr., was an active member.

Because of his extraordinary love for High Point College and his outstanding service to the College, the Alumni Association Executive Committee has passed a resolution honoring his memory and recognizing his achievements. The resolution reads:

Whereas, Herman Earl Coble, Sr., graduated from High Point College in 1927; and

Whereas, Herman Coble received the first degree awarded by the College; and

Whereas, he returned to the College as a member of the faculty in 1945 and gave 27 years of devoted service as a teacher, staff member, and friend to many; and,

Whereas, he served the Alumni Association with distinction, giving generously of his time, talent, and resources to the betterment of High Point College, her graduates and friends; and

Whereas, Herman Earl Coble, Sr., expressed his love for the College in many ways over the years, until his death on January 15, 1988;

Now therefore, be it resolved that the Executive Committee of the High Point College Alumni Association honors the memory of Herman Earl Coble, Sr., and expresses sympathy to his wife Lelia Wagoner Coble '28, along with the deepest gratitude to her and Herman for sharing their lives with the College.

This resolution is authorized the thirteenth day of February in the year nineteen hundred eighty-eight.

## Woodruff Stresses Equality To HPC Graduates

A year of milestones at High Point College was appropriately capped when television journalist Judy Woodruff addressed 293 graduating seniors at the College's 62nd commencement on Sunday, May 7, marking the College's largest ever graduating class.

Woodruff, chief Washington correspondent for the MacNeil/Lehrer NewsHour on PBS and former White House correspondent for NBC News, spoke before an overflow crowd in excess of 2,500 family members and friends gathered on the front lawn of the College for the ceremony. She spoke on women's increased participation in society.

"Look upon the greater participation of women in our society as an opportunity, as a challenge," Woodruff told the male graduates. "The society that your parents knew will bear little resemblance to the one you will experience.


"The most important thing to remember is that we are all better off with more choices," Woodruff said. "None of us should feel bound any longer to follow a particular pattern in life."

## Davis Appointed Dean Of The College



On recommendation of the Dean Search Committee, Dr. E. Vance Davis, Interim Dean of the College, has been appointed by High Point College President Dr. Jacob C. Martinson, Jr. as Dean of the College.

Dr. Davis, who has been a member of the High Point College faculty since 1973, had served as Interim Dean of the College since August 1.

Dr. Davis was chosen from a field of 150 applicants, according to Dr. Martinson. "After reviewing the qualifications of all the applicants, the Committee interviewed eight candidates," Martinson said. "The Committee carefully evaluated these candidates before unanimously selecting the person who best fit the College's needs.

"I personally could not be more pleased with this selection. Dr. Davis has proven himself to be an excellent administrator who goes about his duties with a comprehensiveness of care."

A native of Waynesville, Dr. Davis earned his Ph.D. degree at Drew University in New Jersey. He received his undergraduate degree from High Point College and his master of divinity degree from Yale University. An ordained United Methodist minister,

Davis has served as Associate Minister and Interim Senior Minister at First United Methodist Church of Asheboro.

At High Point College, Davis has served as chairman of the department of Religion and Philosophy and chairman of the College's Faculty Affairs Committee.

Active in High Point civic affairs, Davis was instrumental in the establishment of Hospice of the Piedmont, which provides care and assistance to terminally ill patients and their families. Davis was the first president of the board when the organization was founded as Hospice at High Point.

"I have been associated with High Point College for 31 years, which gives you a chance to observe an institution and watch it become a part of your heart and soul," said Davis. "In the next 10 years, people will witness some remarkable things taking place at High Point College. I am excited to be a part of it. We have many good things to build upon."

## Young To Receive Honorary Degree

## Adam, Smith Awarded Honorary Degrees By HPC

Louise Adams, who served High Point College for over 50 years, and Herman H. Smith, President of Herman Smith and Associates in High Point and longtime benefactor of the College, were awarded honorary degrees by High Point College during its commencement on Saturday, May 7.

Adams, who received the Doctor of Humane Letters degree, is a native of Randolph County and received her Bachelor of Arts degree in mathematics from High Point College in 1929. She was awarded the Master of Arts degree in mathematics by the University of North Carolina at Chapel Hill in 1930.

In 1933, Adams began an association with High Point College which has spanned over six decades. She served as an associate professor of mathematics until 1969 when she became a full time assistant in the College Affairs Division. Active in the Alumni Association, Adams assisted with the organization of many alumni chapters, including Forsyth and

Alamance counties and the city of Greensboro. In recognition of her dedicated service to the Alumni Association, she was named Alumna of the Year in 1974.

Smith, who was awarded a Doctor of Laws degree, was born on the family farm near Reidsville. He attended the University of North Carolina at Chapel Hill and later took courses at the Eastman School of Business in New York.


Smith came to High Point in 1924 as a shipping clerk for Amos Hosiery Mills. He rose through the executive ranks and eventually co-founded Amos & Smith Hosiery Company. He served there as secretary and treasurer, as well as a member of the board of directors. Later, he became president and treasurer of McEwen Lumber Company, serving until his retirement in 1982.

Smith was named High Point's "Citizen of the Year" for 1980 in recognition of his longtime involvement in civic affairs. His leadership in the YMCA and High Point Memorial Hospital fund drives resulted in new facilities for the two institutions. He is a former president of the United Fund and has been a member of the High Point College Board of Trustees since 1973.

Dr. Jacob C. Martinson, Jr., President of High Point College, in announcing the selection of the degree recipients, said, "These two honorees have made vast contributions to the city of High Point as well as the College. We are honored to recognize them for their citizenship and their generous goodwill.

"Louise has been a part of the fabric of this institution for over 50 years. Her contributions have been incalculable. She has been perhaps our strongest advocate with the Alumni across the years. As far as this College is concerned, there is only one Louise Adams.

"In honoring Herman, we're honoring his wife Louise Smith as well. They are inspiring examples of gracious generosity. We are blessed with the warmth of their personal friendship, which has been shown in hundreds of different ways. It is fitting that the College's library bears their name, since the library is the heart of a campus."



## Slane Teaching Award Presented To Davidson

Robert D. Davidson, associate professor of Physical Education and Health, was presented the Meredith Clark Slane Distinguished Teaching-Service Award during commencement exercises Saturday, May 7, at High Point College.

The Slane Award recognizes outstanding classroom performance, interest in students as expressed through academic advising and sponsorship of student organizations, participation in campus and community activities, and professional growth.


Davidson was described by his nominator in this way: "His record of service to the college, the local community, and the region is equal to, if not superior to, that of any other faculty member. His colleagues and



## HPC Alumni Contribute Record Amount In 1987-88

High Point College alumni contributed over \$526,000, a record amount, to various areas of the college during 1987-88.

The total represented a 43 percent increase over giving during 1986-87, which was the previous record fiscal year. All gifts contributed by alumni during the year counted toward the \$20 million Aspire Campaign goal.

The majority of the support — \$352,541 — was designated for various institutional endowed scholarships, including the General College Scholarship Fund. This fund, which is almost completely funded by alumni gifts through the phonathon, now has a principal balance of \$49,571 after only 18 months. During that time, an additional \$20,000 in direct grants has been disbursed to students. Overall, 14 students have received grants ranging from \$500-\$800 for the 1988-89 academic year.

na Award from the Forsyth County Chapter and was the recipient of the R.J. Reynolds Scholarship for post-graduate studies.

"It was right here that she started her interest in teaching, having majored in education with certification," said Martinson. "And since she came back to us, she has been student oriented as well as a friend of the faculty, staff and alumni. She has served the college over the years with great distinction."

The percentage of alumni contributing to the college rose to 24 percent, giving the college 2,324 alumni donors. The alumni donors total is up 12 percent from a year ago.

Besides scholarship aid, other donations from alumni broke down into the following categories:

Loyalty Fund (Unrestricted) — \$46,769  
 Building Projects — \$12,222  
 Other — \$115,279

"We are very pleased with the way the alumni recognizes and supports the needs of High Point College, particularly in the area of scholarship aid," said Donna J. Burton, Director of Alumni Affairs. "The alumni of this institution are to be commended for helping the college to continue to move forward."

## Capacity Enrollment Anticipated For 1988-89 Academic Year

The past academic year was one of capacity enrollment and 1988-89 promises a full house and even more, according to Jim Schlimmer, Director of Admissions at High Point College.

Last year set a record for student applications at the school. But Schlimmer and his Admissions team has topped that effort by posting a 43 percent increase in applications from a year ago. A freshman class ranging from 420 to 450 students is expected in the fall.

"A better realization of the strengths of High Point College has been a factor in the increased numbers," said Schlimmer. "Increasing our contacts has been a key to the effort as well. We made contact with 700 more seniors this year thanks to having an additional counselor on the staff. We had better execution of our communications program. We had more phone calls, wrote more letters and made more contacts in high school programs across the country. We saw almost 1,500 more students at College Day Programs than we saw in the prior year."

Another part of this success story has been the strengthening of the Presidential Scholarship program for academically gifted students. The financial award has been increased from \$2,000 to \$3,000 and increased contact was made with scholar prospects. As a result of these efforts, a

record number of students (2,400) applied for the program and a record number accepted invitations to be interviewed as a part of the Presidential Scholarship process. After the process was completed, 25 Presidential Scholarships were awarded.

"With the huge quantity of applicants, one would expect some decrease in quality," said Schlimmer. "But it simply didn't happen. We have assembled the best group of scholars in the College's history. The Presidential Scholarship has now become more prestigious and competitive."

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# HPC Freshmen Class Won't Knuckle Under

It isn't surprising to see Jerry Steele sporting a wide grin these days. Steele, High Point college athletic director and basketball coach, has seen the future of the Panther basketball program. And it's a pleasing one.

The Panthers have signed their four top prospects — Jay Witmer, Jerome Adams, Doug Oakford and Terrence Knuckles, who was officially unveiled Tuesday — to enter next season with a strong freshman class.

Together, they are one of Steele's best recruiting classes in years.

Oakford, a 6-8, 225-pound center, will partially fill the gap left in the middle by the graduation of talented pivot man Roy Smith. Oakford averaged 17 points and 13 rebounds per game last year in Rockville, Md.

Steele likes Oakford's passing ability and inside touch, and will likely give him playing time as a freshman.

Adams probably will not see as much playing time as Oakford. He hails from East Wilkes, where he averaged 19 points, 8 rebounds and 5 assists per outing last season. A 6-2 guard, Steele hopes Adams can get his feet wet without pressure next season and contribute significantly during the 1989-90 campaign.

The Panther backcourt appears set for next year with George Byers returning and former N.C. State guard Kenny Drummond joining the program for one year.

Jay Witmer of Apex, will likely require some development. But at 6-8 and 195 pounds, Witmer is another addition to the Panther frontcourt.

But the jewel of the group could well be Knuckles, who could see ex-

tensive playing time if he lives up to advance billing. Knuckles played under former High Point player Jim Price of Yorktown High School, where he averaged 19.5 points and 8 rebounds per game.

Together, the group provides a solid nucleus for Steele to build on. They are gifted athletically. They also are solid academically, so Steele won't have to sweat out each semester worrying whether he will lose them at midseason with grade problems.

The incoming class rivals the large group which entered HPC in the fall of 1977. That class consisted of Bob Hovey, John O'Brian, Scott Richardson and Joey Yow. Hovey and Yow helped lead the team on an 18-game win streak and a berth in the NAIA national tournament in Kansas City during the 1978-79 season. Yow even sank the winning bucket in the 1978

Carolinas conference tournament championship game.

If this class duplicates those feats, Steele will be sporting an even wider grin in a couple of years.

Ricky Proctor, a graduate of Ledford High School and HPC, will join the athletic department as trainer.



## Dateline ... High Point College

**Marcia J. Thompson**, assistant professor of modern foreign languages, has been given a six-week Fulbright grant to study the German social, political and economic structure.

Thompson is one of 25 professors of colleges and universities from across the nation who were selected for the grant. Thompson will conduct her study in Bonn and Berlin, West Germany beginning in June.

**Dr. E. Roy Epperson**, Vice President for Administrative Affairs and professor of chemistry, traveled as chairman of the Reaffirmation Commission of the Southern Association of Colleges and Schools to the Nigerian Baptist Theological Seminary in Ogbomoso, Nigeria, where his six-member team evaluated the results of the school's self-study process.

The trip served as a follow-up to the team's first visit to Nigeria in August, 1986, when the self-study process was initiated. Epperson, who works as a consultant and resource person for the Southern Association, has now completed 25 visits for the commission.

**Dr. Everard H. Smith**, assistant professor of history and political science at High Point College, has been accepted into the 1988 postdoctoral summer program on nuclear weapons and arms control in Cambridge, Massachusetts.

The program will be co-hosted by the Defense and Arms Control Studies Program at the Massachusetts Institute of Technology and the John F. Kennedy School of Government at Harvard. The program will last from June 20 to July 1.

Topics covered will include the physics and effects of nuclear weapons, the evolution of strategic

arsenals and doctrine, the technology and politics of strategic defense, command and control, European security issues, nuclear testing limits, nuclear non-proliferation, arms control theory and practice, and the ethical issues of the nuclear age.

A book by Dr. Edward J. Piacentino, professor of English at High Point College, has been published by University Press of America.

Piacentino's book, entitled T.S. Stribling: Pioneer Realist in Modern Southern Literature, is the first book to focus exclusively on Stribling's major southern novels, published between 1922 and 1934, which taken collectively represent his most important achievement as a writer. The book is published in both hardcover and paperback form.

Dr. Piacentino joined the faculty of High Point College in 1973 after obtaining his Ph.D. in American Lit-

erature from the University of North Carolina at Chapel Hill. In addition to his duties in the English department, Piacentino also serves as Director of the Honors Program at High Point College.

Roy Smith, a 6-8 senior forward at High Point College, was named to the NAIA All-America basketball team (honorable mention).

Smith helped lead High Point to a 22-6 record this year including a second consecutive Carolinas Conference Championship and a berth in the District 26 title game. He averaged 15.8 points per game and 6.3 rebounds per contest while shooting 52% from the floor and 76% from the foul line.

Smith was named to the All-Carolinas Conference team, the All-NAIA District 26 team as well as being voted MVP in the Carolinas Conference Tournament this year.

# HPC Track Squad Wins Twin Titles

PEMBROKE — Chip Shea won the long jump and 120-yard hurdles to lead High Point to the NAIA District 26 and Carolinas Conference men's track championship at Pembroke State.

Shea, who also finished second in the high jump and third in the triple jump, was named the most valuable performer in the field events, along with Lenoir-Rhyne's Randolph Bowers, who won the shot put and discus.

Shea's long jump of 23-9 set a school record.

High Point's Bob Davidson was named coach of the year.

Pembroke State's Jay Jones was named the MVP in the running events. Jones won the 1,500-meter and 5,000-meter runs and finished second in the 800-meters.

High Point scored 122 points to take the team title in the district and 94 points for first place in the conference. Defending champion Pembroke State, which had won both titles the last two years, finished in second place in the district with 72 points and second in the league with 44.

"This was the most significant meet this season," Davidson said. "This is what we wanted."

Other finishers in the district were Lenoir-Rhyne (44 points), Elon (43 points) and Gardner-Webb (18 points).

In the conference, Lenoir-Rhyne took third place (31 points), and Elon finished fourth (27 points).

High Point placed in all 18 events in the combined district and conference meet. Several Panthers placed first in both district and conference.

The HPC 400 relay team finished first in both at 42.3. Members of the team were: Carlton Stallings, David Arnold, Wayne Jones and Lavelle Kinney.

Jones also finished first in the 400 dash and the triple jump. Kinney won the 200 dash; Arnold claimed first in the 400 intermediate hurdles, and John High won the 800 meters.

In addition, the mile relay team won with Kinney, Arnold, High and Jones contributing.

Chris Masterson took first place in the conference in the javelin with a 163-8 toss.

Other Panthers with strong second-place finishes were Carlton Stallings (100 dash), Blain Jiron (discus), Tony Bolden (javelin) and Lee Simiril (5,000 run).

## Late Addition Keyed Panther Track Team

The saying "Better late than never" certainly proved accurate for the High Point College track team this season.

"It was kind of freakish, actually," Bob Davidson, Panther track coach said. "Carlton Stallings couldn't go to our final meet of the season at Athens, Ga., on the 400 meter relay team, and Nat Norris got to go in his place. If it weren't for Nat, we might not have done so well at that meet. And who knows, we might not have been able to go to the nationals, either. We don't know that for sure, but he sure made a difference."

Norris, a late addition to the HPC track team after running around baseball diamonds for four years, helped key the Panthers to their best-ever finish at the NAIA national track meet held at Asuza-Pacific College in California. The team totaled 13 points and placed 16th in a field of 100 schools.

The 400-meter relay team of David Arnold, Norris, Wayne Jones and Lavelle Kinney finished third in the nation with a time of 51.19. The finish guaranteed All-America status for the team. Norris, in the 100 dash, and Arnold, in the 400 intermediate hurdles, earned individual All-America recognition as well.

But Norris almost never got the opportunity to run track for the Panthers. He sprinted in high school, but played only baseball at HPC.

That changed as the '88 track season wound down. Always known for his speed, Norris got his chance when Stallings was unable to compete. With Norris on the squad, it shattered school records and exceeded national qualifying times.

Norris was late. Very late. But better late than ...

"We went out there primarily on the wings of the 400 relay team," Davidson said. "They got us there when they qualified at the Athens meet. And the difference was Nat.

With him, we changed the running order. We made David Arnold the starter after Stallings went out, and Norris went in at No. 2.

"Then, all of a sudden, they started bringing their times down."

Matching national qualifying times allowed the team to enter the four relay runners in separate events, a move which keyed the school's strong finish.

"These kids are pretty good individually in their own right," Davidson said. "Since they were all out there, we decided to enter them in other events as well."

That allowed Jones to compete in the triple jump, Arnold to run the 400 hurdles, Norris to race in the 100 dash and Kinney to try his hand in the 200.

Arnold placed sixth and Norris fifth in their events. Jones and Kinney failed to earn individual awards, settling for the team honor. The team's only female performer, marathoner Frankie Chaplin, failed to qualify.

"Going out there, I felt Jones had the best shot of any of them," Davidson said. "But Norris qualified in the 100, finished second Thursday and Friday, and really seemed like he belonged there. To be perfectly honest, I didn't think he had a prayer. He was only in the 100 because he happened to be out there with the relay team. He had only been with us about two weeks.

"We were very fortunate in the relay. Everything went real smooth. No one dropped a baton, and nobody left early during the race to disqualify us. We worked real hard on handoffs before going out there. And once we got there, the team set a school record of 41.16. I never dreamed they could run so fast. We were a clear-cut third in the relays. We're just tickled pink with the performance."

This was something of a dream team for Davidson and High Point. Roger Phippen was High Point's last All-America in 1972. This year, the Panthers came home with a pair of All-Americans who earned the distinction not once but twice.

"They seemed so confident," Davidson said. "There was no hint of fear. And they scored more points (13) by far than any other High Point team ever had in a national meet.

"If you had asked me if this was the best team I had ever coached prior to the conference and district meet, I would have said it was one of the best. If you asked me after the conference and district meet, where we won by 50 points, I would have said it was awfully close to being the best, because we've had some fine teams over the years.

## Ellenburg Will Coach HPC Women

Joe Ellenburg, athletic director at the University of West Florida, has been named women's head basketball and volleyball coach at High Point College, High Point athletic director Jerry Steele said Thursday.

Ellenburg succeeds Debbie Trogdon, who resigned both posts effective at the conclusion of the 1987-88 school year.

Steele said Ellenburg, who had been at the Pensacola school since 1984, emerged from a field of approximately 30-40 applicants for the job. Ellenburg will also assume teaching duties within the physical education department.

"We talked with several people," Steele said. "We interviewed assistant coaches, head coaches, and high school coaches. We felt there were eight or 10 people at least who were qualified, and that we had an interest in. Fortunately, he was at the top of everyone's list.





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# Q&A

with President Jacob C. Martinson

*Leo Durocher once said, "Nice guys finish last." Well, that cliché certainly doesn't apply to Jake Martinson. Whether he is addressing a large commencement audience or talking to a young student in his office about ways to leave High Point College a better place than he found it, Dr. Martinson communicates with the candor, innovation and integrity that have stamped the office he holds and have captured the imagination of the college community.*

*Martinson became High Point College's sixth president in 1985. Prior to his arrival at High Point College, he had served as President of Brevard College in Brevard, North Carolina for nine years.*

*Listed in Who's Who in America, Martinson holds degrees from Huntingdon College, Duke University and Vanderbilt University and has done postgraduate work at the University of St. Andrews in Scotland and the Institute for Educational Management at Harvard University. His extensive educational background also includes positions as trustee of the Independent College Fund of North Carolina since 1976, member of the Board of Directors of the North Carolina Center for Independent Higher Education, member of the Board of Directors of the North Carolina Association of Independent Colleges and Universities, and 1986-87 Chairman of the North Carolina Friends of Higher Education.*

*Martinson is a dedicated churchman. He serves as an elected board member of the National Association of Schools and Colleges of the United Methodist Church and is an ordained United Methodist minister, having served churches in North Carolina, Florida and as far away as Scotland.*

*He is married to the former Libby Smathers of Rutherfordton and Waynesville, North Carolina. They are the parents of two children, Beth and Kirsten.*

**HIGH POINTS:** You have stated on more than one occasion how important it is for a college to meet the student where he or she is. How do you believe the College is accomplishing this goal?

**MARTINSON:** Obviously, what I mean by that is that we have a responsibility to meet the student where the student is academically. I suppose I have been influenced by John Gardner, former head of Common Cause, when he says that it is no sin to let average as well as brilliant students into college; but it is a sin to let them leave without ever having been challenged. I think we meet the student where the student is and challenge the student whether the student is average or brilliant; that is our charge as educators.

Sometimes it is more of a challenge to meet an average student and challenge him academically, lifting his sights, than it is to take a valedictorian and graduate that valedictorian *summa cum laude*. In my opinion, if we take an average or below average student and graduate him or her *cum laude*, we have done something quite significant. In both cases the student must be challenged. I think High Point College is lifting sights in many ways, not just academically, but morally as well. The accomplishments of a college are determined by what happens to a student after he or she leaves the institution.

**HIGH POINTS:** During your administration the College has experienced record growth in enrollment. Should we expect the trend to continue?

**MARTINSON:** By nature of the situation, we will not have the percentage of record growth we have had,



because we do not have the room, and I don't see High Point College building additional residence halls. As I see it, we want to keep the College filled to capacity with a winsome kind of student, the kind who has potential and will make us proud.

**HIGH POINTS:** What has been the most dramatic change at High Point College during your administration?

**MARTINSON:** I would say the most dramatic change I have seen is the way in which the College views itself. We have here a truly exceptional college and I have observed a change in how we view ourselves and how others view us. The College is becoming of age, we are now just beginning to realize our potential. Watch us over the next ten years!

**HIGH POINTS:** What has been your administration's biggest accomplishment?

**MARTINSON:** You have asked for one, but let me give you more than one. We have kept tuition costs down while at the same time lifting faculty salaries and accomplishing more in the

area of capital improvements. I think that is quite a feat. We have also filled the residence halls while at the same time maintaining our standards. The student profile out of necessity will be higher for our entering class next fall. I am not saying that they will be any better students, I am only saying that the academic profile will be higher. There is a difference, and that difference to me is significant because I think far too much attention is given to scores and GPAs. Long ago the College Board made it clear to me the limitations of SAT scores. SATs just do not measure initiative!

Also, under this administration we have had building going on. We have built a new men's residence hall which was sorely needed, and which is a joy for the students and a beautiful addition. Also, we have started our own campus in Winston-Salem with a new building. We will be adding another building there this spring. Most important to capital improvement, however, has been the way in which we have updated and renovated our existing buildings. I believe in maintenance. Maintenance is something one cannot always see, but it preserves a campus, and I like building for the future.

One could underscore that the biggest accomplishment of this administration is a winning attitude. All of a sudden, I sense on the campus that we want the best and we want to be the best.

**HIGH POINTS:** What has been your biggest disappointment at the College since taking office?

**MARTINSON:** There have been a few disappointments. For example, I will never forget the early morning call when the chapel burned. We had just redecorated it. But we did not despair. We built it over again and many think it is more lovely than ever.

When a student leaves prematurely, we must assume some responsibility

for that unfortunate event. Being a college president is a wonderful job, but not always an easy one. I think all of us here take student problems very seriously. I do not have a very long list of disappointments; one reason is that I am much more patient than I used to be, although my wife will never believe that. I know that most of what we have set out to do will be done. We have a long way to go, but so far we are right on target.

**HIGH POINTS:** Does the College want to close Montlieu Avenue, and if so, why?

**MARTINSON:** We are not interested in closing Montlieu Avenue as such, but we would like to see it rerouted and I think that will happen. Originally, Montlieu Avenue went by the front of the campus. Now, since the College owns property on both sides, it rather goes through the heart of the campus. This is not the fault of the city. The College simply bought property on both sides of Montlieu, so at this stage it would be nice to have Montlieu rerouted so that we could put formal gardens at the entrance of the campus where the Avenue now is and build a Fine Arts center at the other end of the formal gardens. It would make the campus one of the premier beauty spots in the city, a place where you

would bring your visitors on a Sunday afternoon for walks in the garden. When I speak of formal gardens, I am thinking of the gardens in England which are beautifully tailored to the needs of the landscape surrounding them.

Currently, we have drawings of how Montlieu could be rerouted very effectively and very inexpensively to allow the campus to have a proper entrance. I don't think it is unusual. For example, Silas Creek Parkway in Winston-Salem does not go through the Wake Forest campus even though Silas Creek Parkway is a main thoroughfare. The situations are not identical, but I do think it would be in the best interest of all concerned, including the City of High Point, for High Point College to have a magnificent campus.

**HIGH POINTS:** There has been some discussion about the College considering a change in athletic affiliation, including the possibility of a move to the NCAA. What do you see in the College's athletic future?

**MARTINSON:** Recently, the NAIA has undergone a change. The "football schools," those who have football programs, have chosen to form their own conference, and since High Point is not interested in running a football pro-

gram, because we do not need to keep our admissions up, we are rather the “odd man out.” Meanwhile, Guilford, which has always been a close rival, has gone to NCAA Division III. We have considered Division III, but this presents a problem as well since the conference in which Guilford has aligned itself also has football as part of the overall program. So this narrows our options. The College has been invited to go into NCAA Division II with a very fine conference, but with the costs involved with going to NCAA Division II, we feel it would be in our best interest to either stay in the NAIA or go into NCAA Division I. By the time our new athletic facilities are complete, we will have made the decision.

**HIGH POINTS:** In what areas would you like to see High Point College improve?

**MARTINSON:** The College has made great strides in getting more alumni participation. In fact, we have a greater percentage of alumni involved now than we have ever had before, but there is room for improvement and I would like to see us have even more alumni participation. I would like to see the College do a better marketing job. When I picked up the *U.S. News*



and *World Report* the other day to read about “the best” colleges, I fully expected to see High Point College listed. After all, there are no better colleges of our kind in the nation. Still, we were not listed because the writer’s conception of what the “best” means is quite a bit different from my conception of what the best should be.

We are proud of the SAT scores of our students this year. And as I have indicated, because of our capacity enrollment, we must insist on higher SAT scores for the incoming freshman class in the fall. But having said that, I do not measure best in the terms of the SAT scores of the students, or the amount of endowment in the coffers, although our endowment is above average for a school our size, but to a great extent that is precisely what I read. In my lifetime, Richard Nixon would have been the only U.S. President who would have been eligible for admission to many of the educational institutions I read about. Consequently, I have a right to question the criteria used. Be that as it may, I think we need to improve our marketing. We need to let people know what we have. We may have an image problem. For years, we were thought to be a little school run by the City of High Point. This was never the case, but this is the way we were perceived. I think our recent national image has helped us. With articles on the College in Piedmont’s *Pace Magazine*, in “Portraits of Excellence” published by the Council of Independent Colleges, and “In Search of Academic Excellence” published by the Macmillan Publishing Company and the American Council on Education, we are developing a better image as a school of which we can all be proud.

**HIGH POINTS:** What do you find most rewarding about your job?

**MARTINSON:** The impact which we have on young lives. To watch a stu-

dent come to High Point College insecure, somewhat frightened, and maybe a little bit homesick and to leave here self assured and ready to try the impossible with a God given faith and confidence in his or her own ability and in the resources of God, this means everything to me.

**HIGH POINTS:** What should be the College’s number one priority over the next five years?

**MARTINSON:** I think it is to become one of the very finest colleges of our size in America.

**HIGH POINTS:** What do you believe is High Point College’s greatest challenge over the next decade?

**MARTINSON:** It is for High Point College to attain and maintain a position of prominence in private higher education in America.

When I first came to High Point College, I was, as I have indicated, influenced by the inherent quality of the College, the dedication of the faculty and staff, the good spirit of the community, and the commitment of the Board. This consensus of good feeling along with the support of the strong alumni organization will continue to help the College realize its fullest potential and make the College equal to all the challenges of the ’90s, of that I have no doubt. But I didn’t answer your question, did I?

The greatest challenge over the next decade will be for High Point College to have some small part in turning out the finest graduates this country can have, persons who have the right kind of marriage between fact and value, graduates who are as interested in what they can give as in what they can get, and who are more concerned with moral values than in what is legally acceptable.

As a church related college, I think we have a mandate to leave a mark on the students given to our care.

# Forte Whistles While He Works

Rewards should be received with joy. But this one was acquired without a wide smile.

Last September, Joe Forte, a 1966 graduate of High Point College, had just participated in the Olympic basketball gold medal game in Seoul, South Korea. For the select few who are talented enough to compete in the Olympic Games, participating in a gold medal final is usually a thrill of a lifetime. But for Forte, it represented the disappointment of an entire nation.

Don't misunderstand Forte's achievement. As the lone male basketball official selected to represent the United States in the 1988 Summer Olympics, Forte became the first basketball official from this country ever to work the gold medal game. Unfortunately, Forte was the only rainbow in a dark American men's basketball storm that raged over Seoul.

For the first time in Olympic men's basketball history, the United States team did not qualify for the championship game, which made Forte eligible to officiate the gold medal final, since his country's squad would not be participating. After working the game, Forte reached into a mixed emotional bag to describe his experience.

"Of all the officiating I have ever done, including working NCAA finals and ACC Championship games, it was the one prestigious assignment I wished I never received," said Forte during a recent interview. "I'd rather see our players playing in the gold medal game than me officiating in it. But when I look back at the experience, I am elated to have worked the gold medal game from a purely professional viewpoint. It's just when you come to the Olympics as a U.S. basketball official, working the gold medal game is the furthest thing from your mind."

Most of Forte's professional achievements have not been cloaked in such irony, however. The Pennsyl-



vania native has been busy piling up frequent flyer miles in his pursuit of excellence since the day he began officiating major college basketball games in 1975. And if an official's ability is judged by his assignments, Forte's climb to the top is near completion.

He has worked the NCAA Final Four five times and called the championship games of 1983 and 1987. He has officiated the past six ACC Championship games and worked the 1987 Pan American Games. And after being named as the 1988 Naismith College Official of the Year, Forte decided to take on a new challenge, leaving the amateur basketball scene this fall to become an NBA official.

Much has happened to Forte since his days at High Point College, where he played on the Panther basketball and baseball teams. His baseball ability led to a stint with the Cincinnati Reds organization before he turned to basketball officiating as a way to stay involved in athletics.

"When I first started officiating, I just wanted to do varsity high school games," said Forte, who now lives in Smyrna, Ga. "Then somebody said, 'Why not do college games?' And then you keep working your way up the ladder.

"I received an FIBA License, which is necessary to work international games. Then I worked the pre-Olympic Qualifying Tournament and the Pan Am Games. After that, I thought I might have a shot at the Olympics. They only take one male and one female official from each country, so it was quite an honor to be picked. I feel very fortunate and happy to have

been picked and I was proud to represent our country."

With political troubles creating violent confrontations in South Korea at the time, Forte expected to encounter some turbulence during his stay, but was pleasantly surprised.

"At first I had some concerns because of what I was reading about South Korea," said Forte. "It made you think you were going to the DMZ after some of the things you read. It was unfortunate, because I wanted to bring my family but I decided not to because of the potential danger involved. But when I got there, there was no hint of violence. They did a great job preparing for the Olympics. There was no feeling of fear whatsoever. And Seoul is a beautiful city."

While working over 50 games a season as a college official, Forte also found another way to influence the game of basketball. Along with Ron Foxcroft of Canada, Forte is co-owner of a company that designs and manufactures whistles that are shrill enough for the players to hear above deafening crowds. Thanks to its revolutionary design, Forte's whistle became the official whistle of the Olympic Games and is used by the NCAA. The NFL also is experimenting with the whistle this season.

"It took us three and a half years to do it," said Forte. "With no pea in the whistle, it works on aerodynamic wind tunnels. It isn't affected by wind or water, so we've even sold it to skin divers. Women and children have also used it as a safety device. We've had great success with it."

Success with a whistle just seems to follow Forte wherever he goes.

## HPC Welcomes Record Class

Enrollment at High Point College reached capacity with the largest freshman and transfer class in the college's history. A total of 537 new students entered for the fall semester.

The college received 1,372 applications from freshmen, which also set a single-year record for applications at the school. Applications from freshmen were up 40 percent from a year ago.

Overall, 1,930 students are enrolled at High Point College for the fall semester, which is also a new school record. Including the record freshman class, High Point College houses approximately 860 residential students.

"A better realization of the strengths of High Point College has been a major factor in the increased numbers," said Jim Schlimmer, Director of Admissions at High Point College. "The positive way that High Point College is perceived has been shown in the increased market share of in-state and out-of-state students who have chosen to attend our institution.

"Increasing our contacts has also been a key to the effort. We made more phone calls, wrote more letters and made more contacts in high school programs across the country. We saw almost 1,500 more students at College Day Programs than in the prior year."

## Renovation Project Completed


High Point College has completed a \$400,000 renovation project that encompasses five areas of the campus, including a new \$50,000 snack bar.

This summer's renovation to the snack bar, which is adjacent to the cafeteria on the ground floor of the Campus Center, includes new lighting, wood booths with upholstery, bentwood chairs, new wallcoverings, plants and a completely new menu with such food items as pizza by the slice or whole, sandwiches, snacks and drinks.

In a \$100,000 renovation of Woman's Hall, new walls, dropped ceilings and furniture were added to the first and second floors of the north wing. A \$200,000 heating and cooling system also was installed.

A \$40,000 renovation transformed a maintenance building into a 12-room dormitory where 20 freshman women reside, helping to house the record enrollment at the college this fall. Named The Annex, the one-story, brick building includes single and double rooms, a lounge and communal bathroom. Work included new walls, dropped ceilings and tile floors.

Also included in the renovations are a new \$5,000 faculty lounge which includes a kitchenette, new lighting and furniture, and a \$5,000 expansion of the campus post office.



## Habitat for Humanity Chapter Recognized

High Point College's Habitat for Humanity Chapter was recognized as a Charter Campus Chapter in a ceremony at the Atlanta Civic Center.

Former President Jimmy Carter and Habitat for Humanity Executive Director Millard Fuller recognized the pioneer Chapters and presented the Charter certificates at the 12th Anniversary Habitat for Humanity International Celebration. High Point College is one of only 24 colleges and universities across the nation that has formed a Charter Campus Chapter.

Habitat for Humanity is an ecumenical Christian housing ministry whose objective is to eliminate poverty housing from the world. Habitat for Humanity has over 240 affiliated projects in U.S. and Canadian cities and more than 50 projects in 24 developing countries.

Paige Alvarez, a High Point College junior from Fernandina Beach, Fla., represented the college and received the charter. Chaplain Ben W. Curry is the advisor for the chapter.

## Hayes Named Vice President For Financial Affairs

# Continuing Education

## CAEP Continues To Grow

When High Point College's Continuing Adult Education Program began in 1978 to provide full-time working adults access to higher education, its initiators were hopeful of the program's success. But it is doubtful that they could have predicted its phenomenal growth over the past decade. In 1978, adult degree programs were still in the nascent stage and many colleges and universities were reluctant to risk the untried. Now, ten years later, the College Board reports that 45% of the college population is comprised of students 25 years of age or older.

High Point College has quickly earned a reputation for its innovation in the field of adult education. Several national publications, mostly business journals, made reference to the evening program's unique design and close association with area businesses.

What constitutes its uniqueness? It was designed exclusively for those people who wanted to continue their employment but at the same time recognized their need for undergraduate education. The program's format allows students to attend class for 100 minutes three nights per week for an eight-week term. If students enroll in two classes per eight-week term, they complete two normal three semester hour classes for a total of six semester hours credit. Thus it is possible to obtain twelve semester hours credit during the equivalent of a sixteen-week semester and be considered a full-time student.

In 1979, an off-campus program began when the college entered into an agreement with R.J. Reynolds, Inc. to hold classes at their corporate headquarters in Winston-Salem.

Based upon the success of the R.J. Reynolds program, in 1980 several other Winston-Salem companies

formed an association with the college known as the Piedmont Area Evening Degree Association (PAEDA) whereby employees, spouses, and dependents of the member companies could attend classes at the training facility of Piedmont Aviation. Over the years, word spread and at the time the association was reorganized this fall, over 80 companies were participating.

Around 700 students enrolled for the 1988 fall term with approximately 450 in Winston-Salem and 250 in High Point. With a full-time continuing education administrative staff of six, the CAEP has experienced significant improvements in the delivery of services to the evening students. A dedicated faculty, both full-time and adjunct, continues to be the key to providing an academic program of consistent high quality.



"It's one of the most important things we do because it gives adults an opportunity to obtain a bachelor's degree when they may not have been able to in any other way," said High Point College President Dr. Jacob C. Martinson. "It gives them an opening they might not have had while employed."

## You're Never Too Old To Grow Young . . .

Willard has worked for the past 27 years as Office Manager for Dr. Austin P. Fortney, who is High Point College's staff physician. She acknowledges that her duties with job and family as well as church and social activities were more than enough to keep her busy, but she had always wanted to go to college. "I wanted a new challenge and I didn't want my brain to get old," said Willard, who decided to major in industrial and organizational psychology.

Her return to school two years ago was not an easy move. "After seeing an ad in the newspaper about the adult program, I waited two weeks before I got up the courage to go visit the school," said the 54-year-old Willard, who is the mother of three children.

Willard credits her success (only one "B" on her otherwise straight A record) to the support of her family and employer, but she hastens to add, "All of my instructors so far are able to empathize with the time constraints placed on adults with family and job responsibilities while seeing to it that we get a quality education."

Willard says she was attracted to the college's evening program because it was geared to people who'd been out of school awhile. "I was afraid I'd be the oldest one here but I wasn't. Now it doesn't matter."

# Aspire Campaign Notes

## Aspire Campaign Tops \$7 Million Mark

The following major gifts and pledges have been recently received toward the college's Aspire Campaign:

An estate gift of approximately \$500,000 will be used for the John, Fallie and Sarah Holmes Scholarship. The scholarship was first established in 1986 by Sarah Holmes '34 of High Point, who served as President of Carolina Cotton Batting Company, in honor of her father and mother. After Sarah passed away in 1987, a bequest was received by the college. Preference will be given to North Carolina students preparing for a career in business who demonstrate a financial need.

NCNB and a local anonymous donor have pledged \$100,000 toward the development of a proposed athletic facility. The pledge will be used for the Hospitality and Hall of Fame room in the proposed complex.

Louise Mandrell and Black Furniture Company have pledged \$100,000 toward the proposed athletic facility. The lobby will be named in their honor.

North State Telephone Company has pledged \$32,000 toward the future construction of a new Fine Arts Center. The gift has been designated for a rehearsal hall, which will be built in the proposed Fine Arts Center.

High Point Bank and Trust Company has established the Martha Elma Ellis Scholarship at High Point College through a major contribution to the Aspire Campaign. The scholarship is a tribute to Miss Martha Elma Ellis, who has been employed by High Point Bank and Trust Company for the past 57 years and currently serves as a senior vice president. Preference for the scholarship will be given to students from the High Point area.

An anonymous local couple who are

alumni of High Point College has donated a collection of coins and currency that spans from the early colonial days to the present.

The collection, which includes coins of virtually all denominations ranging over a 200-year period, has a present value in excess of \$30,000. Highlighting the collection are Bechtler gold pieces and a complete collection of gold coins minted in the old Charlotte Mint around the turn of the 19th century. Plans are being made to exhibit the collection in Smith Library.

The Aspire Campaign is a \$20 million major gifts campaign for High Point College being conducted by the college's Office of Institutional Advancement. Projects included in the campaign are the new Men's Residence Hall, the construction of a new athletic facility and a new fine arts center, renovation of historic buildings on campus and the development of the Winston-Salem campus. Endowed funds for scholarships, an honors program and faculty development are also included.

The timetable for the Aspire Campaign is split into two phases. The first phase will run until May 31, 1991, with a goal of \$10 million. The second phase will begin in 1992.

## Reflections of Giving

At this holiday time of the year, attention is focused on giving — of gifts to family and friends, as well as gifts to charitable organizations. Recently, I paused to reflect on the true meaning of giving as it relates to High Point College.

- ✓ Spends a couple of hours on a Saturday serving lemonade to new students and their parents, making them feel welcome
- ✓ Writes letters to former classmates, inviting them to come back to campus for Homecoming weekend
- ✓ Helps the Continuing Adult Education Program with registration for a new session
- ✓ Works with a committee to plan a local alumni outing
- ✓ Attends performances of the theater group and the High Point College Singers
- ✓ Offers an internship to a student who is interested in finding out more about a particular career field
- ✓ Supports the athletic program by coming to basketball games . . . even when the team isn't having a winning season
- ✓ Displays High Point College materials at the office and at home

If a gift is "something voluntarily transferred by one person to another without compensation," as Webster defines it, then all of the above — and many more — are gifts. We may not be able to measure them in quantifiable ways, but with these gifts, High Point College is blessed, and her students are blessed.

Kahlil Gibran, in *The Prophet*, wrote the following about giving:

"You give but little when you give of your possessions.

"It is when you give of yourself that you truly give."

In this season of giving, remember, there are many ways to contribute to your alma mater. Although they may not appear in the "numbers," they are recognized and appreciated.



# Panther Peaks



**Soccer:** The Panthers posted a 13-4-2 record and advanced to post-season play for the 14th time in the past 15 years. Dexter Gillmore, a junior midfielder from Toronto, Canada, and sophomore Thomas Ingram, a defender from Belfast, Northern Ireland, were named to the National Soccer Coaches Association of America (NSCAA) All-America team. Junior Mark Hodor of Olney, Maryland, scored 17 goals during the season to break a school scoring record for goals in one season.

**Volleyball:** Under first-year coach Dr. Joe Ellenburg, the Lady Panthers advanced to the NAIA National Tournament and finished the season with a 20-10 record. The national tournament bid was the Lady Panthers' fourth since 1982.

**Field Hockey:** The Lady Panthers finished with a 12-12-2 mark. Individual players from the team advanced to national competition.

**Men's Basketball:** At press time, the Panthers had gotten off to a quick 4-1 start, capturing the Catawba Civitan Holiday Tournament in Salisbury in the process. The backcourt of senior transfer Kenny Drummond (40 points in an overtime victory against Mt. Olive) and junior George Byers (all-conference a year ago) has provided much of the offensive spark. Despite losing four starters from last year's 22-6 squad that advanced to the NAIA District 26 finals, this team may be just as strong.

**Women's Basketball:** Seven players return from last year's 8-17 squad to play under first-year coach Dr. Joe Ellenburg. At press time, the Lady Panthers had opened the season with a 3-5 record.
