Aspire Campaign News

New Athletic Facility Named

The Board of Trustees has authorized naming High Point College's proposed athletic facility the James H. and Jesse E. Millis Athletic and Convocation Center.

Site preparation and early construction is expected to begin in March, 1990. The arena is expected to seat between 3,000 and 3,500 for basketball games and around 5,000 people for events such as concerts, where floor seating can be utilized. The new complex will also incorporate weight training rooms, an aerobics and dance center, a sports medicine facility, handball courts, locker rooms, offices for faculty and coaches, and an Olympic-sized swimming pool. The estimated cost for the facility is \$3.5 million.

Mr. and Mrs. Millis have contributed \$500,000 to the project and have pledged an additional \$500,000 on a challenge basis to gain support from foundations and other individuals. They will match gifts on a dollar to dollar basis.

Mr. Millis is the retired Chairman and Chief Executive Officer of Adams-Millis Corporation in High Point. He presently serves as Chairman of the Millis Foundation. Mr. and Mrs. Millis are longtime benefactors of the college.

"The Millis name has been an important part of the High Point community before the college was established," said John C. Lefler, Vice President for Institutional Advancement. "The Board particularly wished to recognize Jim and Jesse Millis, who have shown such an interest in this project and have actively served the college since 1960. The Millis family has ensured that this outstanding community facility will be built on the High Point College campus."

"Our interest in High Point College and athletics spans many years," said

Mr. Millis. "We have a son, Jim Millis, Jr., and daughter who are High Point College alumni. Our daughter Emily was actively involved in the college's athletic program.

"We are proud of the college and want the athletic complex to be representative of the quality of the institution," Millis added. "The additional swimming facilities, weight and exercise rooms, handball courts and other features can only enhance the college's reputation of providing a variety of options and outlets for its students."

McEwen Residence Hall Established

Woman's Hall, one of the two original buildings remaining on the High Point College campus, will be renamed Caroline Nichols McEwen Residence Hall to honor Louise McEwen Smith, her family, and in particular, Louise's mother, Caroline Nichols McEwen.

"The McEwen family was active for many years in the High Point business community," said John C. Lefler, Vice President for Institutional Advancement. "We believe the renaming of this building is a fitting tribute for all the wonderful support the college has received from the McEwen and Smith families."

Louise and her husband, Herman H. Smith, who was President and Treasurer of McEwen Lumber Co., have been the primary benefactors of the renovation of the residence hall. The Smiths were also the leading donors in the construction of the Herman and Louise Smith Library and have established a major endowed scholarship for students in financial need.

Jefferson-Pilot Fund Created



Jefferson-Pilot Corporation has given a gift of \$300,000 to High Point College to create the Jefferson-Pilot Fund.

The gift will be combined with a grant of \$150,000 previously received from Jefferson-Pilot and will be used for a professorship and faculty development.

The value of the award, when combined with earnings, now totals approximately \$500,000.

According to W. Roger Soles, President and Chief Executive Officer of Jefferson-Pilot Corporation, the primary purpose of this grant "is to assist High Point College in its recruiting and maintaining of superior faculty members as it continues to build on a foundation of academic excellence."

A portion of the gift will be used to enhance and reinforce salaries of faculty members designated for the professorship, while another portion will be used for faculty development and study.

Professorship Established

The Paul Broyhill/Home Furnishings Industry Endowed Professorship, funded by five major gifts from individuals and organizations involved in the furniture industry, has been established at High Point College.

To date, \$265,000 has been designated in gifts and pledges for the professorship, with additional contributions expected.

The endowed professorship will provide assistance for funding the Home

Furnishings Marketing Program in the following areas: salary support to the Home Furnishings Marketing Program director and the possible hiring of additional full-time instructors.

Major contributors to the Home Furnishings Marketing Endowed Professorship include Mr. Paul Broyhill of Lenoir, Mr. and Mrs. George S. Erath of High Point, Mr. and Mrs. Robert P. Gruenberg of High Point, Mr. and Mrs. Charles E. Hayworth of High Point, and Woodmark Originals in High Point.

Campus Street Named

As a result of a major estate gift from Delos S. Hedgecock, the Board of Trustees has authorized the street in front of Roberts Hall to be named Hedgecock Circle.

As a part of the Aspire Campaign, all campus streets can be named in honor of or in memory of donors who give a minimum unrestricted gift of \$100,000 to \$150,000.

Mr. Hedgecock's sister, Mrs. Lois Gay, is a member of the Board of Trustees.

College Records Best Fund-Raising Year

The Aspire Campaign is far ahead of schedule thanks to a record fund-raising year that has seen High Point College top the \$2 million mark.

The Aspire Campaign, which began in November, 1987, has now gone over the \$8.5 million mark. The \$20 million major gifts campaign is split into two phases. The first phase will run until May 31, 1991, with a goal of \$10 million. Despite being less than halfway into the first phase of the campaign, the college is only \$1.5 million away from meeting the campaign's first phase goal.

The Aspire Campaign, which is being conducted by the Office of Insti-



tutional Advancement, includes such projects as the new Men's Residence Hall, the construction of a new athletic facility and a new fine arts center, renovation of historic buildings on campus and the development of the Winston-Salem campus.

The following major gifts and pledges have been recently committed toward the Aspire Campaign:

Notification has been received from the executors of the Sarah Holmes estate that the college will be receiving additional funds from the estate, bringing the total to approximately \$750,000. The money will be used for the John, Fallie and Sarah Holmes Scholarship. The scholarship was first established in 1986 by Sarah Holmes '34 of High Point, who served as President of Carolina Cotton Batting Company, in honor of her father and mother. Preference for the scholarship will be given to North Carolina students preparing for a career in business who demonstrate a financial need.

The Du Pont Company has announced a substantial and unrestricted gift to the college in connection with the Dionne Warwick Benefit Concert. Company officials have also confirmed that another benefit concert will be held on October 18, with proceeds going to the Aspire Campaign.

College Selects New Symbols

High Point College has a new logo.

The Crucible is a contemporary version of the lamp of learning, which is located on the steeple at the top of Roberts Hall. The flame that is contained within a protective bowl represents the forging of young lives into mature, responsible individuals. The flame, similar to the one used by the United Methodist Church, also represents the college's church ties.

The logo will be used in all college publications, as well as in various public relations presentations.


"In the past, the college was using different seals and symbols and there was no uniformity between the Winston-Salem program and various offices on the main campus," said John C. Lefler, Vice President for Institutional Advancement. "We wanted one easily identifiable symbol that could be applied to all of our divisions.

"The ultimate goal is for the symbol to be recognized as easily as the name

of the institution," added Lefler. "For example, when you see arches, you instantly think of McDonald's. An immediate connection is made. We think we found the design that will work for us in much the same way in this region."

Joe Mikulas and Associates of Jacksonville, Fla., a graphics design organization, was invited by college officials to create the new logo. After a campus visit and several interviews of students, faculty, and administrators were conducted by the firm to gather their views of the college, six symbols were submitted for consideration. The symbols were then presented at random to various audiences, including high school students, High Point College students, faculty and staff. The Crucible was the overwhelming choice.

In addition to the new logo, a new uniform Panther logo for all athletic teams and a new college shield were also adopted by the college.

HPC Launches German Exchange Program

High Point College has now expanded its borders to Freiburg, West Germany thanks to a new exchange program between the college and the Foley Center in Freiburg that will provide students with an introduction to the current European political and business environment as well as contemporary German society.

The four-week program geared toward continuing adult education students begins May 8 with a four-night session at the college's Madison Park campus in Winston-Salem. This briefing will focus on the cultural, theoretical, political and economic aspects of West German society.

Students will spend two weeks in Freiburg and then will wrap the course with a four-night session at the High Point campus. While in Freiburg, High Point College students will live with German families and will visit several foreign companies with American ties, including Ciba-Geigy, Goedecke, Buckbee-Mears and Intermetal. The trip also includes a boat trip on Lake Constance to Austria and Switzerland and a separate trip to France. Students will visit the Swiss Stock Exchange, a Swiss bank and French Parliament.

At the same time, German students from the Foley Center, an international independent college of languages and business studies, will be participating in a similar program at High Point College, with tours of the area's traditional industries — furniture, textiles and tobacco.

High Point College and Foley Center officials agree that the exchange program will provide a unique opportunity for High Point College's adult students who are already in the workplace to learn first-hand about business relationships between the United States and the European Economic Community and the implications of an

open, internal market in Europe in 1992.

"We wanted to have a study abroad opportunity designed for the evening students, and obviously they can't go for a semester because a lot of them work," said Dr. Carole A. Head, director of international studies at High Point College. "This is something we feel we can fit in our four-week May program."

"In 1992, the whole European economic situation will have been changed so that there is a kind of united Europe," said Dr. Vance Davis, Dean of High Point College. "There still obviously will be national borders, but in terms of finance and economics, it will all be tied together. This has enormous implications for American business. We want to give it attention."

"After all these years we're moving toward a united Europe," said Michael Foley, who along with his wife Anna, directs the Foley Center. "But while the barriers are going down in Europe, they're going up around the perimeter of Europe. We believe it's going to be the small businesses in the United States who are going to lose out, and we believe there are no reasons why they should."

"It's up to the Americans to take the initiative and make sure the doors aren't closed," Foley added. "High Point College will be able to say they took the initiative in this."

The move from a Common Market to Single Market among 12 member nations in Europe, which will be completed by 1992, will do away with many restrictions between the countries. Passports will not be required to cross the countries' borders. Different tax rules and currency exchanges will no longer exist. Competition for public building projects will become much keener.

Freiburg, the capital of the Black Forest region, is located at the crossroads of West Germany, Switzerland and France. The city has 180,000 residents.

Madison Park Addition Approved

The Board of Trustees has approved the construction of a second classroom building at High Point College's Madison Park campus in Winston-Salem in response to ever-growing enrollment figures in the Continuing Adult Education Program.

The 10,000-square foot facility will contain classrooms, a science lab, an audio-visual room with additional soundproofing and a projection booth, a reading room, lounge and restrooms. The cost of the Madison Park addition is estimated at \$500,000.

The building will join the existing 10,600-square foot facility that was completed in January, 1987 at Madison Park. The building includes 14 classrooms, a computer laboratory and staff offices.

"Who would have thought 18 months ago, when we officially dedicated the Madison Park campus, that there would now be a need to double our facilities?" said High Point College President Dr. Jacob C. Martinson. "If our projections are correct, the new building will be nearly full the day we open it. But this new project will allow us to have all of our classes at one site.

"Before we can be completely comfortable with the progress being made, however, we need to find a solution for additional parking spaces," Martinson added.

The need for expansion in High Point College's Continuing Adult Education Program is not difficult to understand when you look at the numbers.

Through the first three sessions of the 1988-89 academic year, CAEP has experienced a 24 percent increase in enrollment over the previous year. During this academic year, CAEP has averaged 436 students at the Madison Park campus in Winston-Salem and 246 students in High Point. The college has seen 335 new students enter the program since last August, com-



pared to 269 students during the same period of time last year.

Another result of the growth in enrollment is a need to offer an expanded number of courses at both locations. To date, CAEP has taught 189 courses, an increase of 16 percent over 1987-88. In order to meet the needs of students in Winston-Salem, the college leased additional classroom space in an office building on Brownsboro Road. This facility houses five classrooms, an office and reception

area, and over 100 students this session, which has temporarily helped to relieve the overcrowding of people and cars at Madison Park.

To date, over 300 students have graduated from CAEP's Winston-Salem program since its inception in 1979. The Madison Park program offers majors in business administration, psychology, industrial and organizational psychology, sociology, media communications, computer information systems, and accounting.

Faculty Profile

Life is Smooth Sailing for Stitt

Dr. Jim Stitt '67 has been a professor of history at High Point College for 20 years. He says he became interested in history because he enjoyed "subjects where there were no definite answers."

"I love to talk," Stitt said, "and I love to argue."

Other passions exist in his life too. One is a dedication to campus and community activities.

Over the years he has chaired numerous campus committees, including the first planning committee for the building of the new Smith Library.

Stitt has just completed a one year term as president of the Carolinas Conference and remains the college's faculty athletic representative. He is also the school sponsor for the Alpha Chi fraternity and he is the campus representative for visiting scholars through the North Carolina Center for Independent Higher Education.

Stitt also is actively involved in the High Point community. Some of his activities have included work at St. Mary's Church where he and his wife attend, and membership on the High Point Advisory Committee for United Services for Older Adults.

But few passions in Stitt's life can match the one he has for winter sail-



ing. Just ask his 23-year-old friend "Buster," with whom Stitt shares a certain craziness for the cold months of the year.

Buster is a 17-foot Day Sailer. Together, they enjoy sailing out on a lake during the coolest of all seasons.

So while most sane skippers cover up their boats and pack them away for a long winter's rest, Stitt, along with approximately 100 other High Point area boaters, is making sure *Buster* is fit and trim for winter exercise.

"If you wear a good deal of clothing," Stitt claims, "you really don't feel the cool chill. Secondly, when you're sailing, you're keeping fairly busy. You're constantly adjusting the boat's speed by adjusting the sail. And, there's a great deal of conversation between you and the rest of your crew. There's not much time when you're actually sitting."

Stitt is a member of the Oak Hollow Yacht Club and just recently stepped down as Commodore after a year term.


"Our program is affiliated with parks and recreation," Stitt said, "and we sail 10 months of the year. We take January and February off. I'm not that captivated or hearty to sail during those cold months."

So now the question arises: Why even get out there in the cold of winter to go sailing in the first place? Isn't that one of those sports that takes place during the sunny, WARM, months of the year?

Not according to Stitt.

"You don't have the problem of glare during the winter months like you do during the summer months," Stitt said. "You don't have to worry about steering around other power boats, and there certainly aren't any water skiers to worry about. You can concentrate more on your sailing."

Stitt became interested in sailing and racing four years ago. Five years ago, he purchased his faithful friend *Buster*,



and during that first year together they just had fun.

Then, a friend suggested that Stitt look into the program at Oak Hollow.

"Until I first learned how to sail correctly," Stitt said, "I was pitiful. I always finished way in the back of the pack. Now, I have a sense to make the boat go well, or understand why it's not going really well."

"Racing is where a person learns to make a boat run most efficiently. Anybody can put a boat into the water, but you have to know how to take the best advantage of, say wind direction, to make it run efficiently."

Stitt has won several trophies during his sailing tenure, but there is one that stands out specifically, and that was the first race he ever won.

"I remember it well," he said, "because two weeks after the race my wife was going to leave for France for a year. So, this was going to be the last time we were going to race together for some time."

"It was just a club race, and we got a lot of lucky breaks. We made a few right decisions, and everyone else must have made a few wrong ones. We were able to finish a half a second ahead of the next boat, and it was such a surprise."

That race took place when the weather was a bit on the warm side because as Stitt puts it, "My wife is very aware of the temperature, and she refuses to race in the winter."

"I keep telling her that if you dress real warm, everything will be fine. But I don't think she believes me."

So while Carole Ann stays in to keep warm during the winter months, Dr. Stitt and *Buster* set sail for much cooler horizons.

Over 100 Students Interview for Presidential Scholarship

High Point College Director of Admissions Jim Schlimmer received an unwelcome visitor during Presidential Scholarship Weekend in February.

Snow. And lots of it.

But despite the disruption that inclement weather created, this Presidential Scholarship weekend was a large success in Schlimmer's eyes.

According to Schlimmer, the college received 192 applications for the program, a 20 percent increase from a year ago. From this large pool of applicants, 109 top high school seniors from the eastern United States visited High Point College and competed for the prestigious scholarships through an interview process.

"We spent so much of our time just overcoming the obstacles of the weather," said Schlimmer. "We had to make a lot of courtesy transportation runs between the hotels and the college picking up the prospective students and their parents. We also had to pick up several faculty members who were involved in the interview process but could not dig out from the storm. It was somewhat of a miracle that we could pull it off.

"We were able to make it a success because it has become such a big campus community event," said Schlimmer. "Thirty-six faculty members and department chairmen helped with the interviews and receptions. And our current Presidential Scholars made over 300 phone calls to prospective students and helped out considerably with transportation needs. The Presidential Scholarship Weekend is firmly entrenched as a major part of our admissions program."

Nominations for this program are sought from guidance counselors and ministers. After careful screening by the Admissions Office, those qualified high school seniors applying as freshmen, who are considered the most outstanding in scholarship, leadership and citizenship, are invited to the campus for the competition.

Twenty-three scholarships valued at \$3,000 per year and two full-tuition scholarships are awarded annually. These scholarships are based exclusively on merit.

"We have raised the profile of the college by having this type of program," said Schlimmer. "About 20 percent of our entire application pool comes from this group. And objectively, looking at the average SAT score, it was the best group that we have ever had. We expect these scholars to become important leaders on our campus during the coming years."

Dennis Carroll Will Serve As State Coordinator

The National Council of Teachers of English announces the appointment of Dr. Dennis Carroll of High Point College as state coordinator for the 1989 NCTE Achievement Awards in Writing. Through this nationally recognized competition, now in its thirty-first year, approximately 800 high school seniors are cited for excellence in writing and are recommended to colleges and universities for admission and for financial aid, if needed. Over 6,000 students were nominated for NCTE Awards in 1988. Results of the contest are announced in October of each year.

Students are nominated for Achievement Awards in Writing by their high school English departments and are chosen for recognition by state judging committees. (Each nominee submits an impromptu theme and a sample of his or her best writing to be judged.) The regional judging committees are composed of both high school and college teachers who work under the direction of state coordinators.

The National Council of Teachers of English is made up of more than 90,000 individual teachers and institutional members at all levels of instruction, from elementary school through graduate college. Its goal is more effective teaching of English language and literature in the nation's schools and colleges. NCTE publishes journals, books, and recordings to aid teachers in the classroom and in their professional development.

Panther Peaks

What a Season! Panthers Win Third Consecutive Conference Title



The High Point College Panthers created excitement, earned a national ranking in the NAIA Top 20, filled gymnasiums around the state and found much other success during their recently completed 22-6 season. They also did something even better, in the eyes of senior forward Chris Windlan.

They made history.

The Panthers hosted the 46th annual Carolinas Conference Basketball Tournament and celebrated by defeating Wingate 97-92 in the championship game to become the first school ever to win three consecutive tournament championships.

"This is the best because we made history," said Windlan. "Nobody had

ever won three in a row. It's something we've been looking forward to."

Senior guard Kenny Drummond, the tournament's Most Valuable Player, scored 37 points in the title game to lead the way, as he did for much of the season, along with backcourt mate George Byers. Both were selected to the All Carolinas Conference team.

The Panthers also raced to the Carolinas Conference regular-season championship and were ranked 20th at the close of the regular season.

The Panthers made their third consecutive trip to the NAIA District 26 playoffs, only to be upset 85-84 by Guilford in the semifinals despite 29 points from Drummond.

Drummond Named Player of the Year

Senior guard Kenny Drummond was named NAIA District 26 Player of the Year.



Drummond transferred to High Point College during the middle of the 1987-88 season and became eligible for the 1988-89 season. The Peoria, Ill. native averaged 20.3 points, 4.8 assists and 4 steals per game during the regular season. Drummond teamed with George Byers, a junior from High Point, to form the conference's most explosive guard tandem.

"I think it's helped me a whole lot," Byers said of teaming with Drummond. "I was able to do more things. I was able to gamble on defense and I didn't have to worry about taking my shot as much because I knew Kenny could always pop 20-25 points a game. That allowed me to get the other guys involved, just having Kenny in the backcourt.

"He is real quiet, but he can motivate you in a different way," added Byers. "He goes out and gives you everything he's got and that helps everybody."

"During the course of a game, if we're getting in the flow of things, I think at times he doesn't realize there is anything else going on," High Point College coach Jerry Steele said of Drummond. "He doesn't know if there are people there or not. His concentration level at times is unbelievable."

"I never thought about something like that a year ago," said Drummond. "But I'm very happy about it. To me, it's like Michael Jordan winning the NBA's Most Valuable Player award."

Panther Peaks

A capsule summary of other inter-collegiate sports news at High Point College:

Women's Basketball: The Lady Panthers finished 7-17 under first-year coach Dr. Joe Ellenburg after dropping a 71-62 decision to Atlantic Christian in the first round of the Carolinas Conference Tournament.

"I think we built a foundation for the future on hard work, improved discipline and positive thought," said Ellenburg. "We're definitely going to get better. We came close in a lot of games this year and another step or two will turn us around."

Baseball: Junior outfielder Billy Wilson (.315 batting average and 26 RBI) returns to lead a young and largely untested squad after the Panthers posted a disappointing 13-28 finish a year ago. Veteran head coach Jim Speight plans to start freshmen at catcher, first base, second base, short-stop and perhaps two outfield spots.

Track: Despite graduation losses, the defending Carolinas Conference and District 26 champions are expected to field a strong team again this season. Returning to anchor the sprinters are Lavelle Kinney and Nat Norris, a double All-America performer a year ago. Chip Shea will compete in the high hurdles, the relay events, the long jump, high jump and triple jump, and the mile relay.

Tennis: Coach Ray Alley returns for his second stint as head coach after 13 seasons at Guilford College, where his teams earned seven trips to the NAIA National Tournament. Only one player returns with any notable experience. Junior Pasi Makinen, a native of Finland and one of four foreign players on the squad, owns the only on-court college playing time among the Panthers' top seven players.



National Commission on the Future of High Point College

National Commission To Set Direction For High Point College

A national commission to chart a new course for High Point College was announced at an April 18 press conference by W. Roger Soles, President of Jefferson-Pilot Corporation and Chairman of the College's Board of Trustees.

"For years High Point College has been quietly doing a superb job of educating men and women in the best tradition of the liberal arts," Mr. Soles commented at the news conference on the college's campus. "This national commission will be asked to recommend ways to strengthen the college's work and to establish it as one of the country's leading liberal arts centers of learning."

Joining Soles at the announcement of the national commission were High Point College President Jacob C. Martinson and College Trustee Richard A. Kampe, President of RJR Tobacco Development Co., who will serve as chairman of the commission's executive committee.

Martinson told the news conference, "I am tremendously enthusiastic about the work which will go on during the next year and look forward to the advice and recommendations of such an outstanding group.

"By helping its students succeed, High Point College has experienced success in its own right," added Martinson. "As the College looks to the future, certain decisions need to be made concerning how the institution might best enhance its influence on the lives of students and convey its educational philosophy to a wider audience. The work of this Commission will provide energy and direction for this center of learning for many, many years to come."

Officially named The National Commission on the Future of High Point College, the commission is composed of 142 members from 24 states. Members of the commission are drawn from business, government, the professions, education, college alumni, students, faculty and friends, and the United Methodist Church.

Commission members will be asked to assess the quality and scope of the college's academic program, the extra-curricular experiences offered students, including athletics, and the college's impact on the community and region.

Trustee Chairman Soles said the commission's task would be approached with open minds — "open to new ideas and new initiatives. We will also ask them to dream a bit, to help us identify directions in which our horizons might expand. But in the end," said Soles, "we want pragmatic recommendations that we can turn into a blueprint for the future of High Point College."

College Hosts First Commission Meeting

The first meeting of The National Commission on the Future of High Point College was held following commencement exercises on May 6 in the Campus Center.

Almost 100 representatives from across the United States attended the luncheon, which was followed by an open discussion of the college's present and future.

According to John C. Lefler, Vice President for Institutional Advancement, there were two common themes that surfaced during the discussion. "Over and over again, the thrust of the meeting centered around the belief that the college should concentrate on developing programs that build a strong set of values for its students while also teaching them effective communication skills," said Lefler. "Executives from various industries agree that they are looking to hire graduates who communicate well and possess strong values and character."

After the open forum, commission members then met with their individual committees for the first time and began work and study of specific ideas and areas of the college.

The National Commission will continue to meet during the summer and fall before each committee drafts recommendations to be submitted in January, 1990. A final report will be written by the commission's executive committee and submitted to the President and Board of Trustees in March, 1990.

An Inside Look at the National Commission

Most of the National Commission's work will be carried out through six committees that will consider various aspects of the Commission's charge.

Each committee will be provided at the outset with data and briefing papers based upon such documents as the College's Annual Reports, along with a tentative set of topics for the committee to consider. Committees will be free to request additional information and add topics.

To complete the National Commission's work in a feasible amount of time, it will be necessary to maintain communications between committees. This will be the responsibility of the Commission's Executive Committee.

As individual committee reports are completed, they will be forwarded to the Executive Committee. The Executive Committee will be responsible for reviewing the drafts, establishing priorities, and integrating the drafts into a single document. In January of 1990, a draft of the final report will be circulated to the members of the National Commission. Based on their comments, the Executive Committee will revise the report and prepare the final document.

Commencement

McDowell Addresses College's Largest-Ever Graduating Class

"Discovery and the continuing nature of learning are a way of life," Dr. Richard E. McDowell told 319 students in the largest-ever graduating class at High Point College during commencement exercises on Saturday, May 6.

McDowell, President of the University of Pittsburgh at Bradford and a 1965 graduate of High Point College, spoke before a capacity crowd in excess of 2,500 family members and friends gathered in Alumni Gymnasium for the ceremony. Commencement exercises were originally scheduled to be held on the front lawn of Roberts Hall, but were shifted indoors because of inclement weather.

During his address, McDowell looked back on his days as a student at High Point College.

"You, the graduates, and I share a common bond," said McDowell.

"High Point College has had a profound impact on our lives. As we reflect on our days at High Point, we can clearly discern that we are different and better people as a result of our experience.

"Quality penetrated my very being, painfully and bluntly, when Mrs. Shirley Rawley gave me a B on an English paper, which was by far my best work. It was good! I knew the paper was good; it was inspired writing. However, grammatical errors dropped the grade to a B. Clearly, I had not reached the mark of quality.

"As you cast back over your HPC years, I feel confident that similar effects were created," said McDowell.

McDowell praised High Point College President Dr. Jacob C. Martinson and Chairman of the Board of Trustees W. Roger Soles for their vision and initiative in establishing the National Commission on the Future of High Point College.


"Today, American education is the

envy of every advanced industrial nation," especially Japan," said McDowell. "However, in our very fast-paced and changing world society, higher education is particularly challenged and even threatened. It is not a time for timidity in the management of educational institutions, nor is it the place for a laissez-faire board of trustees. It is a time for action and investment."

In closing, McDowell said, "With the training you have received, your life will be enriched and productive. However, High Point College, as an educational institution, can only point your way and provide a foundation upon which you can build.

"It is you who are responsible for your success, and it is you who must continue to achieve quality if the free world is to progress."

The college awarded 211 bachelor of science degrees and 108 bachelor of arts degrees. Forty-six students graduated with academic honors.



Cole, Weeks Retire From HPC

Two High Point College faculty members, Dr. David Cole of High Point and Dr. Leo Weeks of High Point, have announced their retirement. The two were recognized during commencement exercises for their distinguished service to the college.

Cole, a professor of history, has served at the college for 27 years. He came to the college in 1962 as a professor of history and was appointed Vice President and Dean of the College a year later. He also served as acting President in 1980 and 1981.

Cole is a graduate of Erskine College and received a Ph.D. in history from the University of South Carolina.

"Dave served every office with the kind of distinction and quality which set him apart," said High Point College President Dr. Jacob C. Martinson. "His contributions to this institution are immeasurable and quite frankly, this institution would not be the institution it is had he not taken a leadership role."

Weeks, a professor of biology, came to High Point College in 1967. As Chairman of the department of biology, Weeks guided students through high achievement and successful acceptance into medical and graduate schools throughout the country. He is a member of the American Genetic Association, the North Carolina Academy of Science, and the American Institute of Biology and Science.

Weeks received his undergraduate degree from Georgia Southern College, his master's degree from George Peabody College and his Ph.D. from the University of Nebraska.

"We commend Leo for the faithful dedication he has shown to his profession and to the students he has served," said Dr. Martinson. "He has served the college with great distinction."

be seen with the introduction of a new High Point College core curriculum in the fall of 1989.

Beyond his professional duties, Ramke volunteers as Guidance and Faculty Advisor to the Lambda Chi Alpha Fraternity. He also initiated a Student Government Association Leadership Conference this past year.

Lovely Named 1989 Outstanding Senior

Linda Sue Lovely of Brevard, a senior sociology major, was presented the 1989 Outstanding Senior Award by the Awards Selection Committee of the High Point College Alumni Association. The presentation was made at the annual Alumni-Senior Brunch on April 29 at the College.




The processional line begins to form outside Alumni Gymnasium.









Furniture Program Becomes Family Affair


Students from various family backgrounds who hail from across the United States and Canada continue to come to High Point College to enroll in the school's ever-growing Home Furnishings Marketing program, the only one of its kind in the country.

As you might expect, this brings a smile to the face of Dr. Richard Bennington, who founded the program in 1979. The varied vocational backgrounds and geographic mix of entering students are strong indicators of the program's growth and increased scope. As the Home Furnishings Marketing program enters its second decade at High Point College, it is no longer a furniture family secret.

But as important as the variety and growth of the pool of students in the program are to the future of Home Furnishings Marketing, perhaps the most significant endorsement of the program's value still comes from deep inside the furniture industry. Furniture executives, whose knowledge and experience form the very backbone of the industry, continue to believe in the program's merits by sending their sons and daughters to High Point College to be educated and trained.

"The word is getting out," said Dr. Bennington. "We are receiving students from all parts of the nation who have no previous connections with furniture, which can be partially explained by advertising and the increased exposure the program has received over the past few years.

"But out of the 50 students we have in the program, 15 come from top management families, including 5 of our 17 seniors. You can't mislead the people who are already in the business with slick advertising schemes. They're not going to waste money and their sons' and daughters' time on a program that can't produce what they're looking for.

"Because of our location in the furniture capital of the world, we can offer a lot of outside-the-classroom experience, which gives the program a practical nature. If a son or daughter wants to go into the family business, it's a plus for that individual to receive a liberal arts education combined with an education in the field itself."

Bill Hartman, Vice President of Membership for the National Home

Furnishings Association, believes this educational experience is more than a plus for sons and daughters who want to work for the family business. He believes it is becoming a necessity.

"Earlier in the decade, smaller stores, often family-run businesses, were forced to sell out to the larger chains," said Hartman. "The small companies that survived are stronger than ever because they were forced to compete with the big companies. However, a son or daughter can no longer work for the family business without having knowledge and training in the industry. The competition is just too great, and the business is becoming too complex."

Besides liberal arts classes, the program offers courses in furniture manufacturing, furniture textiles, furniture store operations, marketing strategies, furniture history and furniture design to its students. Students visit the High Point showrooms and the factories that produce about half of the wooden furniture and a third of all upholstered furniture in the country. The program also relies on guest lecturers from the industry and internships at nearby manufacturing and retail companies. Attending the semi-annual International Home Furnishings Market in High Point provides additional valuable information about the industry in action.

"Being from High Point, I've been quite aware of the program since its inception," said Tom Stout, President of Carson's Inc., an upholstered furniture manufacturing company in High Point. "The college has filled a void in our industry quite nicely. It offers outstanding, specialized training for marketing in the furniture industry. The experience has been very beneficial for my son Tom and we believe it will be beneficial to our company when he begins working for us. But I didn't have to push him into it. It was his idea to attend High Point College."

"The emphasis on marketing, as opposed to the manufacturing and engineering end of the industry, has been the program's appeal to me," said Tom Stout, Jr., who is a junior Home Furnishings Marketing major. "The quality and quantity of guest speakers we have encountered has also given me a fresh perspective on the business."

Laurel Peterson, whose dad is Bill Peterson, editor-in-chief of *Furniture Today*, has already begun work as merchandising manager of CV Industries, a furniture wholesale distributor in Greensboro, since graduating from the program in May. "There was a definite appeal to the way the curriculum was structured. The guest speakers kept students up to date with the latest innovations in the industry. It was nice to hear it coming from the professionals who are on the cutting edge of the industry."

But not all sons of executives want

to join the family business. The program seems to have suited the needs of those who wish to go out on their own as well.

"I'm pleased at how well the program stands up when you are involved in the interview process. It seems to put you a step ahead in the employer's eyes," said Russell Turner, who graduated from the program in May. Turner's father, Scott Turner, operates Turner Furniture, a four-store chain of retail furniture stores headquartered in Valdosta, GA.

"My son wanted to go into the furniture business but not into the family business," said Alexander J. Malouf, Jr. of Greenwood, MS, President of Malouf Furniture Company and the John Richard Collection, which specializes in wall decor. "High Point College is a superior school and High Point is a high employment area for furniture. It seemed to be a natural combination for him."

"High Point is the place to be if you're interested in furniture," said Shane Malouf, who graduated in May and now works for Maitland-Smith Company in marketing. "That's where the action is. I met a lot of people who will be a help in the future, including the presidents of some companies. The classwork provided excellent preparation for the practical experience that we received."

Statistics back up the claims of those connected with the program. A recent survey of the home furnishings marketing program's 1981-86 alumni indicated that starting salaries for graduates were between \$15,000 and \$25,000. Ninety percent of the students were employed immediately upon graduation, and 77 percent were still employed in some facet of the furniture industry at the time of the survey.

Earlier graduates reported earning \$35,000 to \$50,000, with 60 percent in management positions. Others were in retail sales, wholesale sales, purchasing, customer relations, and interior design.

Campus News

New Core Curriculum Approved

After almost three years of research, study and work, the Educational Policies Committee, comprised of faculty and staff members from across the campus, has established new general education requirements for High Point College students.

The new core curriculum will be phased in over a period of three years, with freshman requirements being implemented during the Fall of 1989, sophomore requirements activated during the Fall of 1990 and junior/senior requirements activated during the Fall of 1991.

"The Educational Policies Committee is committed to an academic program, particularly during the first two years, which will result in students having obtained a basic core of knowledge — good reading, expressive and cognitive skills, and an awareness of the world around them," said Dr. Ron Ramke, who was chairman of the committee. "The first two years are considered a foundation upon which to build more in-depth, integral and critical learning during the junior and senior years."

A unifying theme for each of the four years will be utilized in the core, with particular courses exemplifying

and focusing on each theme. The themes and courses for each year are:

- Freshman Year — Theme: Human Images; Focus Course: a religion course in either World Religions or Old Testament/New Testament.

- Sophomore Year — Theme: Self and Society; Focus Course: Values and Ethics.

- Junior Year — Theme: Self, Society and the World; Focus Course: World Views.

- Senior Year — Theme: Vocation, Self, and the World; Focus Course: A senior capstone seminar in the major.

"The course in religion, other than being salient as a requirement in a church-related college, is important for providing a spiritual dimension to learning and for informing students of their religious heritage," said Ramke. "Values and Ethics broadens the perspective from the freshman year to gain an understanding of the individual as a responsible actor. The junior year theme expands the perspective from the sophomore year by examining world views, issues, or other cultures outside the United States. And the senior seminar in the major functions to tie the courses in the major together and to provide a perspective on the practical application of knowledge."

"Education has to be applicable to the changing times," said Dr. E. Vance Davis, Dean of the college. "The college wants to make sure that the basic, or core, education relates to the needs of a rapidly changing culture. Even in a business-oriented world, there is a new appreciation for a liberal arts, value-based education. We attempted to modify our core to meet those needs."

The Education Policies Committee also approved a program of "Writing Across the Curriculum," as part of the core curriculum. All core courses will be required to incorporate a significant writing component which begins in

freshman courses and builds skills through the sophomore year and beyond. The writing component will include essays on exams, journals, response/reaction papers, and formal term/research papers.

"The Educational Policies Committee is strongly committed to good expressive skills for our students," Ramke said. "Requiring students to write only in English courses is not sufficient in developing these skills. The responsibility for writing is clearly upon the entire faculty."

Crow Named Director of Continuing Education



Dr. Earl Crow has been named the director of the High Point College Continuing Education Program.

Crow will oversee a program that has grown dramatically since its inception in 1978. With campuses located in High Point and Winston-Salem, the college's Continuing Education Program served over 1,000 students during the 1988-89 academic year.

The program is geared toward adults who wish to continue their employment while at the same time recognize a need for undergraduate education. The program offers its students seven majors to choose from: accounting, business administration and economics, computer information systems, English, industrial and organizational psychology, psychology, and sociology.

Crow, a native of Wilmington, has been associated with High Point College since 1964. He served as chairman of the department of religion and philosophy for nine years and most recently has fulfilled a dual role as a professor in the religion and philosophy department and a development officer in the college's Office of Institutional Advancement. During the past year, Crow has been in consultation with many of the 60 plus companies involved with the Winston-Salem program concerning the expansion of the Madison Park campus, which opened in January, 1987.

Crow received the Meredith Clark Slane Distinguished Teaching-Service Award as the school's most outstanding professor in 1974 and has taught

in the Continuing Education Program since its inception.

"The Continuing Education Program is one of the finer programs we have going at the college," said High Point College President Dr. Jacob Martinson. "I am pleased to have a person of the caliber of Dr. Crow directing the program at this point in its history.

"The program has maintained its excellence because of strong leadership. That will certainly continue under the leadership of Dr. Crow and the many others who will work with him in this cooperative enterprise."

Crow received a Ph.D. in church history from the University of Manchester in England and his bachelor's and master's degrees from Duke University.


"This will be an entirely new experience for me," said Crow. "After 25 years of teaching and working with students, I have developed a certain philosophy of education. Moving into the director's role will afford me the opportunity to express that philosophy for an entire program."

"The goal that we have is to strengthen the college, the religion department, the preparation of people for life and to be true to the Methodist Conference and the city, which together gave the college birth and continue to support it through these years," Warlick said.

"I've found the students to be an invigorating group with which to work. We want to be effective. We want to reach as large a number of students in the worship experience on campus and provide a positive feed-in to the city of High Point.

"I think High Point College is on the way up," Warlick added. "We've got a good faculty and a good administration. I have been very impressed with the leadership he (Martinson) has given High Point College and the interest he has in making stronger the ties that the college and the religion department have with the Western North Carolina Conference of the United Methodist Church and the city of High Point."

Women's tennis coach Kitty Steele was named as Carolinas Conference Coach of the Year.



Simeon Joins Hall of Fame

A. J. "Tony" Simeon '33, who won more than 400 games and three state championships as basketball coach at High Point Central High School (previously High Point High), was recently inducted into the North Carolina Sports Hall of Fame.

Simeon was enshrined during ceremonies at the North Raleigh Hilton in May. Last fall, the North Carolina High School Athletic Association also honored Simeon by inducting him into its Hall of Fame.

Simeon, a native of Uniontown, PA, came to High Point College in 1929 through a football scholarship. He earned nine varsity letters at the college in football, track and wrestling before graduating in 1933.

In his 30-year coaching career at High Point Central, from 1936-1966, Simeon won three state championships in basketball and two in football. He coached in both the Shrine Bowl football game and the East-West basketball game. At various times, he also served as baseball, golf and track coach at High Point Central.

Simeon accepted the job of High Point City Schools Athletic Director in 1968 and served until retirement in 1976. In 1974, the city of High Point honored him by naming its new 10,000-seat football facility Simeon Stadium.

Simeon still receives letters from former students who thank him for turning their lives around. They remember the ways he cared for each of them, making sure they dressed well on game trips and making sure no one brought money along so those who couldn't afford to buy things would not be embarrassed.

Dr. Richard Crowder H'76 of High Point, District Superintendent of the High Point District of the United



Methodist Church and a former basketball player under Simeon, inducted him into the hall.

"Many of us, after all these years, still call him Coach, but he also is, and has been, a counselor, an encourager, the closest of friends, one who has helped to bring out the best in so many of us," Crowder said. "A fellow High Pointer, in reflecting upon (Simeon's) life, picked out one characteristic that is most valid. As his (Simeon's) name was mentioned, he said, 'Coach appears to be at ease with his life.' No other way can describe this caring, compassionate, consistent, competitive, capable Christian coach. We could look the state over and not find another who deserves to be inducted into the North Carolina Sports Hall of

Fame more than Coach Anthony J. ("Tony") Simeon."

Simeon accepted the award, first by thanking High Point College for the athletic scholarship it awarded him in 1929. He concluded his acceptance by saying:

"To all those who taught me to teach others, and to all those who helped me to teach others, I say thank you very much. I only wish my boys and girls (student-athletes) could be here tonight, because they are the ones who really earned this honor."

Simeon, who was a founder of the North Carolina High School Coaches Association and served as its president in 1951, resides in High Point with his wife of 52 years, Bessie Lee Simeon '34.



Aspire Campaign

College Sets New Fund-Raising Mark

High Point College has just completed an historic fund-raising year in 1988-89, receiving approximately \$2.9 million in gifts to set a new record at the college.


This record-breaking year has pushed the Aspire Campaign total to \$8.9 million after only 18 months. The \$20 million major gifts campaign is split into two phases. The first phase will run until May 31, 1991, with a goal of \$10 million. Despite being less than halfway into the first phase of the campaign, the college is only approximately \$1 million away from meeting the campaign's first phase goal.

"It's hard to know where to begin when one starts to give credit for all of the success that has occurred in the Aspire Campaign," said John C. Lefler, Vice President for Institutional Advancement. "I believe we are beginning to prove that with some large gifts and many small gifts you can see remarkable progress and achievement at High Point College. What we have experienced in the past months is a mere indicator of the success the college can enjoy with the support of the community."

The Aspire Campaign, which is being conducted by the Office of Institutional Advancement, includes such projects as the new Men's Residence Hall, the construction of a new athletic facility and a new fine arts center, renovation of historic buildings on campus, and the development of the Winston-Salem campus. Endowed funds for scholarships, an honors program and faculty development are also included.

NCNB Makes Pledge

NCNB of High Point has pledged \$50,000 in honor of J. Edward Pleasants, Senior Vice President of the

"We wanted to honor Ed Pleasants for the contributions he has made to NCNB during his career," said John A. Hamilton, City Executive of NCNB of High Point, in announcing the pledge. "We also knew of Ed's fondness for High Point College and felt this would be an appropriate way to show our appreciation for Ed. The fact that the Smiths joined us in this endeavor speaks well of their continued service to the community and their appreciation for Ed."

"We are pleased to be building a first-class facility that will not only serve the college but also the entire High Point Community," said High Point College President Dr. Jacob C. Martinson. "These pledges move us ever closer to starting construction of the complex. The college is deeply indebted to NCNB, Herman and Louise Smith, and Ed Pleasants for not only these generous pledges, but also for the benevolent service they have rendered to the college for many years."

College Receives Gift From Burriss Estate

High Point College has received \$187,115 from the estate of High Point

philanthropist Jack B. Burris, Sr.

The gift will go toward the construction of the James H. and Jesse E. Millis Athletic and Convocation Center. A yet to be determined portion of the facility will be named in Burris' honor.

Burris, who moved to High Point in 1911, was a self-made millionaire from his investments in insurance company stocks. He gave away millions of dollars to various causes. Burris died in January at the age of 95.

Jefferson-Pilot Fund Increases

W. Roger Soles According to W. Roger Soles, President and Chief Executive Officer of Jefferson-Pilot Corporation, the primary purpose of this grant "is to assist High Point College in its recruiting and maintaining of superior faculty members as it continues to build on a foundation of academic excellence."

A portion of the gift will be used to enhance and reinforce salaries of faculty members designated for the professorship, while another portion will be used for faculty development and study.

Alumni Contributions Set New Record

High Point College alumni contributed over \$1.2 million during 1988-89, which exceeded the previous record by more than \$700,000.

The total represents a 133 percent increase over 1987-88, when the record total of \$526,813 was tallied. All gifts made during the past year also count as contributions to the College's \$20 million Aspire campaign goal. The campaign has reached the \$8.9 million mark as of the end of May.

As in past years, the overwhelming majority of the support — approximately \$730,000 — was designated for institutional scholarships. Of this amount, a major scholarship gift was received from the estate of Sarah Holmes '34. Miss Holmes, who died in 1987, left a bequest of one-half of her estate for the John, Fallie, and Sarah Holmes Scholarship Fund. The disbursements to the fund from the estate exceeded \$600,000 during 1988-89.

The total amount designated for scholarships also includes gifts made during the November phonathon to the General College Scholarship Fund. This endowed fund, which is used for grants based on financial need, now has a principal balance in excess of \$80,000, with more than 90 percent of its holdings coming from alumni.

The percentage of alumni contributing to the College remained steady for the third straight year, with approximately 23 percent of alumni participating.

"We are pleased that the alumni of High Point College continue to be

interested in helping the present students," said Donna J. Burton, director of alumni affairs. "The needs are many, but the alumni have recognized them, and have helped in many ways, both financial and intangible.

"The students join me in thanking all alumni who made contributions this year."

Budd Recognized By Harvard


High Point College trustee and alumnus Richard Budd, Class of 1963, President and CEO of Budd Services, Inc., the largest provider of on-site maintenance services in Winston-Salem, was recently recognized by Harvard Business School, which designed a case study on Budd Services, Inc.

Last year Budd Services, Inc. took in \$15 million in annual revenues, employed 1,200 employees, and served 1,000 clients. The company started in 1962 as a vendor of janitorial supplies. It began as a small company with four employees. Today the services include janitorial services, landscape maintenance, carpet cleaning, and outside security services; the company also sells grass seed. Budd Services operates six divisions with varying degrees of autonomy and corporate control; North State Supply (the original janitorial supplies sales division), Budd Janitorial (a contract service), Budd Landscape (an outdoor maintenance service), and Budd Security (a security guard service), Morris Cleaning (a specialty cleaning team), and Weaver Seed (a grass seed business).

In the Harvard Business School case study, Richard Budd commented on his business philosophy. "My strategy is *service*. Too many people look only to financial statements and matters solely by the numbers, but I don't believe in that."

"Profits come as a result of what you give to the customer, but profits aren't everything. I am much more concerned with quality and with a way of life. I want our people to be actively involved with their families and their communities, and I try to set an example."

The company is viewed as a family business. Richard and Sylvia's son,

Joe, is also a graduate of High Point College and is now Vice President of Marketing for Budd Services. Today, Richard Budd is the sole owner of the corporation, buying out all outstanding shares in 1984. He sees the company growing from \$15 million today to \$50 million, and plans to create much of that growth through acquisitions.

Much of the Harvard case study dealt with computers and processes at Budd Services, Inc. With a sophisticated computer network, Budd Services, Inc. is able to handle job costing — the creation of a profit and loss statement for each job, preprinted time reports, budgets, revenues, costs, time-tables, and monthly billings.

Gerald Chrisco, a chief strategist in the Budd Services organization, stated that the purpose is to put the com-

puterized processes together into a cohesive whole. "We're a team at Budd Services, and we care about what we are doing. We want to be the best team that we can be, and that extends to computer operations." Mr. Chrisco is Vice President of Finance and Administration and the Chief Financial Officer.



Kester is a past member of the High Point College Board of Visitors and has been president of the Panther Club, the school's athletic booster organization.



Faculty Profile

Warlick Tackles Religion at HPC

There have been two turning points during Dr. Hal Warlick's journey to his current position at High Point College, where he is Chairman of the Religion and Philosophy Department and Minister to the College. To understand these turning points is to understand Hal Warlick.

Warlick arrived at his first crossroads in 1965 at a Greenville, SC hospital. As he lay on his back for 10 days following knee surgery, the 18-year-old Furman University freshman began to see that perhaps he would not be the next Raymond Berry, catching footballs to the cheers of thousands in the National Football League.

"Sitting in that hospital, I suddenly realized that even after the knee healed, I wouldn't be as fast," said Warlick. "It made me think about my future. And when I got out, people in the history department at Furman seemed to take a special interest in me. They, along with my roommates, gave me a desire to study."

Warlick's athletic career didn't end there. Warlick, who earned 14 varsity letters in four sports at North Augusta (SC) High School, was switched to defensive back following his sophomore year at Furman, and he was one of the Paladins defensive standouts for his final two years.

But there became room for other things in Warlick's life besides athletics. He tackled the books like opposing ballcarriers and earned his bachelor's degree in history from Furman. He went on to Harvard University Divinity School and Vanderbilt University Divinity School, earning degrees from both institutions.

In the meantime, he married Diane Norman, whom he met at Furman, and their family has grown to include

two sons, Scott and Coulter. He decided to enter the ministry and pastored churches in North Carolina, South Carolina and Texas. In between pastoral stints, Warlick served as Director of Ministerial Studies at Harvard Divinity School.

As senior minister of Emerywood Baptist Church in High Point, Warlick's future in the ministry appeared bright. Since he arrived in 1982, the church had grown dramatically both in membership and financial stability. But nine months ago, he found himself standing at his second crossroads.

Higher education came to call on him again, this time in the form of High Point College President Jacob C. Martinson. He wanted Warlick to come on board to head up the Religion and Philosophy Department. Warlick decided to visit an old friend from his hometown, former Furman football coach and current NC State football coach Dick Sheridan.

"The determining factor in my

coming to High Point College was a two-and-a-half hour lunch I had with Dick Sheridan in Raleigh," said Warlick. "I wanted to talk to someone who knew what it was like to turn down attractive jobs, since he had just turned down both the Georgia and South Carolina head coaching jobs. You wonder if you keep turning them down if you'll ever get another one.

"I thought I would miss preaching on Sunday mornings. But Dick asked me how often I preached. I said once a week. He told me how often ministers and coaches base their happiness on a limited amount of performances per year. Genuine happiness comes when you're doing something that makes you happy 365 days a year.

"I asked myself how you can go from Harvard to High Point College. Well, Dick helped me with that, too. You don't get to teach any more classes or preach any more sermons at Harvard than you do at High Point College. The work itself is not the basis for total satisfaction. It's the people you deal with on a day-to-day basis. Sometimes, size isn't everything.

"After preaching all over the country, I wondered what it would be like to work on a small college campus. Well, obviously I decided to take the job. And Dick was right. The total experience has been very enjoyable."

Each time Warlick has come to a turning point, he has chosen the practical path and left the flash behind. This philosophy seems to spill over into everything in his life.

Ask him what his greatest athletic moment was and he won't mention any honors or the fact that he received a brief tryout in the National Football League. Instead, he beams as he remembers a 70-yard punt return for a touchdown he made late in a Purple

White spring intrasquad scrimmage game at Furman that tied the score. The touchdown kept either squad from losing and running wind sprints after the game in front of an audience, which made his teammates very happy. It made him even happier.

The same goes for his brief tenure at High Point College. He changed the chapel service from Sunday mornings to Wednesday evenings to build a better relationship between the college and the community. Students on campus could attend the church of their choice in the community on Sunday mornings and area churches could participate occasionally in the college chapel services.

He also set up a Board of Stewards, made up of students, to help take care of the chapel and its services. This has helped the students feel a greater sense of bonding with this aspect of college life. These simple strokes have worked wonders. Average attendance at chapel

services has tripled over the previous year.

"To me, religion is not holding up Bible verse signs at football games or schools where touchdowns are scored for Jesus," said Warlick. "I grew up with down-to-earth, salt-of-the-earth types of people who are very real in their faith. You don't have to segregate yourselves into little prayer groups, isolated from the rest of the world. People want religion to be real, not arrogant, flashy, or a mere form of entertainment. That doesn't have any staying power."

Warlick also speaks of staying power when he discusses choosing a college with teenagers and their parents. "I tell them there are six factors in choosing a college: roommate, roommate, roommate, friends, friends, and friends," said Warlick. "Don't worry so much about the library or classroom facilities. About all colleges can take care of those

needs. You're better off being surrounded by friends who possess good habits. Worry about the people your son or daughter is going to be around. Go to a school where you know he or she is going to be taken care of by people who know his or her name."

And according to Martinson, Warlick has plenty of staying power at High Point College. "Hal has brought a renewed interest to religious life on campus, both in the chapel and in the classroom," said Martinson. "He has helped to develop a sound value base on campus for students, as well as for others in the college community. He is a published author (his seventh book, *From Cynicism to Optimism*, dealing with how Old Testament messages relate to today's world, is due out in August), highly educated and a widely-called upon speaker. He is recognized by his peers as an outstanding minister and scholar. And he is appreciated by his friends for his generous good will."

Aspire Campaign

Athletic and Convocation Center Plans Unveiled



Final plans for the James H. and Jesse E. Millis Athletic Convocation Center were unveiled on December 5 at a meeting of the steering committee for development of the project. Construction costs for the facility are estimated at \$5.5 million.

George Erath, chairman of the Aspire Campaign and of the committee which is coordinating fund raising for the facility, said that the plans call for expansion and complete renovation of the existing Alumni Gymnasium and construction of an adjacent building. The new wing will include an eight-lane Olympic swimming pool, racquetball courts, and a fitness center for aerobics and weight training, in addition to offices and classrooms for the Department of Health, Physical Education, and Recreation. Mr. Erath announced that approximately \$2 million has been raised for the project.

Originally envisioned as a simple restoration of Alumni Gymnasium, the concept has broadened to include the fitness and aquatics center next door, said John Lefler, Vice President for Institutional Advancement at High Point College.

"The Millis Center will be utilized for a wide variety of purposes," Lefler reported. "Those students who are in our physical education classes and who participate in the intramural program, our athletes, and any others who wish to take part in health and fitness activities will be welcome to use the facilities.

"In addition," he continued, "the renovated gymnasium will give us flexibility so we can combine the fixed and retractable seating available for arena sports with additional seats on the playing floor to accommodate audi-



ences ranging from 2,500 to 3,000 for such events as concerts and convocations.

"Fine institutions require excellent facilities. This project will be a credit to the College and to the Triad."

Once refurbished, the building will incorporate the Georgian architecture well-known on the campus. A new entrance will be created off West College Drive, with a circular driveway and a white columned facade. A separate entrance to the aquatics and fitness center will be built on the north side facing the field hockey and baseball fields. The result will be an

attractive complement to a campus which is already known for its beauty.

Site preparation and construction are expected to begin in late spring or early summer of 1990. The new facility is scheduled to be open in late 1991 or early in 1992.

Alumni Gymnasium was built in 1957. It is now home to the annual Carolinas Conference men's basketball tournament, as well as a host of other athletic events. The new complex is named for James H. and Jesse E. Millis, longtime benefactors of High Point College, who have served the College with distinction since 1960.

Faculty Notes

Carroll Selected to Serve on Committee

Dr. Dennis G. Carroll '74, Director of Teacher Education and Chairman of the Education Department at High Point College, has been selected to serve on the North Carolina Committee of the Commission on Secondary Schools of the Southern Association of Colleges and Schools.

"The State Committee always takes into consideration the commitment of the selected educator to the improvement of secondary education, the experience such an individual has in the SACS accreditation process, and his or her ability as an instructional leader and administrator," said Robert R. Jones, Chairman of the North Carolina Secondary Committee, SACS. "We believe that Dennis has these qualities."

Prior to joining the High Point College faculty in 1988, Carroll had served as a consultant for the College Board's Southeastern Regional Office in Atlanta, conducting workshop sessions for teachers in Advanced Placement English who are beginning new programs or who seek curriculum modifications. He was also selected as the 1984-85 Guilford County Teacher of the Year.

High Point College assistant professor of English **Alice E. Sink** is a recipient of the North Carolina Writers' Network Writers and Readers Series Award. Ten fiction writers were selected by judges to read their own works at sites across the state during 1990.

In addition, a paper Sink presented last spring at the eighth Annual Symposium of North Carolina Writers will be published in two volumes, *The Home Truths of Doris Betts* and *Women of the Piedmont Triad*.

The American Humanics organization at High Point College has placed 49 students in 23 agencies.

Alumni Phonathon Smashing Success



The fourth annual Alumni Phonathon was a smashing success, raising over \$31,000, due to the efforts of the student volunteers who generously donated their time to call alumni around the country to solicit gifts for the college. This year's drive was held on November 7-9 and November 13-16 with ten students placing calls each night.

The student volunteers are from various campus organizations such as American Humanics and fraternities and sororities. Additionally, members of Patrick Haun's class on Fundraising/Finances for Human Service Organizations helped with the phoning. Mr. Haun remarked that the class is set up to teach the students how to "apply theoretical concepts to real-life situations through experiential oppor-

tunities and service learning." The annual phonathon provided the students with the chance to gain this type of experience.

Jeri Meyers, Director of Alumni Affairs, with the help of Carol McClain, Administrative Assistant, organizes the phonathon and recruits the volunteers. Ms. Meyers stated that "this fundraising effort is a success due to the student volunteers. Without the selfless donation of their time and effort, we would not be able to reach our alumni. We sincerely appreciate everything that they do for High Point College."

Carol McClain pointed out that "the alumni ask about different professors, changes, and sororities and fraternities." Alumni enjoy talking with the students and getting their view points on campus life.

Each year the Office of Alumni Affairs uses the phonathon as its primary fundraising project. Generally, the general scholarship fund is the central focus for the fundraising efforts. However, this year money was solicited for both the general scholarship fund and the new Millis Athletic and Convocation Center. Contributions are not limited to these two needs. Gifts may be designated for any program, scholarship or unrestricted fund that the donor would like.

Job Fair Works

The Job Fair sponsored by the North Carolina Career Consortium, a joint venture of eight colleges/universities, works and Jill Stansell is proof. Five years ago, as a High Point College senior, Ms. Stansell attended the Job Fair in hopes of launching her career. This year Ms. Stansell returned as a recruiter for IBM, the company that hired her. Ms. Stansell said of the Fair, "It was worth it for me. It got me a job."

The consortium is comprised of eight member-schools: Davidson, Elon, Greensboro, Guilford, High Point, Meredith, Salem Colleges and Wake Forest University. This was the sixth annual Fair organized by this group. Approximately 500 students and alumni attended the Fair, hosted by High Point College, at the Radisson Hotel in High Point. With 90 companies and 130 recruiters on hand, the job-seekers were able to get exposure and information. Dorothy Boardman of Bankers & Shippers Insurance attended the Fair for the first time and said that she will be back next year. "They're very interested students," Ms. Boardman said. "They're well-qualified and very interested. They present themselves well."

Randy Rogers of Milliken and Company agreed. "We've had a real good group of students," he said. "They're asking a lot of questions. They seem very prepared. I'm losing my voice. I'm talking up a storm," he added.

An employment representative for the Research Triangle Institute, Gerard Collins said that the Job Fair has become "a regular part of our recruiting program," giving the company an opportunity to meet students from schools they do not normally visit. Collins stated, "we can't be in all places at once."

Besides being held in High Point for the first time, the consortium decided to "try something new," according to Joyce Wainer, Director of the Career

Development Center at HPC. The Radisson Hotel was the site of this year's Job Fair and Ms. Wainer reported that everyone liked the hotel atmosphere better.

Becky York, Office Manager of Personnel for the Hafele American Company, commented, "It's really nice having it in the Radisson. The surroundings are nicer, and it was more convenient in terms of getting here."

Collins and York both stated that attendance seemed to be the same as last year's. The general consensus was that the Job Fair was an excellent source for applicants. York said, "I've seen some real high-caliber folks come through."

Employers are asked to complete evaluation sheets on the event and Ms. Wainer remarked that she "felt really good" about the comments. She noted that the employers were enthusiastic and saw the attending students more committed if they left the college to go to the Job Fair.

A HPC senior, Terry Fox, felt the Job Fair offered him several benefits. "I had two interviews, but I also had the opportunity to meet representatives from other companies and receive information regarding those companies."

Not only does the Job Fair work for the students and alumni, it is also very beneficial for the employers. Ms. Wainer remarked, "It is a very, very big undertaking, but I feel that it is worth all the time."

Career Alumni Day Returns for Sixth Year


Career Alumni Day, a project co-sponsored by the Career Development Center and the High Point College Alumni Association, will be held January 31 in the Campus Center.





Job Fair '89

Campus News

Card Catalogs Thing of the Past

Card catalogs will soon be a thing of the past for High Point College, along with four other area colleges. A computer system will be linking their library collections, thus making the old card catalog obsolete.

HPC, along with Guilford, Greensboro, Salem and Elon, will be automating its library collection and will gain access to approximately 500,000 books in the next five years. This effort has been made possible by a \$2.5 million award from a federal Title III grant.

This innovation will aid college students with their studies by accessing other libraries connected to the computer system. When the network is completed, a student at High Point College will be able to find a book at Guilford College library and know whether the needed book is on reserve, checked out or available. Currently, students have no way of knowing the status of books on other campuses unless they visit and search the card catalogs. "The thing, which I think will make it so attractive to us, is if a student wants a book and can't find it here, he may find it in one of the other libraries and check it out, just by going to the computer. It makes all these volumes accessible; that's a marvelous thing," stated HPC President Jacob C. Martinson.

Director of Library Services, Judith Hitchcock stated, "electronic searching is much more sophisticated. It is the wave of the future." She added, "it will be a much quicker process. The students will come in and sit at the computers and do their searching. It's going to increase the collection available to our students and make using our system a more efficient process. We're all very excited about it."

The Piedmont Independent College



Association of North Carolina (PICA) has tallied the books each school will convert to the computer system and have given them as follows: HPC 110,000; Greensboro 70,000; Guilford 170,000; Elon 80,000; and Salem 50,000. The consortium, PICA, applied for the federal grant for the above mentioned colleges. Dan Moury, president of PICA, noted that the five institutions will have to negotiate for additional funding each year, but do not expect to encounter any problems.

The grant will cover the salaries of eight staff members, computer hardware and software. The new Telecommunications center to be com-

pleted next year will be housed on the Guilford College campus.

With the exception of Greensboro, the other four colleges have already begun to automate their collections through SOLINET, a computer system based in Atlanta. They will continue this process and eventually hook up with a new system based in Ohio, according to Dan Moury.

The computer network is only in the planning stages, but Moury has hopes of linking this system to libraries in the University of North Carolina system. "It would certainly be our hope, down the road, that all academic libraries in North Carolina could be tied together," he said.

High Point College Returns to Freiburg, West Germany

For the second year, High Point College will be sponsoring a special May program which includes two weeks of study in Freiburg, West Germany. This international study experience will focus on the scheduled 1992 open internal market of the European Community, and contemporary German civilization. The program, which will be conducted by High Point College instructors entirely in English, will include visits to businesses in the Black Forest region and Switzerland, as well as trips to the Swiss Stock Exchange in

Zurich, and the European Parliament in Strasbourg, France.

Students enrolling in the Freiburg courses may earn six credit hours through the Business and Modern Foreign Language departments, but interested parties who would like to accompany the group as auditors are welcome. Panther Peaks



A capsule summary of intercollegiate and alumni sports news at High Point College:

Soccer: High Point College finished 16-5 and won the inaugural Carolinas Conference tournament championship. The 16 victories set a single-season school record. Senior midfielder Dexter Gillmore, junior defender Thomas Ingram and junior goalkeeper Yves Fischer were selected to the National Soccer Coaches Association of America All-South team. Gillmore set a single-season school scoring record with 18 goals. He added eight assists and was also voted co-MVP of the Carolinas Conference tournament. Ingram anchored a defense which posted a school-record 13 shutouts and allowed only 17 goals. Fischer recorded a school-record 12 shutouts and a .63 goals against average this season.

Volleyball: The Lady Panthers won the Carolinas Conference championship and reached the NAIA District 26 finals before ending their season with a 21-10 record. Dr. Joe Ellenburg was named Carolinas Conference Coach of the Year, Jimena Vargas was selected as Carolinas Conference Player of the Year, and Vargas joined Sharon Hill and Denise Bickley on the All-Carolinas Conference team.

Cross Country: Fielding a women's team for the first time in school history, the Lady Panthers shared the Carolinas Conference and NAIA District 26 championships with Belmont Abbey. Cindy Harvey and Tracy McIver earned all-conference and all-district honors. The men's cross country team, the first fielded by the college in 14 years, finished second in the conference and district. John High and Terry Kersey earned all-conference and all-district honors. Both teams were coached by Bob Davidson.

Field Hockey: The Lady Panthers finished with an 8-11 record, including

a third-place finish in the Deep South Tournament. Julie Taylor, Kim Morcom, and Muriel Brady qualified for and participated in the National Field Hockey Festival.

Men's Basketball: At press time, the Panthers had struggled to a 2-4 start but did capture the Catawba Civitan Classic with convincing victories against West Liberty State and Catawba. Senior guard George Byers, who averaged 12.7 points and 4.3 rebounds per game last season, is the lone returning starter for the defending Carolinas Conference champions.

Women's Basketball: The Lady Panthers had gotten off to a 4-4 start at press time, with point guard Tracy McIver starting to emerge as one of the premier players in the Carolinas Conference.

Daryl Barnes '77, head football coach at Richmond County (NC) High School, led the Raiders to their second consecutive 4-A state championship with a 39-13 victory over Asheville Reynolds at Kenan Stadium in Chapel Hill.

Richmond County piled up 662 points this year en route to its second straight 15-0 season. The Raiders have won 30 games in a row and 38 of the last 39. Richmond County was ranked all season as one of the top prep teams in the nation by *USA Today*.


