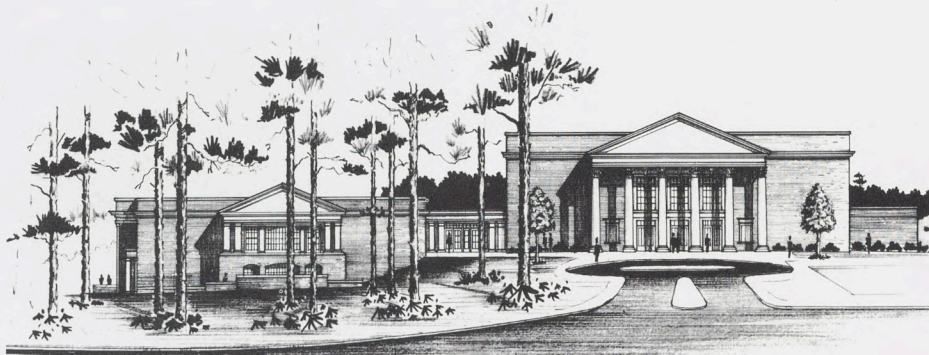

JAMES H. & JESSE E. MILLIS ATHLETIC/CONVOCATION CENTER



Two anonymous challenge gifts totaling \$500,000 have been received by High Point College toward the construction of the James H. and Jesse E. Millis Athletic/Convocation Center.

The receipt of these start-up gifts will be contingent upon them being matched on a dollar for dollar basis on or before the beginning of construction, which is scheduled in June.

The Millis Center is a \$6 million project that will include the renovation of the existing athletic arena and the construction of an adjacent building encompassing an eight-lane Olympic pool, offices and classrooms, a fitness center for weight training and aerobics, locker rooms, racquetball courts, and meeting and reception areas.

The new facility has been named in honor of Jim and Jesse Millis of High Point, long-time benefactors of the college. The estimated timetable for site development, renovation, and new construction will be between 15 and 18 months and is expected to be completed by the end of 1992.

"The Millis Center is a project which we have dreamed of and planned for quite a long time," said John C. Lefler, Vice President for Institutional Advancement at High Point College. "If there is a successful response from other donors, these two challenge gifts from college

trustees will give us the boost we need to start construction on a timely basis.

"Any gift received by the college prior to the construction in June will be matched according to the terms of the challenge, as long as the gifts total \$500,000," said Lefler. "Pledges made as a result of the 1990 phonathon will be matched by this challenge if the money is received before June."

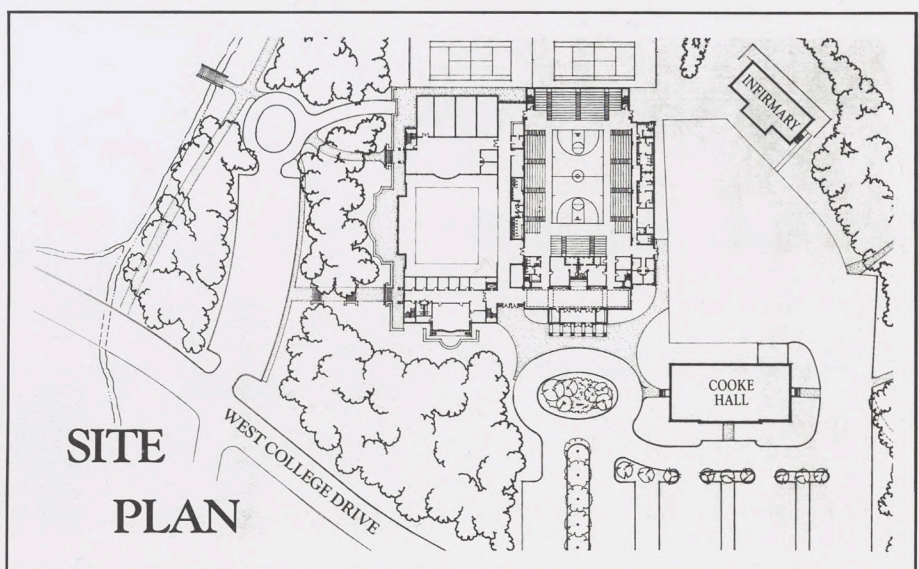
According to Lefler, the college requires that at least half of the project cost must be received before actual construction takes place. To date, the college has received \$2.2 million in gifts

toward the Millis Center. Any previous pledge will not count toward the challenge unless it is received before June.

"During the past 12 months, the college has concentrated on soliciting gifts and pledges in support of this project," said Lefler. "The Millis Center has been designated by the college's Board of Trustees as the college's number one fund raising need."



Cooper Awarded Fulbright Scholarship

Katherine L. Cooper, a senior at High Point College, has been granted a Fulbright Scholarship for graduate study abroad.

Cooper is an international business and French major from Waldorf, Maryland. She is one of only 40 college students in the United States to receive this particular grant. Cooper becomes the college's second Fulbright recipient in five years.

The purpose of the Fulbright program is to enable the government of the United States to increase mutual understanding between the people of the United States and the people of other countries. The primary source of funding is an annual appropriation made by the Congress to the U.S. Information Agency. Grants are made to U.S. citizens and nationals of other countries for a variety of educational activities, primarily university teaching, advanced research, graduate study, and teaching in elementary and secondary schools.

Cooper has been selected as a French Government Teaching Assistant, which will involve teaching English conversation in French secondary schools. Recipients are expected to be well-rounded and articulate and have the initiative necessary for teaching conversational English. She will be in France for eight months, beginning in September.

"I have been studying French for eight years but I have never had the opportunity to go to France," said Cooper. "This is my opportunity. I hope to get a better cultural understanding of France and improve my language skills. My career objective is to teach French at the junior high or high school level in the United States. I have many of the qualifications on paper, but this will solidify my ability to teach effectively in my own mind."

Dr. Carole Head, department chair

of modern foreign languages at High Point College, believes the award is a culmination of Cooper's hard work at the school. "Katherine is the kind of student you target for such an honor," said Head. "Since her freshman year, we have pointed her in this direction. She will reap many benefits from this experience and will be an excellent ambassador for High Point College and

young women in general."

While at High Point College, Cooper has been a Presidential Scholar, president of the Baptist Student Union, a French language tutor, and a member of the Pi Delta Phi, Delta Mu Delta, and Phi Sigma Iota honor societies.

Cooper is the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. W.W. Cooper, Jr., of Waldorf, Maryland.

HPC Students Participate in Trial Lawyers Competition

Nine High Point College students planning on making their careers in law attended a mock trial competition held in Des Moines, Iowa and were awarded outstanding new team honors during the weekend of February 16 - 17. Drake University, which has hosted the tournament for the seven years of its existence, brought over 100 teams from over 70 colleges and universities representing 26 states to the competition. Dr. Vagn Hansen, chair of the HPC History and Political Science Department, served as advisor to the team of students traveling to the tournament. Chad Barker, Brian Blankenship, Tucker Clagett, David Duncan, Rick Ferrell, Eric

Gardner, Steve Hughes, Cindy Smith and Leigh Stewart formed the two teams sent to the mock trials.

In preparation for the competition, Dr. Hansen organized practices for the two teams that included direction and judging from practicing trial attorneys in High Point. The competition was designed for the students to act as both lawyers and witnesses and the HPC students were coached in performing as both. Judges evaluated the student's performance in the competition and decided the verdict and then awarded points for individual student's abilities.

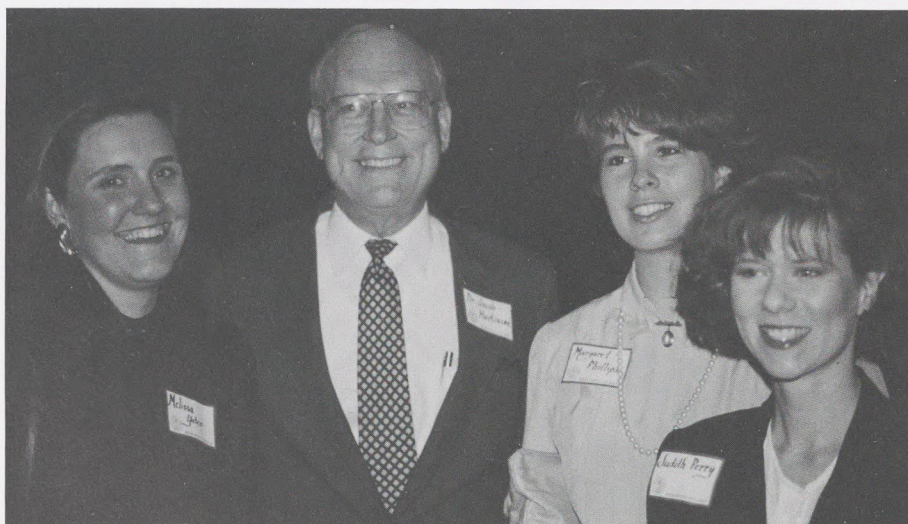


The HPC Mock Trial Team at Drake University

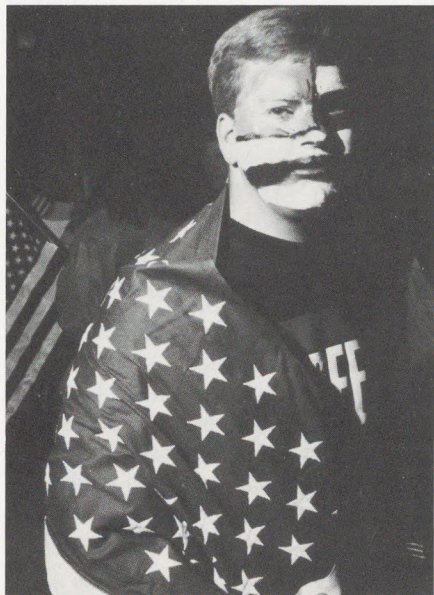

The Lifestyles section of the **The High Point Enterprise** presented a profile on Dr. David Sterling-Decker, assistant professor of history and political science. The article was based on his political views involving the Middle East, where he lived and studied for 11 months while on a Fulbright grant in Sudan. He believes many myths concerning the Arab people exist in the United States.

The **North Carolina Christian Advocate** featured HPC's involvement in the Cities In Schools program, which places a volunteer partner with at-risk high school students to provide them with weekly tutoring, conversation, guidance, and friendship. Twelve HPC students are volunteering their time as partners in the High Point city schools.

Jodie Spurgeon, a sophomore at HPC, was pictured and featured in **The High Point Enterprise** for her role in the High Point Police Explorers program. Explorers assist police with parades, fill in as school-crossing guards, and act as a support unit for High Point police reserves. Explorers also accompany police officers on routine patrol. Spurgeon, an Explorers captain, has been with the program since she was 14 and was originally the only female Explorer.

Mohamed I. Hakki, Washington bureau chief for the Kuwaiti newspaper **Al-Anba**, spoke at High Point College in the midst of the Persian Gulf war and was featured in **The Greensboro News & Record**. He predicted a quick and decisive end to the conflict.

The High Point Enterprise featured a program conducted by the High Point YMCA and HPC. The tutoring and recreational pro-

gram is called Right Track and helps middle school students with their studies and social skills. The students meet with volunteers from HPC every Tuesday and Thursday after school for an hour of work and an hour of fun.

The High Point Enterprise conducted an extensive interview with HPC Vice President for Institutional Advancement John Lefler concerning the Montlieu Avenue relocation project. Lefler explained the surprising timing of the announcement and some of the ramifications of the project for the college and the community.

HPC Dean of Students Gart Evans and High Point mayor Roy Culler were guests on Town Meeting, a **WMFR-AM** talk show hosted by Larry Craven and Bobbi Martin. Discussion centered on the Montlieu Avenue relocation project and phone calls from the listening audience were received on the air during the broadcast.

The High Point Enterprise featured a student rally in support of the U.S. troops in the Middle East. A crowd of over 100 students met in front of the Campus Center to offer a prayer, sing the National Anthem, and sign copies of a letter of support to the troops.

Greensboro's **WFMY-TV**, High Point's **WGHP-TV**, and **The High Point Enterprise** all featured a class taught by Dr. Earl Crow, professor of religion and philosophy, entitled, "Christian Perspectives on War and Peace." The discussion course was particularly pertinent because of the Persian Gulf war. One of the main questions discussed in the course was: "Is it a moral option for Christians to fight in a war?"

Ingram, Gibson Selected for Senior Bowl

High Point College All-America soccer player Thomas Ingram of Belfast, Northern Ireland, will cap an all-star collegiate career by playing in the Senior Bowl April 21 in Las Cruces, New Mexico.

"For me, it's sort of another trip of a lifetime," says Ingram, a 5-9 defender who will participate with 31 other top NAIA players in the annual Senior Bowl. "It rounds off the whole college career for me, basically.

"When I first came here, I thought that was a trip of a lifetime. Now, I'm going on another one."

Ingram won't be alone on the trip. HPC soccer coach Woody Gibson, who helped bring Ingram to the United States nearly five years ago, has been selected as an assistant coach for the Senior Bowl's East squad.

"I think it's quite an honor," said Gibson. "This is only the third year they have had a Senior Bowl game with the NAIA, and all the other coaches that have been selected for this in the first couple of years have been outstanding. They've been around the NAIA for quite a few years, won national championships and contributed to the NAIA, so to be selected as part of that special group is very nice."

For Ingram, the selection comes on the heels of many other honors on the playing field and in the classroom. When he made the NAIA All-America team this year, Ingram became the first male athlete at HPC to earn All-America honors three straight years since Gene Littles, now head coach of the NBA's Charlotte Hornets, showcased his basketball skills in Alumni Gymnasium in the late '60s.

Ingram was also recently honored as a Millis Scholar-Athlete, having obtained a 3.4 grade point average during the fall semester, and is scheduled to graduate in May with a degree in physical education.

But despite Ingram's success, his Irish

family has struggled to understand the importance of his individual honors. "They're starting to understand it more now," said Ingram. "Some members of my family are planning to come over (for his May graduation), so when they come over, I think they'll realize more just what sort of an honor it was."

According to Ingram, his father's advice helped shape his successful career. "As my dad kept telling me when I was a kid, you're only as good as the people around you," Ingram says. "So, I've depended a lot on trying to motivate the people around me so it would make my job that much easier.

"I didn't really think I was a good player. I thought if I did the simple things . . . I mean coaches emphasize to do the basic things and that the others will come later. That's what I tried to do. That's what my philosophy was. That's why I wasn't really a flashy player. I just did the basic things."

Gibson will take Ingram's solid performance over flash anytime. "He has obviously been an outstanding player, as a three-time All-America," said Gibson. "He's been very much a leader of the players, on and off the field. I think he is very well respected by the other players. They look up to him.

"From his background, coming from Belfast and being a little older — he was 19 when he first got here — he was a lot more mature and as a result has lent a lot of maturity to a lot of the younger players. Even as a freshman, he was much more mature than a normal college freshman. He has been someone I could turn to and depend on as a player, as a captain, when something needed to be done.

"But from more than just a player's standpoint, because three-time All-Americans are kind of hard to find, he has probably contributed more to High Point College as a student and as a person than he has in soccer."

Panthers' Lisk Wins Osborne Award

High Point College baseball player Andrew Lisk has been named the winner of the 1990 - 91 Murphy Osborne Student - Athlete Award presented by the Carolinas Conference.

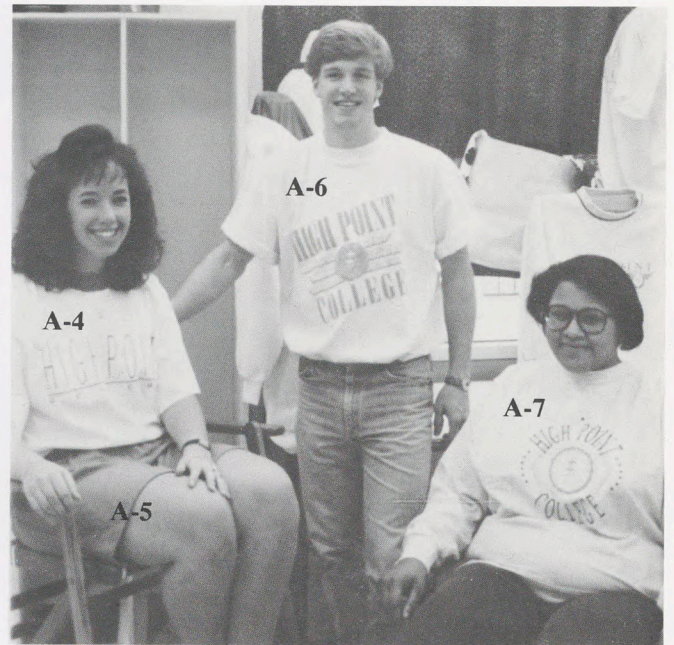

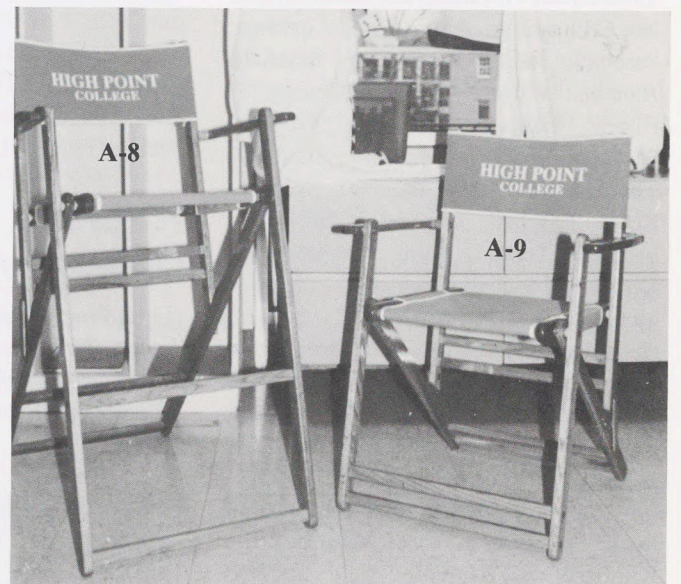

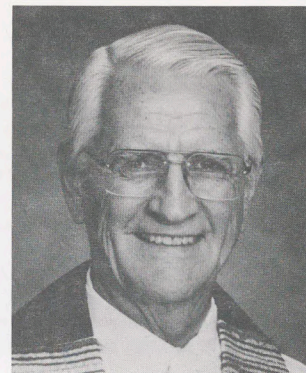

Soles Addresses College's Largest Ever Graduating Class

W. Roger Soles, chairman and president of Jefferson-Pilot Corporation, told 403 students in the largest ever graduating class at High Point College that learning does not stop with a college degree.

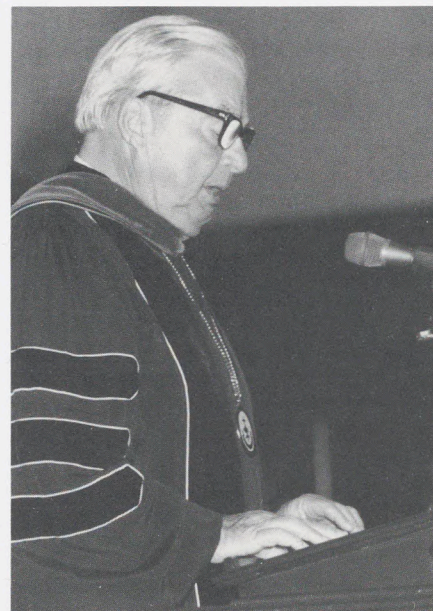
Soles, the chairman of the board of trustees at High Point College and an active member of West Market Street United Methodist Church in Greensboro, delivered the May 4 commencement address before a capacity crowd in excess of 2,500 family members and friends gathered in Alumni Gymnasium for the ceremony.

Soles said education is more than a mere accumulation of facts. "A school cannot endure as a concourse of strangers who just look for knowledge and facts," Soles said. "Colleges are more than an academic reflection on a lonely competitive world. Education's

best gift is a community, a community in mind and spirit where knowledge, facts and life can be learned and lived.

"Across these years, you have been immersed in ideas and truth," said Soles. "Do not stop taking on new ideas and renewed truth. In many ways, your learning has just begun. The newest thing in the world is the development of a new moral awareness over and over again. Work at it. Develop it. Don't ever let it become old."

Soles encouraged the graduates to build upon their sound educational foundation. "We need to make good use of what we learned and remember that learning does not stop here with a college degree—not even a degree as good as this one. Dr. Fred T. Yeats, professor of biology, was presented the Meredith Clark Slane Distinguished Teaching-Service Award during commencement exercises.

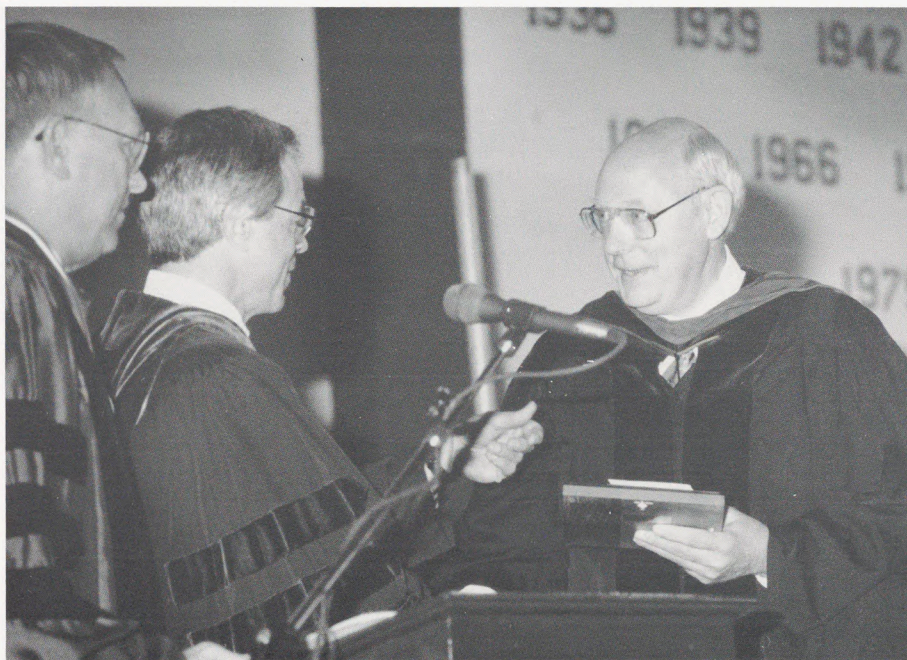
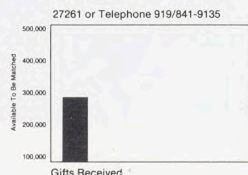

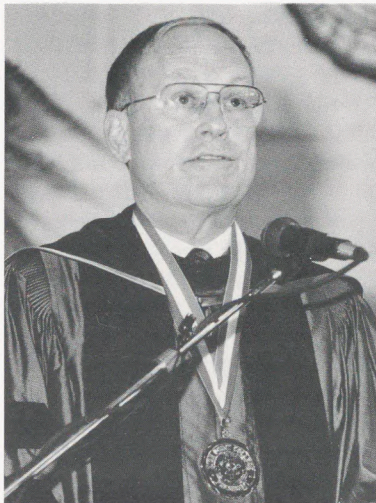

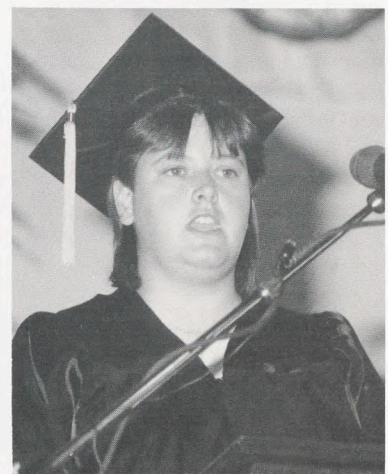

Alumni Profile

HPC's Marching Band and Olin Blickensderfer

In the mid 1930's, Dr. P.E. Lindley, dean of the college, had a dream for High Point College and the student body. He saw a marching and concert band that would help to distinguish the college from others and be an asset to the students. While attending classes at the University of Chicago, Dr. Lindley heard about the outstanding band program the Gary, Indiana school system had. Upon his return to High Point, he wrote to the Gary School Board inquiring if there was anyone in the program who might be interested in working with the newly formed High Point College Band. This fortuitous letter led him to Olin Blickensderfer.

Olin was born and raised in Dover, Ohio and lived there until his senior year in high school. Upon arrival at Emerson High School in Gary, Olin learned he only needed to take an economics course for graduation. The principal was aware of Olin's musical capabilities, so he assigned him to the band director for the remainder of each day. This move enabled Olin to gain

vast experience in teaching, directing, and marching choreography. This background was just what HPC was looking for, and High Point College was what Olin Blickensderfer wanted.

The High Point College band began in 1936 with now renown organist and composer A. C. Lovelace, Jr. as the first student conductor. In 1937, Olin came to HPC as a student and the student conductor for the newly formed band. He worked to create a much sought after marching band in North Carolina. Dr. Lindley and Olin recruited many talented individuals from the

surrounding area and a 44 member band was assembled. The next obvious need for the group was a band uniform and once again Olin Blickensderfer had the solution. He designed a smart purple and white military styled band uniform. Olin wanted this group to be distinctive, unique, and he found the way to achieve that goal. Not only were they superb musicians with an outstanding drum major, Russell Hughes, but HPC had the only "Twin Twirlers" in this area. Emma and Lillie Whitaker were the first set of twins to march and they were followed by Dorothy and Grace Alexander. Professor Franklin Riker stated in 1941, "The High Point College Band proved a surprisingly good organization and acquitted itself with distinction at its winter concert. I realized that there is an unusually gifted young conductor at High Point College, Olin R. Blickensderfer, who is on his way to his mark in this field." He went on to say, "So we have a fine band growing up together which will ere long thrill us with its frank, clean-cut vital warmth—a band of fine boys and girls finely trained and finely expressive." HPC's band played on until 1941, when World War II took most of the young men away from family and friends. In a recent talk, Olin explained, "The band program did not survive the war, and after it was over, I was more interested in pursuing an advanced degree. I asked Dean Lindley for a year's leave to study at the Cincinnati Conservatory of Music and he granted my request. Things went so well at the Cincinnati Conservatory that they asked me to stay, and I had to ask for a release from High Point College. They very graciously agreed."

Olin Blickensderfer graduated and served with the Army Air Force as a navigator. From there, he went to the Cincinnati Conservatory of Music to further his education. Upon completion of this program, he taught at the

Conservatory and played with the Cincinnati Symphony. In addition, Blickensderfer was Professor of Music and Director of Bands at Memphis State University. Now retired, he can look back upon a long and successful career in music beginning at High Point College.

In a recent interview with Dr. Joseph May, Class of 1941, Olin remembered many HPC professors who helped to shape his thinking processes and writing skills. Among this group were Professor E. C. Glasgow, Dean P.E. Lindley, Miss E. Vera Idol, Mr. Nathaniel Harrison, Dr. Helen R. Bartlett, Dr. Paul S. Kennett, Dr. Clifford R. Hinshaw, Mr. J. Hobart Allred, Mr. Nathaniel P. Yarbrough and Mrs. Alice P. White. Olin clearly stated that, "Dean Lindley had the greatest influence on my life. Without his guidance and advice, I am sure there would not have been a band at High Point College. So he is due all the credit for that and for sustaining me for four years as a student." He went on to say, "Even after fifty years, I remember the first class I attended at High Point College was an English class under Professor Glasgow. He said to us, 'Students this

class meets Monday, Wednesday and Friday and every Friday when you come in this room, you will deposit on my desk a handwritten theme.' I hadn't done a great deal of writing up to this point and having to write a theme every week on different subjects looked to me to be a challenge. One I hoped I would be able to overcome, but without that incentive I would never have been able to make the grade later, for instance, in the master's work that I did in Critical and Analytical Research. I had to write a thesis in that program and that beginning (with Professor Glasgow) of a writing program has stood me in good stead for many of these years since." Each and every professor seemed to have touched Dr. Blickensderfer's life and helped him progress through his career in a successful and confident manner.

He speaks just as fondly of many of his classmates and fellow band members. Dean Lindley recruited dedicated individuals who worked hard to help make the HPC band a success. It is easy to see that they were thought highly of by many universities in the area. When a visiting team played at Duke University and did not bring their band,

High Point College was invited to represent the out-of-town team on the Duke campus. Olin described this as, "several memorable trips." Additionally, Mr. Harrison arranged for the band to travel with the HPC football team to all games. They went to Emory and Henry College, Elon College, Guilford College, Catawba College, and Lenoir-Rhyne College to name a few. It has been said that this organization was sharp.

Dr. May described Olin as a musical prodigy and he replied, "That word prodigy is a very flattering one." Flattering, but also true when you consider what a talented man Olin Blickensderfer is. This story could continue for quite awhile and will November 1-3, 1991 at the 50th Year Reunion of the Class of 1941. There are many wonderful alumni stories! Bring all of them to Homecoming 1991 and share with your classmates.

First Convocation of Clergy a Huge Success

Over 250 ministers and guests listened to inspirational messages and special music on April 11 at The Convocation of Clergy, hosted for the first time by High Point College through the Finch Lecture series. The convocation featured Dr. William Hinson, senior minister of First United Methodist Church in Houston, Texas, Nido Qubein of High Point, a member of the International Speakers Hall of Fame, and famed Christian musician and composer Randall Atcheson of New York. The convocation was held by the college to show its appreciation to the clergy and spouses who support the programs and mission of High Point College.

In the first morning session at the Chas. E. Hayworth Sr. Memorial

Chapel, Qubein listed the qualities that all great leaders possess. Great leaders "build bridges of understanding among others. . . and transcend positive thinking, positive attitudes and positive action," said Qubein. Great leaders also "have a spirit of enthusiasm and a love of life and are thankful for their blessings." He encouraged the ministers to "educate people in your flock instead of training them. Teach them how to think for themselves rather than how to act. To educate means to change from within."

In the second morning session at Memorial Auditorium, Hinson, minister of the largest United Methodist Church in the world, told the audience that in order to be a disciple of Jesus Christ, you must "first be with him . . . We need to be restored and healed through prayer. We live in a time when people are desperate for the spiritual. People are desperate to find something to believe in. We must be spiritual ourselves before we can present something spiritual to others. Jesus is concerned about who we are, not what we do. Give God a chance. Be a person

of prayer."

Atcheson, the first person to graduate from the famed Juilliard School of New York City with a double major in piano and organ, gave solo musical presentations during the two sessions. Atcheson has given the first public performance of the 4,192 pipeorgan at Lincoln Center's Alice Tully Hall. Presiding at the two sessions were Bishop L. Bevel Jones III of the Western North Carolina Conference of the United Methodist Church and Dr. Hal Warlick, minister to the college.

"This year's event generated the highest attendance we have ever had in the Finch Lecture series, primarily because of the individuals involved in the programs," said Dr. Jacob C. Martinson, President of High Point College. "The college would have felt fortunate to have had any of the three individuals for the lecture series, but to have all three at the same time is an exceptional honor." The ministers were treated to a barbeque picnic on the college grounds following the morning sessions and then attended various district meetings in the afternoon.

Greenhouse for HPC

High Point College has a new 16' X 26' greenhouse. The project was initiated last year by a research grant received by Dr. Gerald Smith, assistant professor of biology, from the North Carolina Board of Science and Technology. Thirteen thousand dollars of the grant was earmarked for the greenhouse. The College Board of Trustees allocated funds to complete the project.

Dr. Smith is involved in cytotoxic research on spider lilies. He recently had an article published in the prestigious international botany journal, *Brittonia*. He also presented recent findings at the annual spring meeting of the Association of Southeastern Biologists. Two of Dr. Smith's students received Yarbrough Undergraduate Research Grants from the North Carolina Academy of Science to help

finance their cytotoxic research next year.

In addition to research (both faculty and student), the greenhouse will be used in the botany related labs of the introductory biology course (general biology), in the plant biology (botany) course, and in the plant physiology course. It will house the department's fern collection as well as other plants of interest.

The greenhouse benches were built by departmental faculty and students. The shrubs and landscaping around the greenhouse were a project of the Biology Majors Club.

"We are very grateful for the support and encouragement of the college administration and Board of Trustees which enabled us to complete this project," said Dr. John Ward, chairman of the HPC biology department.

Hi-Po Wins Another Award

The Hi-Po captured first place honors from the American Scholastic Press Association Awards competition for the second consecutive year.

The Hi-Po was one of 12 collegiate newspapers in the United States to receive the award among senior colleges with an enrollment between 1,700 and 2,500. First place was given to publications that scored over 850 points on a 1,000 point scale.

"We feel honored to receive this award," said Andrew Ritchie, editor of *The Hi-Po*. "We are especially proud to be recognized by the American Scholastic Press Association for the second straight year."

The American Scholastic Press Association serves over 2,000 schools throughout the United States.

Clement Receives Haverty Cup Award

Carole Clement, a home furnishings marketing and business major at High Point College, is the 1991 winner of the Haverty Cup as the outstanding home furnishings graduate.

Frank McGaughey Jr., president and chief executive officer of Haverty Furniture, said, "We established the Haverty Cup to encourage young people who are interested in pursuing careers in the home furnishings industry. The (award) is our way of helping to develop professionals who are knowledgeable in all areas of the home furnishings industry...to develop our own pool of talent."

Clement's name will be engraved on the cup, which is kept on permanent display at the college. She will also receive a \$1,500 cash



award and an engraved replica of the cup.

Clement won the Furniture/Today 1990 writing competition for High Point College students. She also won S. C. Johnson & Son Pledge and Erath/ Furniture Industry scholarships. She will join Haverty's as a management trainee in June.

Carter Wins Sears Award

Dr. Kathleen S. Carter, assistant professor of history at High Point College, was selected winner of the 1990-91 Sears-Roebuck Foundation Teaching Excellence and Campus Leadership Award during this year's HPC Honors Day Convocation.

Carter is one of nearly 700 faculty members being recognized nationally by the Sears-Roebuck Foundation for resourcefulness and leadership as an independent college educator. Carter has been very active in her discipline since she came to High Point College in 1989, according to James Hobson, manager of the High Point Sears store, who presented the award.

"She is a dynamic teacher, a motivator of students and colleagues, an outstanding contributor to the college community and is active in all phases of education," said Hobson. "Most recently, she was responsible for a successful grant proposal to the North Carolina Humanities Council that will provide opportunities for social studies teachers to engage in summer studies here at the college."

Johnny McGee, assistant professor of modern foreign languages, was presented the L.E. Moody Service Award during the convocation. Alpha Phi Omega, a national service fraternity, gives the award annually to the faculty member, administrator or student who has given the most outstanding service to High Point College. The award is presented in memory of the late L.E. Moody, who was the director of the college's American Humanities program until his retirement in 1973.

Pledge Awards Scholarship to High Point College Student

Jennifer Rebecca Steele, a junior at High Point College, is the 1991 recipient of a \$5,000 PLEDGE Scholarship.

- *USA Today* featured HPC student Leslie Fazio of St. James, NY and her family in a story about the difficulties college graduates are facing entering a sluggish job market.
- HPC home furnishings marketing students were featured in the *Richmond News Leader* for playing a Monopoly Marathon in front of the Broyhill showroom during the International Home Furnishings Market in High Point. They played on a tile top party table with the regulation Monopoly game board baked on the tiles.
- The HPC Elderhostel program was the subject of a lengthy feature in the *High Point Enterprise*. Only for the above 60 set, Elderhostel is an international network of 1,600 colleges, universities, and cultural organizations that offer inexpensive educational programs in the United States, Canada and abroad. HPC has offered Elderhostels for the past eight summers. They are planned and directed by HPC Vice President for Administrative Affairs, Dr. Roy Epperson.
- A "Methods of Teaching Science" class taught by Dr. John Ward of HPC was featured in the *High Point Enterprise*. Twenty-three students from Montlieu Elementary School learned to look through the microscope and identify cells. They worked in groups of three and four with HPC students who plan to become elementary school teachers.
- HPC English professor Gary Foster's presentation of the Second

Tuesday lecture titled "Lights, Camera, Action!" at the High Point Museum was featured in the *High Point Enterprise*. He explored the relationship between the movie posters, movies and film industry of the 1950's.

American Humanics at HPC contributed more than 6,000 volunteer hours last year for non-profit agencies.
- The *High Point Enterprise* featured HPC chemistry and physical science Professor Charles Warde's involvement in electric car research. "It's highly probable that somewhere in the late 1990's, that in order to sell vehicles in Los Angeles basin, automobile companies will have to offer a line of electric cars," said Warde.
- The *North Carolina Christian Advocate* reported on the Convocation of Clergy, hosted by HPC. The speakers included Dr. William Hinson, minister of United Methodistism's largest congregation, First Church, Houston, Texas, and internationally known speaker Nido Qubein. Millis Center Challenge

In March, two anonymous challenge grants totaling up to \$500,000 were offered by two High Point College trustees. Paul Payne Estate

Upon the death of Guilford County resident Paul Payne in 1989, High Point College was notified that it was a major beneficiary of his estate. Mr. Payne's sister Pearl was a member of the Class of 1929.

According to the terms of his will and the trust established by Mr. Payne, High Point College is to receive one-third of the remainder of the trust in memory of Mr. Payne's sister, who predeceased him. The trust document states that "[t]his distribution shall be utilized for capital improvements or capital expenditures only..." The remaining two-thirds is to be distributed to Duke University in memory of Mr. Payne's uncle and in honor of Mr. Payne himself, who was an alumnus of Duke. Duke also will use their bequest for capital purposes.

The trust contains real estate in several areas of North Carolina. Its value has been conservatively estimated at \$3 million, which would mean that High Point College's bequest is valued at least \$1 million. The funds received from the sale of the properties have been designated for the Millis Center project.

Award reflects HPC's Goals

May 4 was graduation day at High Point College.

The school bid farewell to another class of students who embarked to stake a claim on the territory of life. That class included a group of seniors who, along with underclassmen, coaches and athletes, helped secure the Carolinas Conference's John D. Messick Sportsmanship Award for High Point.

The award, voted on by the league's coaches and athletic directors, is presented to the member school judged to have shown the highest degree of sportsmanship, ethics and courtesy for the previous season. It encompasses not only a school's athletes but its coaches and fans.

It's the first time HPC has won the Messick award, which honors the man who served as president of East Carolina University when that school competed as a member of the Carolinas Conference, and school officials are understandably grateful.

"I'm as pleased with this award as anything that's ever happened to the program," athletic director and men's basketball coach Jerry Steele said. "It's not just one sports program. All the coaches from the different sports are involved in it, and it's a reflection on the way things look, the way the coaches behave, the way the participants conduct themselves and probably, I think as big a factor as anything, your students and the fans. I wish it could've happened before the students went home so they would've been aware of it."

"It is one of the finest tributes any school's athletic program can have," HPC president Jacob Martinson said of the award at High Point's Saturday graduation ceremony. "We have a strong athletic program, and this is icing on the cake."

But the icing did not come at the expense of quality. High Point may have finished last in men's basketball (the league's showcase sport), but the Panther program finished second overall in the race for the Joby Hawn Cup, which recognizes the league school with the top overall program. Pfeiffer won the cup with 46½ points to High Point's 44.

"Sometimes people relate losing to sportsmanship, but we went right down to the last tournament in the Joby Hawn competition," Steele said.

"We've got to be doing something right. Philosophically, we must be on pretty sound ground or headed in that direction. It's not just one night's performance when you take in all the events you participate in home and away. We're headed in the right direction."

High Point has been headed down that road for some time. The school produced its second straight (and third overall) Murphy Osborne Student-Athlete award winner this year in first baseman Andy Lisk. Also, HPC has won the Joby Hawn competition eight times outright and shared it once (with Elon in 1980) since its inception in 1976. The Panthers' track record is impressive.

"In our situation, we've been spoiled a little bit on the Joby Hawn Award," Steele said. "Some people are disappointed with finishing second. Well, somebody has to finish seventh."

"We've come as close to dominating it since they started it possibly as will ever happen. Up until the last couple of years, we never really counted points. If we won it, we won it. If we didn't, we didn't."

The Hawn honors consistency, which Steele listed as characteristic of the HPC program.

"I think the good thing has been this in the overall program: Take golf, for example. We had never won a conference championship (since 1949) until



last year. Each sport has had its day, so to speak. We've been competitive, we've been down, we've come back. That's pretty realistic of what life's about."

High Point College alumni have much to be proud of. Their school, one of just two (along with Barton) remaining charter members, is viewed as an anchor in an everchanging Carolinas Conference. The 1990-91 athletic season and its aftermath, which left High Point plenty to smile about, proved why.

Chatterton Selected For All-Star Team

An all-star baseball team comprised of NAIA baseball players will compete for the USA against teams from seven other countries in the IBA Presidential Cup World Championships in Seoul, South Korea.

Selected for the squad was High Point College pitcher Chris Chatterton. The right-hander posted a 4-2 record with one save and an ERA of 2.64 in 14 games with the Panthers this season. He also hit a team-leading .379 with four home runs while playing second base for the Panthers.

The tournament will be played in June in Seoul's Olympic Baseball Stadium. Besides the NAIA All-Star Team, other participating teams will be from the Philippines, Taiwan, Japan, the People's Republic of China, North Korea, the USSR and host South Korea.

Panthers Finish Season Strongly

The High Point College athletic season did not pass into memory with a whimper.

Thanks to the golf and track teams, the 1990-91 campaign ended rather loudly. Both squads wound up taking their shots at the best NAIA competition in the land, and both returned with appetites whetted for more.

"Now, we know what level of play it takes to compete at the national level, and I think our players will be even more determined to get back there because they know what it's like to go," golf coach Woody Gibson said four days after his players completed national competition in Oklahoma City.

The Panther golfers returned with a 16th-place showing in their first national appearance. But the nationals are nothing new for HPC's track program, which featured All-American efforts from Brian Payne in the 400-meter intermediate hurdles and Brian Corrigan in the triple jump.

"Anytime you come back with one All-American, or even place in the top eight, you ought to be happy," track coach Bob Davidson said. In the cases of both teams, the efforts hinged on attaining goals. Payne failed to defend his 1990 110-meter high hurdle national championship and others failed to meet personal goals, but the golfers accomplished one hope—making the 36-hole cut.

"That was one of our goals going out there—to prove we were good enough to be in the national tournament, that even though we were an at-large team we could make the cut and finish in the top 16 or 17 in the country," said Gibson.

"After that, we had a real emotional letdown the next day. We weren't going to win the tournament, and we knew that. We had hoped to play well enough to finish in the top 10 or 12.

It also required some nailbiting in the clubhouse following their second round.

"It came down to the last two groups on the course Wednesday," said Gibson. "We kept wondering, 'Are we going to make it or not?' We would try to figure what certain players had to shoot to beat us. We were playing statistical and number games like that. The drain really took a lot out of us. I know I was worn out that night."

The trip wasn't all work. The Panthers met PGA Tour pro Scott Verplank on the flight from Atlanta to Oklahoma, and met another touring pro, Willie Wood, at Oak Tree Country Club in Edmond, Okla. Verplank and Wood are both members of Oak Tree, which the Panthers visited on Sunday before the tourney and Friday after finishing play.

"You're pretty much on the course from 7 in the morning until 7 at night," Gibson said. "It's a grueling experience. I don't think any of our players had ever competed in a tournament which was played in four consecutive days. I think that was a revelation to them."

Payne's stumble in the 110 hurdles was a disappointing revelation for Davidson and the HPC entourage. In Friday's semifinals, Payne clipped the fifth of 10 hurdles, lost his rhythm and wiped out on the sixth hurdle.

But to his credit, Payne quickly regrouped in the 400 semifinals later Friday. He went on to place second in

Saturday's 400 final with a school-record 51.30-second effort.

"His back was to the wall," Davidson said of Payne. "In the 400 semifinals, he just ran his butt off and had the best semifinal time of the day. It was really a pleasing performance. I didn't know how he would react after he fell, and because he had never qualified for the nationals (in the 400), I didn't know how he would respond. But he really came through."

Payne proved he belonged.

"Over the weekend, Brian became a legitimate national runner in the 400 hurdles," said Davidson.

Payne wasn't the only HPC All-American. Corrigan's fifth-place showing in the triple jump (a school-record 49 feet, 2¼ inches) helped offset an injury-filled year for the freshman native of South Africa. It also enabled HPC to post 12 points, good enough for 25th place among the 114 competing schools.

On the disappointing side, senior John High failed to advance in the 800 meters and Tracy Henry failed on three attempts in the trial jump. But on the positive, Davidson welcomes back most everyone (High is the one major loss) for next season.

That next season should bode well for both the golf and track teams. Next year, they will try once again to send out the school sports season with a flurry.

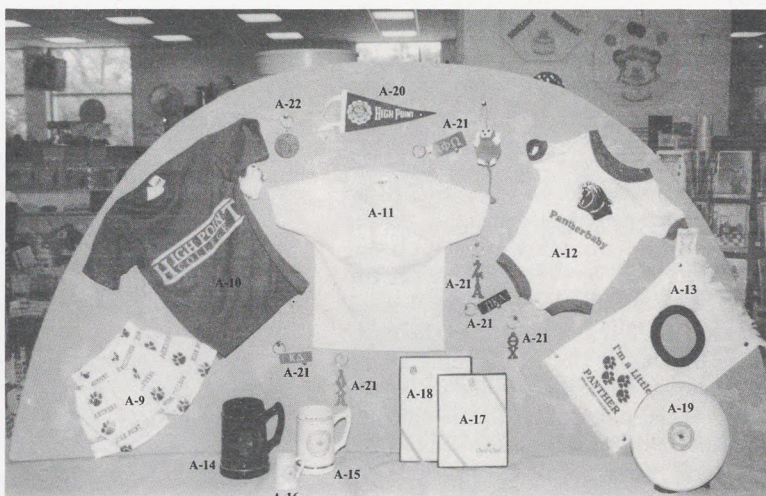

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IN TRIBUTE TO
DR. JAMES ALLEN THACKER, SR.
1918 - 1990

Allen Thacker was a man of grace and charm; a man of dedication and loyalty. He possessed every inch of these qualities, and more.

He was a native of High Point, born November 26, 1918 to John Wesley and Lena Hammer Thacker. He received his secondary education in the High Point Public Schools, the bachelor's degree from High Point College, the master's degree from Duke University, and the doctor's degree from The University of North Carolina at Chapel Hill.

After serving a tour of duty with the United States Air Force during World War II, he returned to his native city. He asked Dr. Charles F. Carroll, superintendent of the city's schools, if there was an available teaching position. Dr. Carroll assigned Allen to a rough group of sixth grade boys at Brentwood Elementary School. There he met his future wife. Allen and Betty were married on August 30, 1946. They had two daughters and one son. Susan lives in Sanford, and Ruth lives in High Point, while James lives in Hickory. There are three grandchildren. Dedicated to his family, he loved each member dearly. As he loved, so was he loved.

Allen Thacker was a teacher by nature. His career was not only involved that group of hard to discipline boys at Brentwood School. Later he served as a principal in Bertie and Alamance Counties. From 1958-65 he was assistant professor of education at Pheiffer College in Misenheimer. In 1965 he joined the faculty of his Alma Mater at High Point College as a member of the education department. Upon the retirement of Dr. Dennis H. Cooke, Allen became chairman of that department. He served the College well and with efficiency. Throughout his distinguished career, he encountered teachers who were having difficulty getting a teaching certificate renewed. Allen Thacker would tell them what courses to take and the necessary forms to complete. His advice always satisfied the State Department of Education in

Raleigh. After helping so many people, the addage was circulated over and over again, "Allen Thacker knows more about the State Education Department than they know in Raleigh!" In his helpful and courteous manner, Allen helped thousands of teachers in our state through his expertise of teaching and his know-how in the many areas of teacher certification. He worked countless hours consulting with school systems across the state helping them prepare their self-study for accreditation renewal by the Southern Association of Colleges and Schools. This valued work in education was summed up by his membership in Phi Delta Kappa whose Triad Chapter honored him with a service key in 1984. He was also honored in 1988 when he was awarded the Verta Idol Coe Award for excellence in education by the High Point Board of Education.

He was one of those people who did not know the meaning of the words, "I can't serve." This is attested by the fact of his noble service which included membership on the boards of directors of High Point Association of Retarded Citizens, High Point Mental Health Association, and Friends of the Theater. He was a member of the Executive Committee of the High Point College Alumni Association and the Guilford County Domiciliary Home Community Advisory Committee. His Alma Mater, High Point College, honored him in 1984 with the Alumnus of the Year Award.

A faithful member of Wesley Memorial United Methodist Church, Allen was a frequent Sunday School teacher of the Adult Fellowship Class. He and Betty were always present for the church's family night suppers on Wednesday evenings and members of the Friendly Club for senior citizens. His deep and abiding faith in his God contributed to Allen's philosophy to give of one's self to others, regardless of the sacrifice it may bring as you leave the world a better place than you found it.

Allen Thacker was an avid member and worker of Twilight Civitan Club which selected him as Civitan of the Year in 1966 and in 1968 he received the club's District Honor Key. In 1989 Twilight Civitan Club honored him with the club's Honor Key Award. He did many "behind the scene" duties for the club, and many presidents relied heavily upon him for his guidance during their term of office. When Allen died on Saturday, June 16, into the homes of his fellow Civitans came the club's newsletter which he had edited on the previous Wednesday. Even when arthritis racked his body with pain, he continued to give of himself with no complaint because the word "no" was not a part of his vocabulary and neither was it his lifestyle. He possessed the intrinsic value of loyalty which is one of those golden qualities of the character of citizenship.

To his family, friends, Alma Mater, and community — be thankful that he was yours and you were his.

To God — "Thank you for Allen Thacker. We are so glad that our paths crossed many times, and he made the pathway easier to travel for so many?"

James Montgomery penned these lines, and they express our tribute to Allen Thacker — a man in our midst whose influence will be felt as we continue the journey.
