# University Continues To Grow; Record Enrollment Tops 3,000

**T**he University opened its 74th year in August with a record enrollment of more than 3,000 students, a new criminal justice major, additional faculty, new residential and classroom facilities, and, for the first time, athletic teams playing predominantly NCAA Division I schedules.

This bodes well as High Point University prepares to celebrate its 75th anniversary next fall.

"We are, of course, very pleased with the progress we are making," says Dr. Jacob C. Martinson, president. "The growth has been steady and manageable over the past 10 years. The additional students, faculty, programs and Division I athletics not only make High Point a larger university, but, far more importantly, they make us better as well. We hope our alumni appreciate what we are working to achieve for their alma mater."

## RECORD GROWTH IN ENROLLMENT

Enrollment for the 1998-99 academic year stands at 3,006, up 8.75 percent from 2,743 when classes began last year. Total enrollment was bolstered by the University's largest entering class of freshmen and transfers, 585. University enrollment has more than doubled during the past dozen years from 1,392 in 1986-87.

Students from 41 states and 34 foreign countries are taking 864 courses in 43 majors and three graduate-degree programs. Fifty-four percent of the students come from outside North Carolina — led by Maryland's 191, Virginia's 141, New Jersey's 121, Florida's 63, New York's 51 and West Virginia's 42. Minorities make up approximately 19 percent of the freshman class.

Enrollment breaks down into the following programs:

- Day, including full-time students who live on campus — 1,624;
- Evening Degree — 1,196;
- Graduate — 186.

Classes for the Evening Degree and Graduate programs are conducted at the High Point campus and at the Madison Park campus in Winston-Salem.

Growth in numbers has been paralleled by growth in the academic profile of the student body. Since 1990, for example, the number of Presidential Scholars and Presidential Fellows has grown by 143 percent, from 157 in 1990 to 382 this year. These students, who are among the best and brightest in the nation, chose High Point over some of the nation's most competitive colleges and universities, including Boston College, Columbia, Duke, Rice, UNC-Chapel Hill, UVA, Vanderbilt, Wake Forest and William and Mary. The list goes on.

"The truth is that there is no single explanation for the exceptional growth," says Dr. Morris G. Wray, vice president for internal affairs. "Many good things are happening simultaneously, and quality breeds quality. It obviously helps that students are happy both with the University and with the community."

## NEW RESIDENCE HALL

A record number of students live on campus this year — 1,001 — compared with 901 last year, according to Gart Evans, dean of student life. The University opened its first apartment-style residence hall on the west side of campus for upper classmen. Each of the 12 apartments in the \$3.2 million, three-story facility houses six students in three bedrooms, with a living area, kitchenette and bath.

Another new facility, a 10,000-square-foot addition to the Chas. E. Hayworth Memorial Chapel, features classrooms and offices for the religion, philosophy, political science and history departments as well as a student lounge. The Board of Trustees named the building for David R. Hayworth, who committed \$1 million to the project.

## NEW MAJOR ADDED

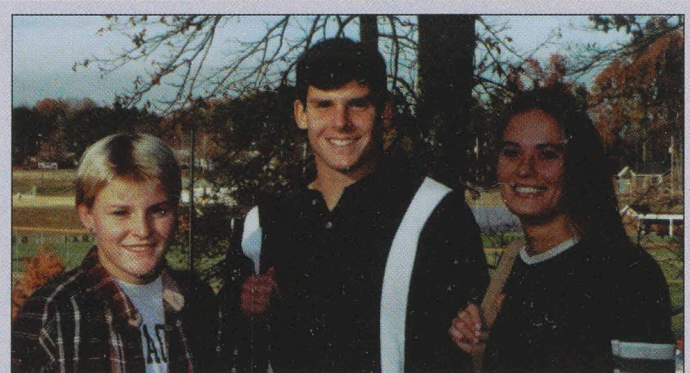
The University offered a new major this fall, criminal justice. The major was approved by the faculty in the spring after several years in development, said Dr. E. Vance Davis, vice president for academic affairs and dean of arts and sciences. Students pursuing this major will concentrate on criminology, which is grounded in sociology and psychology; or in law and justice, which is based in political science, Davis explained.

The criminal justice major will be directed by William S. Cope, associate professor of sociology. Dr. Robert Little joins the faculty as a full professor of criminology. He is one of 12 new full-time faculty members, bringing the total of full-time faculty to 110.

## NCAA DIVISION I

In athletics, all schedules reflect the transition to Division I of the National Collegiate Athletic Association, explained Athletic Director Woody Gibson. Panthers teams, which compete in the Big South Conference, are beginning the second year of the NCAA's two-year compliance period required to move into college sport's premier arena. The vast majority of opponents on schedules this year, including non-conference foes, will be Division I, Gibson said.

"The change to Division I has certainly given us much more of an identity," he said. "It has allowed us to recruit a much higher caliber of athlete with a national approach, instead of just East Coast. We are identified with schools people see on TV. We still have to work to be one of them, but we are now identified with them."

The University fields seven men's and seven women's intercollegiate teams.



# Major University Gifts



## Pauline L. Hayworth Makes Second Contribution — A Matching Gift for Fine Arts Center



Pauline L. Hayworth, widely recognized for her philanthropy and community involvement, has pledged a \$2 million challenge gift for construction of a fine arts center that will complete construction on front campus.

This generous gift follows a \$2 million contribution received in 1994 from her and her late husband, Charles.

Construction is scheduled to begin next year on the facility, which the

board of trustees chose to name in her honor and in memory of her husband. Dr. Jacob C. Martinson, University president, expects Mrs. Hayworth's generosity to inspire other University supporters to match her challenge gift, bringing the total related to her recent donation to \$4 million and the total Hayworth involvement with the center to \$6 million. The projected cost of the center is \$8 to \$10 million.

In her Nov. 3 letter to the University, Mrs. Hayworth made the challenge to be effective between Nov. 1, 1998 and Oct. 31, 2000.

The Charles E. and Pauline Lewis Hayworth Fine Arts Center will feature flexible spaces for classroom instruction, training and performance, including a 500-seat theater. Faculty offices, an art gallery and a special collections room will also be housed in the center. The

domed structure will be built on front campus between the greensward and Montlieu Avenue.

"This gift continues a long labor of love by my late husband, Charles, who, though not an alumnus, loved High Point University with a passion," Mrs. Hayworth said. "His father helped establish the college in High Point nearly 75 years ago, and he served as chairman of the board of trustees with unswerving commitment and dedication for years.

"I, too, believe in this University. I am impressed with what it does for its students and for our community. Charles and I felt fortunate to have the resources to give to others, and we believed it was our responsibility to do so. I can only hope others will match my gift and that this fine arts center will serve the University well for years to come."

A native of Pinehurst, Pauline Hayworth earned a bachelor's degree in English and Greek at Queens College in Charlotte and a master's degree in English at Trinity University in San Antonio, Texas.

After teaching for several years, she devoted herself to many causes, especially those related to fine arts and higher education.

"This is an exceptional gift from an exceptional woman," Dr. Martinson said. "We will do everything we can to ensure that every penny of this challenge gift is matched, and that we build a Charles E. and Pauline Lewis Hayworth Fine Arts Center worthy of the Hayworth name and the family's tradition at this University."

## David Hayworth Gift Funds Expansion, Renovation of Chapel/Classroom Complex

David R. Hayworth, a retired business executive and 1995 N.C. Philanthropist of the Year, has made another large gift to the University that will ensure the Chas. E. Hayworth Chapel, named in his father's honor, will become even more of a campus focal point.

The latest gift is a commitment for \$1 million toward the expansion and renovation of the chapel/classroom complex.

The first phase of the \$2.5 million project, which was completed last summer, enabled the University to consolidate its religion, philosophy, history and political science departments in a two-story addition to the Chas. E. Hayworth Chapel. Named the David R. Hayworth Hall, the addition provides 18 faculty offices; five classrooms where 62 classes met each week this fall; and a large, comfortable lounge. From Montlieu Avenue the impressive addition with the red brick facade and Georgian columns appears to be a free-standing building.

The second phase, on which work has already begun, will expand and refurbish the chapel with a larger vestibule and a taller steeple. The facade will be transformed and bricks repainted to match the predominant Georgian architecture on campus, making it one of the University's most beautiful buildings.

"Essentially what Mr. Hayworth's gift has enabled the University to do is create a more focused center for learning and worship," said Dr. Harold C. Warlick Jr., University chaplain and chairman of the religion department. "Architecturally, it brings the chapel complex into harmony with the rest of campus. These are tremendous improvements for students at High Point University." Warlick said the large investment in the chapel/classroom complex underscores the institution's unique commitment to religion and ethics as a focal point for all students.

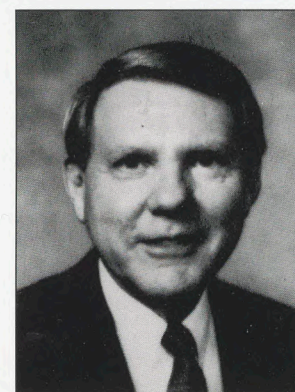
"We wanted our chapel to be a learning center and a gathering place as well as a center of worship," he said.

Hayworth said his gift is simply the latest in a 75-year family tradition. His father, Charles E. Hayworth, helped open the college in 1924.

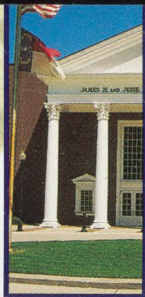
Charles E. Hayworth Jr. was very active at the University. He served as chairman of the board of trustees during a critical period that paved the way for the unprecedented growth the University has experienced during the past decade.

David Hayworth joined the board of trustees in 1992. One year later, through an irrevocable trust arrangement, he gave his home to the University, which plans to use it as the president's home in the future. For that gift, among others, he was named N.C. Philanthropist of the Year by Gov. Jim Hunt and inducted into the Order of the Long Leaf Pine in 1995.

"These gifts are a way to honor my father's and brother's love for High Point University," Hayworth said. "They would take tremendous pleasure in knowing that High Point College has become a great university that is getting better all the time. I'm just pleased to be in a position to help."







# High Point University Would Never Be The Same ...

## After Woody Gibson Landed Here 25 Years Ago

Considering that Woody Gibson was born in a converted Air Force hangar, it's a wonder he can stay anywhere for long. But after some youthful take-offs in different directions — three colleges, a tour of Vietnam and a series of jobs with a professional sports franchise in eight years — he landed at High Point College.

That was in May 1974. He's been here ever since.

That's not to say he hasn't traveled. Just not by plane very often. And never for very long. Sure, he's driven to Toronto and back to talk with soccer recruits. And he's logged tens of thousands of bus miles on the Carolinas' back roads, every year, with his soccer and golf teams.

But he always comes home to High Point University. And the University is grateful for that.

In June 1998, 24 years and a month after following one of his mentors at Guilford College to High Point, Dr. Woody Gibson was named Director of Athletics. The man he succeeded is the mentor he had followed, Coach Jerry Steele. Steele wanted to focus on playing the likes of Tar Heels slayer and national championship contender Utah in Salt Lake City on Dec. 30 as his team moves toward full-time Division I status in 1999.

### UP TO THE TASK

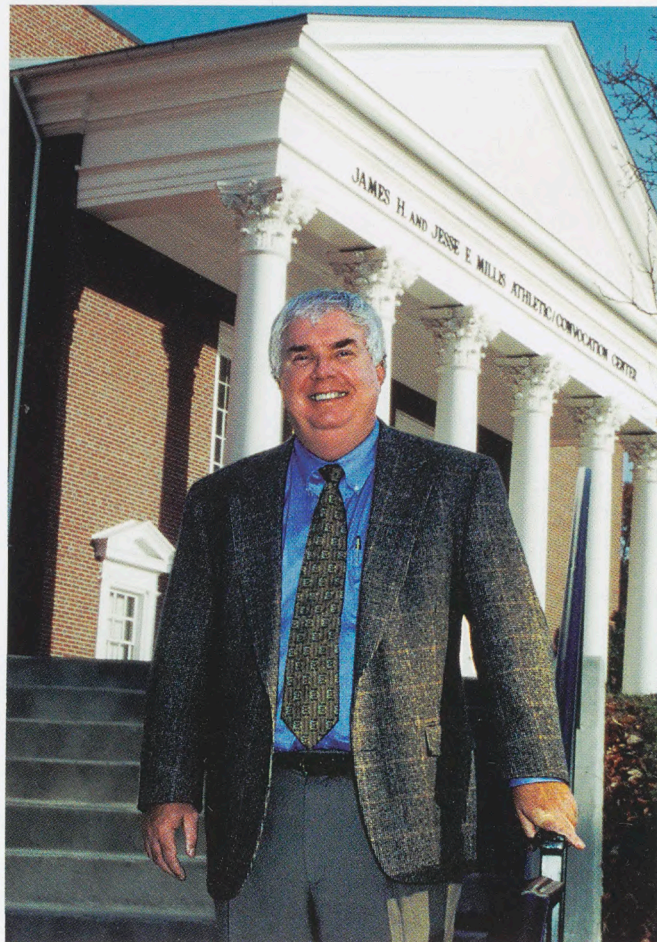
Gibson was asked by the University to lead the entire athletic department into America's highest level of sport competition outside the pros — the NCAA's Division I. If experience — and success — are accurate measures of this man, then he's certainly up to the task.

"Woody Gibson possesses the ability, commitment and tenacity to take us to the next level, the top level, of intercollegiate athletics," says Dr. Jacob C. Martinson, University president. "Woody has demonstrated a fierce competitiveness, an unswerving loyalty to High Point University, and outstanding management skills. We're in excellent hands."

Gibson served as men's soccer coach from 1978 to 1998; started the women's intercollegiate soccer team in 1992 and was head coach for three years; coached the golf team from 1975 to 1992; and was sports information director from 1975 to 1993. He also taught classes throughout the period, initiated a sports management major and earned a doctorate degree.

"I realized early in life that the more things you get involved in, the harder it is for your boss to get rid of you," he says, smiling broadly.

During 20 years as men's soccer coach, his teams won eight regular season or tournament conference championships, qualified for

post-season play 15 times and posted an overall 211-125-27 record. He won nine Coach of the Year awards and was a finalist for National Coach of the Year in 1987. He was president of the NAIA Men's Soccer Coaches Association in 1993-94 and Chair of the NAIA National Tournament from 1991 to 1994. He coached the East All-Star team in the 1991 Men's Senior Classic and in the 1994 Women's Senior Classic, the only coach to do both. In 1995 the National Intercollegiate Soccer Officials Association presented him with the Distinguished Service Award for his commitment and contributions to the sport of soccer.

Gibson twice was named conference Coach of the Year in golf and took his 1991 team to the NAIA National Tournament.

As sports information director he earned the respect of his peers, winning 21 national yearbook and brochure awards from the College Sports Information Directors Association and the NAIA Sports Information Directors Association.

### COACH VS. AD

Gibson says the biggest difference between coaching and serving as athletic director is gratification time.

"As coach you get immediate feedback for what you're doing — you recruit, you win games, you lose games. You know every year exactly how well you're doing and whether what you're doing is working.

"As athletic director you have long-term goals, and it may be three to five years before you can look back and say, 'That worked.' You don't see change happening as quickly or as thoroughly. And you can't make things change on your own, with just you and your team — you depend on many others for funding, for hard work, for commitment."

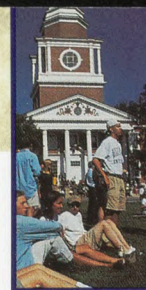
Gibson has high expectations for himself and the people who work with him. "My basic goal is for the High Point University athletic department to be as good as it can be in every aspect," he says. "The fun part will probably be three, four years down the road when we have some things in place, when we win a conference championship and one of our teams does well in the NCAA Tournament. Striving to reach that level is the fun part. It's also the hard part."

### WHY A HISTORY MAJOR CHOSE SPORTS

Why a career in sports?

Gibson, who majored in history because he loves to read, says sports have always been important to him. He grew up playing sports with his brother in Rocky Mount. He played sports throughout high school. He came to Guilford College in 1966 hoping to make the basketball team but served as team manager instead — for

Coach Steele. After leaving Guilford College, he worked for the Carolina Cougars of the American Basketball Association in 1969-70; got drafted and spent the next year two years in the Army, including 12 months in Vietnam; then rejoined the Cougars, March 1972 through May 1974. The Cougars moved to St. Louis, and Gibson moved to High Point, working in the maintenance department while completing his degree. Which he did, in May 1975.

"I just love sports, love being around them, love the atmosphere, the excitement, the pageantry, the drama," Gibson says. "I was strongly impressed by Jerry Steele and Jack Jenson (Steele's assistant at Guilford College and head coach since 1970). Seeing the way they worked with young people convinced me that I would like to be a coach."

### **LESSONS FOR LIFE**

"The pursuit of excellence in sports teaches young people many valuable lessons that, learned well, will serve them throughout life and in all careers," Gibson maintains. "I believe the opportunity to instill those lessons is what keeps people coaching."

The lessons are simple, yet profound:

- Hard work pays off and can overcome a lot of deficiencies.
- The value of teamwork — we must work with others to accomplish common goals.
- We must all deal with adversity.
- Sportsmanship, fair play, ethics, and honesty are essential.
- Success comes with a price.
- Commitment (from an individual and a team) is essential to success.

"Success can be defined in many ways, but in athletics, where you either win or lose, success is defined by winning," Gibson says. "America is about winning. Politics, global economics, law — it's about winning. Athletics teaches you what it takes to win. Athletics causes people to focus on winning and the satisfaction of winning while learning what it takes to be successful."

### **TO STRIVE, ALWAYS, TO WIN**

"There's a trend in sports, especially youth sports, advocating that participants enjoy playing and not worry about winning or losing. That's fine at a certain level. But just playing isn't enough at the NCAA Division I level. Aside from professional athletics, college is the highest you can go in sports, and Division I is the highest college level. That's where we are. At this level, there has to be a desire and a commitment to be competitive and to strive, always, to win."

But not at any price, a practice that has tarnished the reputations of many universities with recruiting violations and low graduation rates for scholarship athletes. High Point University has consistently graduated its student-athletes at a higher percentage than

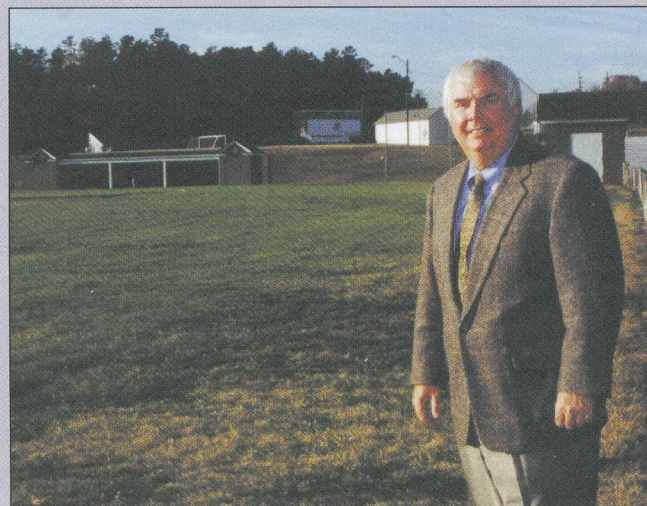

## **Improvements Needed On Outdoor Athletic Facilities**

The athletic fields have served Panther teams well over the years. But now that the University is competing in the Big South Conference in NCAA Division I, many improvements are needed, according to Dr. Woody Gibson, HPU athletic director.

"A lot of athletes make decisions based on facilities, and the caliber of athlete we're recruiting is used to better outdoor facilities than what we have to offer right now," he says, surveying the soccer, track and baseball fields. "We have excellent indoor facilities at the Millis Center, but compared with the other schools in our conference, we're way behind outdoors."

The University needs to extensively renovate or rebuild the field house, Gibson says, with seven or eight locker rooms, (compared to the existing two), public restrooms, concession stand and small training room. He would like to see the track relocated, perhaps to the location of the existing intramural field, which could be moved behind new stands at the soccer field. The soccer field needs to be upgraded and widened with new stands and lights. And the baseball field should also get new stands, a press box and lights.







the overall student population. Gibson is committed to the concept of "student athlete," with the "student" always coming first. He expects coaches to recruit only athletes who can and will manage the academic load. And he will promote more services, such as tutoring, for athletes as Division I schedules demand more of their time.

As High Point University establishes full NCAA Division I status, Gibson sees a much higher profile emerging.

### SPORTS FASHION PUBLIC PERCEPTION

"Rightly or wrongly, the public perception of a college or university is fashioned to a large extent through its athletic program," Gibson says. "In the Big South Conference and Division I, High Point will be associating with a different level of schools than in the past. Our identity will change because of that. And, in my mind, that is good because I think we are a lot better school than we are given credit for being.

"Right now we are laying the foundation for our future history. That's why it's so important to do it right and be identified as a first-class Division I university."

Our new athletic director is getting ready to take flight with High Point University's reputation. Based on what we know about Woody Gibson, it should be a successful mission.

# Watch Out, Division I, Here Come the Panthers

## With a Little Help from Lithuania and Australia

Dee Sasser is an animated guy — anyone who works with him, plays for him or, for that matter, spends 45 seconds with him will vouch for that. But when he starts talking about eating Chicago-style pizza in Vilnius, Lithuania ... or visiting with the police chief there ... or making friends during his recruiting trip to this ancient European capital ... Well, at some point in this revved-up monologue, his enthusiasm kicks into overdrive, and his big — make that BIG — smile lights up his office at Millis Center and, undoubtedly, spills all the way down the hallway to the gym.

It's a slam dunk of a story, and nobody can tell it with more rim-rattling conviction than this eight-year assistant men's basketball coach, head golf coach and distinguished recruiter of foreign athletes.

After winning a commitment from 6'8" forward Valdas Kaukenas during last fall's early signing period, he found Mantas Ignatavicius to be more of a challenge. Kaukenas' big brother was playing ball at Seton Hall University, so he was comfortable with the concept. But Ignatavicius would be the first member of his family to leave Lithuania. All his friends were there. He had a girlfriend. He liked his basketball team.

That left Sasser no choice but to strike out for Lithuania last summer in a last-ditch effort to sign this talented point guard named Mantas, who couldn't seem to make up his mind.

"The single most educational experience of my life, without a doubt, was flying from here to Vilnius," Sasser says, leaning forward, eager to share this city with his visitor. "Remember, Lithuania has only been independent from the former Soviet Union since 1991, but Vilnius is one of the oldest cities in Europe — a beautiful city, the architecture, old churches, palaces ... You really stick out as an American, in a good way. Everyone wants to meet you. I even met the chief of police. I made a lot of friends while I was there. I will return."

The torrent is over as quickly as it begins. Sasser leans back, hands locked behind his head, still smiling.

In the end, Mantas Ignatavicius decided to join Kaukenas at High Point University. He scored 21 points in the season opener. Kaukenas netted 15 and grabbed 10 rebounds before fouling out. Ignatavicius plans to major in international business and continue making contacts in Europe and America during his four years at High Point to put himself in a marketable position upon graduation. Kaukenas isn't sure about a major yet, but he wants to play basketball as long as he can, perhaps in the NBA.

Ignatavicius is adjusting to High Point, to campus life, to academics, to the English language, to a more physical brand of basketball. They are both adjusting, and, by design, they are suitemates, not roommates. Ignatavicius shares a room with Brooks Lee, Kaukenas with Tim Wilson. The arrangement encourages more language immersion, Sasser explains.

Joining the Lithuanians in this exceptional freshman class is Geordie Cullen, a 6'9" forward from Perth, Australia. (No, Sasser didn't go Down Under to recruit him — it was all done by telephone

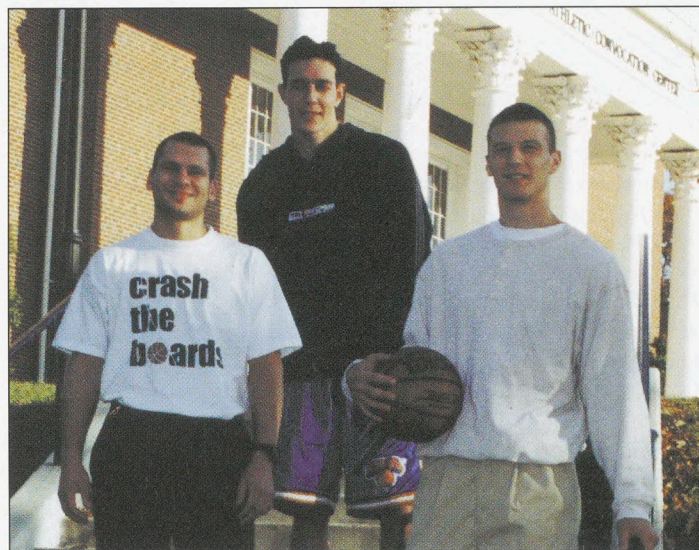
and mail.) To meet NCAA requirements, Cullen had to sit out a year after coming to High Point in January and will be eligible after December final exams.

This young team will carry the High Point University banner into the NCAA Division I as members of the Big South Conference. They aren't easing into the top level of college athletics, either. On Dec. 30, the Panthers play the University of Utah, the team that eliminated the North Carolina Tar Heels in the Final Four last spring before losing to Kentucky (coached by High Point alumnus Tubby Smith) in the championship game. The next day they fly to Puerto Rico for three games.

The team is playing under the third set of rules in Sasser's eight years at High Point — NAIA, then NCAA Division II (when the team got to the nation's final 16 both years) and now NCAA Division I.



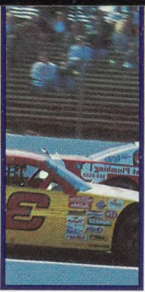

Sasser's leaning forward again. The enthusiasm is building. Watch out, Division I, here come the Panthers.







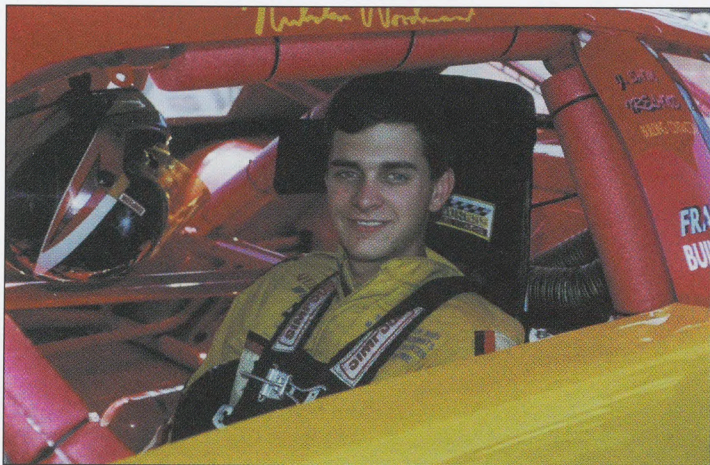
# "Quik Nick" Woodward

## He's Got the Checkered Flag in His Sites

It's the speed generated by 720 wide-open horsepower ... the raw adrenaline pumped by clutching the wheel while going three wide and inches apart at 140 into an unforgiving left turn ... the competitive fire fanned by 42 revved-up cars gunning for just one trophy beyond the checkered flag.

It's stock car racing, and "Quik Nick" Woodward eats it up like a carburetor devours gasoline.

This is the same Nick who finished in the top 10 of his senior class at Colonel Richardson High School, Preston, Md. The National Honor Society and class vice president. The prom chairman. And the just barely 19-year-old High Point University sophomore majoring in business administration.

Nick is doing more than studying business — he's living it. He is moving his race car shop this month into a space he has leased in a building in Kernersville, N.C., about 10 miles from his room in Finch Hall. He will employ a crew chief beginning in January. He's working with a marketing group in Winston-Salem to find sponsors for his car.

He plans to graduate in four years while racing every weekend from March through November at an increasingly competitive level. Nick juggles college work with racing by scheduling Tuesdays and Thursdays as his heavy class days so that he's finished in the classroom by noon on Mondays, Wednesdays and Fridays. Nick has a plan that's working well for him.

"I've always been a firm believer that education comes first," he says while sipping a Coke and watching a November afternoon light up the campus in a blaze of crimson and orange from the snack bar at the Slane University Center. "One way or other I want to be involved in racing — driving, managing a team or owning a team. NASCAR is big business, and I need to be well grounded in business principles."

Is this young man sitting on the pole, or what?

If Nick wasn't born into racing, it didn't take him long to climb behind the wheel. By the time he was nine, he was strapped into helmet and seat while flooring his go-cart through the turns at tracks throughout the Eastern Shore of Maryland. He and his dad raced together for two years, then his father, recognizing young Nick's passion and talent for the sport, gave it up to focus on Nick's career. They've been a close racing team ever since.

"It's been good for the family," Nick says. "It's a big family thing. My mother and sister and aunts and uncles go to as many races as they can."

Late Model Stock Car Racing is catching on among his friends at

HPU. Roughly 20 drove to Caraway Speedway Oct. 10 to cheer for Nick at a 300-lap race. He didn't disappoint them, finishing eighth in the lead lap after being in contention all night. Seven buddies then drove to Manassas, Va., where he finished in the top five.

"For a lot of them, it's the first time they've been to a race," Nick says. "They tell me they love it. They've even started wearing my T-shirts." Nick has a fan club in Maryland that charters buses to races. Nick's necessary confidence is tempered by a sincere humility that, coupled with an easy smile, make him easy to like ... and pull for.

He will be back in the Late Model division in '99. He wants to make a home at a North Carolina or southern Virginia track, but that will depend on his sponsors. Running a competitive car for a March-to-November season in the Late Model division costs roughly \$120,000.

As he moves toward the major leagues of stock car racing — the Winston Cup Series, his ultimate goal the next step for Nick will be the Busch Series, in which many Winston Cup drivers participate. The cost? About \$2 million a season.

He would like to run a few Busch races next season, then jump in full throttle in 2000 or 2001.

"When I feel like I'm ready, physically and mentally, we'll go for it," he says. "I've got time. I don't want to jump up there, then have to come back and work twice as hard to get back up there again. I want to do it one time and do it right."

Sounds like a driver with the checkered flag clearly in his sites.

### Nick's fans have a lot to cheer about

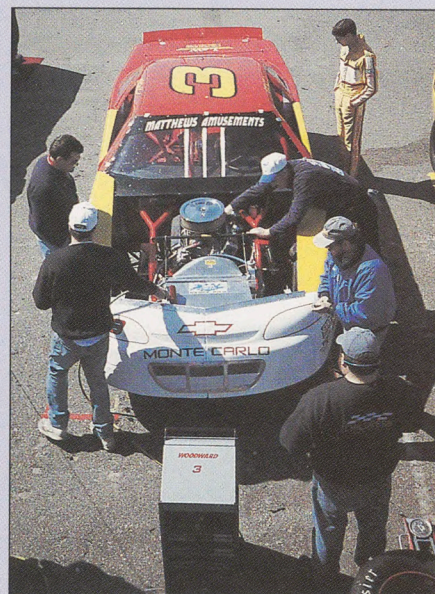
Nick won the World Karting Association (WKA) Virginia State Championship in his third season, 1991. The following year he won the WKA state championships in Virginia and Delaware. In 1993 as the WKA Virginia State Champion, Nick won his first WKA national race and qualified first at Daytona. In 1994 he was not only WKA's Delaware State Champion but also its National Champion.

Moving up to the next level, Nick won four races in Dwarf Car competition in 1995, three at Delaware International Speedway and one at Hagerstown (Maryland) Speedway. He finished second in the Rookie of the Year standings.

In 1996 he raced Dirt Late Models, finishing 10th in points at Delaware International Speedway with several top five finishes.

He moved up to the NASCAR Late Model Stock Car division in 1997 and won Rookie of the Year honors at Old Dominion Speedway, where he finished 10th in points for the season. He was also voted Most Improved Driver by the Metropolitan Auto Racing Fans Club. He was only 17.

During the past season, again in the Late Model division, he won two races, had eight top five finishes, won the Most Popular Driver Award and finished fourth in championship points at Old Dominion Speedway in Manassas, Va.

# Summary of Projects



## Building and Renovation Projects

### CHARLES E. AND PAULINE LEWIS HAYWORTH FINE ARTS CENTER

In November, Pauline Lewis Hayworth offered a \$2 million challenge gift toward completion of the new Charles E. and Pauline Lewis Hayworth Fine Arts Center. This gift brought the total Hayworth involvement to the center to \$6 million. The new domed facility will house classrooms, faculty offices, and training and performance areas, including a 500-seat theater and an art gallery. The project's total estimated cost is \$8 million to \$10 million.



### NEW RESIDENCE HALL

A new three-story apartment-style residence hall opened its doors to upperclassmen in September. The \$3.5 million facility provides on-campus housing for 78 students in three bedroom suites. Because of the University's rapidly growing student body — the 1998-99 head-count enrollment of 3,006 is up nine percent from the previous year — architectural plans are being completed for a similar facility to be opened next fall. The estimated cost is \$3.5 million.

### HORACE S. HAWORTH HALL OF SCIENCE

The 26,000-square-foot expansion of this 1967 building will create new classrooms, as well as laboratories and faculty office space. The estimated cost for the project is \$3 million.

### INTERNATIONAL SCHOOL OF HOME FURNISHINGS

High Point University's unique Home Furnishings Marketing Program and Interior Design Program will make their home in a new, 22,000-square-foot facility; construction is projected to begin in 1999. Estimated cost for the project is \$2.5 million.



### CHAS. E. HAYWORTH, SR. MEMORIAL CHAPEL/DAVID R. HAYWORTH HALL

Thanks to a \$1 million gift from philanthropist David R. Hayworth, this new addition to the Chas. E. Hayworth, Sr. Memorial Chapel provides five classrooms, 18 faculty offices and a student lounge. The second phase of this project is the addition of a larger vestibule and taller steeple to the existing sanctuary, while harmonizing its architectural style with that of the entire campus. The first phase of this \$2.5-million project was completed during the summer of 1998; the second began in October.

### OLD STUDENT CENTER

Originally built in 1941, the Old Student Center will be completely redesigned and renovated for classroom and faculty use. The project's estimated cost is \$1.5 million.

## Meditations Upon The Death Of Martha Gleaton

The following is a reprint of the eulogy Dr. E. Vance Davis delivered at the memorial service for Dr. Martha Gleaton, a distinguished member of the High Point University English Department who, tragically, took her own life in November. We are grateful to Dr. Davis for sharing these heartfelt words with us. The emotional service in Chas. E. Hayworth Chapel, overflowing with family, friends, students and colleagues, was on Nov. 6, 1998.



Scripture: Romans 8:31-39

"What then shall we say in response to this?" Paul asks in his letter to the Romans. "What then shall we say to this?" we ask in the wake of the death of Dr. Martha Gleaton. Because we so desperately want answers to our questions, our impulse is to cry out in our shock, and numbness, and pain to Martha herself. I confess I have had my little private conversations in my mind with

Martha in the last couple of days. And I suspect that many of you have had similar conversations.

I said to her, "Martha, O, Martha, why? We simply do not understand. There were people here trying to help. We wanted you in this place. We wanted you to be our teacher. We needed you to be Mom and Grandmom. Life is just too precious to deal with it like this. You have left us in such a murky mess, and in our deepest honesty we have to confess we are more than a little angry at you, even at the same time that we feel guilt for that anger. We do not like our feelings, Martha, but my, my do we ever hurt."

And I can hear Martha's response back to us. "Vance, I really did not mean to hurt you, or my family, or let the University down. I am sorry I left you all in such a state. Please forgive me. I loved Martie and Ansley and mother and father and Ellen and Mattie. I loved all of my family. I loved this place. I loved my students. I want you to remember me. But please, please do not linger long in your pain. I am so sorry."

Hearing such things, even if we speak only to ourselves in our minds, helps ease the pain; but our imaginary conversations cannot give answer to our basic "Why?" Shortly after I learned of Martha's death Wednesday evening, I was sitting on the sofa in stunned silence and disbelief. Suddenly I became aware that I was staring at a book on the coffee table. The book was Fred Chappell's latest, and one I had purchased for my summer reading. Unfortunately, it remained unread. But the title leaped at me — *Farewell, I'm Bound to Leave You*. Even though I knew instantly there was no connection, I uttered "Martha!" in my mind. In part, because Fred Chappell was Martha's professor at UNCG. But in part because it expressed what I had projected Martha to say to us, "Farewell, I am bound to leave you." It seemed to hint at why.

I picked up the book and frantically began turning the pages to find the reference for the title. It comes in the very last few pages in the context of a family vigil for a dying grandmother, a vigil with which the book actually begins. The words are from an old song; they are spoken as grandmother to daughter. "And so farewell I'm bound to leave you. All away you rolling river, I'll be gone when dawn is breaking." The daughter utters a weakened protest, "O Mama, don't say so. Not this dawn or the next or the next. It is too

soon for you to go." In my heart I suspect Martha simply felt she was in a box that she could not get out of. Farewell, I am bound to leave you. I have to go. We protest to her, "It's too soon for you to go." And our attempts to understand still leave us without satisfaction.

But let us leave the whys, the anger, the guilt — at least long enough to celebrate the life. Martha Gleaton was a remarkable woman. One might not gather that at first glance. Here was this tiny, little person walking demurely across campus, almost with a shuffle, with perhaps a cigarette in her hand, or a banana, or a cigarette in one hand and a banana in the other; you could miss her significance.

But stop her and talk to her, and you discovered her passion for literature. Visit her home and be greeted by an array of animals, and you easily concluded something about her respect for and love for all of God's creatures. See the smile on her face as she led little Mattie about, and you sensed her love for her family. Sit in her classes, and you knew you were in the presence of talent that understands and communicates. Watch her anywhere with students, and you witnessed the genuineness of her care. And for most of the years that I knew her, hear her laugh, and you became aware of her zest for life.

People of all sorts simply invited her into their lives and she walked therein with gentleness, as if to say, "I know I am on sacred ground." Yes, Martha Gleaton was a remarkable woman — a keen minded, warm hearted, life-affirming friend.

Alas, I hear her speak again. "Enough, enough," she says. "Get on with it now. Go write a poem, pet a dog, tell a joke, call a friend, read a book. Want some suggestions? How about *Divine Secrets of the Ya Ya Sisterhood*. If that does not do it for you, read some eighteenth-century literature. Read some Fanny Burney or try to figure out *Tristram Shandy*. Enjoy a Restoration play, or read Jane Austen, or Virginia Woolf's *Mrs. Dalloway*. Read. Just do it. Enjoy life. From time to time you will remember me — that is enough."

What then shall we say in response to this? Just a couple of other thoughts I have. If it seems appropriate to us and we need to, we may want to say in our souls, "Martha, we forgive you." If it seems appropriate and we need to, we may want to ask forgiveness to cover our sense of inadequacy and guilt. But after that we should find as quickly as possible ways to put aside the question "Why?" The question is a natural one, but I learned long ago that trying to answer an unanswerable why can only eat your own life away. If you can, let it go.

Finally, come back to the New Testament affirmation. Reread Romans 8. "For I am convinced that neither death, nor life, nor angels, nor demons, neither the present nor the future, nor any powers, neither height nor depth, nor anything else in all creation, will be able to separate us from the love of God in Christ Jesus our Lord."

What then shall we say to this? Nothing can separate Martha or us from the God who loves us all. Nothing. Please hear that — NOTHING. Not Martha's death, nor our anger, our guilt, our pain, our remembrances, our failure to remember — nothing — not now or forever more. We are not alone. Thanks be to God!

Amen.

### Alice Sink Captures Extraordinary Courage That Triumphed in the '44 Polio Epidemic

For her first book, High Point University English professor Alice E. Sink turned to the memories and stories from her own past — namely, of the polio epidemic of 1944, and what became known as “The Miracle of Hickory.”

*The Grit Behind the Miracle* is Sink’s account of that historic unfolding of events, and weaves together the personal recollections of medical professionals, parents and polio survivors who were patients at the Emergency Infantile Paralysis Hospital. The unit was constructed, staffed and accepting patients within 54 hours of when work began.

The Emergency Infantile Paralysis Hospital was built at a campground as a response to the overflow of polio victims in Catawba County during what was to become the second-worst polio epidemic in U.S. history. With area hospitals too full to accept new patients, the need for such a facility was sudden and dire. *The Grit Behind the Miracle* recounts the courage and determination of medical professionals and ordinary citizens alike, working together to make the improbable a reality.

Amazingly, most of the children who were treated at the makeshift polio hospital survived — thanks to tireless efforts of the staff and the camaraderie of their young charges.

Sink includes the fondly recalled memories of the parents whose children were treated at the hospital, as well as those of the

patients. For many, the ad hoc facility was a miniature paradise in the midst of one of the most devastating disease outbreaks our nation has ever known. Sink gathered their tales at a 50-year reunion that she organized for the purpose. She transcribed their recollections through the filter of creative non-fiction in crafting the book’s poignant narrative.

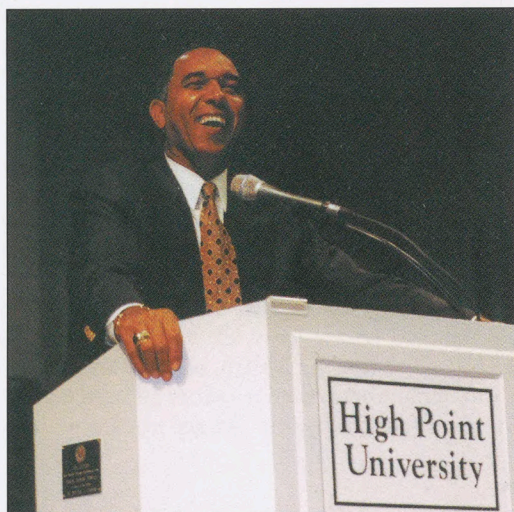
Building the hospital made heroes out of many who contributed time, materials, and labor to the hurried project. The incredible confluence of volunteered effort — everyone from lumber yards and local residents to the U.S. Army and state prison convicts pitched in — resulted in a fully operational facility with a stunning rate of success for the 450 patients who were treated at the Emergency Infantile Paralysis Hospital in its nine-month existence. Only 12 of those patients died. The hospital was closed in March 1945, when Charlotte Memorial opened a new wing for the treatment of polio.

The story made national news and became known as “The Miracle of Hickory.”

*The Grit Behind the Miracle* is a 240-page labor of love for Sink, who grew up through three polio epidemics in her native Lexington and watched this pernicious disease that debilitated so many of her childhood friends and wrought havoc on the social fabric of the time. Almost every facet of life bore the fear and pain of polio, and her own memories of off-limits public facilities and references to iron lungs formed the foundation for the book. And it was the sheer courage and fellowship of everyone involved, including patients, that inspired Sink. As she writes, “The story has been told in their honor and memory.”

*The Grit Behind the Miracle* is published by University Press of America and is available in a hard-cover edition for \$39.50 through the High Point University Bookstore.

## Proctor witnesses historic signing

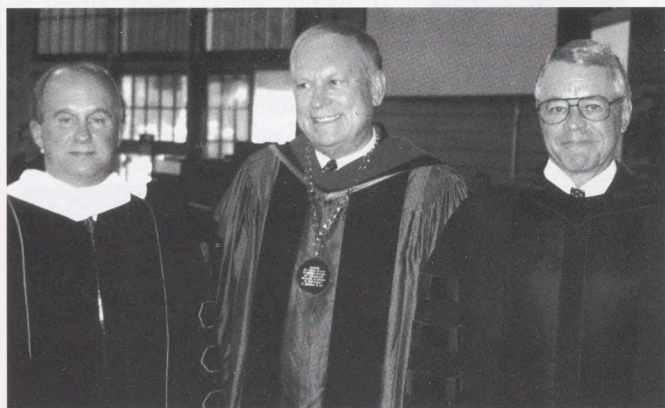
Rick Proctor '79, head of the University's sports medicine program, witnessed the signing of a new law in North Carolina last fall.

Davidson, a native of Fowler, Ind., served in the U.S. Army and played professional baseball for two years with the Phillies' and Braves' organizations.

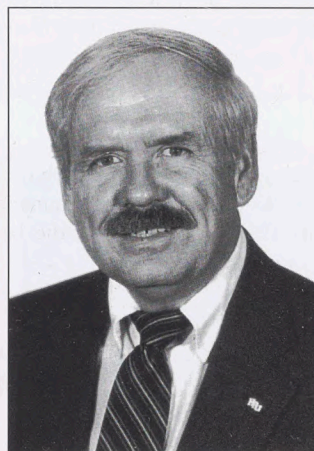

High Point University mourned the loss of two of its honorary alumni in March.

Archie K. Davis died March 13. He earned his honorary degree from the University in 1967. Davis was the former chairman of the board of Wachovia Bank and Trust Co.

Davis served as the president of the Chamber of Commerce for the United States and the American Bankers Association. He also served as chairman of The Duke Endowment and the National Humanities Center. Davis was one of the founders of the Research Triangle Park area near Raleigh. He was 87.

Weldon served as a minister for 29 years with the Western North Carolina Conference of the United Methodist Church. He served as superintendent of the Western North Carolina District in Charlotte from 1975 to 1981.

He retired in 1992 after 11 years of fund-raising work at the Duke University Divinity School in Durham, N.C.

## University hosts Bishop's Convocation

The University hosted the annual Bishop's Convocation for Clergy and Finch Lecture on March 26.

The convocation was held in the Chas. E. Hayworth Sr. Memorial Chapel on the campus. It featured two sessions and a luncheon on the Greensward.

Dr. Barbara A.B. Patterson spoke at the first session. She is an assistant professor of religion at Emory University in Atlanta, Ga. She is an ordained priest in the Episcopal Church and past president of the National Association of College and University Chaplains.

Dr. Robert L. Blocker provided music for the sessions. Blocker has been Dean of the Yale University School of Music since 1995.

The second session featured Dr. Robert M. Franklin as the Finch Lecture speaker. Franklin became the sixth president of the Interdenominational Theological Center in Atlanta in July 1997. The Center is the largest African American seminary in the nation.

## Warlick publishes new book

Those who have read the book say Warlick has succeeded in his endeavor.

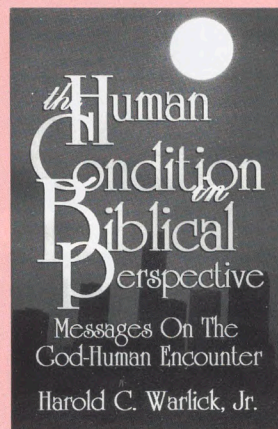
"Dr. Harold Warlick combines a vast reservoir of knowledge, disciplined spirit, and life experiences in explaining complex human issues," said Dr. William A. Brown, Distinguished Professor of Music at the University of North Florida. "He does this in such an extraordinary and illumined manner that this book should be required reading."

Dr. Robert Blocker, Dean of the School of Music at Yale University and guest pianist at the Bishop's Convocation of Clergy, added: "This book is not a trendy self-help guide; this is a compendium for a deeper and richer life."

The main purpose of the book, Warlick said, was to create an affordable textbook for introductory religion classes. But, churches in South Carolina and Tennessee have already pre-ordered the book for use in adult Sunday school classes.

The book is released in conjunction with the completion of the renovations to the Chas. E. Hayworth, Sr. Memorial Chapel on campus. The book's dedication reads: "This book is dedicated to the alumni, students and staff, both past and present, whose commitment and support have enabled their university's chapel to remain a vibrant place of worship."

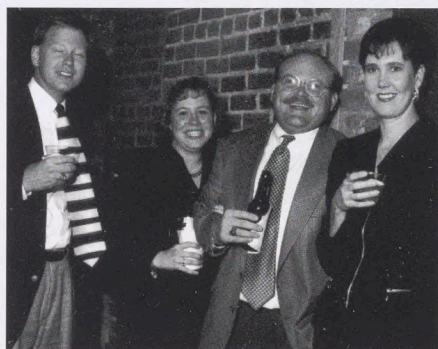

We hope the following photo essay captures the essence of the event and inspires you to join us this year.

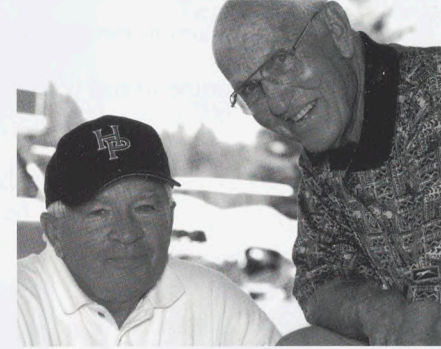
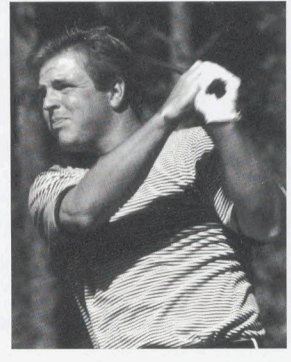
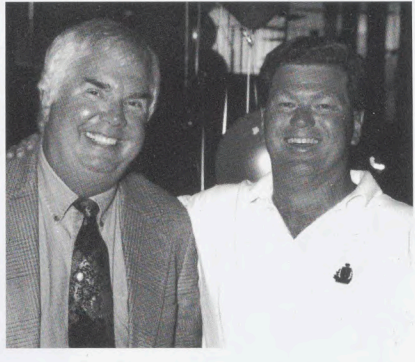
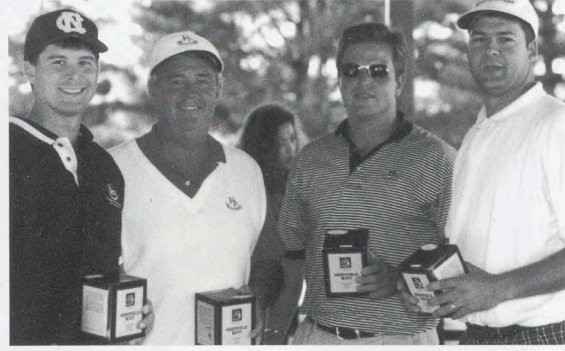

# Tubby Smith

## Our National Champion

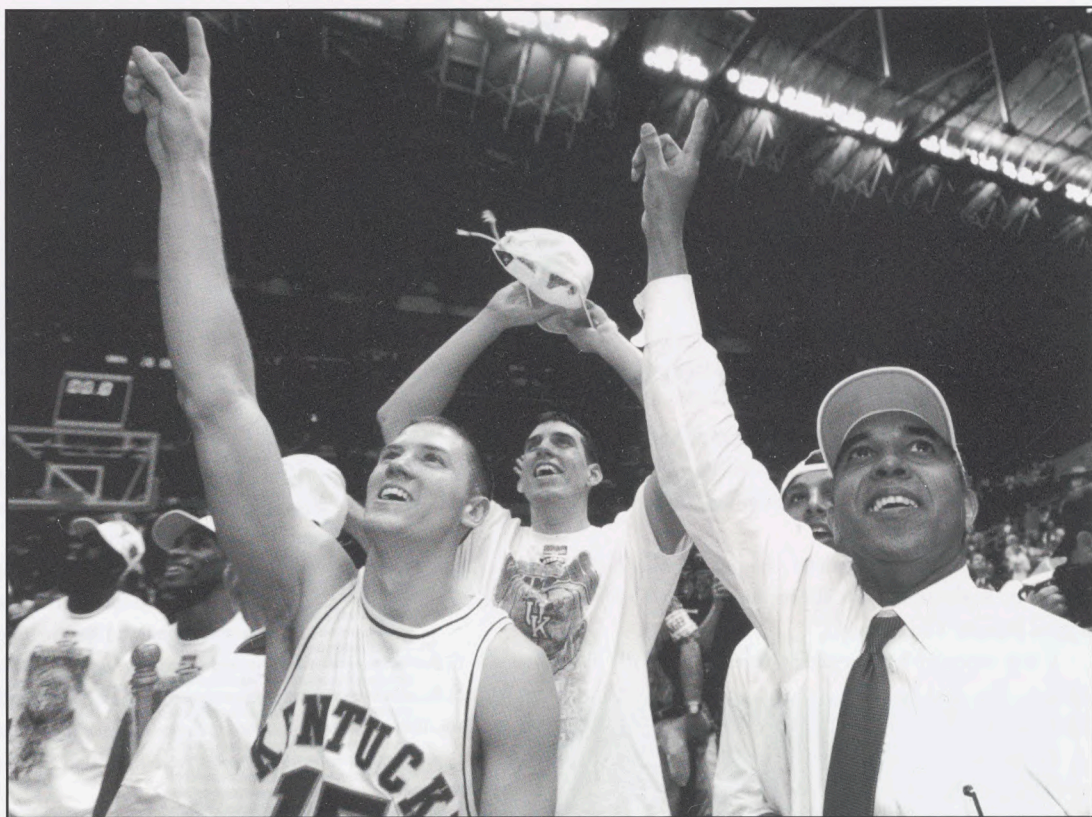
Orlando "Tubby" Smith '73, once a high-flying All-Conference guard for the Panthers, soared to the pinnacle of his profession this spring, leading the University of Kentucky Wildcats to the National Championship in the NCAA Tournament.

Smith's team beat Utah 78-69 in the championship game. Previously, the Wildcats came from behind to defeat Duke 86-84 in winning the South Regional and outlast Stanford 86-85 in overtime to win in the Final Four semi-final matchup.

These three wins capped a 35-4 season that had the legions of Kentucky faithful praising their new head coach. Smith succeeded Rick Pitino, who left Lexington for the NBA and strongly urged the University to offer the job to his former assistant, Tubby Smith. Smith had already enjoyed successful stints at the University of Tulsa and the University of Georgia.

Smith was two years into building a strong program at Georgia when Kentucky came calling. He was torn, he said, but the opportunity to lead one of the nation's perennial powerhouses was too good to turn down.

He was undaunted by the prospect of stepping into a pressure cooker — after all, as one of 17 children reared by proud tenant farmers, he has spent a lifetime meeting and overcoming challenges. So Tubby Smith and his wife, Donna (Donna Walls '76), moved the family from Athens to Lexington, swapping Georgia red for Kentucky blue.

Many High Point alumni remember them both in Panther purple and white, when Tubby was a star point guard from Scotland, Md., and Donna was a cheerleader from Richmond Va. and High Point's first African-American homecoming queen. During his senior year, Tubby gave Donna, a freshman, a ride to Richmond during a holiday. Then began a romance that continues to this day. They were married Dec. 27, 1975, and have three sons: Orlando Jr. "G.G.," who plays for Georgia; Saul, who plays for Kentucky; and Brian, who is 13.

Jerry Steele, who coached Smith during his senior year, presented a prestigious coaching award to his former player this spring at the New York Athletic Club.

"I really enjoyed coaching him," says Steele, who continues as head coach of the High Point men's basketball team. "He was special. I knew he would be successful at whatever he did. That he chose to coach is good for basketball and good for the young men who play for him. We at High Point University can be proud that Tubby is part of us."

During the championship run in March, Coach Smith got a lot of national TV time. He was impeccably dressed and cool under pressure — intense but always under control. He devised winning game plans, and he instilled confidence in the young men who executed them. At the end of the run, when the nets were cut and the trophy was held high, his players gave him credit for the championship.

Tubby Smith is a champion — our champion.

## Student's life was distinguished by courage

Four years before she died of cancer and three years before her illness was diagnosed, Carol Hooker kept a poem on her dorm room door which was written by a terminal cancer patient.

"I think that illnesses are the keys that unlock certain doors," the poem reads. And for Carol who fought a winning battle against multiple sclerosis and lupus for many years, these words of inspiration became a tragic irony at age 21.

Amanda Carol Hooker of Hendersonville, N.C. died Feb. 10, 1998 after a three-month struggle with stomach cancer.

Despite her frequent bouts with illness during her three and a half years here, Carol impressed professors with her intelligence, moved students through her friendship, and established communities through her responsibility to the church.

According to junior Jennifer Gauntt, Carol's death has had a tremendous impact on students, but not just because she was so young. "She was going to be a great person," Gauntt said.

Carol received her sociology degree early with all University honors in January. She had been accepted to the East Carolina University School of Medicine and was planning to pursue a career involving children and medicine.

Before cancer kept her from classes, Carol was a double major in sociology and biology. On Feb. 12, Carol was buried in her ECU Medicine sweatshirt and HPU baseball cap.

Dr. Charlie Warde was Carol's professor for two semesters of physics. "She got into my head early on and got two solid A's from me," Warde said.

Carol came here on a full-tuition scholarship for academics. She became a junior marshal. She used her knowledge to tutor other students.

"As always with Carol, she carried a number of other people on her back," Warde said. "She was always looking out for other people."

Gwendolyn Ruffin '98 considered Carol her best friend and characterizes her — as most of Carol's friends do — as independent, devoted to God, and all-around amazing. "Although she was very young, she was also very mature and wise," Ruffin said. "Carol was always making plans for the future."

But despite her drive for success, Carol always put others before herself. Close friends and strangers both share similar stories of Carol's concern for others' well-being.

"Carol took care of everybody else first," Jennifer Coppedge '98 said. "She would stop anything to help somebody."

Along with her mission of helping others came Carol's service to ministry. In 1996, she started High Point's chapter of the national organization Campus Crusade for Christ. In lieu of flowers, Carol requested memorials be made to Campus Crusade for Christ.

"The most memorable thing about Carol was how accepting she was of people," Veronda Bryk '98 said. "She tried her hardest to understand others."

Friends and acquaintances are thankful to have experienced Carol's altruism.

The poem Carol lived and died by said prophetically: "Perhaps the illness may show us some truths which healthiness hides away."

Carol used her vision to help others. And her spirit will continue to inspire all who were fortunate enough to know her.

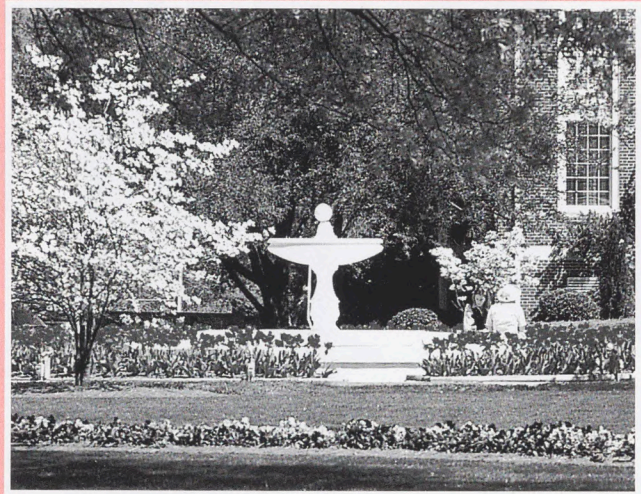
## Marion's Garden

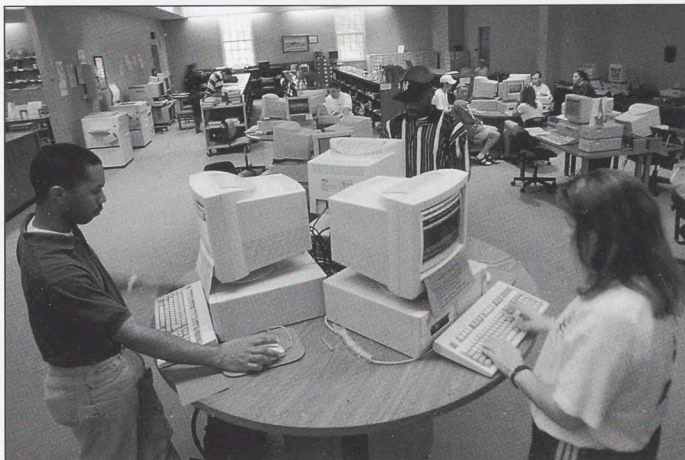
Jennifer Gauntt and Kim Envall represented the N. C. NU Chapter at the regional convention in Alabama. Both Jennifer and Kim presented a paper

## Woody Gibson named new athletic director

Jerry Steele, who has served in a dual capacity as Athletic Director and head men's basketball coach for 26 years, will retain his coaching position.

Gibson's appointment was necessary with the University's transition to NCAA Division I. Dr. Vance Davis, vice-president for Academic Affairs said the responsibilities were too great for one man to serve as head coach and athletic director. "Jerry Steele has done a tremendous job for us as AD and head basketball coach," he said.

"But because of the many time commitments, responsibilities, and duties associated with the positions of basketball coach and athletic director, it is unfair to Jerry Steele to ask him to continue in both capacities."

Gibson is a 1975 graduate of the University and has served in a variety of positions within the athletic department. He has coached the men's soccer team since 1978 and earned his 200th victory in that capacity last fall. Former Catawba head coach Peter Broadley will take over that position this season.

Gibson served as golf coach from 1975 to 1992 and Sports Information Director from 1975 to 1994. He will continue to serve as the coordinator of the University's sports management degree program.

## Panthers are truly Student Athletes

High Point University athletes know what it means to be a student-athlete.

In a recent report released by the University Office of Internal Affairs, several of the Panther sports teams excelled academically as well as on the playing field.

The women's cross country team held a cumulative grade point average (G.P.A.) of 3.495, and all members of the team were recognized as scholar-athletes. One member of the team earned a 4.0 G.P.A.

The women's soccer team also proved academic prowess. The team posted a 3.269 G.P.A. and 81 percent of the team were named scholar athletes. 67 percent of both the women's and men's tennis teams, 60 percent of the volleyball team and 50 percent of the women's basketball team were recognized as scholar athletes.

Crystal Palace general manager Terry Doherty discovered Speight when his name came up in conversation with Wake Forest head coach Dave Odom.

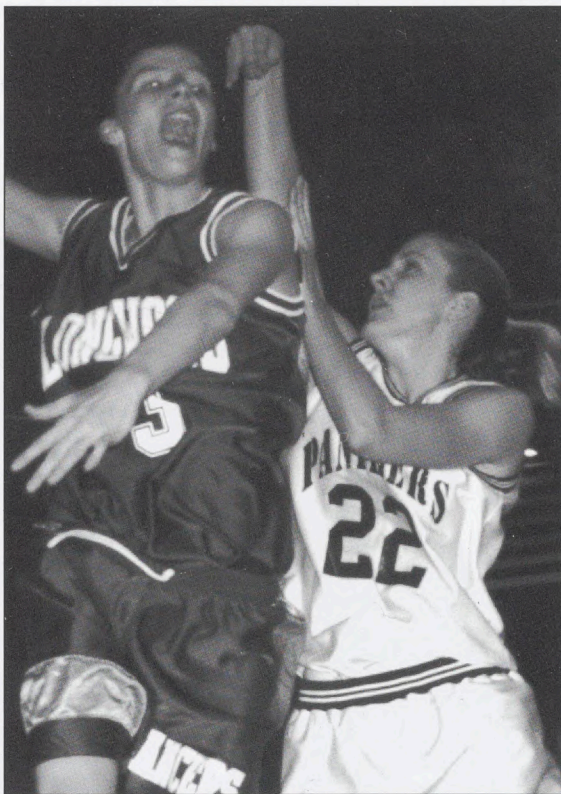

## Women's basketball team nets 500th victory

After posting a successful 23-4 record for the season, the women's basketball team recorded the 500th win in school history during the final game of the season.

The team, led by senior guard Karen Curtis, soared in their first year of Division I competition and participated in the Big South Conference tournament.

Curtis re-wrote the record books this year by surpassing Gene Little's '69 as the University's all-time leading scorer with 2,612 points. She also took the helm in the assists category netting 602.

In addition to being named to the Kodak Division II All American Team and the Daktronics All American Team, Curtis set a single game scoring record for HPU by scoring 43 points versus Mount Olive College.

The University retired Curtis's number 15 jersey.

The men's basketball team posted a 12-13 record and participated in the Big South Conference Tournament.

## Women's basketball team reunites to celebrate title

The 1978 women's basketball team returned to HPU to celebrate the 20th anniversary of their national championship during Alumni Night on January 31.

The reunion was part of the Alumni Night festivities, which included a reception for alumni between the men's and women's games.

Over a four-year period from 1975 to 1979, the women's basketball team posted an overall record of 117 wins and 15 losses. They captured four consecutive Carolinas Athletic Conference championships, and three regional titles, and earned three consecutive trips to the A.I.A.W. National finals.

In 1978, the team won the A.I.A.W. National Championship.

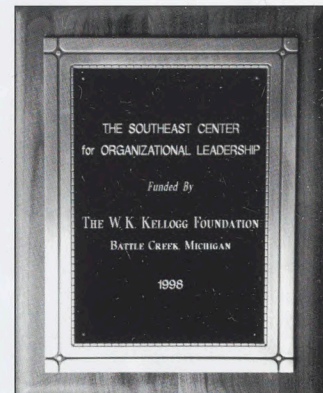
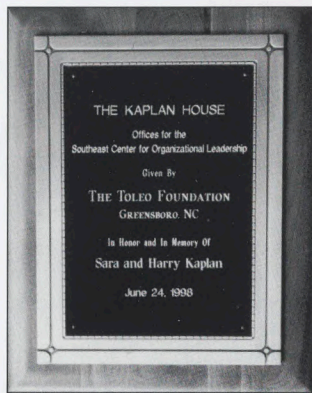

# UNIVERSITY ASSUMES NATIONAL LEADERSHIP IN HUMAN SERVICES EDUCATION

## KELLOGG, TOLEO GRANTS FUND EXTRAORDINARY CENTER

*When Leonard Kaplan '51 heard about the new program, he wanted to help. So did the W.K. Kellogg Foundation.*

Together — Mr. Kaplan through his TOLEO Group in Greensboro and the Kellogg Foundation in Battle Creek, Mich. — they have provided a financial foundation for an extraordinary program that has earned High Point University national distinction.

This spring, HPU began a study to determine the need for and how best to deliver education for human service providers throughout the Southeast through its new Southeast Center for Organizational Leadership.

High Point is one of only a handful of universities nationwide that educates executives for non-profit organizations. Committed to creating change in communities through education, the Southeastern Center for Organizational Leadership is funded by a Kellogg grant and housed in a contemporary building renovated and furnished by a TOLEO grant.

High Point is the only institution in North Carolina and one of only 12 nationally to receive a W.K. Kellogg Foundation grant targeted at programs that help make non-profits more effective.

Seventy colleges and universities, including several in North Carolina, sought the Kellogg grants. Other recipients were Harvard, Yale, George Mason, the University of Texas-San Antonio, City University of

New York, Arizona State, Case Western Reserve, State University of New York-Albany, Johns Hopkins, Portland State, and California State-Los Angeles.

“We are honored that the Kellogg Foundation has selected High Point for such a prestigious and generous grant,” said Dr. Jacob C. Martinson, University president. “Our proposal was selected from an extremely competitive field that included some of the finest colleges and universities in

the nation. We are grateful for this opportunity and look forward to pioneering models for human-service education.”

Patrick Haun, an assistant professor in High Point’s human relations department, assumes responsibility for turning this concept into an effective educational experience as the center’s executive director.

Early in the grant process, High Point decided to include other regional universities. The center initially will work with North Carolina Central University in Durham and Shaw University in Raleigh. Eventually, other partners will participate in Center programs; three other universities already have expressed interest in becoming partners. High Point is first in the nation to initiate a collaboration among colleges and universities in the area of human services education.

The immediate priorities will be to establish the center on campuses and complete a needs analysis to explore unique educational systems and the need for graduate-level education. Part of the center’s mission, Haun said, is to discover new models for delivering undergraduate and graduate programs in human services education.

Another objective of the new Center will be to offer leadership programs for high school and college students selected to leadership positions, addressing such issues as conflict management, financial planning, committee and board development, and managing volunteers.

“There is very little formal or informal training designed for new leaders, no matter what their age,” Haun said. “We will help fill that void.”

than most other colleges or universities — educating students through its American Humanics program. American Humanics is a nationwide partnership of colleges and universities that prepares graduates for positions with human services organizations such as Big Brothers/Big Sisters, YMCA, YWCA, Boy Scouts, Girl Scouts and Habitat for Humanity, to name a few.

“The Humanics affiliation and our success with it certainly placed High Point University in a good position to be recognized by the Kellogg Foundation,” Haun said. “A glance at the other recipients clearly indicates that the Kellogg selection process was rigorous and competitive, so everything we could muster was an important component to being awarded the grant.”

W.K. Kellogg Foundation, one of America’s largest and most prestigious philanthropic foundations (with nearly \$10 billion in assets), was established in 1930 to “help people help themselves through the practical application of knowledge and resources to improve their quality of life and that of future generations.”

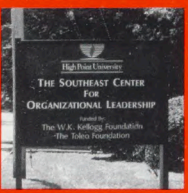
The Foundation, based in Battle Creek, Mich., targets grants in the areas of health; food systems and rural development; youth and education; higher education; and philanthropy and volunteerism.

While the Kellogg grant underwrites the center’s programming, a grant from the TOLEO Group of Greensboro provides and furnishes a permanent campus home for the center.

Leonard Kaplan, the TOLEO Group’s chairman, examined the uni-

## New Center Director Has Long History In Human Services

(EDITOR'S NOTE: This story was first published this spring in "CONNECTIONS," the magazine about American Humanics programs, students and alumni, based in Kansas City, Mo.)

Sometimes you don't see your future clearly until others see it in you first. Did American Humanics founder H. Roe Bartle see himself in W. Patrick Haun when he bestowed on him the title of Bartle, Jr.? We may never know. One thing is certain: Patrick Haun has helped many people find their own future through his service as a Boy Scout, American Humanics student and alumnus, and AH Campus Director at High Point University. After fourteen years as campus director, Haun has been named CEO & Executive Director of the Center for Organizational Leadership at High Point University.

A West Virginia native, Haun was involved in the Boy Scouts for 13 years and had attained the rank of Eagle Scout when he enrolled in the American Humanics program at Salem College (in West Virginia). After graduating in 1971, he joined the Boy Scouts of America as a district executive in Huntington, W.Va. Haun then worked at his alma mater as director of alumni affairs and director of admissions. He received his master's in education administration at West Virginia University in 1979. In 1984, he accepted the position of campus director for the American Humanics program at High Point University.

Haun's commitment to the American Humanics program in non-profit management and leadership is evident. He has gone beyond the extra mile by taking students to Europe to experience the non-profit sector overseas for a fresh perspective on the sector in the United States. In addition to his dedication to students, Haun believes strongly in cultivating relationships in the community. He has served on a number of local boards, including the Boy Scouts, Boys & Girls Clubs and YMCA.

Haun was associate dean for four American Humanics

Management Institutes from 1987-1990 and provost for the Institute in San Antonio, Texas in 1991. One of his favorite memories is rebuilding the interior of a Boys & Girls Club as part of the San Antonio Management Institute. Another highlight of his career was founding the American Humanics Campus/Executive Directors Association with the help of AH Directors Dr. Robert Ashcraft, (Arizona State University); and Karen Every (Rockhurst College). Haun served on the American Humanics National Board for four years and was the first

Campus/Executive Director to be allowed voting privileges.

American Humanics has gone through many changes since Haun's days as a student at Salem College. The number of campus affiliates has grown from four to 51.

When he learned there would be an AH affiliate at Bennett College, only seven miles away, Haun was somewhat concerned. Could two American Humanics programs exist so closely together? The answer is a resounding "YES!" Already, the two schools have collaborated on AH such activities as the fall student retreat.

"I attribute a great deal of my professional success to my training and experience gained from American Humanics," Haun reflected. He will continue to be involved in the community and with American Humanics.

David J. Bergen succeeds Haun as High Point University's American Humanics Campus Director. Previously, Bergen was assistant professor of Human Relations at High Point. He is currently the campus advisor to the Habitat for Humanity campus affiliate and co-chairs a committee on alcohol and drug abuse.

"Dr. Bergen is well liked by his peers and commands the respect of the students," Haun said. "He has already begun to fill my shoes."



# STUDENTS INVESTING REAL DOLLARS

## THANKS TO A \$100,000 DONATION



High Point University students this fall will be the first in the Triad, and among students at only 33 campuses nationwide, to invest real dollars through a university-sponsored investment club.

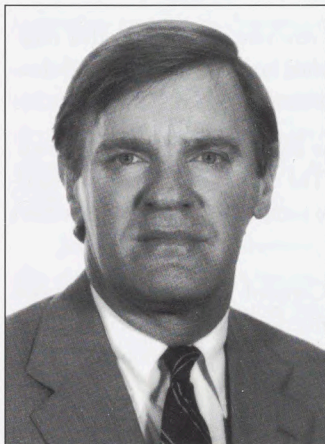
Retired businessman and alumnus James E. Foscue made the investment club possible this year with a \$100,000 donation in honor of Floyd Craven, a 1959 graduate of the University, trustee and certified public accountant whom he has known for nearly 40 years.

"I wanted to make this gift to the college because, under outstanding management, it is moving in such a positive direction," Foscue said. "And I wanted to honor Floyd Craven because he is not only a man of immense integrity, but he is also the most honest man I've ever met. Others have recognized this about him as well. We have worked together on a professional basis, and he has been a true family friend since I met him in 1960."

The Floyd Craven Investment Club at the Earl N. Phillips School of Business is the first step toward opening a full-blown stock trading room on campus. The trading room will give students instant access to all the major stock exchanges.

When developed for an approximate cost of \$1 million, the trading room will put High Point University in elite company. High Point will join the Massachusetts Institute of Technology, Carnegie Mellon Institute, the University of Texas, Bentley College, and the Illinois Institute of Technology as the nation's only college-based investment facilities.

"What a tremendous educational opportunity this is for High Point University students," Craven said. "We have an outstanding business department at the university, and this program should certainly enhance the students' opportunities. There's definitely some excitement among the trustees, and I have already heard from some who would like to contribute."

There is also an interesting coincidence in the evolution of Foscue's gift, which, Craven said, left him feeling "overwhelmed." Craven had recently discussed with another trustee finding enough money, perhaps \$100,000, to start a stock investment class or club at the University.

"Then, when Mr. Foscue called me over to his home to tell me about his \$100,000 gift, I just about fell out of my chair," Craven said. "Talk about a coincidence. The Lord certainly works in mysterious ways. ... I'm so proud of Mr. Foscue for doing this. He's the most thoughtful person I've ever met."

The Floyd Craven Investment Club will be open to 5 to 20 selected juniors and seniors majoring in business administration with grade point averages of at least 3.2, according to Dr. Marlon Winters, chairman of the Phillips School of Business.

It will provide these students an opportunity to invest in the stock market with actual dollars under the tutelage of finance professors. Students may invest only Investment Club funds and upon graduation will cease to be members. All dividends and other earnings by the Investment Club will be returned to the club fund for future members to invest.

A steering committee will select Floyd Craven Investment Club members and oversee, without directing, their investments. The committee will involve a finance professor, a business professor, an investment banker, the chairman of the Phillips School of Business and a High Point University official appointed by the president.



Day-to-day supervision will center around the current finance professor teaching the investment analysis class, part of the finance major in the business department. Investment Club members will receive intensive training from the supervising professor.

A native of Jamestown N.C., and the son of Dr. John E. and Vera Armfield Foscue (daughter of Dr. David Armfield), James Foscue attended High Point College and the State University. He joined Earl N. Phillips Sr. in business and was co-founder of several furniture-related manufacturing companies. In 1972 he joined Earl N. Phillips Jr. and W.M. Webster in founding First Factors Corp., where he served as chairman until the corporation was sold earlier this year to G.E. Capitol.

"Throughout his distinguished career, Jim Foscue has brought the highest level of distinction to the business community, to the society and to the University," said Dr. Jacob C. Martinson, University president. "We are proud of the fact that he is an alumnus."

"It is difficult to determine who is most enthusiastic about this special gift," Martinson said. "Floyd Craven is deeply honored. The Phillips School of Business has great anticipation for what this kind of gift can mean to strengthening our academic reputation. And the University is most optimistic about the benefits of recognition and additional support, which will most certainly occur as word about the gift spreads."

## 75th Anniversary marks growth, accomplishment

On September 14, 1924, the first High Point University students braved miserable conditions to begin the tradition of excellence that has come to embody High Point University.

Rain poured, turning the barren grounds into a mire of mud and muck.

Only three buildings dotted the campus. Roberts Hall housed the offices, classrooms, library and the dining room. The female students huddled together in Women's Hall, which still lacked heat and locks on the doors. McCulloch Hall had no roof, so the male students lived with local families.

But the early students persevered, setting the tradition of committed alumni and students.

The common thread weaves HPU graduates together. A 1939 graduate, a 1969 graduate, and a 1989 graduate share the same Panther spirit. The Class of 1999 will carry this spirit into the new millennium. Experiences differ and times change, and those who experience High Point leave the campus, but High Point University will never leave them. The spirit of strength, integrity, and excellence remains.

The University has grown to a 28-building campus, with more in the works. Over 2,600 students attend the school and 15,000 alumni praise their alma mater. Old Montlieu Avenue has been re-routed, allowing for a lush greensward on the front campus. An ornate brick and wrought iron gate encircles the campus now, beckoning visitors to take a closer look. Crews recently renovated the Chas. E. Hayworth, Sr. Memorial Chapel to provide for a more attractive facade and more classroom space.

The University is raising funds to build a Fine Arts Center, Humanities Building and an International School for Home Furnishings.

High Point University will celebrate its 75th anniversary on September 14, 1999, remembering the past with nostalgia while peering ahead to the 21st century. The future will bring new opportunities, but will perpetuate the tradition of excellence.

Make plans to return to campus September 1999 for the 75th anniversary celebration. With the support of alumni and friends, the University has grown to what it represents today, and with your continued support it will reach unimaginable heights tomorrow.

## Gifts boost furniture program

High Point University recently received \$250,000 dollars and a new endowed scholarship for the proposed International School for Home Furnishings and the furniture program.

The University plans to begin building the school in 1999.

Bassett Furniture Industries, Inc. committed \$150,000 to the International School for Home Furnishings. The contribution will be used for the school's furniture library.

Leggett & Platt pledged another \$100,000 toward the building of the school.

Marilyn "Toddy" Richman, of Glencoe, Ill., endowed the William S. Richman Memorial Scholarship in honor of her late husband. The scholarship was established in conjunction with her children, Daniel A. Richman, Elizabeth Richman Besser and Ruth Richman Kornbluh, and will be given each year to a student in the furniture program.

William Richman was president of Stratford Company and the upholstery division of Mohasco Company. A founder of UFAC, the Upholstered Furniture Action Council, he became chairman in 1979. He was an active member of the American Furniture Manufacturers Association and the Home Furnishings Council.

## Cannon Foundation gives \$100,000 to the University

The Cannon Foundation, Inc. in Concord, N.C. donated \$100,000 toward the expansion and renovation of the Horace S. Haworth Hall of Science.

The University plans to expand and renovate this building that originally was built in 1967. Currently, the building houses laboratories and classrooms for biology, chemistry, physics, and general science.

The expansion project will include the addition of classrooms, laboratory space, faculty offices and a lecture hall. The exterior of the existing building also will be redesigned to blend in more compatibly with the University's architecture.

Industrialist Charles A. Cannon, of Concord, established the Cannon Foundation. The foundation supports construction projects at libraries, hospitals, health care institutions, colleges, universities and other non-profit organizations, primarily in North Carolina.



## Annual Fund reaches new heights

The 1996-97 Annual Fund for High Point University reached new heights this year through the Alumni Phonathon.

The phonathon reached a pledge total of \$131,520. The total is the highest ever raised through the phonathon in the history of the university. Previously, the highest pledge total was \$125,000. New dollars in gifts and pledges doubled from last year to reaching almost \$50,000.

The phonathon has also set records in gifts received. To date, the phonathon has brought in over \$150,000 and over \$13,000 in matching gifts.

The drive was operated by trained student callers dedicated to the future of their University, and the record totals were made possible by caring alumni who are committed to the continued excellence of their alma mater. Most of the funds raised were designated unrestricted, which will be applied to the University's most immediate needs, like scholarships, and library holdings.

Two alumni lifted the totals for the Founders Campaign for High Point University recently by donating over \$600,000.

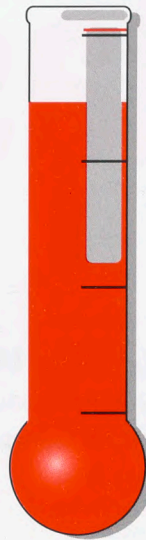

The scholarship will help students of the University's Earl N. Phillips School of Business. The university currently enrolls over 1,000 students in business-related majors.

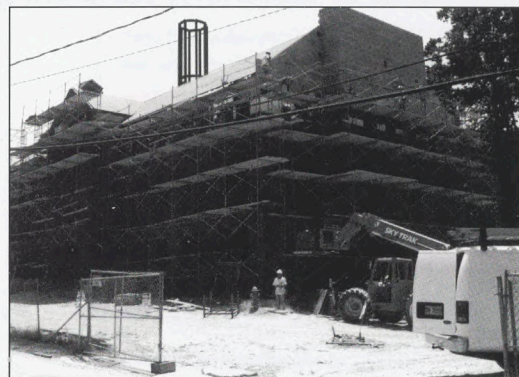
Mrs. Hoffman is a 1946 alumna and was a member of the Alpha Gamma Delta sorority while in school.

# Supporting HPU Athletics



## Rules and Regulations Guide for Alumni and Supporters of High Point Athletics

It is important to follow NCAA rules governing the recruitment and treatment of student-athletes. The control and conduct of the High Point University athletic program is the responsibility of the institution as a whole. Ensuring compliance includes taking responsibility for the actions of student-athletes, staff members and any other individual or organization engaged in activities promoting High Point University athletic interest.

While your interest and support of the athletic program is important to the University, your compliance efforts are greatly appreciated because violations could affect the eligibility of either a current student-athlete or a prospective student-athlete. Since it is not possible to cover all NCAA legislation that may apply to alumni or supporters in this informational statement, please forward any additional questions to Mr. Mike Tuttle, Director of Compliance (336-841-4518) or Dr. Woody Gibson, Director of Athletics (336-841-9105) at High Point University.

### DEFINITIONS

#### Representative

A representative of the institution's athletic interest is an individual who has ever:

- participated in or been a member of any agency or organization promoting High Point University athletics (Panther Club, Educational Foundation);
- made financial contributions to the High Point University athletic department or its athletic booster organization;
- assisted in providing extra benefits to enrolled student-athletes (occasional meals, summer jobs, etc.); or
- otherwise promoted the High Point University athletic department.

As High Point University alumni, friends, fans or supporters, you are representatives. This is a status you keep forever.

#### Extra Benefit

An extra benefit is any special arrangement by a representative to provide a service to a student-athlete that is not expressly authorized by NCAA legislation. An extra benefit would include, but is not limited to, the provision of transportation, meals, clothing, entertainment, preferential loan terms, housing and other benefits offered to student-athletes not available to the general student population.

#### Prospective Student-Athlete

A prospective student-athlete prospect is a student who has started classes in the ninth grade. A student remains a prospect even after signing a National Letter of Intent with High Point University. He or she only loses prospect status when High Point University classes begin or at the beginning of official High Point University team practice before the start of classes.

#### National Letter of Intent

A National Letter of Intent (NLI) is the official document used by a college or university to establish a prospect's commitment to attend a specific institution. It is applicable to NCAA Division I and NCAA Division II schools.

### IMPORTANT NCAA RULES REGARDING RECRUITING

#### NCAA Bylaw 13.01.5.1

In Division I, representatives of an institution's athletic interests are prohibited from making in-person, on-or off-campus recruiting contact, or written or telephone communications with a prospect or the prospect's relatives or legal guardians.

#### Limited Exceptions

A representative may have contact with a prospect regarding summer employment provided the prospect has already signed an NLI and the High Point University Director of Compliance and/or Director of Athletics is aware that the representative is making these contacts regarding employment.

A representative may have a phone conversation with a prospect only if the prospect initiates the call. The telephone call may not be prearranged by an institutional staff member and the representative is not permitted to have a recruiting conversation. The representative must refer any questions about High Point University's athletic program to the athletic department staff.

A representative may have contact with a prospect who is an established family friend or neighbor, provided the contact is not made for recruiting purposes and is not initiated by a High Point University coaching staff member.

A representative may view a prospect's high school contest on the representative's own initiative, but the representative may not contact the prospect or the prospect's coach or principal.

If a representative knows of a high school student-athlete who might want to attend High Point University, the only permissible activity for the representative is notifying the appropriate coach.

#### NCAA Bylaws 13.2.1 and 13.2.2

Representatives of the institution's athletic interests shall not be involved, directly or indirectly, in making arrangements for, giving or offering any financial aid or benefits to a prospect or the prospect's relatives or friends such as:

- employment arrangements for prospect's relatives;
- clothing or equipment;
- co-signing loans;
- providing loans;
- cash or cash-like items;
- any merchandise;
- free or reduced-cost services, rentals or purchases;
- free or reduced-cost housing;
- arranging for or sponsoring an awards banquet in honor of high school or two-year college athletes, or
- presenting awards to prospects who have excelled in athletics.

### IMPORTANT NCAA RULES REGARDING CURRENTLY ENROLLED STUDENT-ATHLETES

#### NCAA Bylaw 16.02.3

A student-athlete can not receive an extra benefit from a representative unless it can be demonstrated that the same benefit is available to general High Point University student population.

#### Limited Exception

Representatives may provide an occasional meal for a student-athlete under the following conditions:

- The meal must be provided in the individual's home (as opposed to a restaurant) and may not be catered;
- Meal must be restricted to infrequent and special occasions, and
- Representatives may not provide transportation to a student-athlete to attend a meal function unless the function is held at his or her home.

#### NCAA Bylaw 16.14.5

Representatives or athletic booster clubs may not provide awards to student-athletes.

#### Limited Exception

Representatives or athletic boosters may provide expenses for awards or banquets through the athletic department.

#### Proposition 62 (effective August 1998)

An NCAA Division I student-athlete may earn legitimate on- and off-campus income during semester or term time, provided such income in combination with other financial aid included in the student-athlete's individual limit does not exceed \$2,000.00 above the cost of attendance at the institution. Prior to commencement of employment the student-athlete and employer sign an affidavit which is kept on file in the department of athletics which specifies:

- The student-athlete has not been hired based on his or her athletics ability or the value that the student-athlete may have for the employer because of the athletics reputation or fame the student-athlete has achieved;
- The student-athlete is compensated only for work actually performed; and
- The student-athlete is compensated at a rate commensurate with the going rate in that locality for similar services.

Further stipulations include that:

- The student-athlete has spent one academic year in residence as a full-time student at the certifying institution (includes two-year and four-year transfer as well as freshmen); and
- The student-athlete is eligible academically to compete for the institution.

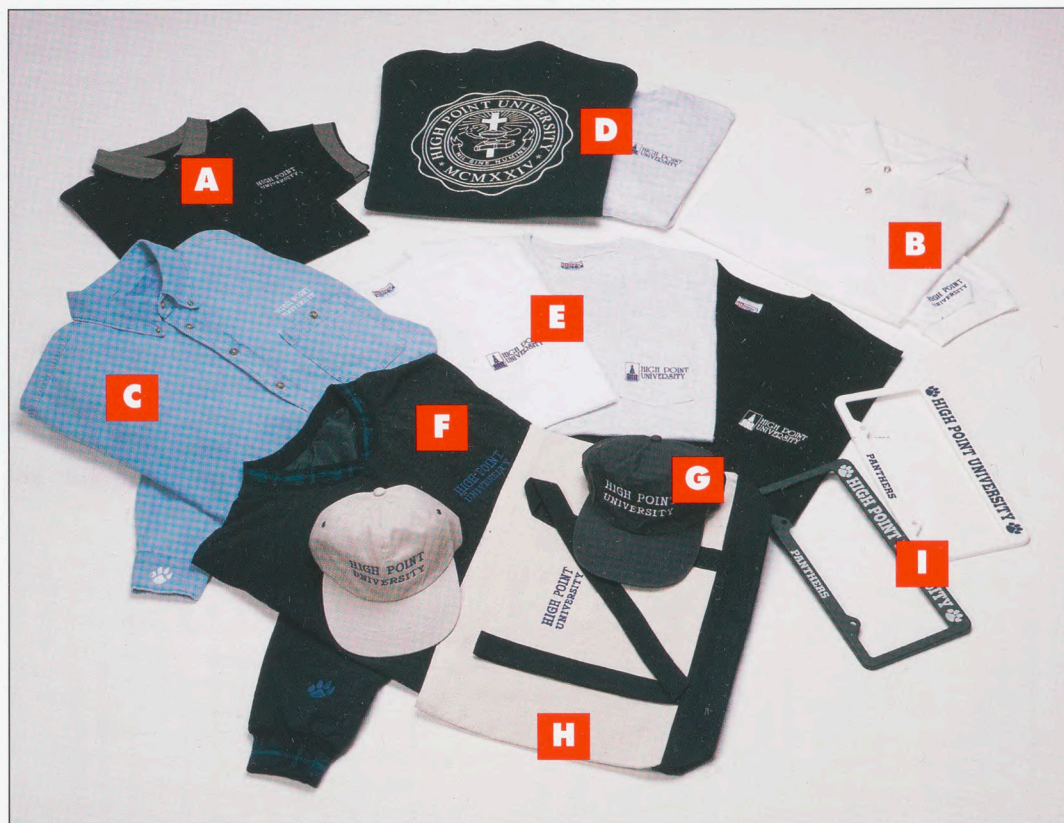
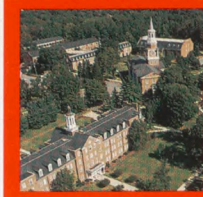

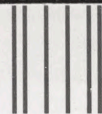
