

Juniors Danny Gathings and Zione White developed into two of the Big South's best players.








The men's team won their second consecutive Big South Championship title as the women placed third on November 1, 2003 in Myrtle Beach, SC.








Lambda Chi Alpha

The sisters are annually involved with the Childrens Miracle Network that colaborates with Duke Childrens Hospital.






Sophisticated Ladies




High Point University is fortunate to have a myriad of vocal groups that range in style from a capella to gospel, from choral to Broadway.




wax candle-making. Spring Fling featured novelty signs, key chains and High Point's favorite comedian Shang.






